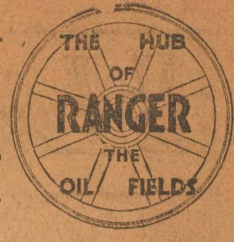

## BRECKENRIDGE DEPUTY KILLS TWO

### AIRPLANES AID IN SEARCH FOR BOY'S SLAYER

Wichita Falls Aroused When Taxicab Runs Over 14-Year Old Boy.

By Associated Press. WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 17.—Following the arrest of Joe Torres last night on the charge of being the driver of an automobile which ran down and killed Archie Martin, 14-year-old youth, Monday, a special grand jury indictment was returned yesterday afternoon.

### Fort Worth Girl Who Shot Lover Is Granted Bail

FORT WORTH, Nov. 17.—Bessie King who has been arrested in connection with the shooting of Motorcycle Captain Quincy Burnett at a local drug store yesterday afternoon, was released on \$2,500 bond this morning, following the filing of complaint charging her with assault to murder. Burnett is still reported to be in a serious condition.

### Shotgun's Roar Foils Colorado Train Robbers

DENVER, Nov. 17.—Denver police and railway officials are scouring the country for several train bandits, who were foiled in an attempt to hold up Rock Island passenger train No. 6. It was eastward bound for Chicago and running over Union Pacific lines.

### Vagrants Will Clean City Streets, City Dads Decide; Pay Half on New Uniforms

In future prisoners at the city jail who cannot pay their fines will be forced to work on the streets until the amount is paid. This action was decided upon at the meeting of the city commission yesterday afternoon. The body also decided to defray half the cost of the new uniforms ordered for the police force. It also took under advisement a proposition made by A. B. Poe that Evergreen cemetery be taken over by the city at a cost of \$7,000, which, Mr. Poe stated, was the price he gave for the fourteen acres of land included in the cemetery.

### HARDING MAY MEET OBREGON AT VERA CRUZ

President Will Make Decision Today While En Route to New Orleans.

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Nov. 17.—Harding's reply to an invitation extended him to visit Mexico during his southern trip will probably be decided within the next twenty-four hours, while aboard a special train from this city to New Orleans. The President-elect leaves Brownsville at the end of a nine-day vacation and will reach New Orleans at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, where he will lay over for five hours. Preparations are on foot for his entertainment at that city, and it is expected that he will deliver an address before the New Orleans Association of Commerce.

### Mother and Two Daughters Die in Fire at Orange

ORANGE, Texas, Nov. 17.—Three persons, including a mother and two daughters, died early this morning when a three-story frame building caught fire and burned to the ground. The dead are: Mrs. Hermina Herk and her two daughters, Ethel Reed, aged 7 years, and Theresa, aged 7 years.

### COTTON SEED HULLS BURNED FOR FUEL BY WINTERS OIL MILL

WINTERS, Nov. 17.—The market for cottonseed hulls has dropped to such a low level that the local cotton oil mill is burning them for fuel, according to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The local company advertised hulls at \$5 a ton and is unable to sell. Coal is high. Therefore, the hulls make a splendid heat.

### LEAGUE OF NATIONS TAKES UP ROUTINE WORK BEHIND CLOSED DOORS

GENEVA, Nov. 17.—The League of Nations assembly has gotten down to routine business, but met today behind closed doors. The report of Secretary General Sir Eric Drummond was approved. There was no plenary session. The sixth vice president will be elected tomorrow.

### OTHER BUSINESS DEMANDS SALE OF LOCAL CEMETERY

In offering to sell the city the Evergreen cemetery, Mr. Poe said that he would be willing to take a heavy loss in order to get free so that he could attend to his other business which is located in El Paso. His offer was that he would sell the ground and all the improvements and allow the city ten years in which to pay the price of \$7,000, if it needed that much time.

### BEGINNING OF WORK ON NEW TELEPHONE EXCHANGE UP TO PRESENT TENANTS, SAYS POE

Owner of Building Says Company's Plans Indicate Belief That Ranger Will Be a City of Magnitude.

The local telephone company will begin the work of altering the upper story of the Poe building on Marston street for the use of their offices and exchange by Jan. 1. This information was given out by A. B. Poe, owner of the building, this morning. Work would begin by Dec. 1, Mr. Poe stated if the tenants now in the upper story of the building found new quarters by that date. The telephone company have a space seventy-five feet square, and at a cost of several thousand dollars it will remodel the space to fit its needs. The partitions will be reset, lighting and plumbing rearranged.

### ARREST MADE FOR OPERATING SLOT MACHINE

An arrest was made last night by the police under a charge of operating a slot machine. A fine of \$20.70 was paid by the owner. This, perhaps, is the first fine ever paid in Ranger for this offense, and is evidence that the department intends that the machines shall remain with their faces to the wall.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 17.—Girl swimmers who compete in contests of the Amateur Athletic union must in the future wear suits that come high about the neck, cut with due allowance for shrinkage, under a ruling adopted at the annual convention of the union.

### Wetzel Elected by C. C. Directors to Sammies Board

Guy Wetzel of the National Supply company has been selected by the Chamber of Commerce directors as a member of the board of the Sammies Oil corporation under the plan announced by Senator A. P. Barrett, the company's president, for giving local capital control of the Ranger gas plant.

### NEXT CONGRESS TO ADOPT STRINGENT IMMIGRATION LAWS

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Stringent measures, affecting the immigration laws of the United States, were forecast today as the result of an inspection trip made here by members of the immigration committee. The next congress is expected to take stringent action, according to Albert Johnson, chairman.

### IRRIGATION POSSIBILITIES IN RISING STAR SECTION

RISING STAR, Texas, Nov. 17.—For the nominal sum of \$200 a large garden can be irrigated in this country, according to George T. Barnes, secretary of the chamber of commerce in his plan to aid in irrigating small tracts under the West Texas Chamber of Commerce plan. He figures that vegetables from the patch the first year will more than pay for the irrigation patch. Ten demonstration irrigation plants will be out next spring under the plan.

### Entombed Miners Are Rescued

EARLINGTON, Ky., Nov. 17.—Ten miners were rescued today from the burning Arnold mine near here, and the bodies of five others were recovered. One man is still missing.

### Slow Shipments of Brick Delay Paving Program

As fast as the work can be done with incoming shipments of materials that are slow-very slow—the McKenzie Construction company will finish the paving on the east side. For the benefit of those who are forced to travel the avenues now open along the tracks, the city commission wants it known that just as soon as the brick can be laid and it is considered safe to cross the newly constructed bridge on Lamar street that route will be opened. It has also given the assurance that Railroad avenue from Lamar to aunt streets will be paved, with a dip across the creek near Hunt. An effort is being made to keep this avenue open until Lamar street can again be traveled.

### Villa to Colonize Lower California With 15,000 Men

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Nov. 17.—Panchito Villa, the former Mexican bandit, suddenly appeared in Escondido, Lower California, about 140 miles from Tijuana, today. Fifteen thousand men are said to be with Villa in Lower California. It is reported that he will head a large colony, who have brought tractors and other modern farming implements for cultivating the land.

### PETROLEUM INSTITUTE MEETS AT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—The world's oil supply, particularly the Mexican and Near East situations, will be discussed during the three-day annual meeting of the American Petroleum institute, which began today. General sessions will be held each afternoon and evening, supplemented by morning group meetings.

### OMAHA POSTAL CLERK ADMITS PARTICIPATION IN BIG MAIL ROBBERY

OMAHA, Nov. 17.—Government secret service men from Chicago and New York are at Omaha and Council Bluffs investigating the theft of several sacks of registered mail. Reports vary as to the value of the loot secured. Local papers estimate it at \$3,500,000, but officials reluctantly concede the loss to be \$1,000,000.

### ANTI-GERMAN RIOTS BY CZECHO-SLOVAKS

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Several anti-German riots are in progress at Prague, capital of Czecho-Slovakia, according to telegraph dispatches received here. A German theater and newspaper offices were attacked.

### BOLSHEVIKI DEFEAT ANOTHER ENEMY FORCE

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Moscow papers claim that the Red army has inflicted an overwhelming defeat upon the Ukraine army of General Pletura, almost annihilating three divisions, according to word received from Copenhagen today.

### ALLEGED BOOTLEGGERS SHOT DEAD IN BATTLE IN REAR MOVING AUTO

Hughes Is Surprised While Guarding Seized Whisky, Disarmed; Out-talks 'Em, Gets Guns Back, Is Attacked.

BRECKENRIDGE, Nov. 17.—Two alleged bootleggers were shot and killed last night by Chief Deputy Sheriff B. H. Hughes as they struggled with him in the rear of a moving car trying to secure his guns. The men's names were given as Lockhart and Leonard Watts. Back of the killing was displayed cool nerve by the officer in securing his release from the bootleggers after they had surprised him guarding ten cases of liquor said to have been the property of the dead men.

### TEXAS CO. WELL, GHOLSON TRACT, IS FLOWING 800

The Texas company yesterday afternoon brought in a well on the Gholson tract, Denison survey, in the northeast corner of Eastland county, about five miles from Ranger. At last report the well was flowing at a rate of about 800 barrels and was said to be getting stronger.

### Exposure, Not Violence, Killed Chicago Girls

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—Police stated today that the confessions of the two men held have nearly cleared up all the details of the mystery surrounding the deaths of Marie Graney and Lillian Thompson, two actresses found in Grant park Sunday morning. According to their investigations, the girls died from alcohol and exposure and not from violence, as was formerly supposed.

### PADEREWSKI WILL ESTABLISH POLISH COLONY IN MEXICO

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 17.—Ignacio Paderewski, famous composer and former premier of the Polish government will reach this city sometime during the latter part of the month with the avowed purpose of establishing a Polish colony in Mexico.

## MOVIE CAMERA MAN TAKES ALL DAREDEVIL HERO'S RISKS

### Fans Watching Hair-Breath Escapes on the Screen Have No Thought for the Poor Chap That Has to Turn the Crank.

When Durable Dough Fairbanks or some other desperate movie star dashes jarringly from the roof of a rapidly moving railroad car into a flivver, likewise in rapid motion, all the fans hold their breath and not one of them thinks of Mike, the snub-nosed camera man who filmed the thriller.

Yet Mike and his camera were there, moving right alongside the daredevil hero when the picture was taken, either in another flivver or in an engine on a parallel track.

Of course, the cameraman's stunt isn't as dangerous as that of the star but it's no snap at that. A good camera man, we are told, is a person with a heart of stone, no nerves, no mouth, all ears, and with a right hand trained to keep up a circular motion with the unflinching regularity for hours and hours at a time. He goes through innumerable experiences calculated to make him lose his self-possession says a writer.

"What your hero rushes into danger, Mike's there, too. If you remember that perfectly awful oil-tank scene in 'The Silent Avenger,' just remember that Mike was in it too, and even if it didn't get up to his ears as it did on Bill, it was just as gooey where it did get. Mike has to see the hair-raising escapes in the greatest American serial without blinking an eye. In flood scenes, he's knee-deep in icy water. In fire scenes his face and his film are blistered by the heat.

But the news photographer has the hardest job. A story went the rounds something like this:

The camera man had been commissioned to get a picture of a king. Now, entrance to a king's parlor must be with due pomp and ceremony. But Mike walked in briskly, stepped over to the king, and said: "Get over here, will you? It's too dark where you are to get a good shot at your plume." ## EAST SIDE FIRE HOUSE ACCEPTED BY CITY COMMISSION

## PETRIFIED BODY OF WOMAN, FIRST FOUND DUG UP IN ARIZONA

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 17.—Excavating in a mound just west of Phoenix, Ariz., two explorers unearthed the petrified body of a woman of prehistoric ages, making a discovery that is welcomed by scientists throughout the country as one of the most important known to geologists and those versed in the science of paleontology.

News of the discovery was received in Los Angeles in a telegraphic message from Phoenix.

While the petrified bodies of men have been discovered at various times in the past in certain areas of the middle western states, that is the first time that the petrified body of a woman was ever found, it is reported.

The woman's body was in a good state of preservation. How many hundreds of thousands of years the body may have lain locked in the earth is a question that scientists will endeavor to answer.

While the features and general physique of the body conform in a general way to the natural characteristics of the Toltec tribe of Indians, there are certain peculiarities that indicate a relationship to the Aztecs.

The woman may have belonged to a prehistoric race that even antedates these tribes, it is said. A careful examination of the body is said to have unmistakably stamped it as belonging to the stone age.

The woman was about five feet in stature. She had a wide forehead and high cheek bones.

So well preserved was the body that

it is believed that petrification set in before natural decay had time to take place. Even the fingernails, it is reported, were in a state of preservation. In the mound with the body were the head of a stone image and a number of crude implements of corroded copper and flint, such as belong to prehistoric races.

### Weather Bans Aerial Mail.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 17.—Winter weather in Holland, Germany and Denmark has been judged too severe for commercial aviation. The daily aerial mail service between Holland and England, and Holland and Germany will be discontinued until next spring.

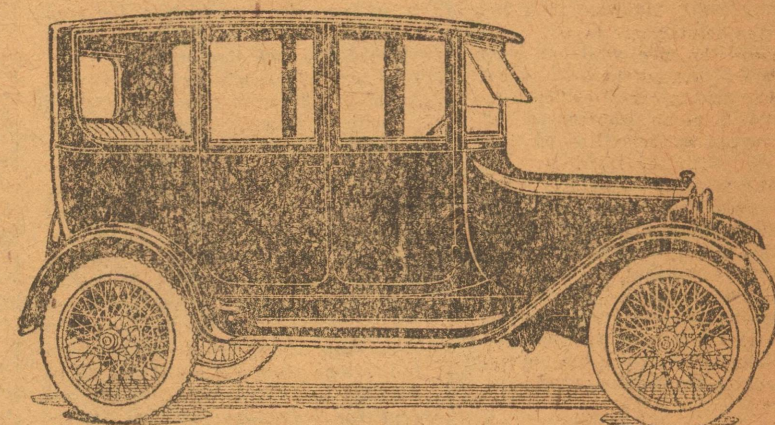

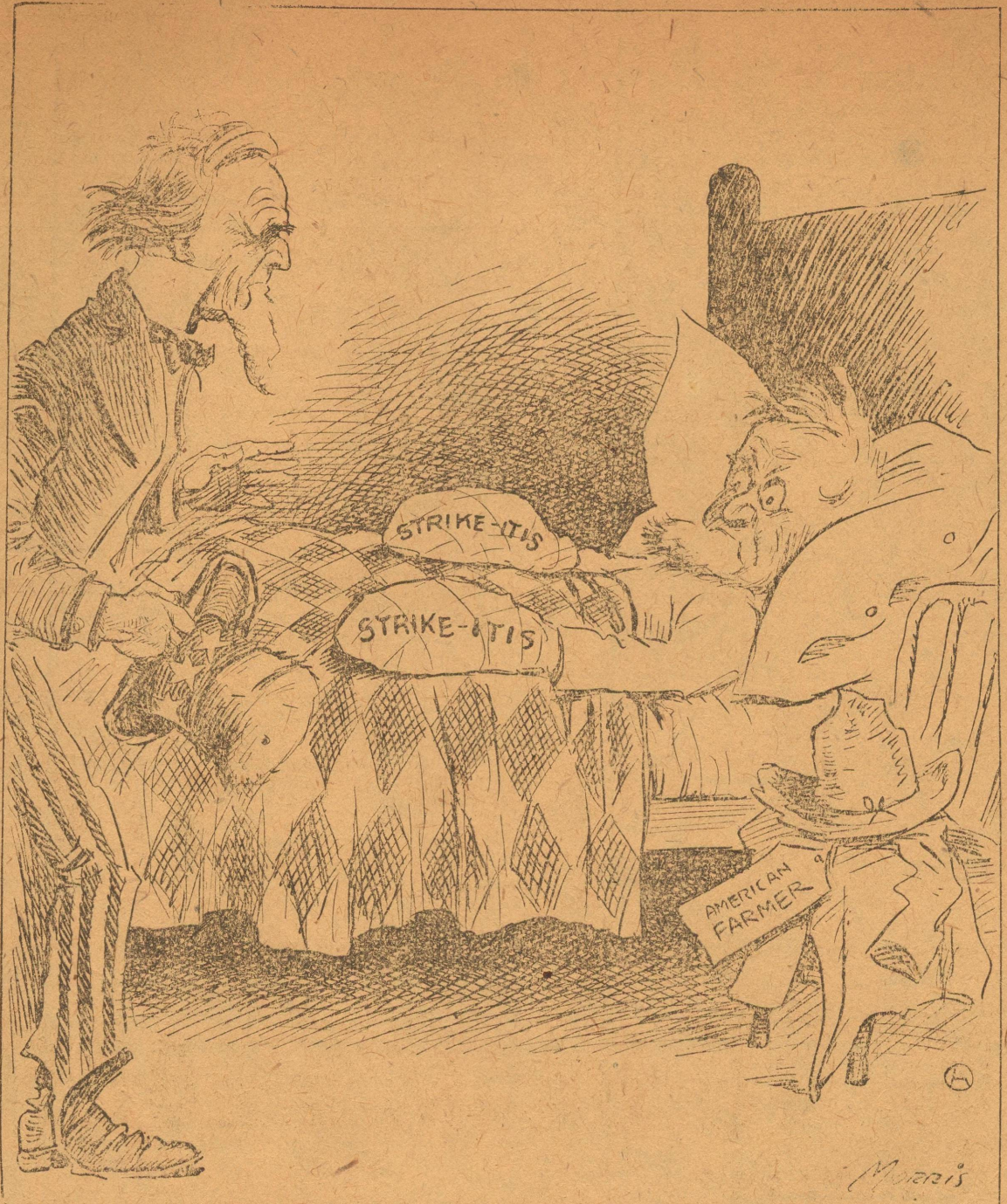

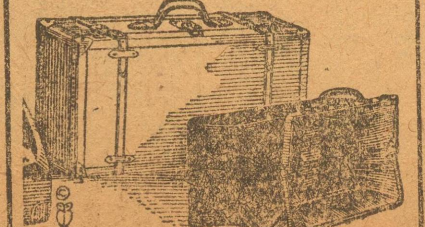

### AVOID PAYROLL ROBBERIES BY USE OF CHECK

#### Large Business Concern Plans to Operate Without Currency.

ROCHESTER, Nov. 17.—A large business house having headquarters in this city has undertaken to conduct its affairs entirely without the use of money. Instead of currency, it intends to use checks, trade acceptances and travel checks to make payments of every kind, including its payroll. As the concern deals with more than 800,000 individual customers the result of the experiment will be watched with interest.

The company's reason for adopting this method is given as an effort to demonstrate a means of ending the epidemic of payroll robberies and to show that modern business may be conducted most efficiently without the use of 'small change' thus leaving the nation's money where it belongs, in the banks, to serve as the basis of credit.

The announcement says even carfare, hotel bills and railroad fares for the company's force of several hundred salesmen, and other sundries are to be paid by checks. All petty items even to one-cent postage stamps will be paid henceforth by check and "no currency of any amount or denomination is to be carried in any form as company property."

To meet the payroll of its factory, the company has offered to employees either a regular pay check or the option of receiving on pay day a deposit slip showing that his earnings for the week have been deposited to his credit in a local bank. This plan is expected by the house to prove popular with the thrifty class of employees and to increase the volume of bank deposits. Executive employees who have no banking account have been advised to start one at once.

### Sarcasm Aplenty When Patti Met Jenny, 'Tis Said

PARIS, Nov. 17.—A member of the French Academy of Music recently told the following anecdote concerning the only meeting between Jenny Lind and Adelina Patti. It is timely in connection with celebrations of the 100th anniversary of the birth of the "Swedish Nightingale."

Patti, whose youth was just budding into womanhood, sang one evening in one of the leading salons of the Champs Elysees. Among the audience was Jenny Lind, then rather an aged woman. After the applause that greeted the conclusion of Patti's singing had subsided, the Swedish singer approached Mrs. Patti and congratulated her but not without making reserves as to certain detail of omission and a slight criticism of certain notes.

"I feel that I may tell you this without offense," she added, "because, you see, I am Jenny Lind."

Displeased by the reproach, Patti replied drily: "Oh, yes, I have heard of you; my grandmother spoke to me of you."

Mrs. Pauline O. Field, the only woman attorney practicing in the general sessions court in New York city, and the only woman member of the Criminal Bar association, has been elected president of that association.

### Turning Post at Pine and Marston to Protect Children

A concrete turning post will be placed at Pine and Marston streets to protect school children from automobiles that round the corner without obeying the traffic ordinances. The city will erect the post following a petition from citizens from that section. The post sets out that because the Central school was near that corner, hundreds of school children passed and repassed the spot daily and because motorists did not observe the traffic regulations there was grave possibility of a fatal accident.

The post will be oval in shape and perhaps sixteen inches high. It will be painted white so that it can be easily seen at night.

A little later the city expects to erect these posts at all prominent corners.

### EGYPTIAN WOMEN LIFT VEILS AND PEEP INTO CIVIC AFFAIRS

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Egyptian women are at last beginning to take an interest in public affairs, particularly in the schools. Viscount Milner in his report as High Commissioner of Egypt says that no change which has taken place in that country in the last few years is more striking than the awakening interest.

### SMUGGLERS STEAL GERMAN COAL.

ROTTERDAM, Nov. 17.—Thousands of tons of German coal, intended for some of the entente nations, have been stolen while en route down the Rhine and smuggled into Holland on barges, says the Rotterdam Courant. Only a part of the coal was unloaded at the allied depots, and the rest, covered with stones, was brought down the river to Holland, says the newspaper.

### MANUFACTURE DIAMONDS BY ARTIFICIAL PROCESS.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 17.—Henry Polack, president of the Dutch Diamond Workers' Union, says it is not impossible that a German explosives' firm has discovered how to manufacture diamonds artificially, as it claims to have done. The chief difficulty is to obtain an unbelievably powerful pressure under the right circumstances, M. Polack explained. Since it is a manufacturer of explosives which is reported to have discovered the method of making diamonds—he said it was possible that experimenters had succeeded in obtaining the desired pressure.

M. Polack expressed some doubt as to whether diamonds could be manufactured artificially at less than the cost of mining them.

It was recently announced in Berlin that a dynamic company of Hamburg had obtained the patent for the manufacture of diamonds and was in a position to produce several hundred carats daily at a cost less than the present world price for the natural stones.



# TOYS FOR AMERICAN KIDDIES COST \$100,000,000 THIS YEAR

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Many strange new toys which fill the show windows of toy shops and stores throughout the United States, as Christmas approaches, prove that the boys and girls of America are a force which cannot be overlooked—even as a business proposition.

The failure of the toy supply from foreign shores, especially from Germany and Austria, during the war caused such a demand for means of entertainment and instruction for young America that American genius came promptly to the rescue. The result is that this year there will be a greater variety of toys than ever before, and they will be better toys.

This year there will be \$100,000,000 worth of toys sold in the United States, and more than \$80,000,000 worth of them are being made in the United States—an almost entirely new industry, so far as this country is concerned.

And it is predicted by the men who have become leaders in this new business that its importance for this country is only beginning and that next year will see an increase of at least 30 per cent over the production of this year.

Before the war most of America's toys were purchased in foreign markets, but today the situation has changed and American manufacturers are competing in many instances in countries which formerly understood the American producer have even after the articles were brought over the ocean at big cost.

A few years ago, when the supply was cut off by the war, the American manufacturer turned to the development of the industry because of larger profits. Machinery was invented which permitted the manufacturer to turn out large quantities and the product was standardized, which also aided in greater production.

Toy Industry Grows.  
"The American toy industry may be reckoned today as one of the substantial and growing enterprises of the country," said W. O. Coleman, a director of the Toy Makers' association of the United States.

"The manufacturer has turned his ingenuity toward the invention of new types of toys; toys that are miniature replicas in many instances of the scientific and mechanical triumphs of the day. No other country has ever developed so many entertaining, instructive and education toys as have been placed on the market in this country during the past five years.

This is particularly true of mechanical toys. New types of motors have been invented for the miniature automobiles, airplanes, submarines and trains that are being manufactured by the millions this year. And American toy manufacturing is still in its infancy.

"The toy industry abroad, particularly in Germany, the greatest toy country, and in Japan, is essentially a home industry, with the imperfection and lack of standardization which this implies. The American industry is a machine industry, with the product scientifically standardized and manufactured at a cost which, under present conditions, cannot be duplicated abroad.

Not a Seasonal Industry.  
"The toy industry in the United States is no longer a seasonal one, nor does it endeavor merely to produce novelties. Many articles of an educational nature are classed under the heading of toys. There is the pushmobile, for example, the kiddie cars, coaster wagon, children's books, games, tool boxes and kindergarten accessories. Dolls are, of course, manufactured in tremendous quantities and diverse styles, and, although it is not generally realized, doll accessories, wardrobes, etc., form a huge industry also.

"Department stores, hardware stores, corner stationery shops and small notion dealers now handle toys as a part of their business. Large production by mass methods resulted in intensive sales campaigns undertaken by American methods.

"When the bulk of toys was imported the importer sold to jobbers or direct to retailers but it was a seasonal trade restricted almost entirely to the Christmas holidays.

## BRITISH GAIN SHIP TONNAGE AS AMERICA SHOWS BIG DECLINE

International News Service.  
LONDON, Nov. 16.—British tonnage in shipbuilding is increasing whilst American tonnage decreases, according to a report issued by the American Chamber of Commerce in London.

Reduced building in American shipping is given as the reason for the announced decrease in that country. The total number of vessels built in British yards during the three months of July, to September was 967, with a gross ton-

nage of 3,731,000 tons. The total for all other countries combined—including America, but excluding Germany—was 3,834,073 gross tons.

America has vessels under construction at the present time amounting to 1,772,000 gross tons as against 3,500,000 tons a year ago. In the March quarter of last year over 4,500,000 tons was actually under construction. In the eighteen months ending September of this year this tonnage has been reduced by 58 per cent, whilst in the same period there was in Great Britain an increase of 65 per cent.

The first shell hurled by the American army at the Germans, Oct. 23, 1917, was fired from a French 75-millimetre gun of Battery C Sixth Field Artillery, First Division. Corporal Louis J. Varaday, of East St. Louis, Ill., fired the shot, pulling the lanyard. The historic cannon with a record of having fired 20,000 pounds in all, is now at the U. S. Military Academy, West Point.

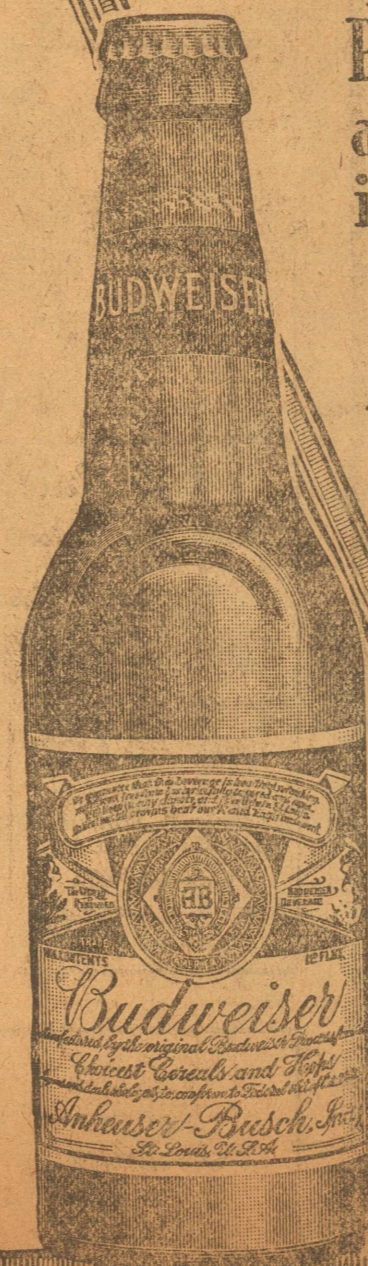

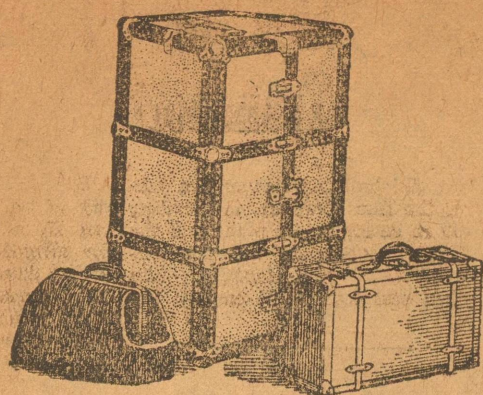

Since there will be many of you who fully share our heartfelt sorrow and regret for the breach that the war has occasioned in our friendly intercourse, and cherished that old friendliness, you must, we believe, be sharing our hope for its speedy re-establishment.

"We therefore, the undersigned directors, heads of houses, professors and other officers and teachers in the University of Oxford, now personally approach you with the desire to dispel the embitterment of animosities that under the impulse of loyal patriotism may have passed between us.

surely look to be reconciled and the fellowship of learning offers a road which may—and if our spiritual ideals be alive must—lead to a wider sympathy and better understanding between our kindred nations.

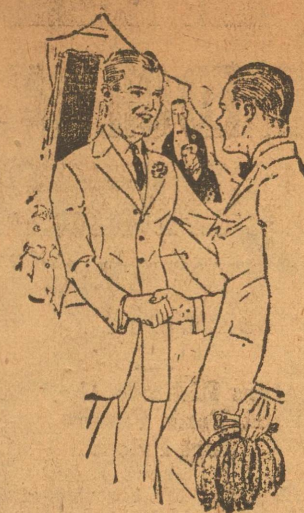
