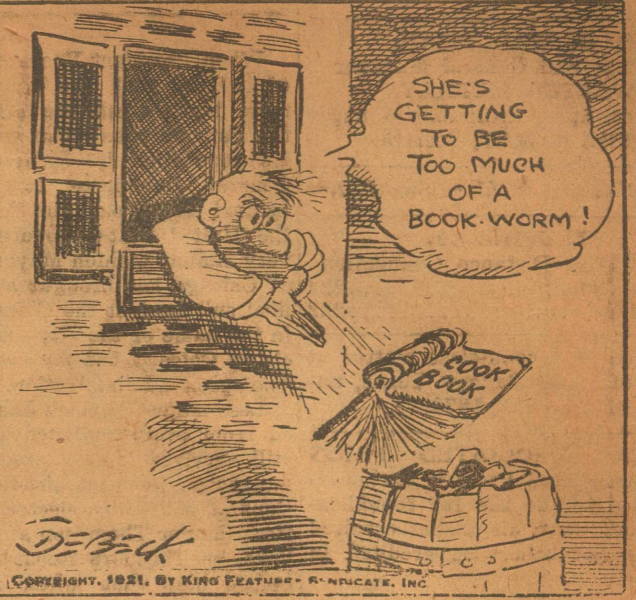
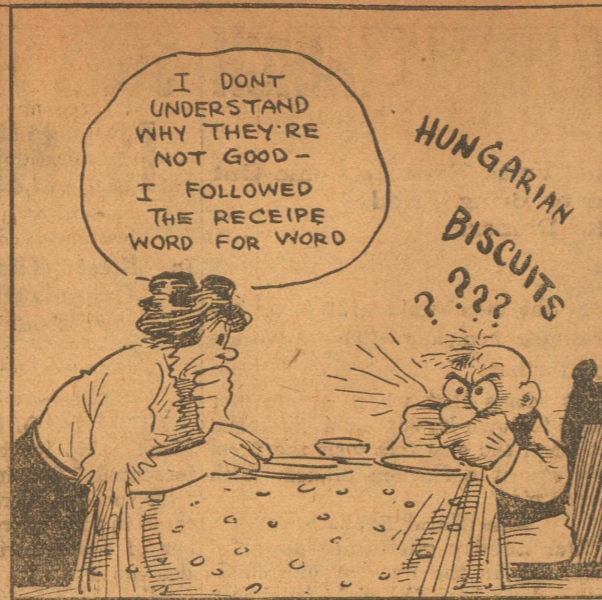
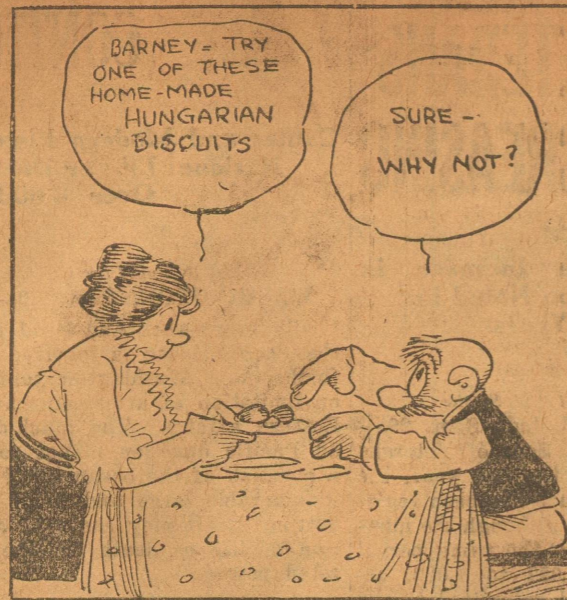

\$45 BANK CLERK BUYS SWELL CAR; GETS PINCHED

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Theodore Siemer of an old Hoboken family, had a position as receiving teller in the Merchants National Bank, Jersey City, a salary of \$45 a week, a wife and two children. For the latter's benefit he took a bungalow at Lake Hopatcong in Corts Park, more than two miles from the railroad station, and for three years commuted to Jersey City.

Everybody living near had a car. One is needed in that country. Siemer got one of the better sort, a five-passenger model. Its upkeep was a formidable load on \$45 a week. So Mrs. Siemer drove it to the Lackawanna station to meet all trains and took arriving and departing summer visitors to and from the hotels and boarding houses, thereby making a little money.

When this automobile was in collision with another two weeks ago a report of the accident got into the New Jersey papers. Officials of the bank read it. They knew that automobiles of the better sort do not go with salaries of \$45 a week, and they began an investigation.

Siemer was arrested by department of justice agents on a complaint filed by a surety company which furnished the receiving teller's bond. He was arraigned before United States Commissioner John W. Queen on a charge of embezzling \$4,544 by checks drawn on Aug. 1, 3 and 4. His alleged operations were described as kiting checks. No dissipation or extravagance is charged to Siemer, and the misuse of the bank's funds charged is attributed to trying to live on a better scale than \$45 a week makes possible.

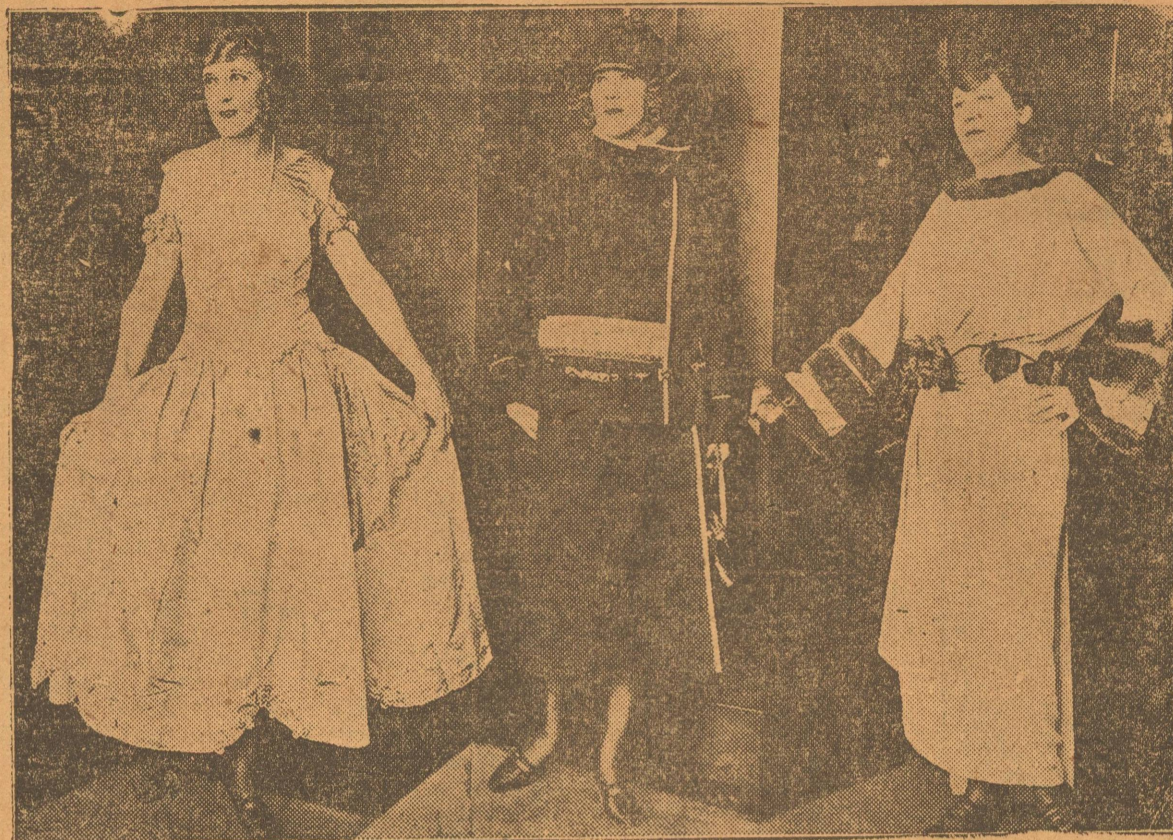

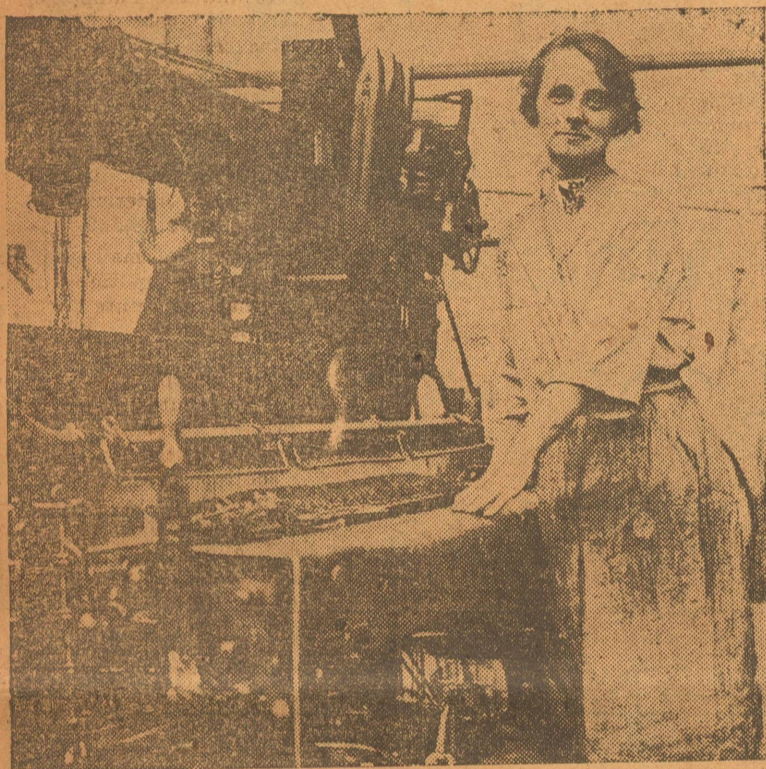

CHINA'S ONLY FEMALE LAWYER A TEXAS WOMAN

Miss Helen Leary of San Antonio a Graduate of U. of T.

AUSTIN, Sept. 29.—That graduates of the law school of the University of Texas are now making themselves in various parts of the world is shown by the fact that the only woman who has ever been admitted to the bar in China is from this institution. Mrs. Cleveland McCauley, wife of Lieutenant Commander McCauley, U. S. N., and formerly Miss Helen Leary of San Antonio, is now in the United States on a visit with relatives after a trip around the world, during which she spent a considerable period in China and Japan, and practiced law in China. For the past six months she has been touring the globe with her husband.

Mrs. McCauley graduated from the school of law of the University of Texas in June, 1918, and later taught in the schools of Tampico, Mexico. There she met her future husband, an officer in the navy. He was transferred to New Orleans, and then to China, and Mrs. Leary had to cross the ocean in order to meet him in China, where they were married at the American embassy.

For some time after going to China, Mrs. McCauley stayed at Shanghai, where her husband made his headquarters during his trips up the Yangtze-Kiang on his duties with the United States navy. While there

she took up the practice of law and specialized in behalf of the sailors at that port. Although she could only start these cases between trips, they were all finished by other lawyers, who would not have undertaken them had she not started the work, it is stated. All American cases are taken to American courts in China, according to Mrs. McCauley, and for this reason the practice of law there is much the same as in this country.

Lieutenant and Mrs. McCauley returned to America by way of Europe, coming through India and traveling across the northern end of the Sahara desert on camels. They visited large cities such as Jerusalem, Paris and London, crossing the English channel in an airplane. Instead of taking fifteen hours for this trip by boat and land, they crossed over in three hours in a ship carrying twelve passengers. After a short visit in San Antonio, Mrs. McCauley will probably set out again with her husband on his travels with the navy.

CECIL M. ROOD PAYS RANGER BUSINESS VISIT YESTERDAY

Cecil McKay Rood, who formerly made his home in Ranger, was here yesterday reorganizing the field forces of the Putnam Fluid Lift company of which he is now field superintendent. The lift is an oil well contrivance which will, it is said, lift oil from wells that have refused to respond to a pump.

In its workings the gas from the wells is utilized to force the oil into four stations, which are a part of the contrivance.

The stations occupy four positions in the well and under the influence of the gas the oil travels from station to station until it reaches the top of the casing.

A shower bath was included in the service, though it is feared ice water was not available.

Under the soothing influence of the baths the boys, wrapped in the arms of the sleep god and snoring lustily, were found later by Captain Tom Weeks, of the police department, and the remainder of the night was spent in broken slumber on the iron cots of the city prison.

PUMPKIN DISHES

Pumpkin Butter.
Wash, peel and scrape seeds and pulp from pumpkin, boil in water until easily pierced with fork, drain, rub through colander; to each quart of pumpkin add 1-2 teaspoon sugar, a pinch of ginger and cloves and 12 cinnamon drops (commonly called red hots), bought at candy store. Put all ingredients in a large preserving kettle, boil, stirring occasionally until thick, which requires about 2 hours. Can and seal in mason jars.

Pumpkin Pie.
Wash, peel and scrape seeds from pumpkin; boil in water until tender; rub through colander. To each quart of pumpkin add 1 level teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon ginger, a pinch each of cloves and salt, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cocoa, small piece of butter, 2 eggs, 1 cup milk and 1 tablespoon cornstarch. Beat this mixture, have 3 pie tins lined with rich crust; fill to rim with the above mixture and bake until thoroughly done, which requires about 25 minutes, or until the custard puffs up.

Fried Pumpkin.
White crooked neck pumpkins are used for this. Peel and cut in 1-2 inch slices the neck part of pumpkin, soak in weak salt water 15 minutes. Take from water, dry with a cloth and place in baking pan with lard and butter or lard alone, sprinkle with sugar and fry in oven until brown and soft.

CONVICTED MEN DECIDE NOT TO TRY FOR APPEAL

Fred Davis and Tom Lane Face Fifty and Thirty-One Years Respectively.

BRECKENRIDGE, Sept. 29.—Two Breckenridge convicts facing long terms in the state penitentiary yesterday changed their minds as to attempting appeals of their cases. Fred Davis, alias Skinner, sentenced to fifty years for the murder of Edgar Bullock, declined to appeal and accepted sentence from District Judge C. O. Hamlin. Tom Lane, facing thirty-one years for two convictions of hijacking, withdrew his appeal and requested the opportunity to serve his sentence. Lane was sentenced with Paul Burton for an alleged series of robberies on the Ranger-Necessity road.

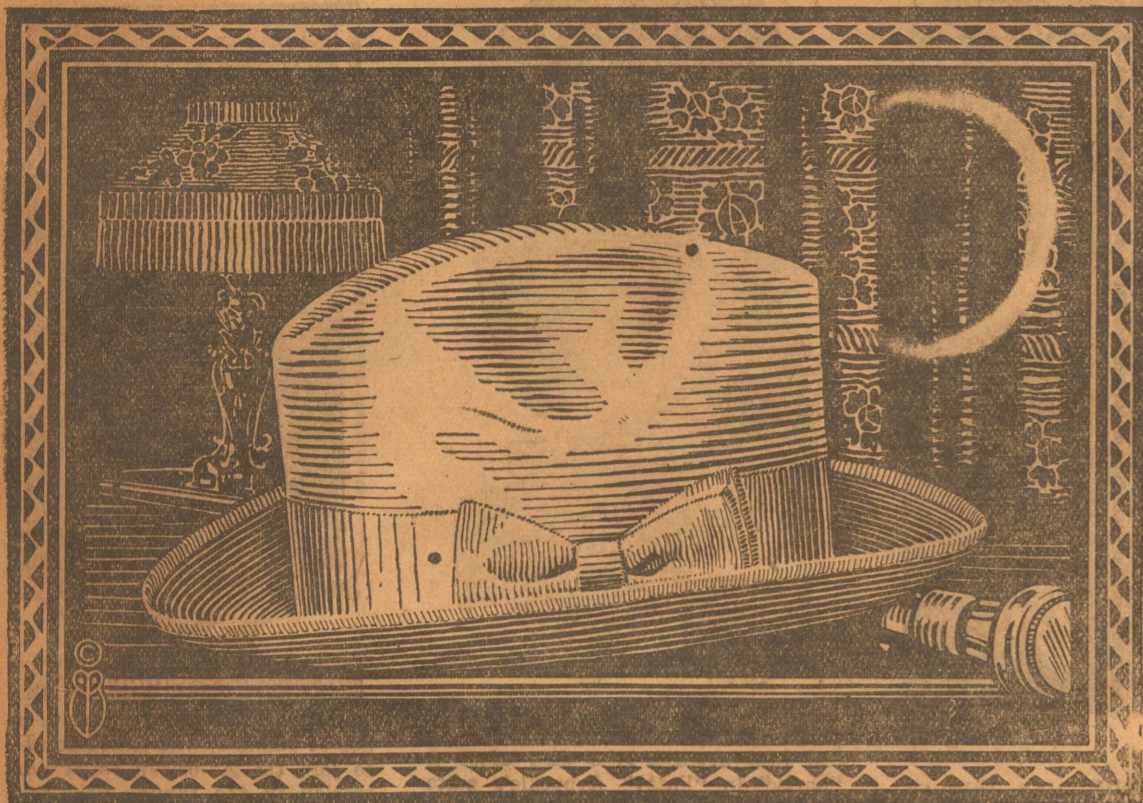
