BIGGEST HOTEL FOR NEGROES.

ATLANTIC CITY, Sept. 2.—Plans for the largest hotel in the world to be owned, operated and exclusively patronized by negroes, are announced by the Fitzgerald Hotel and Development corporation. The new hotel will be built, it is announced, on North Indiana avenue, just off Atlantic avenue. It will have a tower rising fourteen stories in height, with two gigantic wings, each seven stories high. Supporters of the project point out that 650,000 negroes reside within five hours' ride of Atlantic City, and that every year more than 100,000 negro visitors come to the resort who have had to be content with second-class accommodations.

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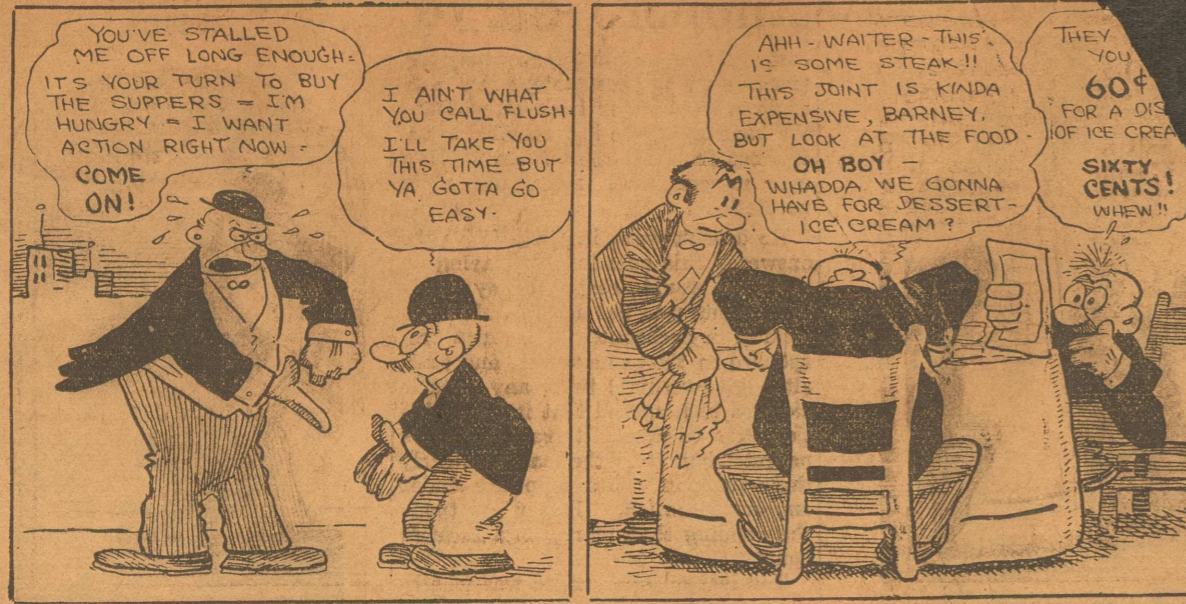

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Sept. 2.—"Petting parties" on the beach are absolutely the last word in social innovation here. They are the abomination of the staid old folks who also make the subject of censure and criticism. But with the younger set they are a source of almost daily delight.

A "petting party" consists of one girl and as many male admirers as will pay her court on the sands. They crowd about her—all in their bathing togs, of course—and compete with one another for the privilege of pilloving their heads in her lap. Some girls will manage to "pet" as many as four or five young admirers simultaneously. As might be assumed, all the petting is not done by the girl.

Many of the old fashioned mothers and fathers, who have protested in vain against the epidemic of "petting parties," are hoping an order may be issued against them by the authorities. They see hope of social reform along other lines in an edict at the Point Breeze hotel against "cutting in" on the dance floor.

For some time the girl who has the largest number of dance partners "cut in" on her has been considered the most popular at the resort. The result has been contests in this form among the young folks. Girls who have measured the extent of their appeal by the number of male arms they have been able to squeeze into during the progress of one dance are indignant over the order of Edward Hayes, proprietor of the Point Breeze hotel. Mr. Hayes announced "cutting in" would have to cease, much to the gratification of the parents and the wall-flowers.

The "cutting in" custom had progressed to a point where more young men were dashing about the ballroom seeking to take partners from the embraces of others than the floor could comfortably accommodate. The consequence was vigorous protests from the guests.
