General Pablo Favela Slain in First Clash With Obre-

gon Forces.

By Associated Press. EL PASO, March 18 .- The revolution that was to have broken out in the Mexican state of Coahuila early this week met with disaster in the making, even more quickly than the Rodriguez-Merigo uprising in Chihuahua of a few weeks ago, United States operatives declared here to-

The new government was planned by general Pablo Favela, the federal officers said, who has been spasmodically under arms in the vicinity of Torreon for about a month. About five days ago Favela clashed with a small federal force near Lerdo, on the Durango side of the Coahuila border. The general sustained a serious wound, fleeing to the mountains with a few followers and dying soon after. General Ireneo Villareal, who with two followers was arrested in Presidio county, Texas, by American officers about the same time, was to have joined the Favela movement, possibly as second in command, the officers said. The Villareal party ar-rived in El Paso last night and was taken to the county jail to await disposition in the federal court. They pleaded not guilty to the charge of fomenting a revolution.



New Orleans on one side has the Mississippi river, which for a hundred miles flows through the lower countryside into the Gulf of Mexico. Near the entrance to the gulf the delta is broken by several streams with harborage suitable for small craft. Lagoons, bayous and small lakes abound. On the other side of the city lies Lake Ponchartrain, which enters the Mississippi Sound, a direct tributary to the gulf. Here, also, bayous and lagoons form a labyrinth of water routes.

On these at night with muffled oars or wrapped propellers strange craft now move their mysterious way, according to local gossip. Fast little motor boats, coming from nowhere, going nowhere and seemingly with no particular object in view, steal in just as the shades of evening are falling, enter the lagoons and then, puffing madly, the boats rush through the marshes, the high grass hiding men and boat until the haven is reached.

Hidden Rum Likely. Internal revenue men say most forcefully that the entire lower littoral of the Louisiana lower coast is dotted with secret caches and hidden caves in which large quantities of "Cuba" rum, Jamaica joy juice, Scotch whisky and other refreshments are stored.

That there is truth in these rumors is shown by a visit to New Orleans itself. In no place else, perhaps other than Key West, does liquor flow as smoothly and as excellently as in the Crescent City.

The bootleggers maintain an unofficial exchange and the cargoes are smuggled in, unpacked and doled out to restaurants and "soft drink" saloons. It is entirely possible in these latter days to get genuine absinthe, champagne, whisky and cocktails.

Liquor prices compare very favorably with those of New York. On account of the large quantity imported, the prices range from six to seven dollars a bottle for good whisky; four or five for bootleg jolts, while gin sells for three dollars a crock. Champagne costs about nine dollars a pint.

Rum Pilots of the Sky. New Orleans, which has always been a high liver, does like its booze and will have it. Not only does it come in by boat, but it is said that airplanes have recently been put into service from other cities on the gulf coast and that these bring back as much as one cockpit can hold. ANTS JUST LIKE MAN! Woman Suffrage, Graft and Craving for Liquor Found to Prevail in Insect World, Says Professor.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 18 .--- != Ants are like humans-they like liq- CLAIMS MAN HYPNOTIZED uor, they enjoy woman suffrage, and many of them are skillful graftersis the observation of Prof. William Morton Wheeler, dean of the Bussey Museum at Harvard university, who recently completed a tour of the world, made to learn what he could about the busy little fellows.

Prof. Wheeler invaded many lands, traveling through dargerous parts of Africa, Asia and other localities in his hunt for scientific knowledge.

Man Trained Animal. That "man after all is but a large brained animal" is one of his conclusions. He met and became acquainted with 10,000 species of ants during his travels.

"The similarity between these insects and humans is striking," he comments. "Three fundamentals guide their lives, like ours; they are hunger, sex and fear.

Many Grafters.

"The numerous grafters among ants remind us of our own kind. Large numbers of ants-like humans -manage to make their living without working for it."

Prof. Wheeler found the liquorloving ants in large numbers in the tropics. Whenever they have the chance, he explains, they will climb over-and into, if possible-the wine, beer and rum casks sent to that area in generous quantities. They make it perfectly clear that they like the stuff from the way they go after it and they become intoxicated on it, too, he declares.

Prof. Wheeler points to other valuable lessons. He says: Birth Control.

("If all individuals were permitted to have families without restraint the population soon would outrun the food supply. The higher 'social' ants have overcome this difficulty by restricting reproduction, except when food is abundant.

"The societies of man and insect are analogous, but the insect is the simpler. He is more mechanical in his way of doing things. He sticks to routine. But by watching a swarm of ants at work or play, any careful observer will note many of the characteristics prominent with humans. He will see manifestations of co-operation between a number, of jeal-ousy, of anger, of laziness, of dishonor, and such things on the part of others."

The scientist reminds us that in most kinds of insect life, including he ant, the female is the best build-He leaves it to us to decide whether the human race v "up" or "down" to a similar condition.




As surgeons must know how to use ether and other things of that character, Clyde brought a bottle of ether to school to make a few little experiments


