LOVE RULES AT DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

FRAUD CHARGES ARE DENIED BY TWO WITNESSES

Plaintiff in Suit Also Denies Fraud by Anyone, at Any Time, in Any Manner.

The case of Eastland county vs. G. A. Davison et al., which has been on trial in the 91st district court since Monday a week ago, is progressing slowly and the indications are that it will require practically all, if not all, of the present week to dispose of the case.

M. G. Robertson, former county commissioner, was the first witness on the stand for the defense Tuesday. He testified that he was 67 years old and that he had been a citizen of Eastland county about 26 years. He said that as commissioner he did his best to protect the county's interest in the matter of road building and that there were no frauds practiced by himself or other members of the court in passing any orders relating to road matters or any other matters.

Ranger Man Testifies. Saunders Gregg, a former member of the Fleming-Stitzer Road Building company, followed Mr. Robertson on the stand. He stated that in July, 1921, he sold his interest in the Fleming-Stitzer company, which was an undivided one-fourth interest, to G. A. Davison for a consideration of \$25,000. He also stated that the items in controversy in this suit were for work done and materials furnished after he had disposed of his interest in the road building company. "The county had notice that he was selling his interest and there were never any frauds practiced," he said.

G. A. Davison was called to the stand by the defense and testified with reference to the claims that he is now endeavoring to collect from the county. He said that these claims had been presented before, but had never been paid. He said that he had paid off all of the road script, that had been issued after the Security State Bank & Trust company failed, out of the proceeds from the sale of the 495 good road bonds. He denied that there was fraud practiced by anyone at any time and in any manner.

Starnes Recalled. Following Mr. Davison former Judge C. R. Starnes was recalled to the stand. By his testimony the defense sought to prove the difference between the market value of 13 1/2 year bonds and 18 1/2 year bonds, the contention of the defense being that under the contract the county should have delivered to the contractors \$3,000,000 worth of bonds that matured in 13 1/2 years, but instead delivered them \$3,000,000 worth of bonds maturing in 18 1/2 years. The difference, Mr. Starnes stated, was \$2,400 per each million dollars' worth of bonds, or \$74,700. J. T. Suggs, attorney representing the Southern Security company, who made the contractors' bond, took the stand and testified that no notice had been given his company by the county prior to the filing of the suit, as provided by the policy, and that he was served with notice of the release by an order passed by the commissioners court in January, 1922.

DRILLING RESUMED ON LAVACA COUNTY WELL

HALLETTSVILLE, Texas, May 28.—The well of the Yavaca County company, four miles north of Sublime, Lavaca county, which shut down several months ago account of bad roads and the inability to haul fuel oil and supplies, has resumed drilling. This well has found a strong gas pressure at 1,100 feet. There will be a meeting of stockholders and a general celebration and barbecue at the well on Sunday, June 1. Because of the establishment of the fact of a fault in this section this well is being watched with great interest by oil men.

Competitive Offers For Death Rays Is Claim Of Inventor

PARIS, May 28.—Americans have entered the race to obtain the secret of Dwindell Matthews' death ray, he said today. With Great Britain and France already in competition for the diabolical invention which may revolutionize war and make the nation that holds it supreme, Matthews announced that he had received a letter from the United States making him an offer for it.

LONDON, May 28.—A full statement relative to Dwindell Matthews' death-dealing rays has been promised today in the house of commons, where Under Secretary Leach of the air ministry is to report the government's findings.

Meanwhile the London newspapers today published large advertisements in which Matthews gives a testimonial for a patent medicine. "It has helped me when engaged in arduous mental work," reads the advertisement over Matthews' signature.

AUSTIN, May 28.—Earle V. Hankamer of Sour Lake, was today appointed a member of the Texas university board of regents by Governor Neff to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Frank C. Jones of Houston.

MELLON TAX PLAN TO GO INTO PLATFORM

President and Capitalists Propose to Make It Plank of Republican Creed.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—A Mellon tax plan will be written into the republican platform at the Cleveland convention, and President Coolidge will go to the country on it, regardless of his action on the democratic tax bill now before him.

Little doubt that the president will sign the tax bill that has been sent to him is felt here. It is understood he considers it as the best now obtainable and business is clamoring for some relief.

Capitalists will see to it that a plank indorsing the Mellon tax plan is written into the republican platform. Meanwhile the democratic tax bill remains at the treasury department, where it is being studied by experts on finance and taxation. It is indicated they will report to the president that it is a better bill than the present law.

Mayfield Contest May Go To Senate Before Adjournment

WASHINGTON, May 28.—An early end of the senate investigation of the election of Senator Earle B. Mayfield in Texas appeared to be looming near today. A move to end the inquiry and make a report to the senate before adjournment is taking place. Unless the committee permits the counsel for George E. B. Paddy to enter into general issues involving the Ku Klux Klan, Paddy's counsel may be compelled to close the case this week.

Wheeler Charges Confidential Reports Have Been Removed

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Confidential reports of the department of justice agents on border troubles were removed from the evidence filed by Detective William J. Burns, Senator Wheeler charged today before the senate Daugherty investigating committee.

Wheeler said that the committee had searched for the letters bearing on Mexican revolutionary plots and was unable to locate them in the files.

AUTO DRIVER KILLED WHEN POWDER IN CAR EXPLODES

SAN ANTONIO, May 28.—Four cans of powder exploded in a coupe driven by Albert Morales late yesterday afternoon resulting in his death shortly afterwards. The theory is that a short circuit in the wiring transmitted the current to the mudchairs and from there to the rear where the powder was stored.

FARMER-LABOR PARTY HOLDS ALLOOF FROM THIRD PARTY

ST. PAUL, May 28.—The Minnesota farmer-labor party cannot legally participate in the so-called third party at the national convention June 3, Fred A. Tite, state chairman, indicated today. The farmer-labor party of Minnesota has no national affiliation and cannot be bound by the action of any other convention, Tite said. He held that the party was aloof from any other party action.

HEAVY WIND DOES MUCH DAMAGE IN FORT SMITH, ARK.

FORT SMITH, Ark., May 28.—A 62-mile gale struck Fort Smith last night and wrecked part of the light and power plant, stalled street cars all over the city, put more than 900 telephone wires out of commission and uprooted many trees.

Anniversary Edition of Ranger Times

It Will Be Issued About June 1 To Mark Beginning of Fifth Year of Publication.

JOHN ESTES SHOT AND KILLED IN FORT WORTH, JOHN HONEA ARRESTED

FORT WORTH, May 28.—John Estes, a lawyer of this city and one time a deputy sheriff in Tarrant county, was shot and instantly killed at 8:45 o'clock Tuesday night in the lobby of the Westbrook hotel.

John Honea, deputy United States marshal and a former sheriff of Tarrant county, is charged with the shooting. Three shots were fired, one bullet striking Estes in the left temple, another just below the heart and a third going wild.

Honea was arrested by city officers and taken to the police station for investigation. He said Estes had made threats against his life during the week, but declined to make any other statement. Friends of the two men said they had not known of any trouble between them.

REPUBLICAN PLEADS FOR AMERICAN NAVY OF IMPROVED RANK

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Enactment of the proposed \$150,000,000 naval construction program will put the American navy in first place among the navies of the world, Representative Britten, Illinois, republican, told the house today in opening the debate on the bill. He said that the United States is now at a ratio of four in a 5-4-3 line-up with Great Britain and Japan.

HOUSTON HAS DISASTROUS FIRE IN AUTO GARAGE

HOUSTON, May 28.—Fire of unknown origin early this morning gutted a garage and paint and upholstery shop with a \$100,000 loss. Fifteen new automobiles and several others all property of customers of the garage were destroyed by the fire.

CHANCELLOR MARX WILL TRY TO REORGANIZE CABINET

BERLIN, May 28.—Chancellor Marx has accepted the commission to reorganize the cabinet offered to him by President Ebert yesterday.

CONGRESS WILL INQUIRE INTO PROHIBITION

House Committee to Inquire If It Be Success or Failure and As to Law Enforcement.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—An official investigation of the success or failure of prohibition was ordered today by the house committee on alcoholic liquor traffic, in its first meeting since 1919.

A sub-committee was appointed to conduct the inquiry and delve into every phase of the prohibition problem. The committee was instructed to ascertain if the consumption of liquor had increased or diminished, and if the 18th amendment was being enforced.

PLATFORM AND PRINCIPLES OF CONVENTION

Love-Hanger Merger of Texas Democrats et al., Adopt Inoffensive Resolutions.

WACO, May 28.—The committee on platform and resolutions, with Cato Sells of Fort Worth as chairman, reported to the conventions resolutions, which were adopted, embracing the following:

1. Following the nomination of a progressive candidate for president the Texas delegation to vote for McAdoo as long as possible and to use the unit rule.

2. Praising the policy of Woodrow Wilson and urging that the democrats remain loyal to his program. Also that a special session of congress be called to enact legislation in behalf of the farmers, reduce freight rates, repeal the Fordney-Cumber bill urging a new tariff, urging that the federal reserve bank be operated so as to benefit the people and not private interests, urging that grafters be run out of Washington, lauding the Garner-Simmons tax bill.

3. Instructing its delegation to vote for abrogation of the two-thirds rule.

4. Condemning the policy of isolation of the United States, opposing manufacture and sale of light wines and beer, declaring that it is impossible, urging that enforcement officers be put in the civil service, favoring a constitutional amendment against child labor, urging that the veterans' bureau be cleaned out.

5. Indorsing Alvin Owsley for vice presidential nomination and commending him to consideration of the delegates.

6. Instructing all delegates to favor a plank for equality of men and women and urging that no one be sent to New York who has not favored prohibition and suffrage 100 per cent.

7. Asking that the Texas delegation in Washington ask that Texas be reapportioned under the 1920 census law.

8. Indorsing Neff's administration and saying the convention has unbounded confidence in his honesty and integrity.

The resolution indorsing Neff was offered by Grover C. Morrison, of Austin, assistant attorney general.

Japan Protests But Views Exclusion With Composure

TOKIO, May 28.—The Tokio cabinet today declared to instruct Ambassador Hatihara in Washington to lodge a solemn protest with the United States government because of the adoption of the immigration law with the Japanese exclusion clause. Simultaneously the foreign office issued a statement reviewing the provisions of the exclusion clause and deeply regretting its passage despite Japan's protestations.

Several of Tokio's newspapers comment on Japanese exclusion legislation in a comparatively composed and moderate tone. The Jiji says: "We must patiently await for the Americans to reconsider their action. The Nachi Nachi says, "Japanese should take reprisal steps." The Yomiuri says, "The first stage of anti-Japism is completed. It may be repeated twice or thrice."

NEFF DECLINES TO WALK INTO ANY LITTLE WEB

Refuses Place on Texas Delegation to National Gathering; Gets Commendation.

WACO, May 28.—The state democratic convention, which adjourned here late Tuesday, declared in favor of William G. McAdoo for the democratic presidential nomination, re-elected Thomas B. Love national democratic executive committee man and endorsed Earle B. Mayfield as having obtained his election as United States senator honestly and fairly. The convention's work was not marred by any serious wrangle.

Governor Pat M. Neff, with keen discernment and shrewd foresight, refused overtures from the Love-Hanger merger; controlling the convention, and told the convention he could not accept the offer of a place as delegate at large on the Texas delegation to the democratic national convention because he was not in accord with an instructed delegation.

Hanger of Fort Worth put through a motion to authorize Chairman Hicks to name committees on platform and resolutions, credentials, permanent organization and order of business. Cato Sells of Fort Worth, Texas manager for William G. McAdoo's campaign for president, was made chairman of the platform and resolutions committee, with the following associates: J. M. Henderson of Dainierfield, P. Logan, Jefferson; W. T. Lively, Dallas; W. C. Davis, Bryan; A. J. Aldrich, Crockett; H. W. Wells, Jackson; J. W. Blake, Houston; Mrs. J. D. The first test of the strength of the Ku Klux Klan in the convention came on the report of the committee seating the klan delegations, which was accepted without dissenting vote. And again when Mrs. Nona Boren Mahoney of Dallas nominated Mrs. J. T. Bloodworth of Fort Worth to succeed her as national committeewoman, Mrs. Mahoney not being a candidate for re-election. Mrs. Bloodworth's nomination was put by acclamation and carried unanimously.

The convention named Thomas B. Love of Dallas to succeed himself as the Texas member of the democratic national executive committee; gave its indorsement to Senator Earle B. Mayfield, declaring his election legal; commended Alvin Owsley, former commander of the American Legion and indorsed him for the democratic nomination for vice president of the United States, and adopted a platform of dry progressivism with instructions to its delegation to vote under the unit rule for William G. McAdoo for president so long as his name was before the national convention. The resolutions committee agreed to report a resolution expressing "unbounded confidence in the honesty and integrity of Governor Pat M. Neff and heartily endorsing his administration as governor of Texas."

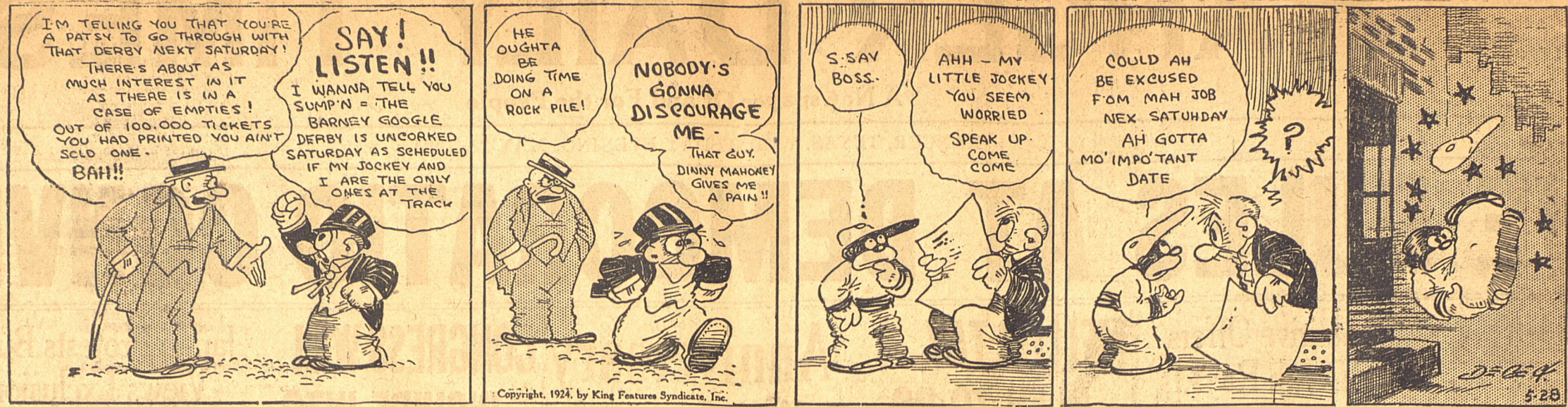

**FARRELL MAKES  
COMPARISON OF  
OLD AND NEW**

**Asks If Today's Players As Good As They Were Years Ago.**

By HENRY L. FARRELL (United Press Sports Editor)  
NEW YORK, May 28.—Late in each spring, when a fair test has been applied to all the young phenom graduates to the major leagues, both sides line up for the argument: "Are the new ball players as good as they were 10 or 15 years ago?"

Taking a squint at the early batting, pitching and fielding averages, the side supporting the positive argument haven't much material to convince the veterans, who like to insist that these are poor days on all fields of sport compared to the times that have gone.

Ty Cobb, Tris Speaker, Eddi Collins, Everett Scott, Zach Wheat, Grover Alexander, Walter Johnson, Jack Quinn, Jack Fournier, and Jake Daubert, all 10 to 15-year men and better, are still going strong enough to set the pace and to keep youngsters out of their jobs.

With few exceptions, the best players who can be held up as examples of the modern game against the old game are themselves veterans as ball players are judged.

Roush, Sisler, Hornsby, Heilmann, Williams, Ruth, Schalk, Dugan, Bancroft, Bigbee and many others who might be held up as favorite comparison with the old stars are really veterans and could be held up themselves as examples to support the argument that the new players are not as good as the old ones.

Taking the liberty of assuming that modern times can be stretched back five years, there is no doubt that the old time days never saw a hitter to compare with Babe Ruth. The Babe offers one positive argument in himself that at least one type of baseball is better today than it was 10 or 20 years ago.

As Ruth revolutionized the science and strategy of baseball by making of it a slugging game, so he reduced

the possibility of developing players of today that could compare to old stars by eliminating practically all of the science at which the old timers excelled.

It must be admitted, perhaps, that there has been no team since the days of the old Baltimore Orioles that could compare to that great team. The game that the Orioles originated and perfected is still being followed by most of the successful managers of today.

Frank Frisch, second baseman for the New York Giants, perhaps is the best young player developed in the past five years. But he has yet to attain the class that will cause the

old timers to remark: "Remember how Eddie Collins . . ."  
Rogers Hornsby, beyond all doubt, is one of the outstanding players of the modern school, but he is not only inferior to Collins as an all-around ball player, but is slipping behind Frisch as a player of general ability.  
George Sisler, the perfect ball player, is another exceptional product of the modern times. There is nothing that Sisler cannot do well and, in addition to being a brilliant individual star, he is a great team worker and is showing the talent of a fine manager.

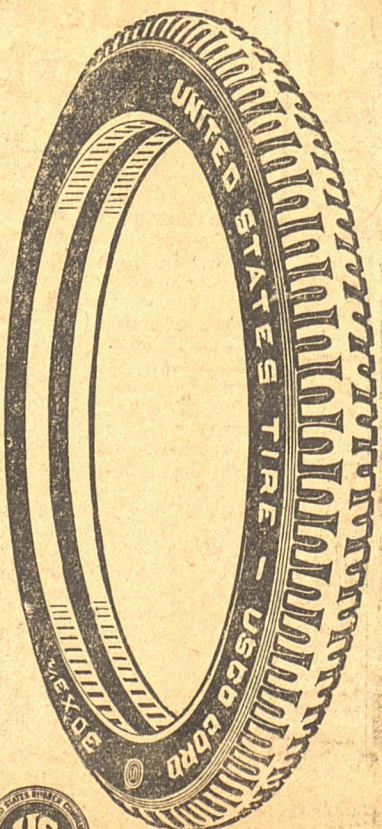

**WORK ON VARSITY STADIUM TO BE BEGUN NEXT WEEK**

AUSTIN, May 26.—Much of the material for construction work on the Texas memorial stadium has been shipped from the factories, and preparations are being made for the beginning of construction work on June 1, according to H. L. Burney of the firm of Walsh & Burney of San Antonio, contractors for the construction of the first unit of varsity's stadium.  
Excavation work on the stadium is rapidly nearing completion, and the space for the football gridiron is being filled in with black dirt. Grass will be planted on the football playing field as soon as possible, so that the field as soon as possible, so that fall between Texas and A. & M.  
Some lumber has already arrived in Austin for the construction work, and the steel, which has been shipped from Kansas City, will be here in a few days, Mr. Burney said. It is necessary to have the steel at an early date, for it will be used first in putting down the foundations.  
Mr. Burney estimated that 3,000 cubic yards of cement, 500,000 feet of lumber, 300 tons of steel, 4,000 yards of sand and 5,000 yards of gravel would be used in the construction work.

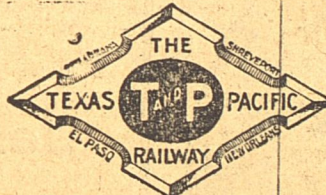

CHICAGO PLANNING HUGE AUDITORIUM ON FAIR SITE

By United Press. CHICAGO, May 28.—The largest convention hall and community center in the United States, if not in the world, will be built in Chicago if plans of the south park commissioners here materialize. Backers of the plan propose to remodel the old fine arts building left by the world's fair in Jackson park and make it the leading auditorium of the nation—one that would attract hundreds of thousands of people to Chicago annually. Citizens of the south side are expected to vote June 2 on a large bond issue, part of which would provide funds for the colossal project. The structure as planned will contain a series of halls that can be thrown open into a huge auditorium, seating 25,000 persons. The scheme

provides for indoor swimming pools, gymnasias, ball rooms, club rooms, recreation halls and minor auditoriums. Present specifications for the main auditorium place the speaker's rostrum in the center. The large hall is also planned for huge athletic carnivals, with a straightaway 150 yards long. The main building at present has approximately 150,000 square feet of floor space. It has two large wings, which could be used for art and commercial exhibits.

NEW FROCKS FOR OLD AND HOW IT'S DONE

By HEDDA HOYT (Fashion Editor of the United Press) (Written for the United Press) NEW YORK, May 28.—To have a frock for every occasion is quite an essential thing these days. One needs morning frocks, afternoon frocks, beach frocks, tea frocks and frocks for various other occasions. The woman who is content to make one frock do for all occasions is no longer seen in the cities where ready-made garments sell so cheaply. The women of limited means often find the task of being appropriately gowned for all occasions a difficult one. Therefore, it is the woman who is clever at remodeling last year's gowns who always appears well dressed in spite of a meagre pocket-book. Making over clothes is an art in itself. It is more difficult to remodel an old gown than to make a new one.

There are many ways, however, to remodel last year's frocks so that they will bear the earmarks of 1924. We will take the typical frock of last spring and summer, for instance. These frocks had the low-bloused waistline made on an elastic band. As we all know, the elastic waistband is no longer used on the smarter gowns of this season since most gowns are devoid of waistline, being straight-lined models. By removing the elastic band from an old frock, and reducing the width of the skirt by taking in the side seams, one has the invariable silhouette of today.

If the straight chemise effect is too severe, a bow of self material or chiffon can be attached at one side of the gown, giving the side-trimming effect which is in vogue. Those who prefer a semblance of waistline may use a band of ribbon or self material to form a narrow girde effect. Often we find that the ready-made frock has been pieced together at the elastic waistline. In this case one may insert a narrow band of beading or embroidery at the waistline. Where fullness is used in the skirt, it must be confined over the hips as the front and back of all frocks are flat this year.

The panel frock of last year is also passe, but taking off panels is a very simple matter and the material used in the panels may be utilized elsewhere on the frock. If the panels are sufficiently wide they may be added to the back of the frock to give the waistlength cape effect. Narrow panels may be joined together with eren lace to insure width for the capelet. Again, one may sew the panel material together and have it pleated to produce a cape. There is another way panels may be used to trim a frock. By using them in band form about the skirt just below the knees, one has the new bottom-trim effect. Many of the latest frocks have flaring flounces at the bottom of the skirt. A straightline frock can have a flounce of contracting material added below the knees to give the flounce effect. In fact, many of the new figured silk gowns have wide flounces of taffeta in solid color or finishing the bottom of the skirt. The black frock can be vastly altered by applying several layers of crepe de chene of contrasting colors together and adding them to the hem, one has a 1924 frock.

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
