Around Town

As this paper goes to press, my wife and I will be in Houston, Texas, for the Texas State Archery Association annual tournament.

Former National, State, and current State champions will be represented there, for two days of intensive competition. The TSAA is a Target Archery organization, affiliated with the National Association. All rules for the tournament are NAA rules.

The events we will be entering will include: The York round, (Mens round), the National and Columbia rounds, (Womens rounds), and the American round, (for both men and women).

The York round, is an event, with distances from 100 yards to 60 yards. A total of 144 arrows are shot in this event, 72 at 100 yards, 48 at 80 yards and 24 at 60 yards.

While the men are shooting the York, the women will be shooting the National and Columbia rounds. The National round calls for 48 arrows at 60 yards and 24 arrows at 50 yards. The Columbia is 24 arrows each at 50, 40 and 30 yards.

After the first rounds have been completed, which will be about five p. m. Saturday afternoon, a Clout round will be shot. This is an additional round for which awards will be given, but will not count toward total score and the championship. For the men the distance is 180 yards and for the women 120. The target is a flag, placed in the ground, marking the center of the scoring area. A total of 36 arrows are shot in this event for a possible score of 324 points.

After a refreshing shower and perhaps a dip in the motel swimming pool, the annual banquet and business meeting will be held. This a l w a y s lasts until about ten or eleven o'clock, then it is to bed and a good night's sleep for all concerned. Tomorrow is another hard day.

Sunday morning the whistle will sound for the second day of shooting.

Sunday's schedule will be two American rounds. The American round is 60, 50, and 40 yard event with a total of 90 arrows being cast, 30 from each distance. The completion of the first American will bring us to lunch time.

Afternoon's schedule is a repetition of the mornings activity, followed by an interesting event called the Wand round. The wand is a piece of soft wood three inches wide with a two inch stripe painted down the center. The wand is driven into the ground, at the 100 yard line for men the 60 yard line for the women, and projects up six feet.

Each archer is allowed 36 arrows to determine who can place an arrow on, or near the line down the center of the wand. Only those arrows that are imbedded in the wood count. This is also an additional round for which awards will be given.

After the days shooting is over, the presentation of awards will be made. Championship trophies in men and womens divisions plus awards for the two additional events.

Now there is nothing left but the long drive home. The fun is over and the road home looks much longer than it did coming.

Two candidates, Richard Herweck and Jerry Bob Warden, were chosen for order of the Arrow.

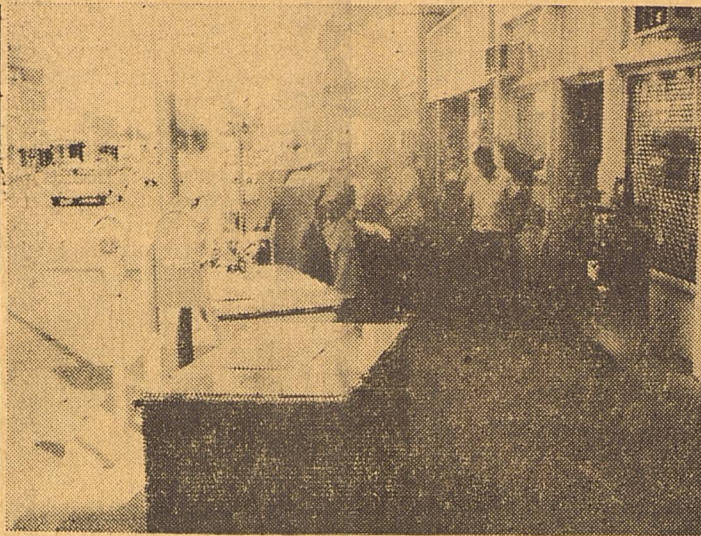

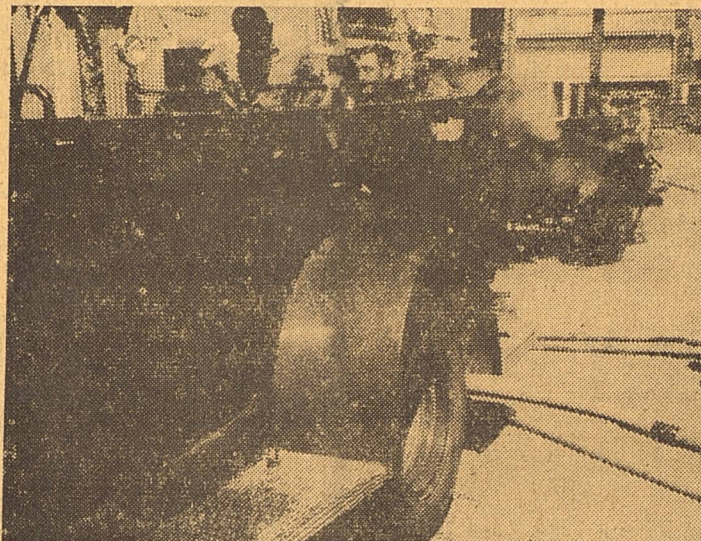
Auction Report

A total of 1156 cattle, 280 hogs, and 54 sheep and goats were sold to 105 buyers at the Eastland Auction sale last Tuesday. There were 290 sellers.

Prices were reported as follows: butcher bulls 16 to 18.7 cents; butcher cows 15 to 17.2 cents; canners and cutters 8 to 14 cents; butcher calves 23 to 25.5 cents; stocker calves (Lt. choice) 28 to 35 cents; stocker calves (Hvy. choice) 24 to 26.1 cents; pairs of cows and calves \$150 to \$218; butcher hogs 16 to 18.5 cents; sows 12 to 14 cents.

L. E. Corbell, 62, Killed In One-Car Wreck Thursday

Funeral services for Louie Edward Corbell, 62, of Eastland who was fatally injured in a one-car accident Thursday at 12:05 p. m., were held Saturday at 2 p. m. in the Hammer Funeral Chapel, with Dr. Cyrus Barcus, Methodist minister, officiating.

Interment was in the DeLeon Cemetery. Rev. B. J. Manley was in charge of graveside rites.

Mr. Corbell was fatally injured when his car overturned about 13 miles southeast of here, in the Kokomo Community. He was alone in the car when the accident occurred.

An Eastland resident for 20 years, Mr. Corbell was employed as butcher at the Worth Food Store in Cisco. He was formerly employed with the Ernest Frozen Food Co. here.

He was born in DeLeon Sept. 5, 1901 and was married to Margaret Hudson in Eastland on Jan. 19, 1934. He lived at 310 N. Dixie.

According to Highway Patrolmen who investigated the accident, he became the fourth

person killed in highway accidents in the state since the holiday death count began.

Surviving are his wife; one son, Dickie, of Eastland; one daughter, Mrs. D. W. Donegan of Fort Worth; two brothers, H. W. and Leon, both of Fort Worth; two sisters, Mrs. Nettie Pittman of DeLeon and Mrs. Bertha Butler of Odessa.

Downtown Fire Causes Light Damage to Maddocks Building

Fast action by the Ranger volunteer fire department prevented what could possibly have been a disaster Wednesday afternoon about 3:30 p. m. when the tar melting machine of the Lydick-Hook Roofing Company of Abilene became overheated and erupted, spreading hot-flaming tar over the ground at the rear of the C. E. Maddocks Insurance Company's building.

The roof of the building was being repaired, with the melting machine in the alley below. Two neighboring buildings form a wall on either side of the small alley, causing poor air circulation in this area. This could possibly have been associated with the overheating.

The burning tar spread to the wooden stairway leading to the apartment above the office. Fire damage appeared to be limited to this area.

One window in the back of the building was broken. The

apartment sustained a limited amount of water and smoke damage as did the office below. The actual amount of damage was not immediately determined.

Men passing in front quick-

ly lent a hand in removing office furniture from the building. After the fire was extinguished and the smoke partially cleared away, all furniture was replaced. No one was injured.

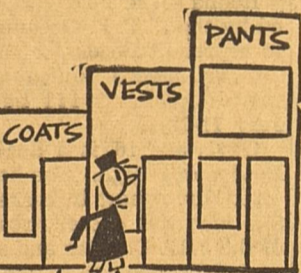

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — A veteran has asked me as his personal physician to get a report of the VA x-ray and laboratory studies made at a recent examination. How can I get this information from the VA?

A — You may secure Form 3288 from the Veterans Administration which will authorize the release of information from the veteran's records. Or the veteran concerned may send to the VA a written statement granting permission to release the information to the doctor.

Q — Are members of my immediate family eligible for VA hospitalization?
A — Veterans only are eligible to receive care in a VA hospital. First priority goes to veterans with service-connected disabilities; after that Service men without service-connected disabilities who are unable to pay for hospital care.

Q — Can I make a reservation for burial plot in a national cemetery?

A — Burial plots are assigned at the time of the funeral. No advance reservations are made. Once the plot has been assigned it is understood that the wife (or the veteran if the wife is already buried there) will be buried there when the later death takes place. In certain cases a child may also be buried there.

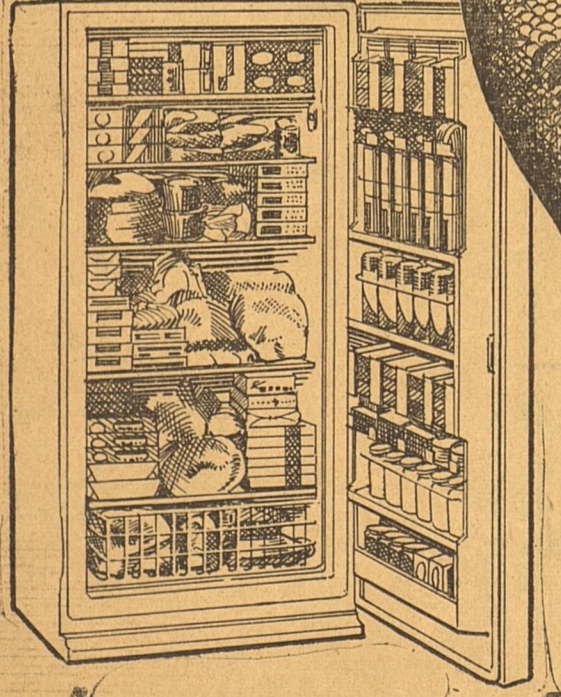

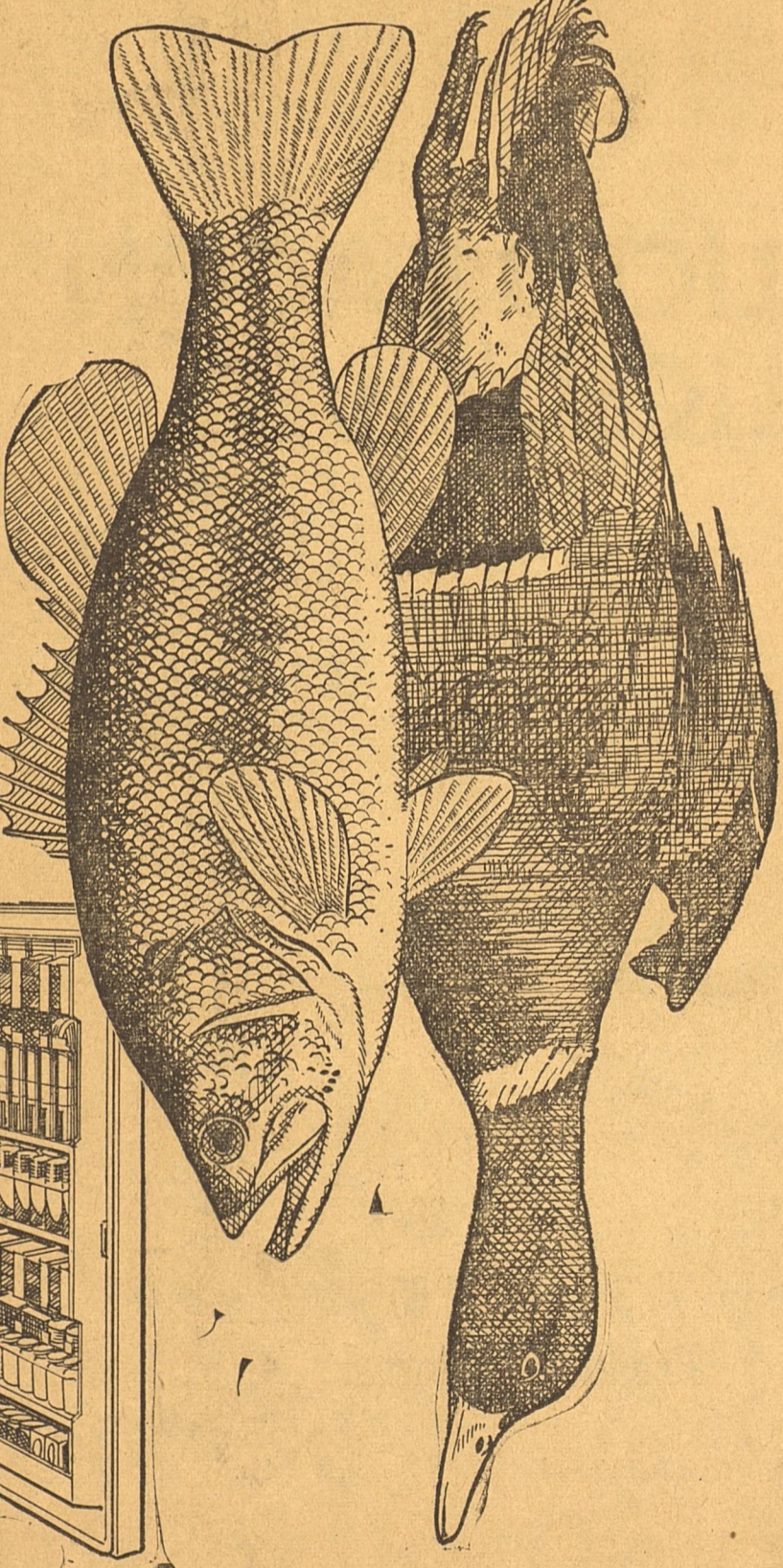
