CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Railroad union chiefs left Chicago today, carrying secret orders to be sent to all union officials throughout the country tomorrow, understood to call for the start of a general strike of 2,000,000 railroad workers on Oct. 30.

The union heads departed following a four-hour secret conference at the Masonic temple of the 500 general chairmen of the

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 .- Powerful railroad unions, turned down cold in their efforts to negotiate with their employers, must strike or back down. A strike seemed certain.

"What else is there to do but strike?" W. G. Lee, prosident of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, said in reply to a question, as the five hundred general chairman, representing two million railroad workers, started their deciding session here. "If I was a betting man, I would bet there would be a strike," Lee stated. Thwarted by the most serious rebuff in the experience of railroad unionism, the workers' representatives

"I don't see how the roads have the nerve to suggest another wage cut, when they know we have voted to strike because of the last one," Lee said. "The time for talking is past."

The men then would appeal to the board for relief, and a hearing could be called.

The whole procedure, according to one of the high officials, was mapped out in Washington last week.

HARDING TAKES HAND. WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 .--President Harding today took a hand in the adjustment of railroad rates and wages on a new

basis, in the hope that it would aid in reviving industry. He called the public group of the railway labor board to Washington today and personally took them to the office of the interstate commerce commission for a conference.

The purpose of the meeting was to consider the possibility of an early adjustment of railroad rates and wages, in the expectation that it would contribute to a revival of industry, according to an explanatory statement issued at the White House.


