GIVES VIEWS OF JUDGE STARNES

Bank Closing Principal Basis for Attack; Mixup With Auditor.

Confining his arguments principally to himself and dealing in satire, J. R. Stubblefield of Eastland, yesterday spent nearly two hours speaking to probably 400 persons at the Christian tabernacle on "Why Judge Starnes Should Resign."

Perhaps twenty minutes of his speech was confined to a review of the action of the commissioners' court in the matter of a bond to protect the county's money, which is tied up in the closed Security State bank. Several times he intimated that a part of the money was going into the wrong pockets.

His one direct charge was that \$50,000 of the county bonds were placed as collateral as a loan of \$35,-000 for the bank before its closing. These bonds are alleged to have been placed with a Chicago concern by Judge Starnes and Sam D. Young.

Appeals to "Old-Timers." Because Stubblefield brought into play every art of the speechmaker to arouse sentiment against Judge Starnes, it was almost impossible to separate the real facts stated from the reams of satire in which he indulged. It was apparent throughout his talk that he was appealing to that class known as "old-timers," of whom perhaps 200 were in the meeting. Repeatedly he would address them by their first names.

At the close of his talk he asked those who were with him to stand. Perhaps 150 arose. He then asked that those against him arise. There was no response.

This remark was made toward the end of his speech. In the forepart of it he dwelt at length on a letter he had received in an envelope bearing the name of Judge E. A. Hill, from a purported Ku Klux Klan. He seemed much concerned about the letter and seemed to think that almost any day he would be bumped off because, to quote him, he "had so fearlessly taken up this fight." Early in his speech Stubblefield admitted that he was drawing a fee.



BERLIN, Sept. 2.—Field Marshal General Von Buelow, who was com-mander in chief of the German Secand army during the war died here Marshal Von Buelow, who was 76

years old, was one of Germany's leading commanders during the war He was raised to the rank of field marshal Jan. 27, 1915, on the fifty sixth anniversary of the kaiser's

Marshal Von Buelow's name was among the list of Germans whose surrender for trial was demanded by the treaty of Versailles. After his name was published he declared publicly that the Germans demanded by the allies "only did their duty to the Fatherland," and that extradition was an ignominy to which "no German would voluntarily submit. declared that he would never place himself at the disposal of the entente nations, and expressed the belief
