



## Mrs. Landers To Teach In Japan This Year

Mrs. Clara Landers of 605 Young Street, has been selected by the department of Defense to teach in the air force departments schools of Japan for the school year of 1963-64. She is the daughter of Mrs. R. E. Barker and the late Mr. Barker of Ranger.

Mrs. Landers has been assigned guidance work in the elementary school at the Yokota Air Base in the Tokyo area by Pacific Air Force School Superintendent Richard R. Meyering and Major John Ward, director of the Pacific Air Force Dependents Schools. Pupil enrollment at Yokota is expected to be 1,700 with a teaching staff of 65 for grades one to five.

The air force school system in Japan operated ten elementary schools, five junior high and six senior high schools for dependents of military and civilian personnel assigned to bases located on the central and southern islands of Japan. The distance between the northernmost school at Misawa and the southernmost school at Itotzuka is over 1,000 miles. The student populations vary from 250 to 2,500 in the different areas. A total enrollment of approximately 15,000 pupils is anticipated for the 1963-64 school year in Japan, with a teaching staff of 750 American teachers.

The 1963-64 school year dependents school staff, of which Mrs. Landers is a member, includes administrators, faculty members, guidance personnel, music and art specialists, nurses, remedial reading and speech specialists, specialists in education of the exceptional children, and health and physical education specialists. The staff represents teachers from nearly every state in the union, and are professionally trained, possessing an overall average of seven years' experience. One of the advantages, both to the dependents schools and to the area, is the exchange of skills, ideas and suggestions.

Air force dependents schools are located in Germany, England, Azores, France, Libya, Labrador, Japan, Spain, Newfoundland, Italy, Turkey, Korea and the Philippines. The majority of overseas schools are located in countries which offer cultural and educational opportunities that will enrich a teacher's professional career. There will be opportunities to travel to historic places and cultural centers or attend a foreign university during overseas stay.

Mrs. Landers has been granted

a leave of absence from the Ranger school district while serving in this overseas assignment. She plans to leave Abilene terminal airport on August 11, and will arrive in San Francisco by jet at 6:27 p. m. Travel from Travis air base will be made during the flight — at Honolulu and Wake Island. Approximately 30 hours of air travel will be required from San Francisco to Tachikawa air base near Tokyo.

Adequately furnished living quarters at the housing area near school locations will be furnished for teachers. On arrival in Japan, new teachers will be met and personally greeted by members of the teaching staff. The 1963-64 school year for teachers will begin on August 15 and end June 5, 1964. Class sessions with pupils begin August 26. The Christmas vacation will extend from Dec. 21 to Jan. 6, and a spring vacation will be observed for one week prior to Easter Sunday. These vacations will provide an opportunity to visit such places as Hong Kong, the Philippines and other places of interest.

Mrs. Landers is a graduate of Ranger High School and Ranger Junior College. She attended the University of Texas for several summers and received her B. S. degree from Hardin-Simmons University in 1940. After the death of her husband, N. E. Landers in 1960, she returned to Hardin-Simmons and received her masters degree in elementary education in August, 1962. She is completing requirements for guidance and counseling and has also studied library science at Texas Womens' University

## Draft Boards Will Call 609 In September

AUSTIN — State draft boards will get their biggest monthly quota in nearly two years in September.

The call for September asks for 609 men for Army service, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

This is the biggest state quota since November 1961, when the quota was 923.

The September call of 609 compares with 552 for August, 349 for July, and 187 for June. The September call is the state's share of a national quota of 12,000 men.

The state Selective Service director also announced pre-induction physical and mental examinations for 2,060 men in September.

Local board quotas for the September call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The September quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on September 1, except volunteers and those legally termed delinquent under the law, who may be younger.

## Cisco Club Will Give Free Show

An estimated 40 persons from Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Comanche, Midland and Abilene had by Friday entered for competition in the First Annual Water Skiing Tournament that will be held today at Lake Leon, according to Freddie Stroud, tournament director.

The event will be held in the open area near the Chock-A-Block Marina at the bridge so that spectators can watch all the shows. The ski show will begin at 1 p. m. and there will be a category for just about everyone.

Stroud has announced that for men there will be divisions of: up to 14; 15 to 18; 19 to 24; and 24 up; and for women, up to 14; 14 to 24; and 25 up. Trick skiers will not compete by ages, he said.

Fifteen trophies will be presented, one for doubles and one for slalom in each age group and one for trick skiing.

George Ford of Eastland will make the trophy presentations. Judges for the contest will be Glenn Scallorn of Eastland, Virgil Moore of Breckenridge and Richard Moore of Cisco. A second judge from Breckenridge is expected.

The American Water Skiers Association rules will be followed.

Ski requirements for all but trick skiing are that each entrant must use skis not more than eight inches wide, nor under four feet long. Extra skis will be available for contestants.

Wayne Jackson of Eastland has been named safety commissioner and will be in charge of equipment inspections.

Deadline for entry in the contest was Sunday morning.

An hour long spectacular Ski Show will precede the skiing competition and the public is welcome for the afternoon-long water sport festival.

Dr. Chief Brown of Cisco will present his Cisco Ski Club in performance and one of the highlights will be a five-man pyramid skiing demonstration by Gene Agnew, Rodney Callaway, Bill Midkiff, Rupert Brown and Dick Sander.

Rupert Brown of Cisco will also demonstrate "barefoot" skiing.

Other demonstrations and performances will consist of a three-man pyramid, two girls' slalom water ballet, two-man precision slaloms, three-man cross-over and under precision, and two skiers riding on a slalom.

Participants in these demonstrations will be Paula and Gene Agnew, Rodney Callaway, Bill Midkiff, Dick Sander, Jim Dolgener, Beverly Benton, Colette and Rupert Brown. Others assisting who will accompany the group will be Sandra Lane, Louise Woods and Barbara Callaway.

Adding merriment, too, will be a special clown act "right off the streets of Eastland." Identity of the clowns will not be revealed, and spectators will be pitting their wits to guess who's who.

A large crowd is expected for the first annual event.

## Farmers And Ranchers Add Much To State's Economy

Texas farmers and ranchmen are continuing to contribute mightily to the general economic welfare of their state and nation. They are big spenders on main street, points out John McHaney, extension economist, despite the fact their numbers are decreasing. Their purchases of production and consumer items continue to increase and are a determining factor in many counties for business conditions.

On an annual basis, Texas farmers and ranchmen spend about \$1,848,000,000 in their operations. Included is 44.9 million dollars for hired labor and machine hire; 398 million for seed, feed, plants, fertilizer and lime; 310 million for livestock bought and livestock expenses; 301 million for machinery purchased and for repairs and maintenance; 119 million for petroleum products; 67 million for construction materials; 57 million for miscellaneous crop expenses and 147 million for other expenses including interest and insurance.

Emphasizing the importance of agricultural spending, Mc-

Haney points out that three-fourths of all the manufacturing in the state is confined to about six percent of the counties. Also, that in 208 counties more workers are hired on farms and ranches than in manufacturing and in 215 counties the value of agricultural production exceeds that of manufacturing.

Many businesses in our towns and cities are existing wholly or in part on agriculture and their employees spend their money for various consumer items which have a multiplying effect on main street.

Farmers and ranchmen, McHaney explains, because of the cost-price squeeze and the need for more efficient production, have used machines to replace high cost labor whenever possible. Tractors, trucks, combines, cotton picking machines and strippers, corn pickers, pick-up hay balers, home freezers, telephones, electrical equipment of many kinds, milking machines and much other machinery have become standard equipment during the past 20 years.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT**  
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.  
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:  
"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision."  
Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1963, and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.
