## STAMPEDE OF CATTLE SAVES MOONSHINERS

Barnes and McDowell Seize Big Still and Liquor in Palo Pinto Canyon.

The stampeding of a bunch of cattle in a canyon two miles below the Hagaman dam this morning saved several moonshiners operating a large and well equipped still from capture at the hands of Deputy Sheriff John Barnes and Police Chief Shell Mc-Dowell. The men, who could be heard talking, took to the thick underbrush when the cattle bolted at the officers' approach. One, returning to investigate, spied the officers hiding in the brush and on refusing to halt was fired upon by Chief Mc-Dowell but is thought to have escaped uninjured.

The still, which is said to be one of the most complete uncovered in this section, had a capacity of approximately 80 gallons and was located in perhaps the most inaccessible spot of the main canyon of the Palo Pinto, about six miles northeast of town. ## GAS STOCKS DECREASING

NEW YORK, Aug. 17 .- Gascline stocks held at United States refineries at the end of July de-creased for the third consecutive month according to a weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. The decrease during July was 441,930 barrels, the figures covering approximately 66.7 per cent of the refining operating capacity.

There was a net decrease of all liquid stock held at refineries of 558,588 barrels. North Texas showed an increase of 850 barrels; Central Texas an increase of 950 barrels; the Mexia pool is reported at 64,000 barrels.

No changes were reported in crude oil prices for the major districts.


