An ambulance was summoned for the injured California residents and they were taken to Ranger General Hospital where they were treated for cuts and bruises, according to reports. They resumed their journey to Dallas by bus later in the day.

Ruth Ramey Ends Career With Extension Service

Ruth Ramey of Richmond, home demonstration agent in Fort Bend County since March 1, 1945, will close out what is believed to be the longest continuous record of Extension work by a woman agent in Texas when she retires Aug. 31. She will complete 40 years and two months of continuous service on that date.

Her Extension career began in Eastland county on June 26, 1923. She went to Wharton county Nov. 1, 1941, then transferred to Fort Bend county 18 years ago. She has helped bring about many changes in homemaking practices through county extension education programs spanning the four decades.

"During this period, which began during the heyday of the Model T and lasted through the present period of excellent roads and air-conditioned automobiles, Extension programs have been adapted to meet the needs of the people. We have moved away from basic skill-type instruction in cooking, sewing and canning to the family-centered approach. Major emphasis now is being placed on involvement of people, the coordinated subject matter approach, and management. We work with people through the county program building process and strengthen our programs by calling on professional and resource people to help us," she pointed out.

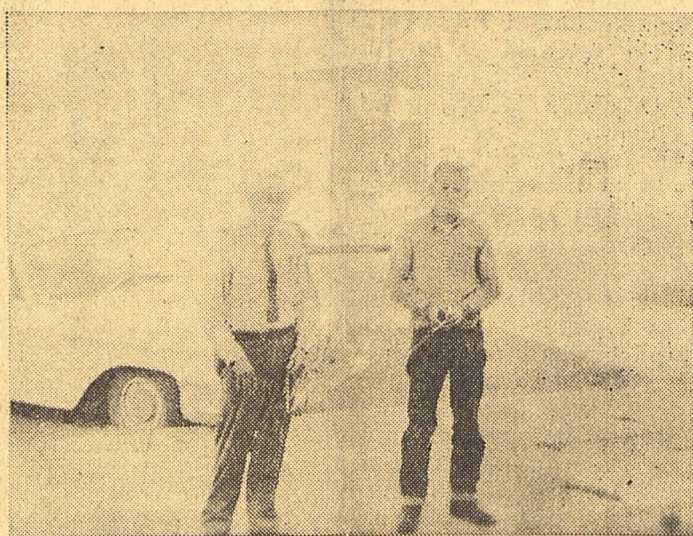
There was a time when it was easy to distinguish between rural and urban women, but today the woman who lives outside the city is just as smartly dressed and as well informed as her urban friend, Miss Ramey said. "Today, we work more and more with women who do not belong to home demonstration clubs. The HD members, who are thoroughly trained in leadership, assist on subcommittees of the overall county program building committee and work as adult leaders with the 4-H program."

At the time she began work with the Extension Service, the beef canning program was underway, and agents did virtually everything "but kill the animal." Cutting up the meat was an ordinary part of the job, and the canning was done primarily in a "retort," a large cast iron container in which 15 of the No. 3 cans of meat could be processed at the same time. Pressure canners were being used also, but they could process only 8 cans of that size at one time, so the larger container was more popular, she said.

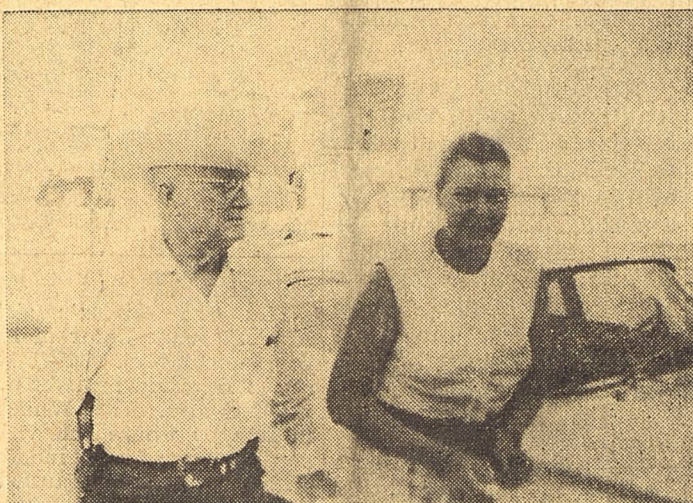
"When a beef was to be canned, everyone in the family took part. There was plenty of work to keep the men, women and children busy from dawn to dusk and sometimes later. From 300 to 500 cans a day was a peak performance by using several retorts," Miss Ramey said. The shift to food freezing began about 20 years ago, when frozen food lockers became available to families, and freezing still dominates the food preservation work. Glass containers have replaced the cans for today's preserved and home canned foods, the agent emphasized.

Miss Ramey has worked with adults and youth during her 40-year career as a county home demonstration agent. Assistant agents have worked with her in the youth programs of Wharton and Fort Bend counties. Her outstanding work won for her the Distinguished Service Award given by the National Home Demonstration Agents Association several years ago.

A native of Sulphur Springs, Miss Ramey was graduated from high school there and from Texas Woman's University. She has attended workshops there and at Texas A&M College and Fort Collins, Colorado.

NEW DORMITORY TO BE READY FOR FALL TERM

The new addition to the men's dormitory at Ranger Junior College will be ready for occupancy by September 1, according to Richard Henderson, president of the Board of Regents.

This structure, which will double the capacity of the new dormitory, occupied only last January, will house 106 students. Work on Newell Hall, also a dormitory for men, will also be completed by September 1, Henderson said. The renovation on Newell Hall has included new aluminum window frames, paneling

of interior walls, new floors, enlargement of the resident supervisor's apartment, new plumbing fixtures and new paint, inside and out.

The two new buildings, which face each other across Sinclair Ave., on the campus, are both of light cream brick.

Four more buildings, now on the architect's drawing board will be put up for bids by August 15. The final plans are to be presented to the Board of Regents for approval by August 10, by Elam and Associates, architects and engineers of Wichita Falls. The four buildings will include administration, science, classroom and gymnasium.

Three Local Women Receive Their Diplomas

Recently receiving diplomas from the 15th Annual School Lunch Workshop were Mmes. C. E. Beck, K. E. Falls, and Wilson Simpson of Ranger.

Instruction was given to 200 school cafeteria workers all over the state.

The week long workshop was sponsored by South West Texas State College of San Marcus and was directed by the Home Economics Department in co-operation with the San Marcus public schools, the Texas Education Agency, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Cafeteria workers attending were grouped into five classifications; New Cook, Old Time Cooks, New Managers and Supervisors, Old Time Supervisors and Managing Supervisor, in assigned classes and demonstrations according to group.

Session topics included Business Management, Bookkeeping, Determining Yield and Proportion, Buying and Ordering Food, Safety in the Kitchen, and many other related topics.

Staff members and consultants, represented all areas of the state, particularly Lubbock, Dallas, Austin and Houston.

Consultants included Henry I. Boies, Marked In Specialist; Doyce Jaeschke, Home Economics, both of the U. S. Department of the Interior.

Out of state consultants included Ruth Powell, State Director of the School Lunch Program in Little Rock, Arkansas; and Shirley Lee Wilson, research for Foods' Research Institute in San Francisco, California.

A spokesman for the women reported that they thoroughly enjoyed the week and will feel better prepared this fall when they go back to the task of feeding the school children.

With Ivy Rash . . .

Millie Jones And Friend Returned To County Jail

Mrs. Millie Jones and William Splawn, jail-breakers and robbery suspects, were returned to the Eastland County Jail Sunday afternoon.

Both said they were happy to be back — and except for a total body rash on Mrs. Jones, neither looked the worse for wear after their Idaho escapade.

Returned from Lewiston, Idaho, by Sheriff Lee Horn and Texas Ranger Earl Stewart of Blanket, the pair faces charges of armed robbery of the Worth Food Market in Ranger.

"Treatment was had in Idaho," Mrs. Jones reported, and her boyfriend Splawn echoed the complaint about the bad time they'd had in that state.

The two were captured at a roadblock in Idaho by the FBI on an illegal flight to avoid prosecution charge in connection with the Ranger robbery.

Escape from the Lewiston jail followed Mrs. Jones' striking the jailer with a home-made club (bars of soap tied in a shirt sleeve). She then released Splawn and the two fled the jail by a fire escape in the early-morning break. A freighted motorist later left his auto, keys and all, to them, which they wrecked before they took to the woods.

The woods proved a poor hiding place because poison ivy was "everywhere" Mrs. Jones said. She hadn't been given medical treatment, she said, after they were captured and returned to the jail, even though the rash had become infected.

When the pair arrived at the local jail Sunday, Mrs. Jones appeared to be covered with the rash.

Mrs. Jones happily posed for pictures and talked freely after learning that a newspaper reporter was present.

Vaccination Clinic To Be Held In Strawn

Dr. John Foster, Ranger veterinarian, will conduct a dog and cat rabies vaccination clinic in the Strawn City Hall Saturday, August 10, from 2:30 to 5:30 p. m.

People having dogs and cats that are over six months old and have not been vaccinated within the past year, are encouraged to take advantage of the Strawn City Council sponsored clinic.

It is not mandatory that this clinic be attended, and there has been no out-break of the disease, although one rabid Skunk was found and killed in the area a short time ago. The vaccination that will be given is of a one year duration. It is necessary to have the shot repeated each year. There will be a vaccination certificate issued along with a vaccination tag.

ROUGH FISH TOTALS 89 POUNDS IN TWO WEEKS

A total of 89 pounds of rough fish has been weighed in at Lake Leon in the first two weeks of the rough fish tournament.

Included in the catch was a 9-pound carp, caught on a trot line by Boone Yarbrough of Ranger, which tied for first place last week with a 9-pound carp caught by Randy Honea of Cisco.

Mr. Honea also had pulled in a 7 lb., 4 lb., and 3 lb. catch. Other winners were Luther Kirkpatrick with an 8 lb. carp, June Trout of Eastland with a 6 1/2 lb and 4 lb. carp, and Z. O. Mehaffey of Eastland with a 6 lb buffalo.

The water board is conducting the tournament to try to decrease the rough fish population in Lake Leon, and during the second week of the tournament almost twice as many rough fish were weighed in as was weighed in the first week.

The tournament will continue indefinitely with a weekly prize of \$5 for the largest rough fish caught during the

"Please say that we're very happy that Mr. Horn (Sheriff Lee) came after us. We knew we'd get good treatment from him," she said.

"If that constable from Cisco had come for us," she added, "he'd never have got back here with us."

Reluctant to talk about the Ranger robbery Sunday, the two said they had decided that they will plead guilty.

Sheriff Horn reported an uneventful trip from the Idaho town to Eastland, with the two in heavy shackles and handcuffs. When the auto drove up to the jail curb, Splawn was sitting in the front with the Ranger Stewart driving, and Horn and Millie in the back seat.

Big Grocery Bill Expected As 49th Men Take To Field

NORTH FORT HOOD — There is a lot to the old adage that a soldier moves forward on his stomach — that is, he likes to eat.

The grocery bill of the 49th Armored Division, Texas National Guard, during its two weeks of training here proves that point.

Enough food will be rationed out to feed a city the size of Waco — or about 105,000 people — in one day.

For example, if all the bread the division consumed were stretched loaf to loaf, the "bread line" would extend past Gatesville, six miles away. It involves about 28,608 loaves.

And there will be enough coffee for about 200,000 cups. Operating the division's "super market" — better known in military terms as the ration breakdown — is 2d Lt. Sam Lucchese of Austin, a member of the 249th Supply and Transportation Battalion.

His chief clerk, SFC Granville Moehring of Austin, put the pencil to the ration estimates and came up with the 49th's market list for the 1963 camp.

By Aug. 11 the last day of camp, the "Lone Star" men will have put under their pistol belts some 58,496 pounds of meat, and another 12,480 pounds of poultry.

Naturally, there will be a side order of 60,352 pounds of potatoes.

The 49th Division will spread round 7,872 pounds of butter, 5,440 pounds of flour and, also in the dairy department, 358,400 half-pints of milk.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:

"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision."
"All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political subdivision within said county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and providing that the recipients of the benefits for said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointed officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

"AGAINST the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointed officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1963, and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

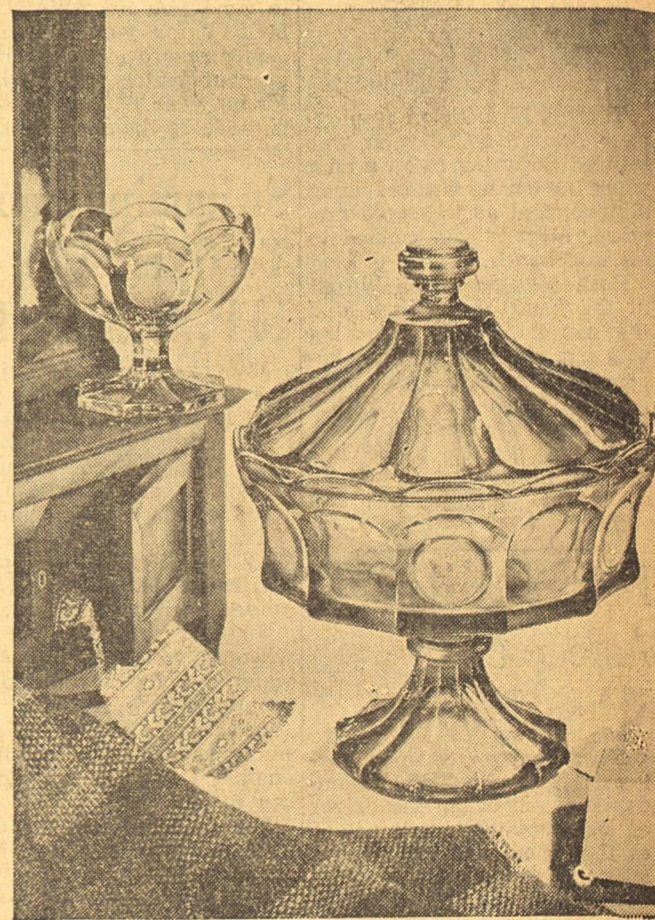

Peanut Growers From Wide Area Due At Meeting

Peanut growers from Texas and Oklahoma are expected to attend this year's annual meeting in Stephenville on August 16 in extremely large numbers. The Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, founded in 1937, now consists of better than 10,000 active peanut grower members. Its principal office, located at Gorman, serves as headquarters for the organization and extends its operation areas west of the Mississippi River.

This includes the states of Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Louisiana, Arkansas, Arizona and California. The Association serves peanut growers in many ways including making available price support loans, keeping the growers abreast of marketing and production information, encouraging research on Southwest peanuts and representation of growers on the State and National levels with respect to administrative and legislative matters.

The vast geographical area covered by the Association is divided into 7 districts. The growers in each district are represented by a member of the Board of Directors. These directors are Johnnie Rollins, Granbury, Texas, president;

Jesse Leach, Holdenville, Oklahoma, vice-president; D. B. Warren, Gorman, Texas, secretary-treasurer; Cecil Bynum, Pleasanton, Texas; Barton Scott, Binger, Oklahoma; Roy Gentry, Shawnee, Oklahoma; and Elvin Walker, DeLeon, Texas. The administrative officers of the Association are Ross Wilson, Gorman, Texas, assistant manager.

Since the Association was organized in 1937, its peanut grower members have received over \$4,600,000 in cash dividends resulting from the marketing activities carried out by the Association. In recent years the Association has been delegated the additional responsibilities of handling the diversion of surplus peanuts and of handling all activities pertaining to the Cold Storage of shelled stocks held by Commodity Credit Corporation.

The meeting at Stephenville August 16 will begin at 10 a. m. in the Agricultural Auditorium of Tarleton State College. Educational data of much interest and of vital importance to growers will be presented by a panel of experts from Texas A&M University and Oklahoma State University. These meetings at Stephenville the past several years have been highly successful and this year's meeting is expected to be no exception.

A complimentary lunch will be served at noon in the spacious college cafeteria. After

lunch a report regarding Association activities will be presented and door prizes will be awarded to the holders of lucky numbers. Johnnie Roll-

ins, Association President emphasizes that all peanut growers and persons interested in important meeting.

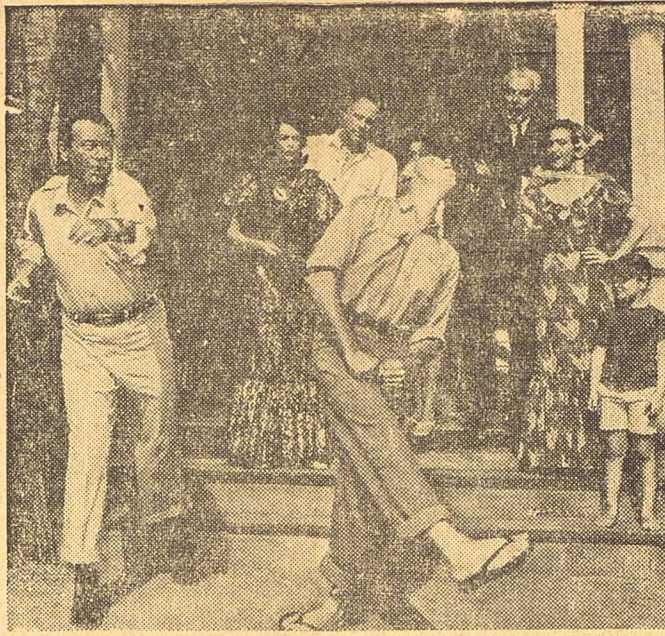
Walker Family Holds Its Annual Reunion

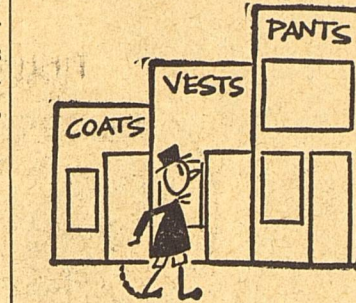
