# Mayfield Leads Ferguson by 67,943 PEARL LONG VICTIM; LEON WILSON HELD

Sue Nominated for County Treasurer; Mayfield and Blanton Sweep County.

With about 150 votes of five small boxes unreported, every county race has been settled and the Eastland county majority for state races de-

Ed S. Pritchard was nominated county judge by a majority of 1,362, polling 3,210 votes to Ross' 1,848. J. T. Sue received the nomination for county treasurer by a 505 majority over Felix S. Boland, receiving 2,769 votes to Boland's 2,264.

Earle B. Mayfield carried the county by 868 over James E. Ferguson with a vote of 2,948. Ferguson received 2,080.

Congressman Thomas L. Blanton carried the county over Oscar Callaway by a majority of 768, receiving 2,897 votes and Callaway 2,129.

In the lieutenant governor's race T. W. Davidson carried the county by a majority of 473 over Colonel Billie Mayfield, receiving 2,715 votes to

Davidson Beats Mayfield for Lieutenant Governor; Bentley - Marrs Race Only One Undecided; Mayfield Leads From Start.

DALLAS, Aug. 26.—Returns from the Democratic primary Saturday tabulated at 1 o'clock Sunday morning, indicated Earle B. Mayfield has been nominated for United States senator over James E. Ferguson.

Returns from 206 counties, 38 complete, accounted for 476,-139 votes, of which Ferguson had 204,098, and Mayfield 272,041. This gave Mayfield a majority of 67,943. The story told by the returns was almost monotonous, Mayfield having led almost from the beginning of the tabulation. Of counties reporting and returns of which are complete it is indicated that Ferguson carried El Paso, Galveston, Bexar and Bosque, and Mayfield carried Dallas, Tarrant, Harris, McLennan and Wichita. Figured on the basis of the count reported, it is estimated the total senatorial vote will be about 600.000.

For state superintendent of public instruction, S. M. N. Marrs had 218,779 on incomplete reports from 206 counties, 38 of which are complete, and Ed Bentley 205,702.

For lieutenant governor on the

same returns, T. W. Davidson had an apparently safe lead over Billie Marfield Jr., with Davidson's count 254,514 and Mayfield

For state treasurer, the vote stands: C. V. Terrell 235,371, George A. Garrett 180,372.

On the face of these returns, it seems safe to say the race for superintendent of public instruc-

tion is the only one undecided. Those watching the vote pointed out that apparently there was more interest in the senatorial race than the others, as the total vote reported for superintendent of public instruction was only 424,481, against 476,139 for senator.

Six counties did not hold a run-off primary. These were Kerr, King, Goliad, Jim Hogg, Terrell and Real.

In congressional races, the incomplete vote in the Fourteenth district gave Hertzberg 16,059 and Cunningham 12,416. In the Seventeenth district, Blanton 25,419 and Callaway 15,484.

For judge court of civil appeals, incomplete, district No. 3 gave Baker 29,800 and Blair 26,085, and in district No. 5, Jones 36,773, Taylor 35,772.





#### MAKING FARM DOLLARS.

Next Saturday, Ranger will have forward step, if it will plan wisely.

That opportunity is the town-farm conference, at which, its proponents hope, plans can be put under way for co-operation between business men and farmers, which will result in the upbuilding of a prosperous farm population.

Even at first glance, there are many steps apparent which would be of mutual benefit, revolving about the fundamental of providing a market

For instance, here is the matter of vegetables being expressed into Ranger from Fort Worth while local farmers must spend time in peddling their produce as well as raising it. Instead of this, Ranger farmers should not only be able to fill the local market, but their surplus should be exported, as well. Proper marketing arrangements, entered into wholeheartedly and with intentions of fair dealings on the part of both producers and distributors, will reverse the present condition, to the profit of both. That means more dollars in Ranger.

Then again, several Ranger dairies are mere delivery agents for Fort Worth creameries. Why in the world should cream be shipped from New Mexico into Fort Worth and then back to Ranger? Why shouldn't Ranger, with the vast acres at her disposal, have surplus cream to ship to Fort Worth? The answer, of course, is that there are not sufficient cows. From that premise, however, it is easy to work along lines of definite progress. There is land suitable for dairies, now lying idle. There are men who know dairying methods, and who are willing to work energetically, if they can obtain the land and the opportunity to better themselves. In agricultural sections, banks are not averse to loaning money to buy cattle, realizing that it promotes the prosperity of the community. Presumably, the Ranger banks would do the same thing, if plans were formed along business lines. Success would mean not alone the shipping of cream, but a creamery to handle it. That would mean more dollars in Ranger.

These things are but instances of what farm-town co-operation could bring about. There are others. There is the chicken industry, which puts many persons on few acres, and other types of specialized farming for which Ranger is well situated. All would mean more dollars in Ranger.

But these things, if left to grow of themselves, will develop only gradually, whereas applied effort can save years in bringing them to a high state of development.

Get behind the farm conference Get every farmer you know behind it. If it functions as it should, this entire district will be materially benefited. Bigger towns than Ranger have been built virtually on farm prosperity alone.







PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 26.—The United Mine Workers are ready to negotiate a satisfactory wage agreement with governmental representatives should the federal government take over the anthracite mines in case no agreement can be reached with the operators, John L. Lewis, president of the union, said tonight in a statement relative to the possibility of such action by congress.

With a deadlock existing between the miners and operators for peace in the hard coal fields, Lewis said that the anthracite consuming terri tory would be seriously embarrassed for lack of fuel during the coming winter and described the possibilities of such a situation as appalling.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, who came to Philadelphia yesterday from Canada, left with Mrs. Gompers for Washington today. He declined to comment on the situation, stating that the labor end of the dispute was in the hands of Mr. Lewis.
