

LONDON, Nov. 22.—A plot to assassinate Premier Lloyd George in conformance with the new wave of Irish violence was unearthed today by the Irish officials. They announced that a *a*ocument ou"ining the whole plot had been found and that the principals would probably be arrested soon. Normal conditions have been re-

stored in Dublin, following the outbreak of violence in that city Sun-day. Sir Hanner Greenwood, seeretary for Ireland. announced in the house of commons today that thirty-three persons were killed in Dublin and Ireland during the week-end rioting. Fourteen persons were killed in Dublin and twelve at Croke Field during the afternoon, while those killed in other parts of the island bring the total up to thirty-
