SCHOOL CAR IS STOLEN IN RANGER WEDNESDAY

The Ranger High School Driver Education car was stolen Wednesday morning about 9:30 after it was left parked with the ignition keys in it.

Superintendent G. B. Rush had parked the car in front of the First Baptist Church and was gone only a few minutes, returning to discover the car had been stolen.

After police were notified and proper alerts sent out, a abandoned 1956 Chevrolet was noticed in the parking lot of the First Baptist Church.

When the owner in Fort Worth was contacted, he was unaware that his car had been stolen.

Roadblocks were set up in the area and the driver abandoned the Ranger car in the Cisco area, escaping on foot. Several persons reported seeing him and notified authorities.

Later, a 1961 model car was stolen from the Paul Blaine residence in Cisco and driven to Abilene where the driver snatched a new white Oldsmobile that Wayne Durham and Co. had leased.

LIQUOR AND BEER RETAIL STORES REOPEN IN RANGER

Liquor and beer retail stores resumed sales Friday as the final legal details were met and stocks of merchandise were moved in. A total of seven store permits had been approved as compared with five for the 60-day period prior to the election contest resulted in a new vote last July 20.

The applications for seven beer retail permits were approved by County Judge Scott Bailey at a hearing last Thursday morning. Five of this group had previous licenses. Three applications for off-premises liquor licenses were approved and conditional approval was given to a fourth.

Receiving liquor and beer licenses were Garland Carey's Drive-In, Highway 80 East; Vernon's Liquor Store, High-

way 80 East; and Raymond Bryan's The Point, Highway 80 West. Conditional approval went to Mrs. Illa King of Strawn, with the notation that approval would come when her Strawn license is cancelled. Later, it was reported by the Liquor Control Board at Abilene that the Strawn license had been cancelled.

Morris Campbell was issued a permit for a beer wholesaler's outlet. He has the distributorship for Lone Star Beer.

Maxie Law of Highway 80 West, Hess' Grocery of North Austin and Kelly's Drive-In Grocery received beer retailer's permits.

The Ranger precinct had been open for legal sales for 60 days before the election contest halted the retailers.

For the first time in recent history Ranger once again had the appearance of a cattle shipment point as fifteen cattle cars were loaded for rail shipment.


Railroad cars were parked on the spur track paralleling Commerce St. This was a convenient location for trucks to unload the cattle directly into the cars without the use of the loading chute.

The sale of the cattle was transacted through the Ranger Cattle Auction barn.



County Building Committee Meets Monday at 7 p.m.

Initial Program To Be Reviewed

Kay Aishman To Be Duchess At DeLeon Festival

"Very little planning is done in preparing meals in Eastland County homes, resulting in the fact that over 50 per cent of the families are deficient in needed nutrition."

That's an excerpt from a report by the Family Living Sub-committee of the Eastland County Program Building committee.

This county problem and many others will be discussed when the Building Committee meets Monday, August 5, at 7 p.m. in the 91st District Courtroom on the third floor of the Courthouse.

The public is invited.

The family living committee also reports that there is a large per cent of obesity (overweightness) in the county and a large practice of food fads and falacies.

Reports from the other eight sub-committees will deal with other general problems and suggested remedies.

Here are excerpts from other sub-committee reports:

"The historical heritage of the county has not been sufficiently preserved and promoted in the past."

"Over 50 per cent of the homes in this county were built before 1929 and a larger per cent of these are in need of repair and up-dating."

"There is a lack of adequate information to the consumer on selecting, using and caring for household equipment."

"There is little free community recreation throughout the county."

"There is a demand for education in clothing construction and managing the clothing construction dollar."

"Public health and welfare conditions and facilities are good, but better organization and modernization of facilities are needed."

"Serious sanitation problems could arise in the near future because there is not a strict enforcement of sanitation laws in the county."

"Little has been done to exploit the abundance of wild game and fish in the county and parks and facilities are inadequate to accommodate visiting hunters and fishermen."

"Eastland County's abundant gray clay has proven excellent in making lightweight concrete."

"Cost of transportation of crushed limestone is a major problem in marketing this abundant natural resource."

"Retail sales in the county decreased from \$26 million in 1954 to \$22 million presently."

"A major concern of people in Eastland, Cisco and Ranger is the planned by-pass of those towns by Interstate Highway 20."

"Agricultural problems areas are lack of diversification of cash crops, wind and water erosion with flood and siltation damage, and lack of management practices."

"There are a large number of organizations throughout the county, but there does not seem to be any effort toward overall county planning by these organizations."

The Eastland County Program Building Committee was organized in 1956 and is developing the County Program, using the county census as a basis. In the fall of 1962, the committee revised and broadened its membership from the original 28 members.

Tom Wilson, president of Eastland National Bank, is chairman of the committee, with Don Kincaid, of Cisco, vice chairman, and Mrs. Ernest Schaefer is secretary.

terway was shaped and sodded to bermuda, and two acres of critical gullies were reshaped and sodded. Four ponds for livestock water have been built thus far under the program, and about one and one-fourth miles of cross fencing has been built on four different farms, other ponds and fences are now under construction.

Twenty-one contracts were approved at Eastland in time for spring pasture planting and other seasonal practices. Twelve contracts were written and approved by the Rising Star work unit during the same period. A large number of contracts are being developed at the present time. It is anticipated that 50 to 60 contracts will be signed within the next six months.

Application of the planned conservation practices on the original 21 contracts at Eastland was almost 100 per cent as planned. Costal bermuda plantings as a part of land use adjustment was the most widespread practices. A total of 964 acres of Costal was planted on 20 farms. Practically all of this bermuda was on cropland being taken out of cultivation. One large wa-

terway was reseeded from other sub-committee reports:

If you want to see a wild and woolly Barrel Race, be sure you don't miss the "Small-Fry" stickhorse Barrel Race. These youngsters will bring with them to the show the MEANEST and WILDEST stickhorses that money can buy. Any thing can happen! On occasions we have had horses to throw a shoe, and some of our best riders have had a taste of the old arena dust, and there are times when some of the best trained horses balk at the chute and refuse to come out. We have seen some of the Mothers have to make a run at the barrels in order for young "junior" to tear loose and come out to ride.

The "Small-Fry" also enter such events as the Shoe Scrambled, Ribbon Goat Race, and the regular Barrel Race.

Each contestant must enter three events to be eligible for a trophy and one event must be on horseback.

This is only a sample of what goes on at the Rodeo. Look for more stories in this paper.




