



This is due largely to the gen-erous attitude of the United States to ward Montenegro during the war and to the widespread relief work done by

The Montenegrins, who are almost ex slusively of the Greek Orthodox church are Serbian fugitives from the Turk. They speak the Serbian tongue; but in stead of deeming themselves on a pa with other Serbians, they believe they are a sort of Serbian aristocracy.


