



"Burglars" With Flashlights Fight Officers; One Held on Liquor Charge, Other Outruns Six-Gun Barrage

Two men were seen moving about, with flashlights in their hands, side a confectionery store at 2 o'clock last night, and believing they were attacking burglars, Police Captain Tom Weeks and Desk Sergeant Singleton forced an entry into the building. One of the men threatened to attack Singleton with a bottle, but the officer grappled with and finally with the aid of Weeks, handcuffed him. The other man dashed east on Main street and Weeks fired four shots in his general direction, which only added speed to his fast moving feet.

It developed that the men were unloading beer, wine and whisky in the building. John Childress, the man captured, was charged with trans-porting liquor and resisting an officer.

Two dozen bottles of beer and a bottle of wine was taken by the officers. No whisky was uncovered though the officers found a bottle which they said had contained liquor.






that blow The Giants' winning streak of eight finally blew up. The Pirates have







These various soils are all potential assets to the community, if developed, and building to plan always produces better results than haphazard improvement. The Jefferson plan will well bear watching, and emulation.

CARLISLE, Pa., Sept. 8.-Forty barrels of fine elderberry wine proved to be the only effective fire extinguisher when a fire on the farm of Gilbert Beetem here destroyed a barn and outbuildings valued at \$100,000. When tenants reached the fire, water was promptly poured on the burning buildings; but, although a bucket brigade worked for six hours the buildings were destroyed.

The flames started to ignite a handsome lodge on the farm. The water had run out. The tenant remembered a large quantity of wine stored in the cellar, and within a few minutes the bucket brigade was transferring elderberry wine to the roof of the threatened building. A steady stream of wine was kept on the building until forty barrels were exhausted. The building although badly scorched, was the only one on the farm saved.


