Former Ranger Man Is New Assistant Justice

District Judge Steve Preslar of McCamey will become an associate justice of the Eighth Court of Civil Appeals in El Paso, August 1, replacing his former law partner Jim Langdon.

Preslar's appointment was announced at 4:30 p. m. Friday by Gov. John Connally. It becomes effective August 1st.

The new associate justice, a graduate of Ranger High School and Ranger Junior College plans to move to El Paso soon.

"The Governor told me to get out there and go to work," Preslar related Saturday.

The 45 year old jurist obtained his law degree from George Washington University in Washington D. C. while working part time for the FBI as a finger print specialist in 1950.

He returned to his native Texas and opened a law office

in Rankin where he practiced for a few months before moving to McCamey in 1951.

When his partner at McCamey, Langdon, became a judge in 1954, Preslar ran successfully for Upton County Attorney, a post he held for six years.

He was elected 12th District Court Judge in 1960.

Preslar and his wife, Avis, have three sons; Cliff, 14; Sam, 7; and Robert Lee, 5.

Mr. Preslar is well known in Ranger as he visits here quite often with his mother, Mrs. Cora Preslar, and his sister, Miss Eunice Preslar who reside on Eastland Hill.

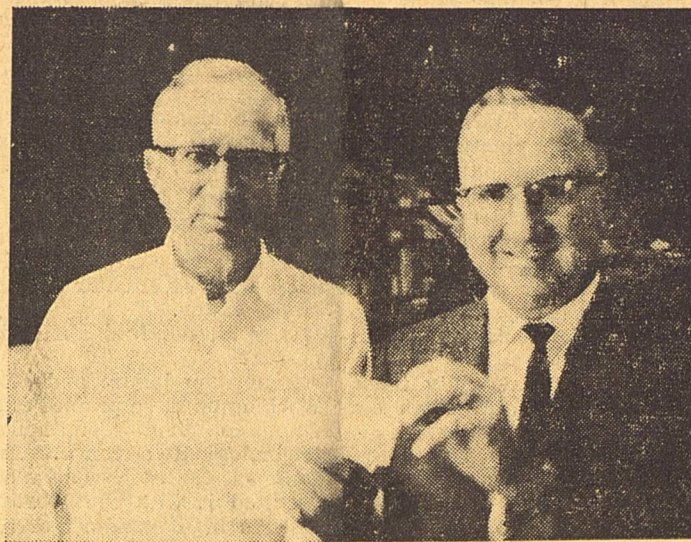
Couple In Idaho To Be Questioned By Local Officers

Printer Joe Stephen Getting SS 'Back-Pay'

A longtime resident of Eastland, Joe C. Stephen, 208 S. Seaman, is now \$829.40 richer because he went to see Howard L. Weatherly, social security field representative from Abilene, a few weeks ago at the Eastland County Courthouse on one of his regular visits here.

Mr. Stephen received payment dating back to June, 1962, as any application for social security benefits can be retroactive up to a year if all qualifications are also met that far back.

Mrs. Stephen was born on November 18, 1899, in Fort Worth. He came to Eastland from Weatherford during the oil boom on a temporary job that was to last two weeks. The two weeks were stretched to over 40 years. He first worked as a printer for the "Eastland Daily Oil Belt News"; this paper later became the "Eastland Telegram".

For several years he worked for Victor Cornelius Theatrical Advertising of Eastland. Fourteen years ago he opened his own business, Stephen Printing Company, in Eastland.

Due to the fact that Mr. Stephen has now slowed down in his work and has begun to take things easier, and does not expect to earn over \$1,200 per year, he will continue to operate his business and will get all his social security benefits. Even if he made as much as \$2,000, he could get some social security benefits.

Mr. Stephen plans a bit of a vacation next week, and will leave Love Field in Dallas Sunday by jet airliner, en route to Los Angeles, where he will visit relatives. Mrs. Stephen plans to visit in Dallas during the week.

Because his benefit checks began before age 65, they will be \$63.80 instead of the age 65 amount of \$76. Money-wise, he will ahead until past age 77.

Mr. Stephen married the former Miss Bernice Bull of Carbon, Texas, on Christmas Day, 1923. He reminisced that they were out several "Model T" Fords going through the sand between Eastland and Carbon before paving came to the rescue.

They have two sons, Stan Stephen, a graduate of Texas University, and attorney for Tennessee Bank & Trust Company of Houston; Rod Stephen, a graduate of Southern Methodist University at Dallas, and athletic director of Longview High School. Both boys are married and have families.

Social Security records are confidential but Mr. Stephen permitted the release of his story in the hope that others past age 62 in Eastland County might benefit from it and also find themselves richer by checking up on their social security rights.

Z. O. Mehaffey Registers First Fish This Week

James Johnson, custodian, has announced that Z. O. Mehaffey of Lake Leon weighed in the first fish of the second week of the Lake Leon Rough Fish Tournament.

Mr. Mehaffey, a resident of Lake Leon, weighed in the first fish of the second week. Everett Noth of Ranger won the first weekly prize with a 6 1/2 pound carp. Runner-up was J. M. Cooper of Eastland, with a 6 pound carp.

Other catches included D. L. Kinnaird of Eastland, two carp, 4 and 4 1/2 pounds and two buffalo, 2 and 3 pounds. No entrance fee is necessary to enter the tournament — just weigh in your catch of rough fish with James Johnson at the information headquarters at the dam. A weekly prize of \$5.00 is offered by the water board, and a \$10 monthly prize for the biggest rough fish caught during the month.

All rough fish are eligible so long as the licensed fisherman's methods are legal, and men, women and children are eligible to enter.

Canvas Of Vote Thursday Date Of Sales Still Pending

Results of the Saturday Ranger wet election which carried by 46 votes, will be canvassed by the County Commissioners Court at a special meeting Thursday morning at 9:30.

The court is required by law to meet and canvass the vote within five days after the election.

Ranger dealers are expected to file applications for permits in the county clerk's office immediately after the canvass. Notice of application has to be advertised, and on-site inspection of facilities performed by the Texas Liquor Control Board, before permits can be issued in Austin.

The election Saturday was the fifth in 13 months, and carried 658 for with 612 against. The vote legalized the sale in the corporate limits of the city of Ranger.

The Saturday turnout was only 41 votes below the record tally at the March election

when 1,301 votes were counted.

In three earlier votes drys won by a small margins twice and by a large margin once. Liquor stores opened and began selling after the March

election but were closed after the 91st District Court held that that election was null and void because the ballots had been "rubber stamped" rather than signed by the election judge.

FARMING IS BE HAZARDOUS OCCUPATION, SURVEY SHOWS

It really isn't news to those who live and work in rural areas that farming can be a hazardous occupation. Farm accidents are a constant threat, not only to life and limb, but also to livelihood. The injured farmer can't work, and the crops and farm animals won't wait for him to recover.

Earlier this year the American Medical Association sponsored the First National Congress on Farm Safety. Hundreds of leaders in farm health and safety programs from scores of private organizations and government agencies spent several days studying the farm safety problem and seeking ways and means of helping the farmer to stave off accidents.

Next in the farm safety campaign comes National Farm Safety Week, proclaimed by President Kennedy for the week of July 21-27. Once again rural leaders will strive to help farmers learn how to avoid accidents.

Inspection, Correction and Protection are the three keynote themes of National Farm Safety Week. Farmers are urged to inspect equipment, land, buildings, and their own work habits and attitudes. They are urged to correct dangerous conditions and careless habits. By so doing, farmers can protect lives, their own and others.

Farm resident accidents cause 9,000 deaths and 800,000 disabling injuries every year. These statistics are appalling, because most of these deaths and injuries could have been prevented. And the statistics do not convey the grief, loneliness and pain involved in accidents.

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D.C. — British Guiana, lying between Venezuela and Dutch Guiana and bordered on the South by Brazil, could easily become the second Communist dominated regime in the Western Hemisphere.

At the present time, this territory, on the Northeast of South America, is under British control insofar as its defense and external affairs are concerned, but the Country is scheduled for independence.

The prime minister of British Guiana is Cheddi Jagan, an East Indian of the same race is about 50 per cent of the population. There is evidence that he is gearing the economy of the Country with the Soviet Bloc. It is known that cement, flour and petroleum products are coming in in quantities from the Soviet Union in exchange for rice, which is taken to Cuba and exchanged mainly for sugar.

Jagan said publicly only a short time ago that "The first Socialist State in the Hemisphere was Cuba; the first in South America will be the Republic of Guiana." He is known to be a leftist and a long time associate of Communists. His wife Janet, a native of Chicago, was a known Communist before losing her United States citizenship by having voted in a Guianan election. She is as much a leader in the country as is her husband and holds the official position of Minister of Home Affairs.

Should Guiana receive its complete independence from the British, it is believed that Jagan would institute a complete dictatorship and place his wife in control of police, and that Jagan himself would take complete control of the labor force.

The opposition is led by Forbes Burnham, a fiery leader of the Negro population, which constitutes about 35 per cent. Incidentally, the remaining population is 12 per cent mixed, 2 per cent Portuguese and 1 per cent Asiatic.

Those informed on the subject believe that the conflicts within British Guiana are not nearly so much on the basis of ideology as they are between the races. This difference is compounded by the fact that the East Indians are Hindus and Moslems and live mainly in the rural areas, while the Negroes are Christian and live mostly in the cities.

The fear is that the British will pull out, which they very much want to do, and wash their hands of a political and

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN — Gov. John Connally says Texas is making a lot of progress on civil rights without demonstrations and disturbances. He urged Texans to avoid the trouble which is plaguing other states.

Roy Evans, secretary of Texas State AFL-CIO, indicated mass demonstrations are needed in Lower Rio Grande Valley to improve working conditions of Mexican workers. Connally committed such statements are irresponsible and inflammatory.

Governor also rejected labor's appeal for a special session of the Legislature to abolish right-to-work law and enact state minimum wage, saying he saw "no need, emergency or desirability" for such a session.

Evans said labor's traditional role is to try to inflame people against injustice, and he intends to keep on trying to do that.

From one of the unpaid boss jobs to a \$16,500-a-year assistantship is the story of Dr. J. B. Copeland of San Antonio.

When the Legislature created the new job of deputy commissioner of the Health Department, Dr. Copeland resigned as chairman of the State Board of Health to accept the job of deputy commissioner. He had been Board Chairman for the past ten years.

Governor Connally named Dr. N. L. Barker of Paris to replace Dr. Copeland. He reappointed Dr. Elmer Baum of Austin and named Dr. John M. Smith of San Antonio and I. D. Flores of Floresville, a pharmacist, to the Board of Health.

Texas is spotted with drought and flood points.

Texas Water Commission found that reservoirs declined a little in June. They wound up the month 76 percent full, so there's room to store more floods when and if they come.

In general, Northeast Texas reservoirs are full, while

those in South Texas are shrinking.

Highway construction is one thing dry weather helps.

State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer reported that contractors on state-federal projects completed \$24,073,319 worth of work during June.

But there's plenty yet to do. They hold contracts which total \$382,872,803 and another \$25,000,000 worth of contracts will be issued this week.

Texas Highway Department has endorsed the idea of building "median rails" on busy urban expressways.

Rails — heavy-duty fences which keep traffic from careening into opposite lanes — have been or will be installed on expressways around Houston, Fort Worth and Austin.

Also under development by highway engineers is a woven wire mesh fence — similar to backyard chain-link jobs — to reduce headlight glare and to prevent pedestrians from crossing the freeways.

Despite recommendations by several major oil buying firms that Texas production be cut in August, the Railroad Commission held the line.

Production will continue at the July rate of 28.5 percent of capability of the wells. Independent producers praised the action.

Texas Committee on Education Beyond the High School has selected one of its members as paid executive director.

He is Dr. A. B. Martin, president of Amarillo Junior College. He will co-ordinate all staff work for the big study. Committee has one year to finish its study and report to the Governor and Legislature.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler continues to be much in the news.

Sadler disagreed with Governor Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr on seriousness of a state-federal dispute on reclaimed lands in the tidelands; swapped hot wires with ex-Sen. Bob Baker after Baker accused him of impending Padre Island Sea-shore project; and insisted that Carr get Supreme Court concurrence on Carr's ruling that a new law reorganizing the School Land Board is valid.

Texas Game and Fish Commission, Department of Public Welfare, Board of Plumbing Examiners, Board of Professional Engineers, Board of Pardons and Paroles, Department of Agriculture, Department of Banking, and Building Commission are moving into the new John H. Reagan State Office Building. Dr. Dorman Winfrey, Director of the Texas State Library, announced that the Val Verde County Library, recognized in December as one of the "Ten Best Small Libraries in the U. S.," also has been cited for its "top-flight public relations gram"...Rep. Robert H. Hughes of Dallas will resign

MOTHER OF INVENTION

Necessity may be the mother of invention, but its Big Daddy is the patent.

July 31 is the anniversary of the day when the first patent was issued in the United States. That was in 1790 — little more than a year after the new government began operating. It was only a process for "making pot and pearl ashes," otherwise known as potash, reports World Book Encyclopedia, but so important was the event that President Washington himself signed the patent awarded to Samuel Hopkins, of Vermont.

Endorsing the document was the then Secretary of State Jefferson, no mean gadgeteer himself, whose inventions include the swivel chair and the dumb-waiter.

Why all the fuss about the patent?

Statesmen before and after Washington have praised it as a spur to invention and hence, technological advance. And some observers have even credited it with the Western world's high standard of living.

A patent is simply a limited monopoly which secures to an inventor the fruits of his labor. For 17 years he has the exclusive right to make, sell, or use his invention. Of course, it may be a profitless 17 years...if some part of his invention has been patented by an earlier inventor who refuses to let him use it. But at the end of that period, the invention becomes accessible to the public at large and scientific knowledge is increased.

Women began making their contributions to scientific knowledge as early as 1809, when Mary Kies was granted a patent for a method of weaving straw with silk or thread.

A few thousand patents later, a former Congressman from Illinois named Abraham Lincoln received one for "A Device for Buoying Vessels over Shoals." The device must have been a success, because Lincoln later declared appreciatively, "The Patent System added the fuel of interest to the fire of genius."

About this time, unfortunately, the fire of genius was just what the examiners were demanding proof of, before

before they would grant a patent. Inventors who labored long and hard over their creations but were unable to show that spark of "divine madness" were turned away, while less-than-brilliant tinkers who might have stumbled onto an idea or a device by accident were rewarded. In 1952 Congress decided there weren't enough geniuses to go around and changed the patent laws.

The requirement, however, proved no obstacle to Mark Twain, who received three patents. In 1873 he was awarded one for "Mark Twain's Self-Pasting Scrapbook," a book of blank pages coated with gum or veneer. He sold 25,000 copies during the first royalty period, leading one writer to comment that this "was well enough for a book that did not contain a single word that critics could praise or condemn."

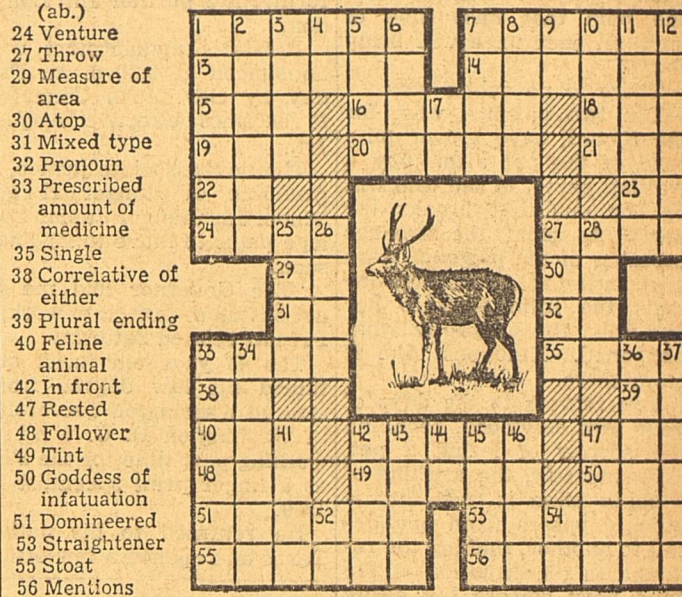

Accent on Health

AUSTIN — People who suffer with hypertension, or high blood pressure, nowadays have more reason for optimism than they would have had a generation ago.

In itself hypertension is not a disease. It's a sign that something is wrong, like the stuffy feeling that comes with a cold. The danger accrues because of the possibility of stroke or serious heart or kidney damage when blood pressure is consistently high.

But even mild elevations in

the blood pressure considered normal for the person involved — if the increase persists — may cause the walls of blood vessels to toughen, exactly as callouses are formed on hands by regular use of an axe or hoe. Research has shown that temporary increases in pressure do not really make much difference.

In the most common type of high blood pressure, called "essential hypertension," the tiny branches of arteries which carry blood to all body tissues (called arterioles) begin to tighten up. Blood passageways become smaller and smaller, and the heart has to work harder to push the blood through. After a time the blood vessels lose their elasticity and the heart muscles thicken with the extra work load. Result: high blood pressure, and ultimately heart damage.

What causes the arterioles to tighten and constrict? No one knows.

High blood pressure sometimes goes up for a period of days or weeks — or even longer — and then drops back to normal. Sometimes it may jump from pure nervousness while your physician is examining you. Perhaps there is a connection between hypertension and the strain of modern life. People who work under constant stress, who worry too

much, are often susceptible. Heredity is a probable factor, and the condition occurs most often in persons between 30 and 50.

The thing which will count most in adding years to the life of hypertension sufferers is the willingness to change their living habits, following the rules of moderation in everything. By securing a doctor's care and following a few simple rules for moderate living, they can probably work and enjoy life as long or longer than their next-door neighbors without high blood pressure.

There is nothing to gain from worry about your chances of developing hypertension. Just make it a point to have a physical examination at least once a year. And worry and argue as little as possible.

Low blood pressure, on the other hand, seldom causes trouble. Afflicting relatively few people to a serious extent, the condition is usually a symptom of a specific disease which can frequently be treated successfully.

economic liability as soon as possible. The British, it seems, feel that the best they can do is leave behind a government with constitutional restrictions sufficient to contain Communism.

The United States, on the other hand, is fearful that the English will leave too soon and that the Communists will move in the vacuum.

Like Castro at the early stages of his take-over, Jagan does not admit to being an out-and-out Communist, but it is plain he is enmeshed already in the Soviet Bloc of nations.

Two situations would probably exist when and if the British grant full independence and move out. Either Jagan would immediately take over as a dictator or under the semblance of constitutional government hold elections which would place him in power under what would appear to be democratic processes. Either of these results would definitely be adverse to the United States and all of Latin America.

Even if the English should be willing to take the risk of throwing Jagan out, safety is not guaranteed simply by such a delay. The Indian population is growing at a much faster rate than the more conservative Negro Majority.

Therefore, our policy should be to insist that the British suspend the Guianan constitution and put off final independence until after an election could be held, which might be approximately two years from now. In the meantime, it would be hoped that something could be done to diminish the power and break the grasp of Jagan to prevent the first Communist take-over on a mainland in the Western Hemisphere.

Should Guiana become another Soviet Satellite, not only would Castro's Cuba be strengthened, but another festering sore would be created to spread the disease to other Latin American Countries.
