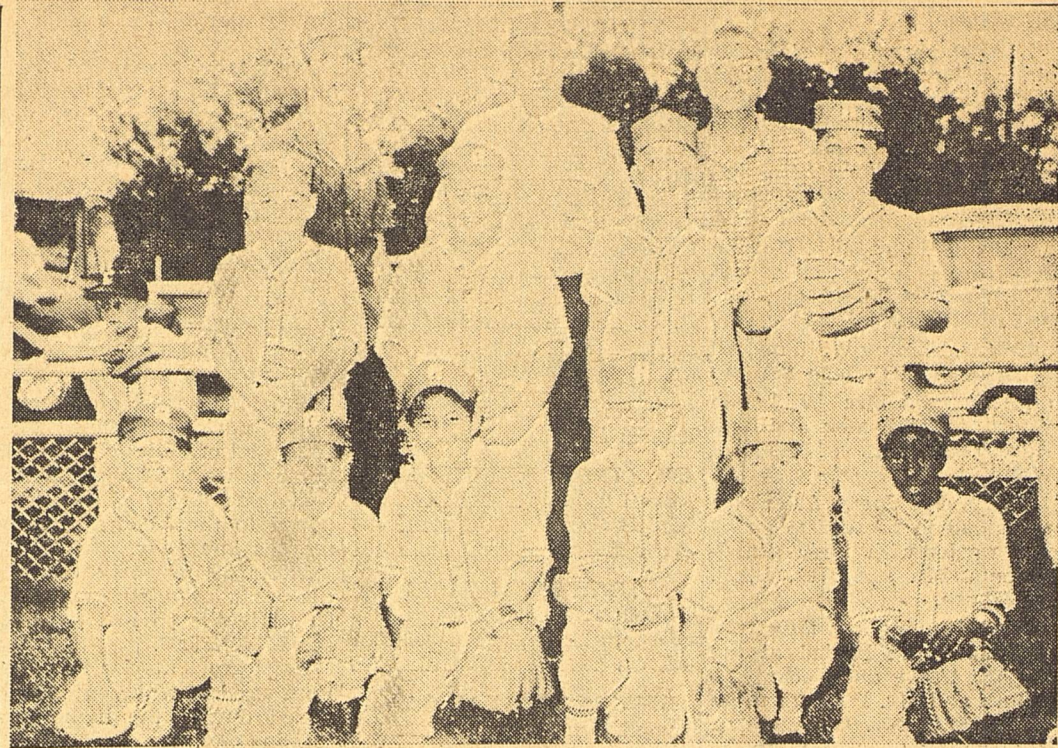
Interment will be in the Bullock Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

Ranger Wet Election Held 'Null And Void'

'Stamped' Ballots Cited As Reason

The liquor stores in Ranger apparently will be closing in about 30 days, after District Judge T. M. Collie declared the March wet vote null and void as the result of a "rubber stamp" Monday.

The hearing in the contested election got underway Monday morning in 91st District Court, and Judge Collie gave his ruling on a motion by the contestants immediately after noon recess.

During the morning session, Calvin Brown, election judge, was put on the stand by Attorney David Hooper of Abilene, and during testimony, admitted that at the time of the

March election, he had not signed the ballots but instead had used a rubber stamp to affix his name to the ballots.

Hooper asked that the election be declared null and void, and Judge Collie took the motion under consideration.

Eastland Attorney Frank Sparks, representing the wet forces, gave notice of exceptions and of appeal following the judge's pronouncement.

It was assumed that with the March election so declared null and void, the circumstances are approximately where they were immediately after the commissioners court called for another continuation because of the absence of "unusual subpoenaed witnesses."

Three young men testified Monday that they voted in the March election, and that they were only 20 years old at the time. However, the trio did hold exemption certificates, it was pointed out.

Judge Collie said in part of his decision:

"Article 821 of the Election Code reads as follows: 'Likewise, no ballot shall be counted if it is found to be fraudulent, but in the absence of a showing of fraud, the mere failure of the presiding judge to sign the ballots shall not make any such ballot illegal.'"

"This provision of the election laws was enacted by the 52nd Legislature in 1951.

"Article 666.36 of the Criminal Code, providing for liquor elections, reads as follows: 'The provisions of the general election law shall be followed in calling and conducting said election where not inconsistent herewith.'"

"Article 666.35 of the Criminal Code provides: 'No ballot shall be received or counted by the officers at such election that has not the name of the presiding officer of such election written thereon in the handwriting of such presiding officer as provided by this Act.'"

"These two provisions of the Election Laws were enacted in 1953, two years after the enactment of the general election code, and being inconsistent with said election code, these provisions of the liquor laws must be followed.

"Under the provisions of Article 666.35, no ballot should have been received or counted.

"IT IS, THEREFORE, the order of the Court that said election is null and void, and the costs of this contest is charged against the intervenors, Calvin Brown and Raymond Bryan."

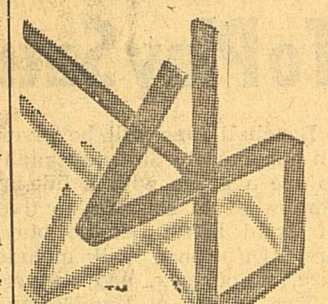

TDPS Accident Report For May Is Released

The Texas Department of Public Safety this week released a summary of accidents that occurred in Eastland County during the month of May.

No fatalities resulted from a tower of four personal injury accidents, however, nine persons were injured. A total of \$4,280.00 in damages was reported to have resulted from the five property damage accidents.

Two fatal accidents occurred during the first five months of this year, compared to the same period last year in which no fatalities were reported.

The 1962 report of personal injury accidents topped the 1963 total of 20 by one, but 42 persons were injured in the first five months of 1963 compared to the 32 during those months last year.

1963's 39 property damage accidents resulted in \$4,280.00 while the 35 last year totaled \$42,480.00.

Total accidents for this year numbered 61 while only 56 occurred during the same period in 1962.

State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

Texas Research League, a nonprofit government study organization that does many administration studies at the request of the state, has issued a report on its year-long probe of the Railroad Commission. Many of its recommendations on agency management and oil and gas conservation already are being programmed.

One scheduled change involvement of Railroad Commission district offices. Commission now has 12 such offices. Responsibilities with respect to wells and staff members are so varied that the League believes the system unfairly imbalanced.

League's answer to the problem is to redistrict and cut the districts from 12 to 10. The huge Midland district would be divided into three areas with new offices at Lubbock and Fort Stockton.

If and when Congress approves a \$1,500,000 appropriation to meet the land-buying needs of Padre Island National Seashore park, newly-named park superintendent William L. Bowen will begin to acquire land for the proposed 80.5-mile coastal playground.

Gov. John B. Connally entertained his "Committee of 25" with a coffee, then set them to work. Committee has the year-long task of studying education beyond the high school.

Connally told them Texas needs a "total policy to guide all institutions, all segments of our higher education enterprise." He said this included state, church and private

schools, junior and senior colleges and academic and technical institutions.

Reported abuses of home building practices and loans were the subject of a recent conversation between Governor Connally and Lubbock District Attorney Alton Griffin, president of the state district and county attorneys association.

Connally said, "It may be that additional legislation will be necessary to get at the heart of the matter."

One reported abuse that concerns them is the alleged practice of "double contracting" wherein 100 per cent home financing is achieved by cushioning appraisals and other real estate sales documents.

After August 23, the governor will have to make 15 more state board appointments. These 15 citizens named will take the place of just one man — Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

Switch was made possible by the attorney general, which passed during the recent legislative session. End result will be to peel down the pile of "ex officio" jobs, which have burdened attorneys general in the past, and give Carr more time for his main job as the state's head lawyer.

About 300 state labor leaders came to Austin to reflect on the accomplishments — or lack of accomplishments — of the 58th Legislature.

As session achievements were listed the Padre Island bill, Municipal Annexation bill, Tourist Devel-

opment program, Water Storage expansion and provisions for teacher retirement.

Measures for rural development, which did not pass, were among what were considered failures of the Legislature.

Although state and federal animal health officials reported that 72 Texas counties are now tagged "screwworm infested" the report was good news, said Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Garrett said that 333 samples confirmed as screwworms in the March 31-April 27 period represented a decrease of 95 to 98 per cent in the number of cases in years before project went into effect.

The 58th Legislature passed two proposed 'states' rights' amendments to the U. S. Constitution. But both are a long way from changing the law of the land.

One would make it simple for the states to initiate other amendments to the constitution; the other would prevent federal courts from ruling on states redistricting as population shifts occur.

To make the grade, both would have to be adopted by 34 states. So far, only 11 have approved the first proposal, and 12 have affirmed the second.

ASTIN — Texas will meet the 1963 tornado season with one of the world's most complete storm warning systems and with a well-oiled public health relief organization.

Radar storm warning sets are in operation in 15 of the state's 18 first-order weather bureaus. All state highway patrolmen have been carefully schooled in the wily ways of the weather and are keeping a sharp eye on the sky as they patrol their sectors.

Texas' "local severe weather warning system," the first of its kind established anywhere in the world, is made up of sets operating around the clock in Amarillo, Abilene, Austin, Brownsville, Corpus Christi, Galveston, Fort Worth, Houston, Port Arthur, San Angelo, San Antonio, Victoria, Waco and Wichita Falls.

Of the first-order weather stations which cover all sections of Texas, only El Paso, Laredo and Del Rio do not have radar storm warning sets

Meanwhile, these precautions are still valid if and when a tornado is sighted: Cut off gas and water before it strikes. Open windows on the north and east side of the house. If possible, take shelter in a storm cellar or cave. If this is impractical, sit down on the lowest floor of a strongly reinforced building, or against the southwest corner of a house. Stay away from windows.

In open country, move away at right angles to the path of the storm. If there is no time to escape lie flat in a ditch or depression to avoid flying debris. (A weekly feature of the Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)
