## Safety Tips . . .

### PROTECT YOUR FOODS FOR JULY 4th HOLIDAY OUTING

The great American holiday — the July 4th weekend — is almost here again.

For millions of American families it will be a four-day year. And for almost every family the long holiday weekend will bring at least one family picnic.

The July 4th picnic is as traditional in America as the hot dog — which often is a main staple of the picnic lunch. Even the flies and the ants have a big time at picnics.

But now and then picnics end in tragedy — the tragedy of food poisoning. Most foods spoil quickly in hot weather and away from refrigeration. If there are a few staphylococci bacteria present, they need only a few hours of time and a warm temperature to grow rapidly. Some foods can become poisoned in as little as five or six hours on a hot day.

There are some easy and simple ways to avoid food poisoning on a picnic. One valuable item is a good portable icebox. Chill the foods thoroughly in the refrigerator at home. Use plenty of ice. Make sure the lid is tight. This will keep your perishables fresh.

Take along the sandwich ingredients in the original wrappings and containers and make up your picnic lunch on the spot, just before mealtime. Take the ham in a sealed can and open it at mealtime. The same applies to mayonnaise. Keep the boiled eggs and potatoes separate in the ice box, and mix the potato salad at the last minute.

Stick to canned foods and sealed jars and bottles that can be opened just before serving. Be careful about pies and cream-filled bakery items. They spoil very fast on a hot day. Fresh fruits keep better and will make good desserts.

It's actually not very difficult to insure safe picnic meals. Just follow your home practice of refrigerating those foods that need it. If you make up a hamper of sandwiches, load it into your hot auto trunk, head for the beach, and eat many hours later — well, you're asking for trouble.

## Archie Robinson Gets \$650 Grant

Twenty-four year-old William Archie Robinson, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Robinson, Sr. of Box 341 in Ranger has been awarded a grant of nearly \$650 from the Medical Research Foundation of Texas as chief investigator of basic medical research being conducted at Baylor University College of Medicine at Houston.

Robinson, a junior at Baylor is carrying on research in physiology under the auspices of a unique program which enables medical students to isolate and investigate original problems concerning man's illnesses.

For nine weeks Robinson will be working with an experimental model to watch what happens in the heart itself and in vessels outside the heart when the heart has been damaged beyond repair.

Each year the Medical Research Foundation of Texas provides a grant of about \$12,000 to promising young medical scientists through this special program at Baylor.

A 1956 graduate of Ranger High School, Robinson received his B. A. Degree from Baylor University in 1960.

### RJC Coach To Speak At Clinic

A staff of 24 top-flight instructors from throughout West and Central Texas have been engaged. Classes will offer specialized training in individual instruments, conducting, marching and twirling, stage band, theory and concert band performance, drum majoring and twirling.

The students will live in air-conditioned dormitories or off-campus if it is more convenient. Appropriate social activities and sports, under experienced guidance, are arranged for the off hours and evening.

Saturday night the Ranger Bulldogs and the Eastland Mavericks met on the Eastland field and played a thriller of a ballgame.

The first four and one half innings found Eastland scoreless against Ranger's score of 6. In the bottom of the fifth inning, things took a bad turn for Ranger.

Eastland's bases were loaded, and a hard hit brought in all three boys, giving Eastland their first points of the game. This action was then repeated. Several hard hits brought Eastland's score up to seven. Ranger only managed one more score, thus losing to the Mavericks by one point, the final score being 7-6.

Pitching the complete game for Ranger was Terry Townsend.

Haden Wilson pitched Eastland's first four innings but was relieved in the fifth by Joe Cooper.

## 500 Expected At Thurber July 4th

An attendance of 500 or more is expected for the big 27th annual reunion to be staged at Thurber July 4th.

The 1963 get-together will be held in the old dry goods building on the site of the former coal mining metropolis which once boasted a fabulous population of more than 10,000.

Major features of the July 4th reunion will include a basket picnic and an enjoyable day of visiting and reminiscing.

The all day affair will be concluded with a business meeting and election of reunion officers.

The five retail and the one wholesale liquor merchants in Ranger were ordered by the Liquor Control Board to stop selling alcoholic beverages this week.

Lloyd Owens, Abilene district LCB supervisor, and three companions visited each of the firms Tuesday afternoon and informed managers of the decisions in Austin.

Owners quietly closed their doors upon receiving orders from the enforcing officers.

All stock will have to be removed from the stores and all signs taken down. No deadline was set, but Owens used the term, "A reasonable length of time."

Coke Stevenson Jr. state LCB chief, placed the call to Owens in Abilene after consulting with Attorney General Waggoner Carr's office.

It was originally thought that the dealers would have 30 days to close down, but Owens explained that this is the case only in a local option election when voters decide to go "dry" but it is not the case in the Ranger situation.

Legally, one observer noted, then Ranger has never been wet, since the March 23 election was nullified.

Inspectors Charles Dudley, A. B. Smith and Clyde Crain accompanied Owens.

Qualified voters in Ranger will go to the polls once again to decide whether intoxicants will be legally sold in the city limits of the town.

The County Commissioners Court Monday called the election for Saturday, July 20, at the usual hours of 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

The court made two changes. A new election judge was named and site for the election was moved. A. H. Powell will be election judge when the voters go to the National Guard Armory, west of town, to cast their ballots.

Proposition will be: "For the legal sale of intoxicants for off-premise consumption within the corporate limits of Ranger."

And "Against, the legal sale of intoxicants for off-premise consumption."

Results of the last (March 23) wet vote, which carried by 11 votes, was declared null and void by Judge T. M. Collier in 91st District Court in Eastland last week. Judge Collier ordered the County Court to re-set a date for the issue.

Commissioners Glenn Justice of Carbon made the motion to call the vote and Buck Collins of Rising Star seconded.

It was a compromise session with the commissioners because during the day-long meet Monday, they heard requests from both the wet and dry groups regarding the election judge and the site for the election.

Both the announced judge and the site were compromises decided on by the court. Members of the Eastland City Commission met with the Court to discuss the possibility of a county teletype system.

They were told that such a unit would cost the county \$80 per month, which would include installation and repair services. The units are provided by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Earlier in the day, Sheriff Lee Horn told the Court in his opinion such a unit would not be worth the \$80 to his department. The possibility of joining with several county towns for the unit was discussed. No action was taken on the matter.

The Court also read a letter from the Huckabay School District in Erath County asking the County to help with road repairs from the Fambro Ranch west to Eastland.

A motion asking for the withdrawal of an earlier notice of appeal was filed this week by Attorney Frank Sparks in behalf of the contestees in the case. Notice of appeal had been given after Judge Collier's ruling.

## SUMMER IS HERE

# Lake Leon Is Ready For Visitors

You don't have to look at a calendar to know that it's summertime.

And you won't have to look any further than Lake Leon to find a better place to have fun this summer.

Leon is ready — ready for the after-work outing, the weekend with family and friends, and for the upcoming holidays ahead, including the Big Fourth of July fun on the water.

The lake's reputation for being among the top bass spots in the state is well deserved, and every time a seven-pound plusunker comes out it means smiles for miles.

And right now appears to

be the very beginning of what will undoubtedly be the best fishing season ever. The heavy spring rains have kept the lake muddied and the fish apparently well-fed.

But now as the waters clear for the summer lake fun, "those big ones will be biting everything you throw in there," one lake sage was moved to remark.

Newest addition to the convenience of Leon visitors is the new concrete boat ramp near the public grounds by the bridge alongside FM 2214. This brings to three, the number of public launching and loading sites at the tree-lined lake.

Another facility at the lake

that's handy for campers and sportsmen is I. S. Echol's new grocery and supply firm, near the intersection of FM 2214 and 2814, south of the lake.

Bait and other assorted supplies are available all around the lake. Facilities include O. D. Quarles Lodge, Dr. H. B. O'Keefe's Chock-a-Block, Jack Chapman's Boat-Tel, Ernest O'Keefe's Lake Leon Lodge, as well as at the Lakekeeper James Johnson's headquarters and Information Center near the dam.

Safety is a keyword with Johnson. The wide shore line and the expanse of fresh, cool water are attractions, but like so many other things, demand

that the participants "play by the rules" for their own and other's safety.

The law is that there must be a life preserver for each person in a boat. Visitors at Leon appear to not mind going the extra safety-step and actually "wearing" that jacket.

The lake, in its short life, has been lucky, and this no doubt stem from the fact that people who ply its waters are courteous — yielding right-of-ways, and giving skiers and swimmers plenty of room.

"Just common courtesy, and doing the sensible thing," Johnson calls it.

This is another good reason Lake Leon is so popular — it's

a real fun place. To attest to the popularity, Johnson has issued approximately 350 boat permits this year. That's year-round permits, and standing records of "day permits" aren't included.

And the lake is not only a weekend or holiday spot either. There have been at least a dozen permanent cabins built at the lake this year, bringing the total number of lake-side improvements to somewhere in the neighborhood of 300.

It would take a calculator to tally the number of "simple docks" and lot-side facilities, where lot-owners come to picnic, camp and launch their boats.

O. F. Etherage, State Game

and Fish Commission official from Waco, who was visiting Game Warden Maurice Dry late this week, said that the added new water in the lake is going to make for even better fishing.

But the important thing is this — somewhere in Leon's damp recesses there's probably a trophy-sized fish with your name on it.

Now's the time to find out. A "clean-up, spruce-up" project began this week at the public picnic grounds at the lake, M. H. Perry, Water Board member, said.

Also a sign painter began painting new signs to mark the various public areas, as well as refurbishing the old ones.

## THE LURE OF GOLD

Many public school administrators have joined politicians in advocating increased federal aid to education. The prospect of additional millions for new buildings, improved facilities and possible pay increases presented an almost irresistible attraction.

Opponents of the proposal have contended that with grants from Washington would come controls and restraints, ultimately making local school boards nothing but figureheads. They have steadfastly held that individual states and communities were completely qualified to supervise and finance their schools and that more economy and greater value could be obtained by keeping jurisdiction close to home.

With another ruling by the U. S. Supreme Court Monday that Bible readings and recitation of the Lord's Prayer in public schools is in violation of a constitutional provision, one which prevents government from establishing or aiding religion, it appears that the foes of federal aid to education have had the picture in accurate focus.

If it is in violation of law to teach children to read and recite the Lord's Prayer, then perhaps a nation professing to be Christian, should either revamp its laws or its public schools.

Shakespeare's plays, which speak of harlots, glorify a dictator and detail gruesome crimes, are required reading, but the Holy Writ is now forbidden.

# TO THE VOTERS OF RANGER

## ABSENTEE VOTING:

Absentee voting shall be conducted by two methods: (1) voting by personal appearance at the clerks office, and (2) voting by mail.

The following persons, and no others, may also vote by mail:

Qualified electors who because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place on the day of the election. The elector shall state in his application the address to which the ballot is to be mailed to him, which must be either his permanent residence address or the address at which he is temporarily living.

An elector desiring to vote absentee SHALL MAKE WRITTEN SWORN APPLICATION for an official ballot to the county clerk of the county of his residence, which application shall be signed BY THE ELECTOR or by a witness at the direction of said elector in case of the latter's inability to make such written application because of physical disability. Such application shall state the ground on which the applicant is entitled to vote absentee and in case of an application by mail shall give the necessary information to enable the clerk to determine whether the applicant is entitled to vote by mail. Such application shall be accompanied by the poll tax receipt or exemption certificate of the elector, or, in lieu thereof, his affidavit in writing that same has been lost or mislaid. If the ground of application be SICKNESS OR PHYSICAL DISABILITY by reason of which the elector cannot appear at the polling place on election day, a certificate of a DULY LICENSED PHYSICIAN OR ACCREDITED CHRISTIAN SCIENCE PRACTITIONER certifying as to such sickness or physical disability shall accompany the application.

ANY PERSON who requests a physician to execute a certificate for another person without having been directed by such other persons to do so, and any PHYSICIAN WHO KNOWINGLY EXECUTES A CERTIFICATE except upon the request of the voter named therein, or, upon the request of someone at the voter's direction, and any physician who knowingly delivers a certificate EXCEPT BY DELIVERING IT TO THE VOTER IN PERSON OR BY MAILING IT TO THE VOTER AT HIS PERMANENT RESIDENCE ADDRESS OR THE ADDRESS AT WHICH HE IS TEMPORARILY LIVING shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) or imprisoned in the county jail for not more than thirty (30) days, or both so fined and imprisoned.

## Browsing With Bev

Many recipes for baked products, cakes, cookies, quick breads and yeast breads, now call for unsifted flour. But many recipes still in use were developed in the days when all flour was sifted and the measurements are for unsifted flour.

Since there is more flour in a cup of unsifted than in a cup of sifted flour, food specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture say you must either sift before measuring or adjust the measurement to get the right amount of flour for these older recipes.

To adjust a measurement from sifted to unsifted flour, simply spoon flour into the dry measuring cup, level it off, and remove two level tablespoonsful.

Recently, researchers in the Agricultural Research Service sifted and unsifted flour in cakes and muffins. When the volume of unsifted flour was adjusted by removing two level tablespoonsful from a measured cup of flour, no difference was noted in the quality of the baked products made with sifted and unsifted flour. However, when unsifted flour was used with adjustment in volume, muffins and cakes were less acceptable than those made with sifted flour. Baking studies showed that spices and cocoa did not blend uniformly by merely stirring them with the unsifted flour. So, if your recipe calls for spices and cocoa, you may want to sift them with the other dry ingredients for uniform blending.




