City Pool Undergoes Repairs

The Ranger Swimming Pool reopened Saturday after having been closed for repairs since last Tuesday.

Monday night at closing time the water was reported by pool officials to be as clear as glass. Tuesday morning, the top of the water was covered with a greenish scum and a waxy substance. There was also a sediment on the bottom of the pool about one-half an inch thick.

Chemicals were put in the water in hopes of dissolving the slime, but when this failed, the pool had to be drained and cleaned.

A sample of the water and scum was sent to Austin to be analyzed for pollution. A negative report came back stating that there was no pollution. It was believed that during these hot days the water temperature gradually rose and caused the sand, rust and dead plant life to come out of the pipes and into the filter system, causing the trouble.

RODEO PARADE DRAWS HUGE CROWD THURSDAY

The Jaycees Rodeo Parade was viewed by the biggest crowd that Ranger had seen in a long time Thursday afternoon, as it came into view on the incline rising at the west end of Main Street and made its way to the railroad crossing and turning right.

Entries met at the Willow Park at mid afternoon in a sweltering summer sun that wilted everything but the spirit of the affair.

Five elementary school age twirlers, spaced to the width of Main Street, led the caravan. The twirlers were in western attire of black and white cowgirl suits and hats. They were followed by Ranger's Chief of Police and Mayor Morris Newnam, and Texas Highway Patrolmen, riding side by side and Sheriff Lee Horn. Two local fire trucks and Eastland's Fire Department Rescue Unit were next.

Jaycee Rodeo Queen, Mrs. Betty Fletcher, clad in a black western suit, riding a roan horse, and her husband, Dick Fletcher appeared next followed by Jaycee president, Don Yarbrough and fellow Jaycees, rodeo officials of Lampasas in colorful dress, and the nine queen candidates. The rodeo band, seated on the flat bed of a big truck parked on Main Street provided appropriate music for the rest of the entries.

Eastland County Sheriffiff Posse, with white western hats and tan chaps rode two abreast. Lacasa's newly organized 4-H Riding Club, led by two girls dressed in white western suits, came next. The rest of the riders wore green and white checkered shirts. Their 4-H float completed their unit.

The "Eagle Feathers," with their paleface tied to a stake, were clad in authentic costume and rode upon the float bed of a truck driven by their counselor, Fred Bennett.

The Erath County Trail Blazers in colorful red satin vests with huge white horseshoe emblems on the back, red western ties, white western hats and inscribed belts made a striking picture. A mass of local riders followed; then came the Gorman Riding Club.

The Junior Riding Club of Rising Star each carrying a red and white banner and clad in white jeans, red shirts, and white hats were followed by their senior riding group. A horse and rider emerged with no injuries after falling to the pavement. A group of horseback riders followed close by.

Cars and pickups advertised Ranger Dry Cleaners, Texas Electric, with Rhonda Reid perched upon the cab and throwing suckers. John Hopper's Premier Station, Pipkins Olds of Eastland, Eastland Jaycees, Ranger Junior College, and Hood King Motor of Eastland.

A pickup, completely covered with issues of Ranger Times and the Rodeo Edition on the windshield and red and white posters on the doors, front and back featured Benny Harris,

Times employee, pulling colored bulletins of "Welcome Rodeo Fans" from the press as Edwena Edmonds, another Times employee, took her telephone calls on the latest news items. Anna Marie Squiers assisted. Both girls were clad in typical rodeo western wear. Barry and Darla Franklin threw the bulletins to the parade viewers.

A car advertising Greer's Western Wear was followed by a pickup with the big green Sinclair Dinosaur bobbing his big head. Nancy Boen, in her white "doodlebug" car, with the words "Don't Horse Around" carried Lance Rippey on a saddle perched on top of the car. Anderson Chevrolet showed versions of the new and old models and an old model car advertised Wards' Riverside tires.

Scott's Bait House of Eastland featured a very black "Aunt Jimima" atop their green pickup. She was thoroughly relaxed in an aluminum lawn chair, holding a long fishing pole and expecting to pull out a big catch.

The Social Science pickup featured a wooden house in the back.

Mrs. Baird's Bread truck followed with tiny loaves of bread being given to the bystanders. Other business and organizations in the parade were Arnett's Texaco Station, Pho Pi Chapter, Pipkins Implement of Eastland and City of Ranger.

Reassigned To Amarillo AFB



The first roper goes for the horns, while the second member of the team sets his trap for the cows hind legs. With both ropes set the cow is then thrown and both hind legs tied. Burl Hinton and Glenn Murphy of Breckenridge was third with 28.9 seconds.

Most of the Texas Parkers, numbering about 150, live in the Palestine area. The Oklahoma descendants reside near Cache, on the reservation provided by the government nearly a century ago.

Cynthia Ann grew to womanhood, became the wife of Chief Nocona and mother of Quannah Parker.

According to legend, she was interred at Fosterville in Anderson County, but later moved to Cache, Okla., on the reservation.

Browsing With Bev

Are you spending needless extra money on postage? Here are some mailing tips that can help you save money at the post office. Rising costs of living made it imperative that many persons trim their spending costs when a need where feasible.

These tips may help you: Don't send letters airmail to cities less than 250 miles away. It wastes money and saves no time.

Don't send special deliveries to a post office box. Regular mail will do as good as job in this case.

Don't waste airmail, special delivery postage on Friday business mailings unless your addressee works on Saturdays. Compare rates of air express and air parcel post. Sometimes one is cheaper, and they both arrive at the same time.

Drop mail off between noon and 4 p. m. It is the slack period in the post office and will get your letters off to a head start. Good timing can make a five-cent stamp all that is necessary.

Sewing machine needles won't rust if you keep them covered with a petroleum jelly. Run the needle through a piece of cloth before using it on material.

How long should you keep cancelled checks? It depends on the purpose.

Hold all checks at least two years, counsels the American Bankers Association. Checks for items claimed for tax deductions should be kept a minimum of three years, while cancelled rent checks should be kept as long as you occupy the premises.

National Farm Safety Week, July 21-27

"Inspection Plus Correction Equals Protection" is the theme for National Farm Safety Week, July 21-27. President John F. Kennedy, in proclaiming the week, called upon all Americans, especially those allied with agriculture, to unite their efforts to cut down the number of farm home and highway accidents.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, long active in the promotion of rural safety, points out the need for making year-round effort. Prevention of accidents takes action by people and it must be continuous throughout every year, says the Council.

A very high percentage of all farm accidents can be traced to a specific cause, and carelessness is a major contributor, the councilmen say. A little checking close to home, they add, will likely reveal that most crippling or fatal accidents on the farm or in the home result from actions wherein people should know better.

The accident record of agriculture is not good and with the ever-increasing use of power machinery and allied equipment, the rate can be expected to move higher unless the people involved make up their minds to do something about it, warns the Council. Therefore, they add, it's up to farm families to find and remove hazards which can cause accidents and to practice safety in their daily living. The outstanding records in accident prevention by other industries of the nation haven't just happened, says the Council, but are the result of well-planned and conducted safety educational programs.

National Farm Safety Week is sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and

the National Safety Council. They work in cooperation with the state Agricultural Extension Services, farm organizations, the farm press, radio, television and other interested individuals and groups.

Accent on Health

AUSTIN — "Pedodontics" is a big word with a simple meaning — the care and treatment of children's teeth. A major part of pedodontics is preventive dentistry, and preventive dentistry for the very young is the one great hope for a realistic solution to our dental woes.

If a child's teeth are properly cared for up to age 15, a

strong foundation has been laid for minimizing dental troubles in later years.

At about 6 months of age the four front teeth — two upper and two lower — begin to peek out. These front teeth are incisors, the cutting teeth. By age 7 to 11 months, four more teeth, upper and lower, start to come in. These are the lateral incisors at either side of the central teeth.

Then Mother Nature wisely skips a few spaces in order to properly shape the jaw. In 12 to 16 months, the back teeth or molars, come in. Then the cuspids show to fill in the space between. At about 24 months, the second molars come in.

Up to this point all teeth which have erupted are primary teeth, and although temporary they are vital. They help shape the face, help the youngster learn to speak distinctly, help him nutritionally and must serve the child until he is 12.

While all this has been going on, the permanent teeth are slowly developing in the jaw bone so they can come forth at the proper time.

The first permanent teeth to erupt are molars — sometimes called "six-year" molars simply because they emerge at about age 6. Because they do not replace the first teeth but come in just behind them, these molars tend to confuse parents who think they are also temporary teeth.

This error can lead to unfortunate consequences. Since the "six-year" molars are permanent teeth, they will not be replaced if lost.

Family dentists strongly emphasize the importance of watching for the six-year molars. They are important to the structure of the mouth. The manner in which they interlock with their opposite teeth will determine the eventual shape of the jaw, facial contour and regularity of alignment of other teeth.

Because of their importance, these first permanent teeth are often referred to as the "keystones of the dental arch." The strength or weakness of adult dental health — barring loss of teeth through accidents — can invariably be traced

to habits of preventive dentistry learned or left unlearned in childhood. And when it comes to preventive dentistry, the pedodontist is a child's best friend.







GIVE US A GIDEON

(AN EDITORIAL)

Most everyone agrees that if the Constitution of the United States forbids Bible reading and prayer in public schools, as the Supreme Court has ruled, there is immediate need of corrective legislation.

It was thought that church people and professed Christians would have deluged Congress with demands for action. If there has been any protest at all, it is thus far too minute to attract wide attention, much less that of lawmakers.

A report from Washington Monday itemized the three subjects receiving most complaint in mail to congressmen. They were (1) Objection to a tax on cosmetics, (2) Partisan opinions on an up-coming fight between railroads and truckers, and (3) Civil Rights.

If the Word of God can be outlawed without violent protest from professed Christians, the zeal for righteousness is gone and American churches have lost their potency.

It was a group of admitted atheists who provoked the Supreme Court ruling. Shall their will go unchallenged? Does any minister or lay-leader have a more important duty than to organize and lead the opposition?

Two recent editorials in this newspaper on this subject were subsequently reprinted by area dailies. As a result, a dribble of mail has been received commending the stand taken. Not one respondent, though, has mentioned writing to a congressman or senator.

The legislative halls in Washington present the proper place for corrective surgery of this malignant wrong. Which will we do, fight courageously or surrender meekly? — Cross Plains Review.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — If I borrow on my GI insurance policy, must I repay a specified amount every month?

A — No. While it is desirable to repay the amount borrowed as soon as possible to save interest charges and to return the insurance principal to its full value, there is no required repayment schedule.

Q — If I should remarry, in addition to losing my widow's pension, will my Government Insurance proceeds cease?

A — Your remarriage will have no effect upon your receipt of GI insurance proceeds.

Q — I recently retired with 20 years of enlisted service. Is it true that I have until January 31, 1965, to start my schooling under the Korean GI Bill?

A — January 31, 1965, is not the last day to START schooling but the day that Korean GI Bill schooling benefits come to an end. Thus, only a year and a half remain to take advantage of this program. However, you should consult your nearest VA office since individual eligibility expires three years after the first discharge or release upon which you would have been eligible for complete separation from active service. Immediate re-enlistment without loss of service time does not

extend this three-year deadline.

Q — I want to convert my term insurance to a permanent plan but I've put it off for years because it costs too much to convert \$10,000. What can I do?

A — You can convert part of your insurance in any multiple of \$500 after the first \$1,000. Convert what you can budget now; retain the balance as term insurance until you are able to convert it.

Q — In a short time, I will retire after twenty years of military service. I desire to go to school under the GI Bill. Am I eligible?

A — It depends on when you received your first unconditional discharge after January 31, 1955. If less than three years have passed since that clear discharge, you are eligible; if more than three years, you are not.

Q — Does the date of my discharge count as far as rehabilitation training is concerned if I have a service-connected disability?

A — Servicemen discharged for physical disability may have eligibility for vocational

3 MILLION

Water Use Hits Peak

As temperatures soar, so does water consumption in Eastland County. The Eastland County Water Supply District has been pumping at near capacity most of the past week, Plant Manager Jesse White reports.

Capacity averages about three million gallons a day — and that's about what it's been taking for Eastland and Ranger, the district's big users.

Thursday, Eastlanders got 1,526,100 gallons; Ranger, 1,643,100 gallons.

The plant uses about 70 pounds of chlorine and from 700 to 900 pounds of alum daily to treat the water. Naturally, since the June rains, the plant has had its problems with muddy water too.




