BOMB BLAST

Acts of Building Graft Head Lead to Disaster, Says Evening World.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 .- District Attorney Swann plans to question all men mentioned in the Evening World yesterday in its "solution" of the Wall street explosion on Sept. 16. The newspaper declares the motive of the explosion was revenge on the part of the House Wreckers' union against a rival organization which Robert Brindell heads. Brindell is the central figure in the "building trust' investigation now under way.

Publication of the Evening World's analysis of the tragedy also brought forth other theories from the police and depart-

ment of justice officials.

Swann said he is particularly anxious to question Raymond Clark, foreman of the housewrecking job diagonally across from the scene of the explosion, who was quoted at length in yesterday's article. He said Clark's statement to the newspaper varied considerably from his previous statement to Assistant District Attorney Talley shortly after the explosion.

LAID TO INDIVIDUALS. Responsibility for the explosion, the echo of which was heard around the world in de-nunciation of "reds" and "an-archists," was charged to individual laboring men or labor sympathizers by the Evening World. The paper, however, admitted it could not explain presence of threats signed "Anarchist Fighters" found in a mail box near the scene of the explosion

In a three-page story the paper announced that the mystery of the blast that killed nearly forty persons and injured 10 more had been "solved." \$1,000 REWARD FOR WRECKER OF HAMON TRAIN

A reward of \$1,000 has been offered by officials of the Hamon rallroad for the arrest and conviction of the persons who were responsible for the wrecked passenger train at Breckwalker last Friday night.

The engineer of the passenger train, R. H. Hansford, declared that someone threw a switch at the station and turned the train he was driving into a freight train standing on a siding. Twenty-five persons were slightly injured, including Engineer Hansford, who jumped from his cab window when he saw that a collision was certain.

OF CERTAIN PLACES IS DEMANDED

With a feeling that would allow no evading of the issue, the city commission yesterday afternoon denounced the gambling, whisky selling and parading of immoral women said to be rampant in Ranger. Davenport, police commissioner, with the statement that if he did not clean the city of immorality in thirty days he would leave the commission.

Mr. Davenport stated that his answer would be forthcoming this afternoon. Instead it was given last night when he ordered the police department to raid every place in the city having the appearance of harboring any violator of the law in any form. Immeral women and their companion were arrested and fined, whisky sellers were given notice, and alleged gambling houses ceased their activities. 


