

## **BROKER FAKED** \$1,500,000 TO

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 2.—George V. Halliday, bankrupt stock and bond broker, confessed today that he counterfeited \$1,500,000 of "interim receipts" of French government bonds, intending to go to New York and "buck the tiger" in Wall street in an effort to pay off creditors' claims aggregating more than \$140,-000, then take up the spurious paper from local banks, according to C. W. Tobie, local manager for the Burns International Detective agency.

A federal warrant, jointly charging Halliday and Harry Turner, editor of Much Ado, with counterfeiting, has been issued. They and Paul Murphy, an advertising solicitor on Turner's paper, were arrested by Chief Operative Connell of the local secret service bureau.



## BICYCLE COPS EARN THEIR PAY IN FORT WORTH

By Associated Press.

FORT WORTH, Dec. 2.—Keeping ever watchful eyes on the property of citizens, sixteen patrolmen mounted on rubber-tired "steeds" nightly weave in and out of the highways and byways of Fort Worth. To their services in protecting with watchdog faithfulness the property and welfare of the sleeping residents, Harry Hamilton, chief of police, paid hearty tribute in words of commendation.

Chief Hamilton's only wish, he said, was to be able to add more men to his bicycle patrol.

At 8 o'clock every night, sixteen policemen on bicycles start on their vigil which lasts until 5 o'clock in the morning. They travel in pairs and the "beat" each pair rides is ten blocks square. For the sections of the city where bicycle riding is practically impossible, four patrolmen mounted on horses keep watch as they ride. A police captain, in an automobile, tours the patrolled districts

"The bicycle squad is one of the most valuable units of the Fort Worth police force," - Chief Hamilton said. "I would have more men patroling the city on bicycles, using them in the districts now patrolled by policemen on horses, if it was possible to use bicycles there. The horse is out-ofdate and the automobile and motorcycles are too noisy."


