The loss on the Hamon road's coal chute, destroyed by fire early Sunday morning, was estimated at \$20,-000 yesterday afternoon by Superintendent J. J. O'Neill. The structure was partially covered by insurance, O'Neill said, and will in all probability be rebuilt following a directors' meeting. The origin of the blaze is attributed by the superintendent to spontaneous combustion brought about by the quantities of lignite coal stored there. As the result of the prompt action of city firemen and railroad employes, several carloads of the coal was saved when gondolas were rushed up under the chute and the coal, not touched by the fire, hurriedly dumped into them. Several tons of coal and a gasoline engine was destroyed with the chute. day morning, was estimated at \$20,-

engine was destroyed with the chute. The fire was discovered about 6 o'clock Sunday morning and the fire department called out. On examination Chief George Murphy found a large part of the coal and the chute in flames. The engines were hurriedly coupled to water tanks in the vicinity and several streams of water turned on the top of the chute, some seventy feet above the ground. The flames, however, had gained too great a headway to be checked and great a headway to be checked and the structure was burned to the ground within a little more than an hour from the time the fire was first discovered. Superintendent O'Neilli when Arthur C. Burch, first of the yesterday expressed his entire satisfaction with the work of the fire department in handling the fire. He explained that lignite coal is highly susceptible to spontaneous combustion and for that reason is rather "tricky." 'Honest Looking" Man's Paper Was Even Printed for Fraud Purposes.

An organized swindling plan by means of counterfeit and forged cashiers' checks was discovered Saturday on receipt of two such checks for \$50 each, drawn on the Peoples Bank of Ranger and cashed by Oklahoma merchants. Both checks were dated Oct. 18 and bore printed across the face a Ranger date line and the name of "The Peoples Bank." Both were made out to F. N. Adams and signed by "L. G. Kent, assistant cashier." checks were immediately protested and returned through banking channels to the Oklahoma banks cashing them and the victims notified of the fraud. Officials of the local bank expressed surprise that so palpable a fake could have "got by" the Oklahoma bankers, as both checks bore unusual indorsements and other earmarks of fraud.

Not only were the papers wrongfully signed, but they were printed especially for the purpose of perpetrating the fraud. They bore the imprint of "Henderson-Ranger," a fictitious printing house, which gave an appearance of authenticity to them.
