The fire department continues to be plagued with many grass fires, averaging four or five calls a day for the past few weeks. This is not only a nuisance to the fire fighters but every grass fire is potentially a property destroyer. Present conditions, dry grass, hot dry weather, makes fires of this type almost inevitable unless extreme caution is exercised by everyone.

Every lighted cigarette tossed from the window of an automobile, every uncovered trash burning barrel, is a potential fire starter. Anyone throwing a lighted cigarette from the window of an automobile or burning trash in an uncovered barrel is an arsonist, intentional or unintentional.

The men who fight these fires are men who have volunteered their services to help protect our property against fire damage. These men have jobs which require and need their full time and attention but when the fire siren blows their work is dropped where it is and they rush to a job which pays them not a penny.

If we do not feel that we owe it to ourselves to be cautious, then we do owe it to the members of the volunteer fire department. If they can take time from their work to fight the fires that we start the least we can do is to start fewer fires.

I am sure that many of you have been exposed to the new parking meters located in strategic places along main street.

There have been twenty new meters placed in service here on a trial basis. If they prove profitable to the city then eventually all the old meters will be replaced by this type. The old meters now being used are becoming almost a liability to the city with the extra maintenance required to keep them in an operating condition.

Seven Seek Beer Permits In Ranger

Seven Ranger firms have filed application for permits for beer retailer's off-premise licenses. The seven are Vernon H. Smith, Raymon Bryan, W. A. Kelley, E. D. Hess, Ila Rayford King, Maxie Law, and Garland Carey.

Best estimates are that the firms will be open for business Monday August 5, after their premises have been inspected by the Liquor Control Board, and hearing held for their permits. County Judge Scott Bailey said hearings will probably be Friday, August 2.

Mr. Smith applied for a license for a retail store to be located on Highway 80 East, to be known as Vernon's Liquor Store. Mr. Bryan's license will be for "The Point", on Highway 80 west, and Mr. Kelley's permit will be for a business on Highway 80 West, known as Kelley's Drive-In. Mr. Hess asked permit for a business at 205 N. Austin St., to be known under the name of E. D. Hess, and Mr. Carey's permit will be located on the north side of Highway 80 east, and known as Garland Carey's Drive-In.

County National Guard Units Off Today For Training Duty

Eastland County's Battery "C" of Texas' 49th Armored Division, joined by other units of the Lone Star division, will go by convoy down Texas highways Sunday morning to North Fort Hood where the national guardsmen will undergo two weeks of intensive training.

From 79 Texas cities and towns in almost every corner of the state members of the 49th, who were battle-trained during the Berlin crisis of 1961-62, will convoy to the vast Central Texas military post. More than 7,000 guardsmen will immediately step into their field fatigues and steel helmets and dig in for intensive combat training.

All areas outside the main camp area will automatically become "combat zones" for the guardsmen and conditions will immediately become tactical. This will mean movement at nighttime, passwords to get by rigid internal security guards — and the wearing

It may not be often that the new county jailer, George Carter, has such well known guests in his establishments as William Slawn and Mrs. Millie Jones, who are believed to have robbed Worth Food Store in Ranger last March.

They recently were caught, escaped and were recaptured by authorities in Idaho. Sheriff Lee Horn and Texas Ranger Stewart are expected to return today from Idaho with the suspects of the robbery.

Under Texas law, if they are found guilty they could be given the death sentence, it is reported.

Mr. Carter, formerly of Rising Star, turned in his letter of resignation as constable of Precinct Seven, effective July 1. Mr. Carter said, "I like Eastland very much and it's people."

He has been in the law enforcement business for about ten years and was a resident of Eastland county for over 30 years.

Opportunity was the thing that inspired him to be deputy sheriff in Eastland, he said. The Eastland jail is very clean and has sleeping quarters for about 25 people. In time of fallout in will hold a maximum of 83 people.

In its security cells the walls are made from quarter inch steel with two inch square openings around it.

The jail has three wards, men's, women's and juvenile ward, and security. This jail was built in 1897, and renovated in 1934. Today you can still see the bullet hole left from the Santa Claus bank robber where a deputy was shot to death in 1927.

Mr. and Mrs. George Carter live in the north end of the jail in a neat 3-room apartment. They have two grandchildren.

Mr. Carter learned several things about law enforcement from his father, who was a Texas Ranger.

The event will be held in the open area near the Chock-A-Block Marina at the bridge so that the public can watch

all the shows.

Entries may be mailed in, either to Taylor at Eastland, or to Stroud, at Rt. 3, Cisco. Entry fee is \$2 per person.

Competition will include slalom, doubles and trick skiing.

Grass Fires Harass Fire Department

Officials are urging a pleading Ranger residents to properly cover trash barrels and use every precaution possible when burning trash. With the present dry, hot weather, it only takes a second for a fire to get out of control, causing untold damage.

Browsing With Bev

A slide into first base as the ball whizzes overhead, a riotous game of lawn tag, or even a quiet picnic on the grass. These things are lots of fun for youngsters—but often not for mom. Not if she has grass stains to remove after the fun is over. Prompt treatment and the right method are the answer to this problem.

Here's what to do to remove a stain, either from grass, flowers, or foliage:

Work from the wrong side of the fabric, forcing the stain out instead of in. On washable fabrics, work a detergent into the stain, then rinse. If the stain is stubborn and remains after this treatment, use a chlorine or sodium perborate bleach or hydrogen peroxide. Do not use chlorine bleaches on fabrics that contain silk, wool, or spandex fibers. Read the labels on wash-wear fabrics to see if it is safe to use a chloride bleach.

Treat grass stains on non-washable fabrics the same but try alcohol first—if it is safe for the fabric. Use 1 part alcohol to 2 parts water for stains on an acetate fabric.

If your cakes crack open, it's probably because your oven is too hot.

If you prize the bright red color of fresh meat, one way to preserve it is to brush the meat with vegetable oil before storing it in the refrigerator.

fore storing it in the refrigerator.

To avoid that unappealing "massed" effect when cooking macaroni, noodles, spaghetti or rice, add one tablespoon vegetable oil per quart of boiling, salted water. The oil also prevents the water from boiling over.
