

State Animal Control **Representative Meets** With Eastland Men

O. L. Coleman, assistant leader of predatory animal control for the state, was in Eastland, Thursday, conferring with parties leading the fight for the destruction of predatory animals in this county.

"Twenty seven trappers under federal supervision," Coleman said in speaking of the importance of such a movement, "have been em-ployed in the following counties near Eastland for the purpose of

destroying predatory animals: "Commanche, Brown, Coleman Palo Pinto, Erath, Somervell, Hood, Parker, Tarrant, Young, Jack, Clay, Denton, Bosque, Mc-Lennan and Hamilton. The first of these counties to organize was Bosque, which organization was ef-fected in July 1927. Recently re-ports from that county are to the effect that there has been more netting wire sold to those who have gone into the sheep and goat business within the last six months than during the entire history of the county theretofore. In none of these counties has the work of destroying the predatory ainmals been abandoned but the work is still being carried forward. "Experience has demonstrated

that the employment of skilled trappers under Government supersion is the most practical and effective way of destroying predatory animals. However, if the


