

His interesting notes are reprinted as follows:

Cottonwood, first settled around 1885, once had a wagon factory. Although the wagons were not nearly as well-known as was the famous Peter Shuttler brand, they enjoyed a good local reputation and farmers and ranchers came from miles around to buy the vehicles manufactured on the banks of Cottonwood Creek.

There has been a lot of demonstrating of late, for Civil Rights and one thing or another. The idea is not new. however, for in 1883, about 200 men banded together and publicly threatened to burn down the town of Brownwood in protest to the selling of barbed

The group, known as fence cutters, wanted continuance of open range and called barbed wire "devil's rope."

Probably the greatest slaughter ever seen in this country surrounding Cross Plains occurred in 1877, the year Callahan County was organized.

Thousands of buffaloes were slain just for their hides. The shaggy beasts were killed and

Sam Bass and his gang were said to have passed through Callahan County in 1888. The famous outlaw "did no business" in these parts but news of his visit provided a choice conversation piece as frontiersmen got together for occasional

One of the most humorous shooting scrapes ever to occur in Callahan County had a happy ending. It happened at old Belle Plain, a town which folded in the early 1880's after being missed by the railroad.

A woman fired both loads of a double-barreled shotgun at a man who was about to whip her husband. No one was hit but the assailant beat. a hasty retreat, saying: "I can lick that guy, but I'd sure hate to take on his woman."

Last Indian raids into this area were led by chiefs Santana and Big Tree. The Redmen were more interested in stealing horses and cattle than gathering scalps. Little damage was done.

Oddly enough, the first case ever tried in Callahan County district court was one in which a man won divorce from his wife on charges of infidelity.

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




