Harding Gives Recipe For 'Normalcy'

Tells Congress U. S. Can "Save" the World Only By Being Prosperous Itself.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—President Harding today proposed to congress a definite comprehensive program for restoring the United States to normalcy. Speeding up of plans to put America again on a sound normal basis is America's best contribution to a worldwide restoration, the President said, with representatives of all of the world powers here for the arms conference in the galleries of the house.

Harding served notice that the United States had no intention of trying to "save" other nations. They must save themselves, he said. America will help unselfishly when they turn to the heroic remedies for the menacing conditions under which they are struggling. No American policy alone will cure the world ills, Harding said. By saving ourselves, he declared, we will help the rest of the world save itself.

Wants High Tariff. The President's policy was clearly outlined in discussing the need for a high tariff.

"Sensible of every obligation to humanity, commerce and finance, linked as they are in the present world condition, it is not to be argued that we need to destroy ourselves to be helpful to others," he said. "It were better to remain on firm ground, strive for ample employment and high standards of wages at home, and point the way to balanced budgets, rigid economies and resolute efficient work as the remedies to cure disorder."

The arms conference was referred to only briefly by the President. "It is easy to believe a world hope is centered in the capital city," he said. "A most gratifying world accomplishment is not impossible."

Residents along Vitalious and Division streets and Desdemona boulevard suffered a slight "gas attack" late last night when oil and gas commenced to flow through the water mains and into the homes. In several homes it flooded the bath rooms with an oil and water spray when the

faucets were turned on. "Come quick! I have struck oil in the bath room," an excited resident of Vitalious street told members of the fire department over the phone late last night. Hardly able to credit the assertions that gas was flowing freely from water faucets, the fire-men responded and found that similar conditions existed in a number of homes. A number of families who had not made the discovery for them-selves were awakened and found their hydrants spouting water and traces of Test Runs Have Fitted It to strong flow of gas. Fire plugs turned on in the neighborhood flowed gas for several minutes which was followed by heads of water.

An investigation by the fire department revealed that a twoinch gas line had in some manner become connected with the water main at the mouth of the alley near the corner of Division and Vitalious street. The discovery was made when a fire plug in the vicinity was turned on and a two-inch gas line located by the noise of its jerking movements. ONE WAY TO SEE EARTH IN MOTION

With a bowl of water and some powdered resin one may observe the earth's motion, we are told by S. Leonard Bastin in the Scientific American (New York). It is common ly supposed, says Mr. Bastin, that it is not possible to demonstrate the movement of the earth without elaborate apparatus, which is far from being the case. He goes on:

"In the first place select a room fairly free from vibration. Then obtain a good-sized bowl or tub a foot or more in diameter and rather deep, and nearly fill it with water. Place, this on the floor of the room in such position that it need not be disturbed for some hours. Get some finely powdered resin and sprinkle a coating of this on the surface of the water. all news dispatches credited to it or Any find substance that would float

The bowl may now be left for several hours, at the end of which time it will be noticed that an interesting thing has

> "It will be seen that the line of the surface of the water has changed its position and that it no longer meet that which runs up over the rim of the bowl. As a matter of fact the black line on the surface of the water has swept around from east to west. What has happened is this: The water in the bowl has stood still throughout the time which it has been left, while the vessel itself has been carried around by the motion of the earth from west to east.

"Another way of putting it is that the earth has swung around through a considerable arc from west to east, leaving the water quite stationary. -Literary Digest.
