# HOLD ENDS OF

Coolidge Prooses to Build and Direct His Own Republican "Machine."

WASHINGTON, May 2.—President Coolidge will not commit the management of his campaign to the republican national organization, according to information coming from in touch with his present political lieutenants. Instead, he will build and direct his own "machine" and make the republican national committee an auxiliary.

Whether or not this determination of President Coolidge is due to his doubts of the republican national committee's fealty or ability is not stated. It is reported, however, that he let it be known two or three weeks ago that he intended taking the di-rection of his campaign in his own The president's first step toward this personal control of his party and its machinery, it is forecast, will be the removal of Chairman John T. Adams of the republican national committee. The president himself will select the successor of Adams, it is announced. It is thought likely that other present officials of the committee will be sup-

Is Directing the Attack.

The president is reported to be selecting the officers of the republican convention. He has chosen the "keynoter" at the convention and will name the man who makes the nominating speech, it is reported. Both of these speeches, it is stated, will have to have the president's approval before their delivery if they are not actually written in whole or in part by him.

Even the regional managers of the campaign will be of the president's choosing. They, in turn, will appoint their subordinates and the republican national committee will execute, not originate, the plans and tactics of the campaign. In fact, it is stated, the work which in former campaigns was left to be outlined and performed by the republican national committee, through its subsidiaries, will this time be done by an independent organization.

There is a good deal of speculation and members of the republican national committee will receive their demotion or elimination. All of the committee officers were friends of President Harding, who made no significant changes in its personnel when he became his party's candidate. John T. Adams was then vice chairman, and succeeded Will H. Hays on the latter's voluntary re-

There are predictions that President Coolidge's campaign will involve larger expenditures than those incurred in 1920, when the various repub lican national congressional, and state organizations spent a total of \$9,700,738, or an average of \$202,-098 a state, as reported by the Ken-yon committee of the senate. Included in this total was \$75,000 contributed by Harry F. Sinclair and at least \$25,000 by Edward L. Doheny.

# LOCAL CROP

Increase of About 50 Per Cent Acreage Planted in Eastland County.

Prospects at this season of the year were never better for a bumper crop in Eastland county that at pres-ent. There is a splendid season in the ground and the farmers, as a rule, have their soil in good conditheir crops. Tweive carloads of commercial fertilizer are bing used on the farms in this county this

The total number of acres being cultivated in the county has been increasing each year since the oil boom and this year there is a 50 per cent increase over last year. This increased acreage is not being planted to cotton only, but to grain and other feed crops as well.

Cotton Planting Time

For the purpose of controlling the boll weevil many Eastland county.

oll weevil, many Eastland county farmers have planned to plant their cotton this year on a uniform date which is from the first to the twelfth of May. A major portion of the crop will be planted at this time. The purpose of this is to get the cotton up after the weevil has starved out and disappeared.

A considerable acreage has been planted to wheat and oats in the county this year and the prospect at present is for a yield of from 35 to 40 bushels of oats to the acre. ### Three Nations Have Round-World Flyers Temporarily Halted

Efforts of three nations to win long distance supremacy in the air were held up for all of them and Wele lead up for an of them today. But while the British and French are trying to make speed records, the American flight is designed to obtain data for future use.

The American air service planes, which started from Calitorma, near Los Angeles, March 15, are in Alaska, three of them at Dutch Harbor. Unalaska, awaiting the arrival of Major Frederick L. Martin, in the fourth plane, who appears to have been lost somewhere between that place and Chignik, in an attempt begun at 11 o'clock Wednesday, to hop from Chignik to Dutch Harbor in the teeth of a gale.

The British round-the-world plane, commanded by Major Mac-Laren, is near Karachi awaiting repairs. Major MacLaren left the hangar at Southampton, England, March 25, and is flying eastward. Repairs for his plane have been shipped from England, being rush-ed from Bologne to Marsailles, from where they will be sent, probably today, by ship to Bombay. It will probably be nearly a month before the British effort can proceed. He has flown 8,700 kilometers anad has been 37 days

Democratic-Progressive Coalition Kills Important Amendment to Tax Bill.

WASHINGTON, May 1 .- The demcratic-progressive coalition won its first important victory on the tax oill in the senate today, defeating an amendment proposed by the republi-cans which they charged would ad-

ersely affect tax-exempt securities.

The vote was 37 to 36.
Only six democrats bolted to vote with the republicans, while seven progressives voted with the democrats.

The amendment defeated provided pecifically that a tax payer cannot deduct from his capital loss or interest paid except those sums which exceed his income from tax exempt securities. It was recommended by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon.

Agricultural Committee Sets Forth Reasons Why It Should Become a Law.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The agricultural committee today laid before the house its formal report on the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill, with an analysis of the existing ills in agriculture and the manner in which the bill is expected to cure them.

Chairman Haugen said he expected to be able to get the bill beford the house for consideration before the end of next week. The threatening situation is described in the agricultural report, which sets forth:

That half as many banks had failed between 1920 and 1923 as during the whole period from 1902 to 1923.





#### SAVE YOUR EYES BY THESE LIGHT RULES

The use and arrangement of elecric lights to give the best results and to protect the eyes of workers and readers was outlined before the joint conference of the American society of safety engineers and the national safety council held recently New York city.
Dr. Charles Sheard, an authority

on illumination delivered the leading address on "Glare—What It Is; What It Does," in which he gave the folowing rules: Light should shine on the ob-

. Light should shine on the object under gaze, not in the observer's 2. Glare, which is light out of place, can be overcome by the use of

diffusing glass globes, reflectors or 3. Strong contrasts of light and shadow are to be avoided. Indirect lighting is to be preferred, by means of which the brightness of lighting bowls or other fixtures is reduced. 4. Avoid the glare of reflections

from polished surfaces. 5. Localized lighting, in the form of drop lights, etc., is to be avoided produces too sharp contrasts of ght and shadow.

6. Both too much and too little light strain and fatigue the eyes, which must labor to obtain sharp definition of the object under gaze.
7. Eye-strain and irritation result

from the use of unsteady, flickering or streaked light sources.







Clubs at Los Angeles June 2-13.

The federation has indorsed state censorship but not federal censorship—but has not pushed the subject

The women have on their Los An geles program a visit to Hollywood and the studios. Certain movie stars of "spotless reputations" will appear on the program, and certain hospitali ties will be tendered the ladies, none of which will be of the character feaured in the daily paper crime col-

At the Hot Springs biennial convention in 1918 a resolution, introduced by Mrs. A. H. Finn of Detroit, was adopted and has never been re-It read:

"That the General Federation rec ommend that women in the various states use all possible effort toward extending the area which is protected by law from the influence of harmful films, inducing the legislatures of states aside from Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kansas and Maryland, (where legal censorship then existed) to enact laws similar to the motion picture censorship laws of those states, governors to appoint suitable men and women to administer these laws, and in general to make and strengthen public opinion so that there may be authority at hand to cope with an evil which so seriously threatens the proper foundation of society."

At the Chautauqua Federation convention in 1922, the motion picture chairmen from a number of states were all primed to launch an active campaign for censorship. But Will Hays took a hand and convinced the ladies that, since he had assumed the czardom of movie land, no one need bother about the censorship. So that

matter was dropped.







Father of Physical Culture

SERNARR MACFADDEN

Primitive nations can dispense with physical training-schools as the creatures of the wilderness dispense with houses and clothes, but city-dwellers need a substitute for the lost opportunities of outdoor exercise. Mental culture and gymnastics should be as inseparable as body and soul. "It is impossible to repress luxury by legislation," says Solon in Lucier's "Dialogues of Anacharsis," but its influence may be counteracted by athletic games, which invigorate the body and give a martial character to the amusement of our young men."

And that remedial use of gymnastics requires the supervision of an expert teacher. It is not enough to provide an assortment of training-school apparatus and trust visitors to use it to good advantage. We might as well establish a free public drug-store and invite patients to come in and help themselves. I have seen athletics on the Let Alone plan tried in a city park, and remember the re-su's in the case of novices who discouraged the first day by disfiguring accidents, and of others who contracted dyspepsia by exer-

cising directly after dinner.

A well-developed system of physical culture offers remedies for almost every disorder of the hu-man organism, and for all but the most hopeless malformations.

As a preliminary, gymnasium pupils should be advised to postpone the principal meal of the day (call it supper or dinner) to the late afternoon, and at least half an hour after the conclusion of their exercises.

Violent muscular efforts can exhaust the vital vigor of the organism to a degree which—for a short -may take away the appetite, and make it advisable to defer repletion for a little while; but even a direct rush from the gymnasium to the dining room would be hygienically preferable to the opposite mistake. After dinner rest is recommended.
