

SECRET CELLAR WAS A PIPPIN, BUT IT LEAKED

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 15.—Burglars who learned a secret that has lurked in the nethermost dungeons of Joe Gonnella's heart, today are sampling \$2,800 worth of champagne, wine, whisky and liquors that they stole from the cafe proprietor's wine cellar, subcellar and sub-subcellar at 3888 Fairview avenue.

Gonnella still has left three times as much as the thieves got, but the thing that hurts is the fact that the robbers got past the barricades he thought would baffle even an Arsene Lupin of a Craig Kennedy. The man whose Belvedere Cafe, at Delmar boulevard and Euclid avenue, has been raided now and then by hoodlums, had no pride in the liquid treasure vault. Iron trap doors, iron bars, secret panels and all that.

Designed by Himself.

The treasurer of the United States never built a mint like Joe's wine cellar. He designed it himself. It was a concrete room 12 by 8 feet and 6 feet high. The main door, made of iron, was kept locked by two vertical iron bars that extended through the basement ceiling and up into a bedroom on the first floor of the bungalow.

The protruding ends of the bars were hidden by a secret—secret no longer—panel in the wall. Did Gonnella wish a little smitter of an evening, all he need do was draw the blinds, slide back the panel and manipulate the bars. Then the iron door could be swung back, permitting entrance into the wine cellar. Next an iron trapdoor in the floor had to be lifted, and then—then one found neat rows of bottles on all sides in the subcellar.

Last night the Gonnella family went out at 6:10 o'clock. They returned at 10:10 o'clock. The foul deed was done.

Burglars had entered through a bathroom window. They took nine cases of champagne, ten cases of Virginia Dare wine, four cases of gin and varied quantities of brandy, ale, Scotch whisky and liquors. Just for luck they also stole a diamond ring valued at \$150, a watch worth \$25 and \$100 in cash. They didn't take the trouble to close the wine cellar door after them.

Gonnella valued the liquors at \$2,800. It was protected by insurance, police reported.

Although it's rubbing it in to say so, Gonnella at one time had a placard over his cafe door which crooned:

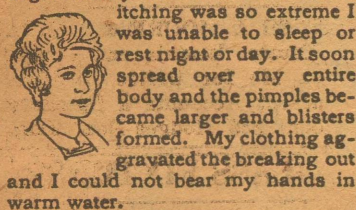

LOCATION OF ANCIENT TREASURE HIDDEN IN THE SAN JUAN RANGE DISCOVERED, RANCHERS SAY

Fortune of \$33,000,000 in Gold and Silver Bars Concealed by Spaniards and Frenchmen Centuries Ago Indicated on Tablets of Stone.

DENVER, Oct. 15.—Is one of the largest hidden treasures in the world about to be discovered? Is Treasure peak, in the San Juan range, ready to give up its reputed hoard of gold and silver, estimated to be worth \$33,000,000?

Two Colorado men believe they have finally located the mine shaft leading to the enormous treasure secreted by a band of Spaniards and Frenchmen hundreds of years ago. Besieged by Indians, the fortune hunters, who obtained much gold through placer mining of the mountain streams, hid the treasure in the heart of Citadel mountain, better known as Treasure peak, twenty-six miles north of Pagosa Springs, Colo.

SINGLE-TAX ESSAYS BARRED FROM SCHOOLS

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 15.—A warning not to allow children attending the public schools to take part in an essay contest dealing with the single tax, because, he declares, the organization advocating the single tax is engaged in a partisan appeal, to such an extent as to render co-operation by the schools illegal, has been issued by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Will C. Becker of No. 1010 Tremont avenue, congratulated themselves, as they skated round and round within the rink nearby upon the ingenuity of their device.

They did not laugh when they attempted to hoist the anchor and crank the Ford for the homeward voyage. It was the crowd that laughed. The peppy idea had become a boomerang. The four-foot, fifty-pound anchor fouled on a rock. In landlubber vernacular, the hook of the anchor would not loosen from the block of curbing. Volunteers stepped forward.
