

It is inexpressibly shocking to read that a man has been killed in Pennsylvania because three other men were convinced that he was a dabbler in black magic and had bewitched them. The shock is not lessened when we read that scores of people in that vicinity believe in witchcraft, and often call "magicians" to cure them of sickness, instead of physicians.

Yet it is not particularly surprising. The belief in black magic is one of the oldest beliefs in the world, and it dies hard. We are not, comparatively speaking, so very far removed from barbarism, after all. The beliefs and superstitions of our half-civilized ancestors do not lie very far below the surface in any of us. What wonder if the thing flares up, hideous and shameful, every now and then.

AN OPTIMIST.

Ordinarily we think of scientists as "soulless" folk-people given to pessimistic predictions, who can find little cause for hope in discussing the future of the race.

But Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the Journal of the American Medical association, proves the exception. Writing in the winter number of the Yale Review, Dr. Fishbein predicts that the natural processes of evolution of the human brain will eventually give mankind a thinking apparatus so much better than he now possesses that he will make the earth into a veritable Utopia.





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

Will Take Taxes Off \$12,600,000.00 Worth of Property

By United Press.

AUSTIN, Dec. 12.-Church property valued at \$12,684,333 will be taken off the tax rolls in Texas when the 41st Legislature passes an enabling act putting in-to effect the constitutional amendment voted this summer to exempt parsonages and other property used for strictly religious pur

The figures are issued by the U. S. Department of Commerce and give valuation as of 1926.

The report shows total value of church property at that time in Texas was \$109,736,730 as re-ported by 12,474 churches. Debts amounting to 13,546,556 were re-ported by 2,776 churches and 14,-032 churches reported that their expenditures durng the year were \$28,925,421.

In all, 15,060 churches made reports. They had a total member-ship of 2,280,514 of whom 1, 186,325 were women; 895,504 men, and the others were not clas-

In ten years church membership had increased from 1,784,620. Church buildings increased from 11,321 to 12,770. Sunday schools reported 1,102,-294 pupils.




