Griffith was regarded by many as the strongest of all the Irish leaders. He was born in Dublin in 1872, the son of Arthur Griffith, a printer. He was founder and first editor of the Sinn Fein and later editor of Nationality, an Irish Sinn Fein organ. Ill Ten Days.

Griffith was ill only ten days and his illness was not considered serious. Yesterday, however, he suffered a sudden collapse and died early this morning. His death occurred at 9:45 o'clock this morning in St. Vincents hospital, Dublin, which he entered 10 days ago for an operation for tonsilitis. He was recovering from the op-


