

RIDER HURT WHEN KICKED IN HEAD BY BUCKING HORSE AT RODEO; HORSE NEVER RIDDEN

"Chick" Hannon, of Miles City, Mont., rodeo rider, is in the Ranger hospital as a result of attempting to ride "Barney Newson," horse that has never been ridden, according to the promoters of the event. Hannon, said to be a topnotch contest rider, came out of the grandstand following a challenge of L. F. Fletcher, arena director, offering \$50 to any man who could stay astride the animal. The rider was unseated at the second jump and fell beneath the borse's feet, and was kicked behind the right ear as the bucking horse passed over him.

Upon a hurried examination made by Dr. McAdon, who was in attendance, it was thought that a fracture had been sustained. This morning the report is that the rider is not seriously injured.

The Jones-Cox ambulance, which was stationed at the grounds in case accidents happened, carried the injured man to the Ranger hospital.

Because of the fact that Hannon was dressed in street clothing and came out of the audience, it was shought that he was someone who did not know the character of the horse he was attempting to ride. It later developed that he was entered in the contests and was a contest rider of ability.

Train crews and switchmen are out on the Hamon-Kell line, tying up freight trains until differences can be straightened out or new crews are secured in their places. 

But when these sales are made to private individuals, the only thing benefitted is the grasping greed of profiteers.

Most of the sales have been made to corporations. The packers bought meat back from the government at half the price at which they sold it to the government, and then they disposed of it to the people at standard prices, or nearly so. The government lost millions-gave them to the capacious pockets of those already rich.

These acts are too numerous and well known to require elaboration. They are also too flagrant to be passed over unnoticed. Some one should be punished and punished severely. Treason is the charge that should be made against these plunderers and wastrels in the pay of the people.
