

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HONOR COLUMBUS.

The Pan-American Union is about to organize a campaign for popular subscriptions for a fund for the erection of a monumental lighthouse to honor the memory of Christopher Columbus.

The site selected for the lighthouse is on the coast of the Dominican republic, in the West Indies, near the capital city, Santo Domingo. Although the first land reached by Columbus was the island of San Salvador, and he did not reach San Domingo until more than six weeks later, the latter island was particularly associated with him in later years of his life, and it was on it that the first European settlement in the New World was established. The site, accordingly, is a fitting one.




