

Narrow Escape From Death; Debris Hurled Long Distance; Timber Through Tank; NEW YORK, Nov. 20 .- Nine person including an entire family of siz, were suffocated and burned to death in a fire **Fire Completes Destruction.**

Only a black spot is left today of an oil well derrick and Only a black spot is left today of an oil well derrick and rigging on the Great Southern lease, eight miles west of Ranger, following the explosion of a thirty-quart charge of nitroglycerfollowing the explosion of a thirty-quart charge of nitroglycer-ine on the derrick floor yesterday afternoon. The charge was blown out of the hole by the well unexpectedly flowing. Following the explosion, all of the rigging that was not blown from the vicinity was destroyed by fire. The driller, tool dresser and nitro shooter, warned by the roar as the well began to erupt, ran about twenty feet away and threw themselves face down upon the ground. They escaped injury.

upon the ground. They escap A heavy piece of timber was blown through one wall of a steel storage tank and part way through the opposite wall. This caused the loss of considerable oil. A nitro wagon driver standing close by heard the cries of the crew and barely had time to get his machine out of the danger zone. This morning the fire at the well had been extin-guished. guished.
