

FRANCE HOLDS OUT FOR MORE SUBMARINES

HAVRE, Dec. 21.—France must have submarines, Rene Viviani, French delegate to the Washington arms conference, declared upon arriving here today, aboard the steamer Paris from New York.

"Our colonial interests make it imperative that we have undersea craft," Viviani said.

"Do you consider the 350,000 capital ship tonnage demanded by Admiral LeBon as excessive?" he was asked.

"The figure has been brought down to a scale which seems reasonable," Viviani answered, "I am not confident of LeBon's ability."

He was asked if he considered the present conference as being a preliminary.

"I do not think disarmament is possible until all nations have agreed to collaborate," he said. "The practical results of the disarmament meet cannot be defined until all interested nations have made known their opinion. I think France cannot engage herself to disarm until Germany, with her potential chemical production, has given safeguards for the cessation of the manufacture of asphixiating gases."

FROZEN HYDRANT RESULTS IN DEATH

FORT WORTH, Dec. 21.—Mrs. Lee Swackhamer of Handley, who was burned while trying to thaw a hydrant at her home Sunday morning, died at noon Tuesday at a Fort Worth sanitarium. The body was taken in charge by the Moore Undertaking company, Arlington. Funeral arrangements will be announced on the arrival of Mrs. Swackhamer's brother.

DRY FORCES HUNTING CANADIAN SANTA CLAUS

SCRANTON, Pa., Dec. 21.—United States customs officers who were here today said they were searching for a large shipment of whisky alleged to have been hidden in a shipment of Christmas trees sent from Canada to Scranton.

The officials declared several thousand gallons of the forbidden liquor had been secreted among a number of carloads of the trees which left the Canadian border some days ago. While the shipment was traced to Scranton, neither the trees nor whisky have been located, they said.

REFUGEES FREEZE TO DEATH.

WARSAW, Dec. 21.—Reports have reached the Polish government that Polish refugees from Russia are dying by scores from exposure to the extremely cold weather. Among the victims are said to be many women and children, frozen to death in cars.

Refugees arriving at Baranowicze, near the frontier, are said to average 6,000 a day. Since last Sunday, when the cold spell began, officials estimate thirty persons have died daily at Baranowicze alone.

One instance was reported of fourteen found frozen in one freight car. Polish officials accuse the soviet government of neglect.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 21.—The ease of Mrs. Madalynne Obenchain, accused jointly with Arthur C. Burch with the murder of J. Belton Kennedy, was continued today in the superior court to Feb. 15. Introduction of testimony for the Burch defense was then resumed.



ANTI-LYNCHING BILL UP AFTER HOLIDAYS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Democratic leaders won their fight Tuesday to prevent consideration of the Dyer anti-lynching bill until after the holiday recess, and following an all-day filibuster the Republican leaders agreed not to press the bill for consideration at this time. Almost all of the day was consumed in calling the roll, at a time when the Democrats left the house for the purpose of breaking a quorum. It was a successful assault following adoption of a special rule on Monday to give the bill a preferred status at this time. Only when the Republican leaders consented to a postponement did the Democratic members re-enter the hall of the house. With a voting strength of more than 300 the roll calls revealed not more than one-half of the Republicans in attendance.

BANDITS KIDNAP WIFE OF CHINESE PRESIDENT

SHANGHAI, Dec. 21.—Madam Yat Sen, wife of Sun Yat Sen, president of the South China republic, has been kidnaped and is being held in the mountains by her captors for \$500,000 ransom. The kidnaping took place at Kwelling in Kwangsi province, the bandits disguising themselves as soldiers. Madam Sun was en route to join her husband, who is at the head of his armies marching forward to Peking. She was to have taken charge of the Red Cross work of the southern armies. Madam Sun is well known in the United States. She is a graduate of the Methodist school at Macon, Ga. Her sister, Meiling Soong, is a Wesley college graduate.

UNCONSCIOUS WOMAN FOUND AFTER PARTY

FORT WORTH, Dec. 21.—Estelle Finch, 21, of Waco, was found unconscious in a little draw between Rosen Heights and Quality Grove by a North Fort Worth undertaking company ambulance driver about 1:20 p. m. Tuesday after three small boys had reported seeing her there earlier in the day. On regaining consciousness at the city-county hospital Tuesday evening, the young woman at first refused to talk, but finally gave her name and details of the affair leading up to her being found in a coma on the outskirts of the city, but refused to furnish names of other principals involved. Going to a camp on the Weatherford road Monday night, she said, she was given something to drink out of a soda water bottle, after which she remembered nothing. The city's narcotic agents are working on the case.

STERN WHEEL STEAMER OPERATING ALONG COAST CORPUS CHRISTI, Dec. 21.—The Lucy, a stern wheeler Ohio river boat, is now operating between Houston, Galveston and Corpus Christi, carrying cargoes of commodities into this port and cotton on the return trip to Houston.

Wife's Visitor Slightly Hurt When Hubby Fires Shotgun Through Window

FORT WORTH, Dec. 21.—Finding his wife in a room at her home in Ross Heights with Mike Strawn caused Walter Snow of 204 1-2 West Third street to shoot Strawn with a shotgun Monday night about 10:30 o'clock, according to Snow's statement made to Assistant District Attorney Will R. Parker. Strawn was not dangerously wounded. He suffered a severe flesh wound in the arm. Several shots also lodged in the side of his face. At a local hospital, where Strawn was taken, he declared to Parker that he had not been intimate with Mrs. Snow. "Until two weeks ago I lived with my wife in Ross Heights," Snow told Parker. "Since we separated I have been going by the house to see if she and the two children, aged 11 and 6, needed anything. Last night I went to the house. I looked through a window and saw Mike Strawn in a room with my wife. I watched for more than an hour. "I went to the barn and got my shotgun, stuck it through the window and fired one time. Strawn then shot twice with a pistol." Snow was not injured. He said he fled when Strawn started shooting.

POLICE SAVE LIQUOR FOR DRY CONGRESSMAN

PEORIA, Ill., Dec. 21.—Acting on an anonymous tip received at police headquarters detectives surrounded the house of Congressman Clifford Ireland and prevented the carrying away of forty-five gallons of domestic wines and five cases of French imported wines. They captured Joseph Zipper and Richard Voris after letting them pile the liquor outside the house near their automobile. Keg by keg and case by case the men brought the liquor out of the cellar deposited it in the rear of the house. 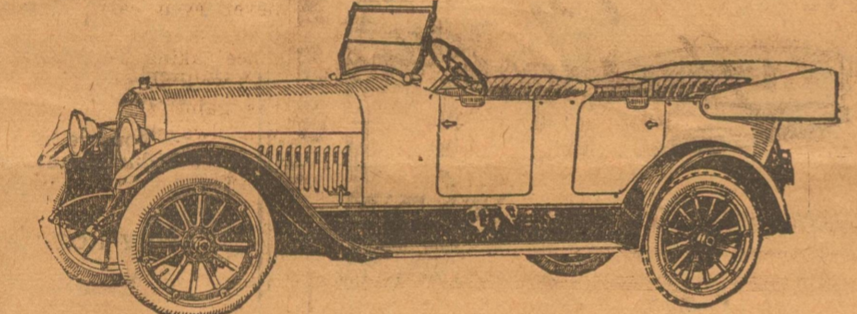

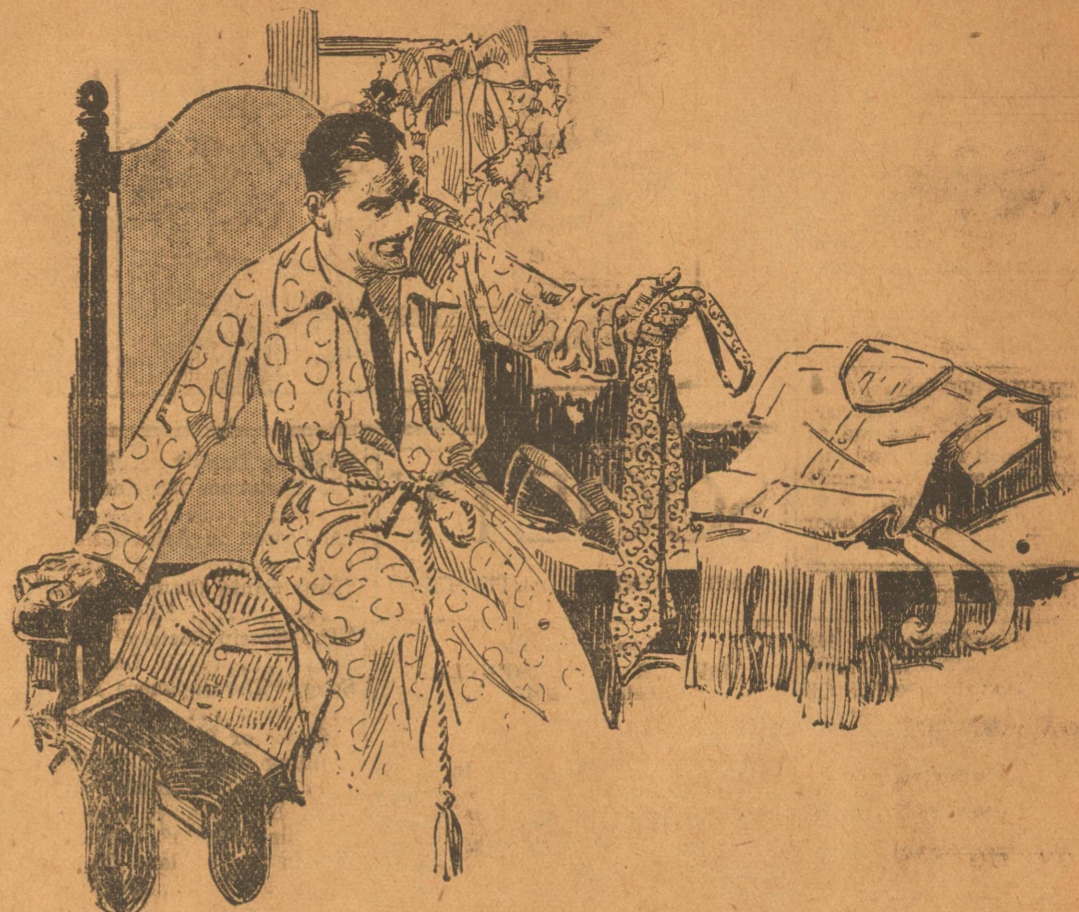
