## FIRE RAZES MID-KANSAS GARAGE AND TEXAS CO. WAREHOUSE

Damage of at Least \$35,000 Sustained; Low Water Pressure and High Wire Fence Contribute to Spread of Flames, Which Start in Garage.

Fire of unknown origin early this morning swept the yards of the Mid-Kansas Oil company and the producing department of the Texas company, lying between the Melvin road and the Texas & Pacific tracks, destroying a large garage and warehouse, together with all contents and damaging other property. A conservative estimate places the combined loss of both companies at more than \$35,000. Water Scarce.

Efforts of the fire department to ----confine the blaze to the garage of the Mid-Kansas company proved fu- FRANCE OPENS WAY tile on account of the scarcity of water obtainable from the four-inch water main in that section, the pressure being so low that even with the pump going full blast the firemen and employes of the Texas company were unable to put a stream of water

over the top of the one-story garage. But for the scarcity of water the department would have been able to save the warehouse of the Texas company, Superintendent J. A. McGinnis of the producing department, stated this morning. Handicapped by the scarcity of water the firemen fought the blaze for several hours, at times being driven behind piles of derrick timbers by intense heat from the burning warehouse.

The fire was discovered shortly before 3 o'clock in the north end of the Mid-Kansas company garage by the night watchman of the Texas company, who hurriedly aroused R. L. Johns, in charge of the yard office. The two men attempted to reach the blaze with a chemical apparatus but were cut off by a high wire fence separating the property of the two companies. The fire department on responding to the alarm found only one available fire plug, which was connected at the dead end of the fourinch water main. Three lines were connected up but one was removed to increase the pressure of the other two. Even then, because of the small quantity of water obtained, the pump was unable to throw it over the garage building. The water pressure increased somewhat several hours later but not sufficiently to bring the pump to its full capacity.

Flames Leap Fifty Feet. From the garage, the flames leaped across a distance of fifty feet to the warehouse of the Texas company and to piles of derrick timbers nearby. Two trucks of the Texas company caught fire but together with the derrick timbers were extinguished. Several gasoline drums blew up as a small storehouse caught fire and before it could be extinguished. The fire gained headway rapidly in the warehouse, and was soon beyond con-



Old Time Melodrama With Unusual Ending Staged at Wed. ding of Yale Man.

WATERBURY, Conn., Nov. 26 .-The fashionable wedding of Edward J. Farrington, Yale man and son of one of the wealthiest men in this state, and Miss Margaret Hodson, member of an equally prominent family, was interrupted in a dramatic manner in the Church of the Immaculate Conception here.

With 2,000 guests giving silent attention, the ceremony had been practically finished. The priest had started to pronounce the words which would end the rite and unite the couple in marriage when the startling break came. An elderly woman in a front pew arose and in penetrating voice shouted:

"Stop! I have something to say be-fore the ceremony is finished. This man is the father of that child!" Child Is Mute Accuser.

She pointed to Farrington and then to the pew beside her, where stood her daughter, holding a 2-year-old

The girl with the baby was Laura Rodden of New Haven, who claimed she became Farrington's sweetheart while he was at Yale and that he was the father of her baby

At first the priest, the bridal party and the guests were too stunned for words. Mrs. Rodden held her ground, insisting that she would have revenge against the man who had denied the parentage of the child and refused to marry the 19-year-old

There were startled whispers in the assemblage and a rising buzz of conversation. Half a dozen ushers tried to induce Mrs. Rodden to leave. The young bride appeared to maintain her composure better than any one else. She took a long look at the Roddens and the baby, then turned about and requested that the ceremony go on.

The priest remonstrated with Mrs. Rodden, telling her the banns had been read for three weeks, in accordance with the church custom, and that she should have come forward with her complaint sooner. The ushers succeeded in leading the excited woman from the building. The ceremony was quickly ended.

#### SKELETONS OF GIANTS UNCOVERED IN ARIZONA

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Nov. 25.—Recent heavy rains in the vicinity of Reddington, near here, have uncovered the burial grounds of a race of giant people who are thought to have lived thousands of years ago, according to August Ealey, a miner, who has been employed in the Reddington district.
