United Press Staff Correspondent. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.-The fate of Roscoe (Fatty) Arbuckle was expected to be determined [66] before the end of today's preliminary in his trial for the murder of Virginia Rappe.

Whether the film comedian would face trial for murder or manslaughter, or go free, would probably be announced by Judge Lazarus before night, it was said.

The state rested yesterday, but the hearing was to be resumed briefly today. It was believed Arbuckle would be held for trial. The decdid not like to dismiss any case without a showing of evidence supporting the charge which was made was taken to mean he would order Arbuckle to be held.







Dr. Nammack said the child developed a skin disease, and Mrs. Cohen was ordered by physicians to "touch" the spots with iodine. Following the death of the babe, Dr. Nammack says he found the infant's entire body had been painted.

Mrs. Cohen is quoted as having said that she followed the instructions of Drs. E. J. Cronin and Russell J. McGraw and applied an iodine salve.

The baby died in convulsions, and Dr. McGraw reported the death to the medical examiner, who immediately made an investigation.




