EASTLAND COUNTY GETS APPEALS COURT

Mrs. Ferguson's Declared Purpose to "Vindicate Family Name" Accomplished

"MA'S" HOPE IS REALIZED; "JIM" IS "VINDICATED"

House Votes Former Governor Amnesty 78 to 51—Opponents Lose Out.

AUSTIN, March 13.—A movement to clarify any doubt existing in the minds of the people of Texas as to the legality of the amnesty bill, finally passed by the legislature and awaiting signature of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, was made in the senate today.

A resolution was introduced by Senators Moore and Fairchild calling upon the senate to resolve into a court of impeachment at 2 o'clock next Monday afternoon to set aside the impeachment disqualifications imposed upon the former governor in 1917.

AUSTIN, March 13.—Governor Miriam A. Ferguson had upon her desk for her approval and signature today the Woodward bill to restore the citizenship of her husband, former Governor James E. Ferguson, lost by virtue of his impeachment and removal from office in 1917 for misuse of state funds.

The house, late yesterday, by a vote of 78 to 51, placed its stamp of approval on the bill in the face of a final attempt by opponents of the measure to attach an amendment providing that the amnesty act be not construed "to condone, vindicate or act as a justification for acts committed by persons heretofore impeached."

Perdue, who offered the amendment argued that by passage of the amnesty bill, the legislature in effect said the evidence by which Ferguson was impeached was false, or that the court was so "corrupt and prejudiced that it could not render a just verdict," and that Ferguson had been unjustly deprived of his office and was entitled to full and fair returns for the salary forfeited.

District Grand Jury Orders Many Arrests and Again Recesses

The Eighty-eighth district court grand jury, which re-convened Thursday after a recess of several days, again recessed yesterday until March 30.

During the time the grand jury has been in session a large number of witnesses have been examined and several bills of indictment, ranging from theft and burglary to robbery with firearms have been returned and many arrests made.

Judge McLean Dies At 89 Years of Age

FORT WORTH, March 13.—William P. McLean Sr., long one of the state's most prominent criminal lawyers, died here today of pneumonia. He was 89 years of age.

McLean was a member of the law firm of McLean, Scott & Sayre, which defended Clara Smith Hamon in the famous Jake L. Hamon murder case in Oklahoma. His son, W. P. McLean Jr., is known throughout the southwest as "Wild Bill" McLean.

GOULD FAMILY OUT OF RAIL ACTIVITY

NEW YORK, March 13.—With the sale of the St. Louis Southwestern railroad, known as the Cotton Belt line, to the Rock Island, the Gould family has disappeared from the railroad map. Although heirs of the \$84,000,000 estate left by Jay Gould are large holders of rail securities they do not now dominate a single mile of railway.

Dissolution of the Gould control of railroads began with the duel with the E. H. Harriman interests in the summer of 1917.

CISCO ROBBERS GET \$500 LOOT

CISCO, March 13.—Merchandise to the approximate value of \$500 was taken from the John H. 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Archer County Well Doing 1,500 Barrels

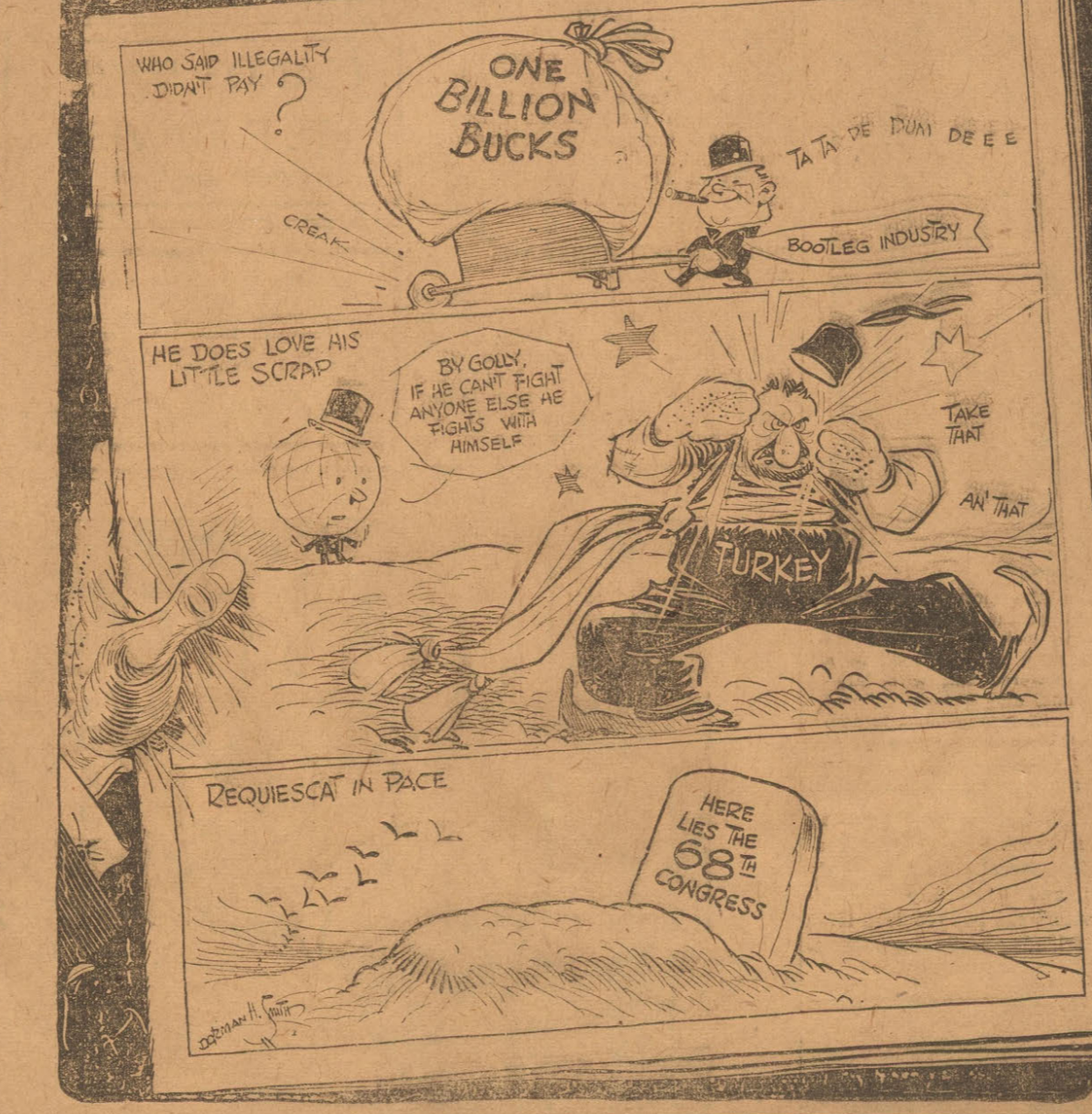

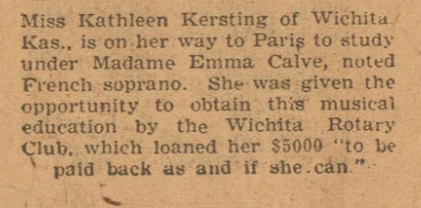
Three Commissioners Retire.
Of the present board of commissioners three retire because of their terms expiring. These are Judge N. N. Rosenquest, Calvin Brown and Tom W. Crutcher. Commissioner Crutcher is rounding out the unexpired term of V. T. Seaberry, who resigned some months ago.

The members who are holdovers are Jim Sherrill and Jess Williams.

Judge Rosenquest, chairman of the board, has made no definite statement as to whether or not he will stand for re-election, but it is generally understood that he prefers not to serve again because of pressing business interests.

Radio Fans Will Hear Ranger Band Concert

Secretary C. C. Patterson of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, while in Fort Worth early this week, arranged with the "Hired Hand" of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram to have a program by the Ranger band broadcast by radio. The date for the concert will have to be in May, which is the earliest open date the Star-Telegram can give, and by that time the Ranger band will be playing better than now. Two men will be sent from Fort Worth to attend to the broadcasting arrangements in Ranger and their expenses and the cost of the wire to Fort Worth used during the program will be the only cash outlay.

Indian Deaths Baffle U. S. Court Officers

PAWHUSKA, Okla., March 13.—The court of inquiry into the murder of a score of wealthy Osage Indians in the last three years came to an abrupt adjournment today, after federal agents who combed the rugged hills of the Osage nation for two days, reported inability to find an important witness.

One who is alleged to be a leader in the murder orgies left last night for Fort Worth, it became known today. This mysterious character has baffled efforts of the authorities to obtain evidence sufficient to warrant filing charges against him. J. Berry King, assistant attorney general of Oklahoma, left here today with a court reporter for an unnamed destination. Before leaving, King declared that newspaper publicity of the hearing had caused many important witnesses to leave the state.

House Passes Bill Over Wichita Falls and Abilene Efforts to Contrary

AUSTIN, March 13.—Final enactment was voted by the house today for the bill by Senator Hardin of Erath providing for the creation of the eleventh court of civil appeals, the house voting, under suspension of the rules, for the location of the court at Eastland, after voting down amendments seeking to locate the court at Abilene and at Wichita Falls.

Residents of the district will have to furnish suitable quarters for the court, together with library and equipment before it becomes operative, under the terms of the measure sent to the governor for approval. If the governor approves the bill it is probable the new court will open next fall, which will give the district time to make ready for it.

A bill similar to this was introduced by Senator Burkett at the regular session of the 38th legislature, but before it was passed finally had been amended placing the court in Abilene. Governor Neff vetoed the bill.

District Sheriffs' Convention On In County Seat Today

The thirty-fifth district sheriff's convention, composed of the sheriffs of Brown, Concho, McCullough, Coleman and Eastland counties, is in session in Eastland today. As a majority of delegates did not arrive until early this afternoon, no meeting was held this morning.

Luncheon was served by the Eastland sheriff's and police departments for the visitors at the Texas hotel. The program this afternoon includes addresses by former district judge, E. A. Hill, Judge Elzo Been of the Eighty-eighth district and Judge George L. Davenport of the Ninety-first district court. The afternoon session is being held in the city hall, and is presided over by Bob Miller, sheriff of Concho county and president of the organization.

COUNTY POSTAL WORKERS GET INCREASE IN WAGES

As a result of the postal employees' bill, recently passed by congress, Eastland, Ranger and other Eastland county postoffice workers and mail carriers, along with Uncle Sam's postal employees throughout the nation now have a raise of salary, effective Jan. 1 of the present year.

Six employees of the Eastland postoffice, four clerks, two city carriers and the assistant postmaster, are raised \$25 per month.

Ranger's assistant postmaster, five clerks in the postoffice and three city carriers also benefit by the salary increase bill. Each will average \$25 a month raise. Four rural carriers out of Ranger will get an additional 4 cents a mile each for each trip, which will add between \$1 and \$1.30 a day to their wages.

The increased salaries will be provided through an increase in certain mail matter.

DISTRICT C. C. MEET HAS BIG ATTENDANCE

SLATON, March 13.—Large delegations from neighboring counties attended the district convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce here Thursday. Several hundred citizens were here from Lubbock alone. Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the Texas Technological college at Lubbock, being the chief speaker of the occasion. John T. Orr, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association, was on the program to discuss the problems of the farmers and the business men.

AUSTIN, March 13.—Senator Berkeley's bill, providing for only one primary, has been passed finally and now is before the house. It provides, like the present law, for a primary the third day in July.

SENATORS AGAIN REJECT WARREN

President Coolidge, Nevertheless, Stands Firm.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Determined to establish, once and for all, the absolute right of the president to select his own cabinet, President Coolidge today marshalled every administration force in the senate to drag through, on his second attempt at confirmation, the nomination of Charles B. Warren as attorney general.

Flushed with contempt and confident of a second victory, the democratic independent coalition of senators opposed to Warren preferred to repudiate the nomination with as much speed and precision as the president showed in resubmitting it after it had once been rejected. So confident were the opponents of Warren that they planned only a perfunctory meeting of the senate-judiciary committee, which undertook consideration of the nomination this morning. A more complete defense of Warren's activities as an alleged participant in big sugar deals, which have come under the scrutiny of the court and the federal trade commission, is anticipated.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—With the nomination of Charles B. Warren as attorney general again rejected by the senate judiciary committee, republican leaders today apparently lost hope, and a movement was started to force a final vote by tomorrow night and adjourn. The judiciary committee voted, 9 to 7, to present an adverse report upon the nomination and to counsel its rejection by the senate.

In view of this defeat at the outset, it is apparent that the views of the senators on Warren have not changed despite the optimistic attitude at the white house. Several republicans were quoted as saying they saw no reason to drag out the controversy any longer.

BANK RECORDS HALT HEARING

Sinclair Counsel Opposes Introduction of Bond Transactions.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 13.—Counsel for the government in its suit to break the lease of the Mammoth Oil company on the Teapot Dome naval reserve, fought today for admission as evidence details of alleged transactions between Sinclair and Fall to show there was fraud in connection with the granting of the lease to the Sinclair interests.

Objections by Sinclair counsel to the admission of bank records and accounts of financial deals of Fall on the ground that they constituted "hearsay evidence," resulted in Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy adjourning court Thursday in order that government attorneys could prepare argument on the point.

John W. Lacey, veteran Cheyenne attorney, began argument at 10:15 o'clock this morning against admission as evidence of the records of the First National bank of Pueblo and the First National bank of El Paso containing Fall's accounts. He cited cases when, he said, upheld his contention concerning "hearsay evidence."

Eastland County Chicks Tempt Stock Show Folk

The Eastland county poultry exhibit is the only one from West Texas at the fat stock show in Fort Worth this week and has been attracting much attention, according to C. C. Patterson, secretary of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, who went to Fort Worth with C. C. Richardson, secretary at Cisco, to install the exhibit, and left it Wednesday in charge of G. W. Briggs, secretary at Eastland.

"It was noticeable how many persons knew of Eastland county as a fine country for poultry," said Mr. Patterson. "The exhibit of day-old chicks running about the model farm made a big hit. Some persons thought the chicks were exhibited for sale and wanted to buy them."

Mr. Patterson is planning an exhibit of 1,150 chicks in the window of his office in the Guaranty Bank building.

DESERVING ADMINISTRATION.
 Mayor R. H. Hodges of Ranger, and the city commissioners, Frank A. Brown, C. O. Terrell, Raymond Teal and Colonel Brasher, seeking re-election after serving one term of two years, are entitled to unanimous votes of the people. So far none has announced against any of them and it seems unlikely that any will, for the election is only a little more than three weeks ahead, and that is as it should be.

Their remuneration for service is so small that the total amount paid to all would not pay the lunch bill for one. They are virtually giving their time and labor to the city, serving for honor rather than pay.

Their administration has been exceptionally successful. Following the rather stormy period of readjustment after the oil boom had subsided, they have carried on against depreciation of property values from the inflation that came with the discovery of petroleum wealth, against losses and disappointments and factional differences. Elected by a small, although decisive majority, they have proved so impartial as officials, forgetting all political differences, that former opponents have now become their friends and supporters.

During their administration the Ranger water system has been purchased and improved. They have extended the water mains and constructed a new and adequate standpipe, have cut the water rate in half, decreased the insurance key rate, improved the fire department, equalized tax values and refunded a portion of the city's bonded indebtedness so that the time for payment has been extended. They have maintained law and order in an efficient manner and have improved the morale of the city.

At no time has this city administration had funds available for improvement work, yet a city hall has been purchased, streets have been improved steadily, sanitary conditions have been bettered and the city's credit has been strengthened. The city-county hospital has been opened and is functioning ably. Ranger has had two years of notable progress.

Such a record of able service is entitled to recognition. All the officials should be re-elected without opposition and it appears probable they will. They have been faithful to the people and the people will show their appreciation.

Senator Borah, by moving a suspension of the rules, practically compelled the senate to go on record on the question of salary increases. Senator Bruce, of Maryland, said he would vote for the bill if it was stipulated that senators and representatives shall not during their present terms of office enjoy the increased remuneration. The bill is in the hands of the president, and if it becomes law, will add about \$10,000,000 to the pay roll per year.

RANGER'S HENS MAKING RECORD

Hens from the Driskill Leghorn farm in Ranger won tenth place in the egg laying contest in progress at A. & M. college for the month of February, and sixth place among the White Leghorns. Pens of leghorns from Missouri and California took first and second place, Barred Plymouth Rocks from Michigan and Texas were in third and fourth places, Washington White Leghorns in fifth place, Rhode Island Reds from Missouri sixth, Texas Plymouth Rocks seventh and White Leghorns completing the first 10 pens.

The best record of the pens, each containing six hens, was 119 eggs during the month, and the lowest record of the first 10 pens was 110 eggs.

The best record in individual contests for the month went to a Missouri Red, which laid 27 eggs; another Rhode Island Red with three White Leghorns tied for second place, each laying 26 eggs; the next 13 hens, including a hen from the Driskill Leghorn farm, tied for third place with a record of 25 eggs each. All were Leghorns except a Michigan Plymouth Rock and a Texas White Wyandotte.

This is the eighth Texas national egg laying contest. It has been in session four months and runs forland county and was in thirty-third one year. A pen of Barred Plymouth Rocks from Bryan is leading at this time with a total of 420 eggs, while White Leghorns of Texas, California and Washington occupy the next nine places with records of 417 down to 355.

The Driskill Leghorn farm of Ranger is the only entry from East-

place at the end of the first four months among 80 entries. They had a set-back when first entered, but have been gaining during the last two months. The success of this pen is expected to encourage many entries from Eastland county in the next contest, poultry raisers here say.

'MEAT DAY' ENDS COOKING SCHOOL

Meat day at the Ranger Daily Times cooking school is always one of the popular days of the school, the session of this afternoon being no exception to the rule. With Aubrey Jameson, expert meat cutter and efficient demonstrator in charge, the lesson was one of exceptional value and helpfulness. Since the cheaper cuts of meat are needed by the masses, and are frequently those which have the most nutrition, Mr. Jameson based his talk on this fact and explained these cuts, where they are found and how they may be prepared to best advantage.

Large Audience Profits. Although entirely different from the talk given last year by Mr. Jameson, it was equally as well enjoyed and the large audience attending profited by the exhibition and explanation of meat cutting.

With deft skill Mrs. Chitwood illustrated vegetable carvings, which may be used as meat decorations, with baker ham, roasts or cold meats. From turnips, beets, carrots and lemons she cut roses, full blown half blown, and buds. From oranges she made butterflies, and green peppers became trailing vines and leaves. The effect was very delicate and pretty.

Cowboy Stew. A real "cowboy stew," made with beef and various kinds of vegetables, and two plain roasts were demonstrated in addition to the full program of meat cutting.

Two recipes which were published with one of our ingredients last week are reprinted today. They are as follows:

- Nut and Orange Loaf.**
 2 1/2 cups flour.
 1-2 cup graham flour.
 1-2 cup sugar.
 1-2 cup candied orange peel.
 1-2 cup pecan meats.

- 1-4 cup Crisco.
 2 eggs.
 1 teaspoon salt.
 3 1/2 teaspoons Calumet baking powder.

Sift the white flour, salt, baking powder, sugar and graham flour together three times. Cut in Crisco, add orange peel and nuts to flour and mix well. Add the two well-beaten eggs to just enough sweet milk to make a stiff dough. Turn into a Criscoed pan and bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees Fahrenheit.

Spanish Sandwich.

Place lettuce leaf on plate and on the lettuce a slice of toast which has been spread with butter. In the center of the toast place a large spoonful of stewed tomatoes or a slice of fresh tomato, cut a hard-boiled egg in two, remove center, mix with Gebhardt's deviled chili meat and Paramount salad dressing. Return to egg cup and place one-half egg in center of toast. Place a small short stalk of asparagus in the center of each egg, and decorate corner of toast with small rolls of bacon strips.

Throughout the cooking school attendance was large and enthusiastic and many expressions of delight and satisfaction were heard from those who attended. The cooking school closes today.

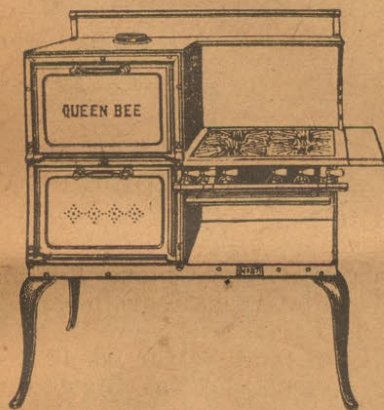
