Priority Order Issued by I. C. C. for Use in Case Freight Is Delayed.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.-Railroads west of the Mississippi river were authorized today by the interstate commerce commission to give preference and priority to the movement of foodstuff, livestock, perishable products and fuel, whenever their operating conditions become such as to cause freight congestion or blockade. The order declared an emergency and laid down rules for the conduct of the western lines identical with those which have been in effect on railroads east of the Mississippi

for several weeks. Roads unable to transport promptly all freight offered, the order stated, may suspend ordinary practices in providing cars for shippers. The order will go into effect Sept. 1 and will emain in effect until further orders of the commission. Unless further orders of the commission are issued, establishing the exact details of priority, no immediate change in the methods of handling traffic in the west will result. However, under its

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
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


