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

WORK WILL START AS SOON AS CONTRACT CAN BE AWARDED

ANGASTER MAKES PROMISE

Plans Provide for Brick and Tile Structure Running South From Main Street, With Accommodations for City of 40,000.

Ranger will have a new depot. It will be ample for a city of 40,000 persons. Construction will be begun as soon as bids can be submitted and the contract awarded.

These promises were made this morning by General Manager Lancaster of the Texas & Pacific railroad when he addressed a meeting of business men at the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 9 o'clock.

The new structure will be located on the south side of Main street, running down more than a block. It will be of brick and tile construction, with a white waiting room 40x90 feet and a colored waiting room 26x40. Smoking rocms, a rest room for women and all toilet requisites will be amply provided for. Mr. Lancaster assured the assemblage that the stat. on would be one of which it could well feel proud.
