## M'ADOO DOES NOT AGREE WITH PAT NEFF

### Mellon May Be Next Cabinet Member to Quit

#### CLUB WOMEN WILL DISCUSS BIG PROBLEMS

General Federation to Meet in Los Angeles in Biennial Convention.

LOS ANGELES, April 11.—"Who Shall Inherit the United States?" and "War or Peace?" will be two of the outstanding problems of this country that will be presented for discussion before organized women during the biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs to be held here June 2-13.

While the program has been made out only in outline, immigration and Americanization and international relations will be given outstanding places.

Oswald Ryan, commissioner who accompanied Secretary of Labor Davis overseas, will be a speaker on the legislative session in charge of Mrs. Edward Franklin White, legislative chairman in the General Federation and deputy attorney general of Indiana.

Mabel Walker Willebrandt, assistant attorney general of the United States, who has just made a national survey on law enforcement as applied to liquor laws and released a map showing that even with law enforcement the country is more than 61 per cent bone dry, will be a speaker at the Los Angeles legislative luncheon. She is expected to make disclosures that will result in a more drastic stand of organized women in the matter of prohibition and prohibition enforcement officers.

**Women to Help Dozeys.**  
In this connection, Inogene B. Oakley of Philadelphia, chairman of the division of civil service, is expected to introduce a resolution having the 2,800,000 women of the federation demand that all law enforcement officers be placed under civil service. She is expected to make further charges that many of the so-called enforcement officers are now in the pay of the liquor interests.

In addition to the legislative programs of the biennial convention, a day each will be given to discussion of various problems of education, public welfare, fine arts, American citizenship and foreign relations.

Mrs. John D. Sherman of Estes Park, Col., candidate for president of the general federation to succeed Mrs. Thomas G. Winter, is chairman of education. On this program to be given June 6, general education problems and the pressing need of a secretary of education in the United States cabinet and the passage of the education bill pending in congress will be stressed by Mrs. C. E. Vowles of Mount Pleasant, Mich.

Mrs. Mary C. C. Bradford, Denver, Col., formerly president of the American Education association, will speak on public revenues and expenditures.

**Need of Kindergarten.**  
Kindergartens and the need of more of them will be discussed by Julia Wade Abbott of the bureau of education, Washington, D. C. Other educational topics will be presented.

In special division conferences there will be exhibits and informal talks on county co-operation by Susie V. Powell, Arts and Mechanical college, Mississippi; vocational home economics, Mrs. Joseph C. Gawler, Yakima, Wash.; home demonstration, Mrs. Joseph S. Leach, Walpole, Mass.; conservation of national resources, Mrs. Francis E. Whitley, Webster City, Iowa.

A plea for the preservation of natural scenery will be made by Mrs. Charles H. McNider, Mason City, Ia., mother of former Commander McNider of the American Legion.

#### SECRETARY OF TREASURY GETS FEELINGS HURT

President Also Gets Peeved, and Sends Denunciatory Letter to Senate.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Following receipt of a letter from Secretary of Treasury Mellon, in which a distinct threat to resign is contained, President Coolidge sent a message to the senate denouncing the conduct of the senate committee investigating the bureau of internal revenue of the treasury department.

"It is time that we return to a government under and in accordance with the usual form of the law of the land," the president said. "The states of the union requested the immediate adoption of such a course. Such information that can be disclosed I shall always unhesitatingly insist that it be laid before the senate."

Singling out the appointment of Francis Heney, San Francisco attorney, by the committee to be its prosecutor at the instance of the senate as stepping on the law, the president called upon them to halt such conduct.

He declared that by "such procedure, instead of a government of law we have a government of lawlessness, against a continuance of such I enter my most solemn protest."

Mellon wrote the president that it interfered with the proper exercise of the duty of the secretary of the treasury, "and I nor any other man of character could accept responsibility for the treasury."

The contest closed at midnight, March 31.

#### Mal Daugherty Puts Legal Obstacles In Way Of Committee

WASHINGTON COURT HOUSE, Ohio, April 11.—Mal Daugherty again today defied the senate committee, which sought to investigate the books of the Midland National bank, of which he is president.

Daugherty's attorneys appeared before Senators Wheeler and Brookhart and said the former attorney general's brother had rejected the subpoena on the grounds the senate committee was not armed with a court order.

The banker also refused to allow access to the bank's books. Brookhart announced that the committee, meeting in the Cherry hotel, would go to the grounds and Daugherty would seek to have Daugherty cited for contempt.

WASHINGTON COURT HOUSE, Ohio, April 11.—Subpoenas for Mal Daugherty, brother of the former attorney general, and three of his "forthwith" associates to appear "forthwith" were issued this afternoon by Senators Wheeler and Brookhart, the senate sub-committee, which came here today to examine records of the Midland National bank in connection with the late Senator Wheeler.

In addition to Mal Daugherty, the subpoenas called for the appearance before the committee of Miss Vera Vaile, secretary to Mal Daugherty and assistant cashier of the bank of which Daugherty is president; H. E. Daugherty, son of the bank president, and cashier of the bank; and Willis Cauley, "right hand" man of the late Jess Smith when he was a Washington Court House storekeeper.

#### MORE AUTO OWNERS IN DALLAS THAN HOME OWNERS

DALLAS, Auto owners are more frequent than home owners, according to local tax figures. R. W. Eaton, local assessor, declared that half of Dallas' car owners do not own their own homes. Many of the car owners are without other taxable property.

#### BOSTON SENDS ORDER FOR QUANTITY OF TEXAS FLIES

DALLAS, April 11.—Dallas will furnish staid old Boston with 2,000 Texas house flies. An order for the insects was received here by F. C. Bishop, chief entomologist of the department of agriculture. Bishop said the flies were wanted for scientific experiments, probably to test their capacities as germ-carriers.

#### Hugo Stinnes, One Of World's Richest Men, Dies In Berlin

BERLIN, April 11.—Hugo Stinnes, Germany's richest man, is dead here from double pneumonia. The great industrialist's death caused a panicky situation on the German stock market.

His son visited America recently in the interest of his father's oil business, and toured the country as the guest of Harry F. Sinclair.

#### BORAH WIRES FOR PAPERS IN WHEELER CASE

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The senate investigation of the indictment of Senator Wheeler is to be immediate and searching, Senator Borah, Idaho, said today, as he prepared to organize at once his specially appointed committee on the inquiry.

The Borah probe awaits only official copies of the papers in the Wheeler case, for which Borah has telegraphed court officials at Great Falls, Mont., where the indictment was returned.

Mrs. Tell, who surrendered voluntarily to the police, said she had shot Blair and then buried his body, following an attack on her by him after she had refused to obtain a divorce from her husband and marry him. Mrs. Tell was employed by Blair as his housekeeper.

RALEIGH, N. C., April 11.—William G. McAdoo has formally entered his name as a presidential candidate in the North Carolina state primaries to be held June 7. McAdoo declined proposal of Senator Oscar Underwood to allow North Carolina to send a delegating instructed for Josephus Daniels, former secretary of war, uncontested.

#### ACCEPTANCE BY GERMANY MADE STIPULATION

Reparation Commission Says Dawes Plan Offers Basis to Solve Problem.

BERLIN, April 11.—Germany probably will accept the Dawes reparation plan, it was stated in authoritative circles today. Official deliberation on the experts' findings has already proceeded to a considerable extent.

If the present government accepts, the next reichstag, which will be nationalistic, may undo everything and precipitate a series of fresh crises, involving dissolution of parliament.

PARIS, April 11.—The reparations commission today accepted the report of the Dawes commission of experts and has recommended its acceptance by the allied governments, provided Germany agrees to its terms.

The action of the reparations commission upon the report came with unexpected suddenness after various members had reported upon the attitude of their governments. Louis Barthou, French member and president of the commission, announced France's acceptance after talking with Premier Poincare this morning.

Sir John Bradbury, the British member, informed his colleagues that Premier Ramsay MacDonald and the British labor cabinet had approved the plan. The Belgian and Italian members fell into line and shortly after 8 o'clock this evening acceptance of the proposals was announced, with the proviso that Germany must accept as a whole.

At the same time, word came from Berlin that the German government virtually had decided to accept the Dawes report. The plan will now be sent to the allied governments for separate action. An official communique stated that the "commission considers the report offers a practical basis for the rapid solution of the reparations problem, and therefore, within the limits of its powers, approves the conclusions and adopts the methods therein set forth."

The commission adds that "it is obliged to reserve its approval of action until Germany declares its willingness to collaborate in execution of the plan."

Premier Poincare is said to consider the report a satisfactory technical solution, but believes its adoption must be accompanied by a political accord, guaranteeing France the support of the allies in case Germany defaults.

#### Spaghetti Is Food For Eating Contest In Kansas City, Mo.

KANSAS CITY, April 11.—Alfred Scuderio was crowned king of spaghetti eaters today. He took the world championship from Frank B. and falo in a close contest. The "dark and empty horse" of the occasion inhaled 1,327 feet of the Italian hay in seven minutes, 100 feet better than the champion's record.

Joe Cassano, St. Louis champion and contender for the crown, did not finish. He said he was unaccustomed to the Kansas City brand of spaghetti, and his tongue became entangled in its strands, which were too flexible. Walter Mandazzo, manager for Cassano, claimed a foul, contending that white rubber strands had been mixed in the plate of spaghetti placed in front of Cassano.

#### MANY UNEMPLOYED MEXICANS BEIN FED IN FORT WORTH

FORT WORTH, April 11.—Approximately 250 unemployed Mexicans are being fed here daily by the Mexican community, according to Mexican consular officers. Promises of employment here by labor agencies is said to have lured 2,500 idle Mexicans to the city.

MANSFIELD, Mo., April 11.—Oliver B. Davis, local newspaper editor, offered to pay his two young women employees two and a half times their present salaries if they would agree to marry for 10 years. Neither accepted.

#### BABY BURNED TO DEATH WHEN FIRE DESTROYS HOME

DALLAS, April 11.—The three-month-old baby girl of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Williams was burned to death when their home here was destroyed by fire.

#### M'ADOO WANTS INSTRUCTED DELEGATION

Insists Only Such Can Win Against Reactionary and Wet Element in Party.

FORT WORTH, April 11.—William Gibbs McAdoo made his first bid here today for Texas' 40 delegates to the democratic national convention by challenging the position of Governor Neff who stands for an "uninstructed" delegation.

"The course Governor Neff proposes for Texas would contribute to a victory for the reactionaries and the wet element in the democratic party," McAdoo declared in an interview on his arrival in Fort Worth this morning from Oklahoma.

"If Texas wants to nominate and secure the election of a progressive democrat as president of the United States, it can be accomplished only by sending an instructed delegation to New York, thereby throwing the whole weight and force of her influence back of the progressive candidate."

McAdoo pointed to the 1912 convention when the Texas delegation instructed for Woodrow Wilson, held the balance of power. "If Texas had sent an uninstructed delegation to the 1912 convention, the nomination of Woodrow Wilson might never have occurred," he said.

Governor Neff announced recently he was opposed to an instructed delegation because of the "chaotic conditions in party politics." He said he favored sending delegates pledged to principles but not to any individual.

McAdoo was scheduled to deliver his campaign speech here this afternoon. Tonight he will appear in Dallas.

#### Signs That Clutter Bankhead Highway Are To Be Removed

The civic committee of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce is not only determined to make Eastland more beautiful, and a more desirable place in which to live, but it is also determined to make the highways leading into this city more attractive to the thousands who drive over them constantly. In other words, a campaign is on foot to remove all the signs that now clutter up the Bankhead highway.

The day has gone when this kind of advertising really amounts to anything but an expense to the advertiser. Every little while a smooth-tongued agent will come through the city, and by a persuasive line of talk, he will get one or more business men signed up for his "wonderful" line of highway advertising.

Then a few more or less atrocious works of art are placed upon the highway, hiding some little heathy spot that otherwise would attract the passerby and make him remember the Bankhead highway near Eastland.

Perhaps there was once a day when this method of advertising paid, when only a few enterprising men had signs along the roads. But in the multiplicity of the signs, the value of the sign has passed, and only become an expense, and a nuisance. The fact that 15 of the largest advertisers in the United States have signed a compact to stop this method of advertising is significant.

For these corporations know what they are doing, and they have found out that if the owners cared to use them in some other way they can do so.

Theodore Ferguson, chairman of the civic committee, has appointed W. H. Sewell, Frank Crowell, Walter Hart, F. E. Williams, J. A. Beard, and J. J. Lucas as a sub-committee to talk with the owners of the signs and go over the proposition with them.

Already several of the leading business men of the city have stated that they are glad that such advertising is being started, that such advertising is a useless expense, and that they are willing to have every one of their signs removed.

Advertisers today are realizing that the best kind of advertising is through the printed page, and if the money that is now put into highway signboards was turned over to the printer it would result in better advertising for the merchant.

**SAHARA DESERT DEVELOPMENT MEANS MUCH**

Enormous Waste Section Ultimately May Be Made Very Productive.

In addition to providing an avenue of access to the natural resources and man-power of French Central Africa, the construction of the Trans-Saharan railway will make possible an intensive exploration of the hidden resources of the Great Desert. Until recently the Sahara has been viewed not as a territory to be explored and developed, but as an obstacle to be overcome. Today engineers are awakening to the mining possibilities of the desert itself, where deposits of many metals, of coal and oil have been found, in addition to the large phosphate beds now under exploitation. Like the Great American Desert, practically the entire Sahara is underlain with a great subterranean body of water, and an abundant supply of water is obtained wherever artesian wells are sunk. This fact alone has already radically changed the aspect, in places, of the caravan routes. Where once there was only sand, extending like a vast and boundless ocean to the horizon, brilliant spots of verdure, small gardens of vegetables and fruit trees, and patches of grain are now to be seen. The desert tribes have been quick to follow the lead of the French garrisons and rare colonists, and more than 100 wells have been bored throughout the region. Thus, to cite but one of many examples, Ben Gardane, which 15 years ago was an arid hating place, is now the center of an olive tract extending six kilometers, where a population of 20,000 natives is definitely settled on the land, which feeds them and their flocks.

There would seem to be no reason why the growing oases, spreading as they do a little further each year, should not continue to extend indefinitely with the continued augmentation in the number of wells, and thus, in time, modify the entire character of the country; convert the nomad tribes into a settled population—for the nomad, ever forced to seek the water he must have or perish, is nomad not from choice but from necessity—and ultimately cause the desert itself "to blossom as the rose." Certainly, when one considers the effect on history of the change of the Egyptian climate or the increased aridity of China, it is not too much to believe that the reduction of the temperature of the European Mediterranean littoral from its present mean average to that of our New England states is fraught with the greatest significance for the future of humanity. 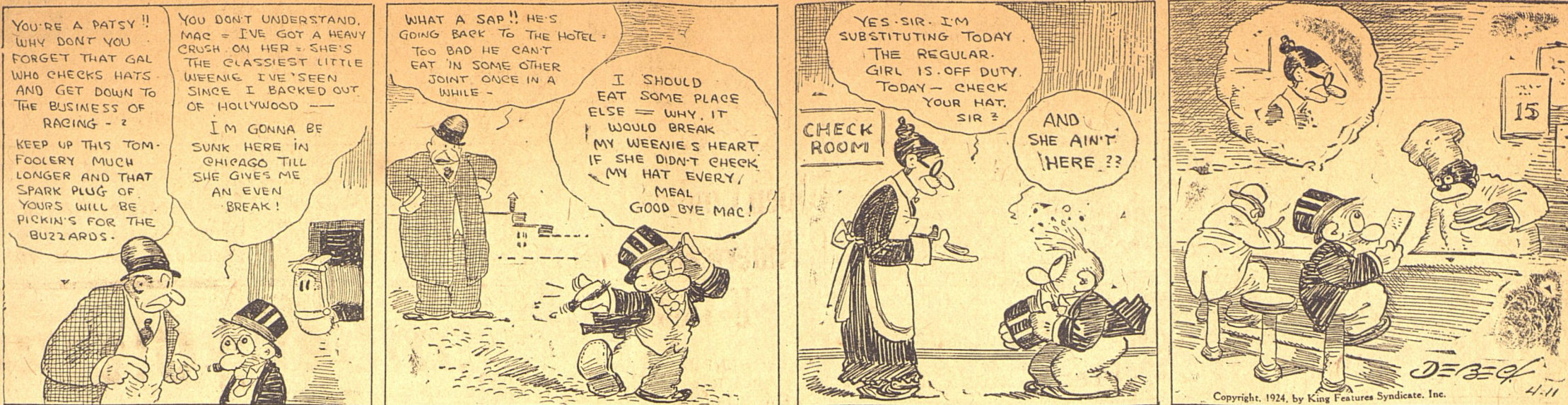

**Open Contest In American League If Yankees Fall**

By HENRY L. FARRELL (United Press Sports Editor)

NEW YORK, April 11.—Just for the reason that the New York Yanks are expected by the majority of baseball critics to be set for another stroll to the championship, the American league pennant race has the possibility of a tremendous sensation that would develop if the Yankees should not live up to form.

It is more or less accepted if the Giants should falter in the National league, one of the two contending teams would win the pennant, but in the American league it would become almost an open contest if the Yankees should happen to stumble and fall by the wayside.

On the assumption that baseball is too uncertain to accept the position of the Yankees as impregnable, five or six teams stand for the pennant in the American league.

Since 1914, when the Boston Braves upset all calculations in the National league by trailing behind the pack until July and then stepping out and winning the pennant, a critic can give any team a pennant chance without risking his hide before the pistol of an assassin.

Four new managers have been appointed in the American league since the season closed last fall, one team has been completely reorganized, one team has been tremendously strengthened, and one has been improved.

Lee Fohl, with the Boston Red Sox; Frank Chance, with Chicago White Sox; Buck Harris, with the Washington Senators, and George with the St. Louis Browns, are the new pilots. Because they have new managers, who may introduce new policies, and whose leadership may exert some kind of a new inspiration, these clubs cannot be figured on past performances.

The Boston Red Sox have been reorganized from top to bottom, with new owners and a new manager. The club has been strengthened by the addition of Steve O'Neill, one of the great catchers; by Wambsgans, a fine second baseman; Bobby Veach, slugging outfielder, and by Dudley Lee, a rookie shortstop, who has been hailed as a sensation by veteran baseball scouts.

By the use of substantial cash, Connie Mack has added to the Philadelphia Athletics Strand and Simmons, two highly touted young outfielders, and Max Bishop, a promising second baseman from the fine Baltimore club. For two years Mack hasn't needed these three players will be needed "much."

The Cleveland Indians, at a sacrifice, succeeded in getting George Burns back from Boston, a position that has been weak since Doc Johnston's legs went back on him.

St. Louis is to gamble on the success that Manager George Sisler has in his attempt to play first base again. With a Sisler in anything approaching old-time form, the Browns are a pennant contender; without him they are in a battle for the first division.

As it will be observed, the American league clubs, with the exception of the Yankees, are all uncertain qualities. The Yankees are certain only by the exercise of an opinion that a piece of mechanism, almost perfect on a baseball blueprint, will function as such when it is put into action and that there are worn parts in the machine that are likely to give way under the strain of hard work.

By United Press. LONDON, April 11.—British ship owners today announced a nationwide lockout against all shipyard workers, effective at midnight tonight. The cause of the lockout is the refusal of striking workers at Southampton to accept the owners' terms and resume work, although they were advised to do so by their own national union leaders.

It was the hoarse bark of "Woody" that aroused Russ Forth to the fire danger. Forth and his wife, clasping Betty Jean in her arms, leaped from a second story window, but were fatally injured. "Woody" was trapped by the flames and laid down his life without a whimper.

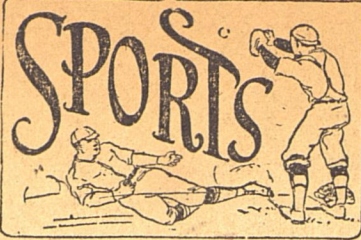

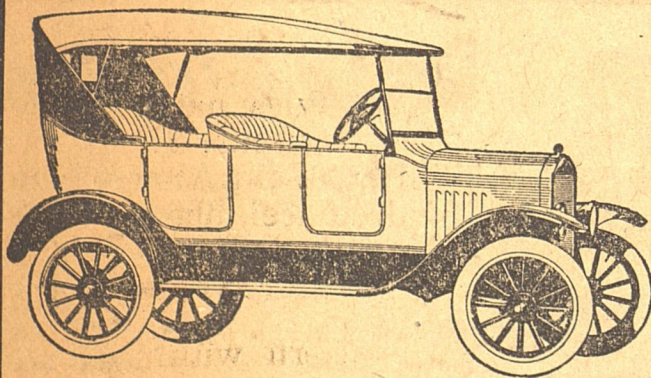

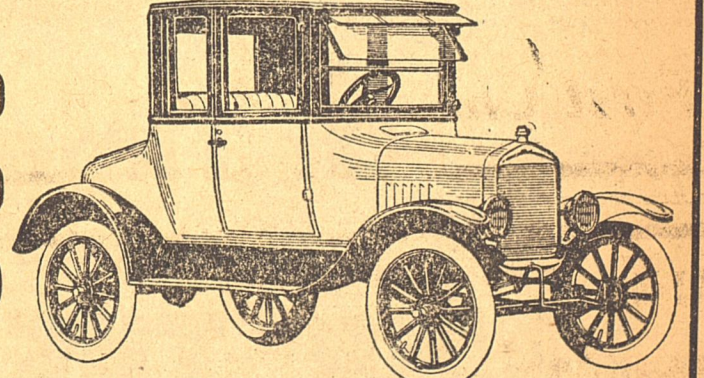

### United States Is Ready To Help In Settlement Plan

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The American government is prepared to support the unofficial role laid out in the reparations settlement plan proposed in the Dawes report, it is understood here. The principal phases of the United States part under the Dawes plan are:

To furnish part of the huge foreign loan to put Germany on her feet.

Appointment of prominent citizens in their special lines to the various boards of control to see that the Dawes plan, if accepted, is carried out by Germany.

Administration circles pointed out today that these two phases, even though they are private in character, would not be undertaken without governmental sanction.

No loans are made to foreign countries by American banking houses without the approval of the government.

French people have abandoned the plan to import negro servant girls from Martinique, principally because the girls could not be obtained.

There will be decorated automobiles at the Guaranty bank building Sunday morning before 8 o'clock to take the Ranger delegation over. The start will be made at 8 a. m., A. H. Shaw, post adjutant, said today. There will be a banner on which "Ranger" will be emblazoned in big letters.

Since there is no local band, the post is arranging to have its own talent furnish music.

The post's colors will be used for the first out door procession Sunday since the purchase.

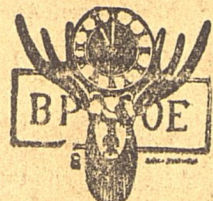

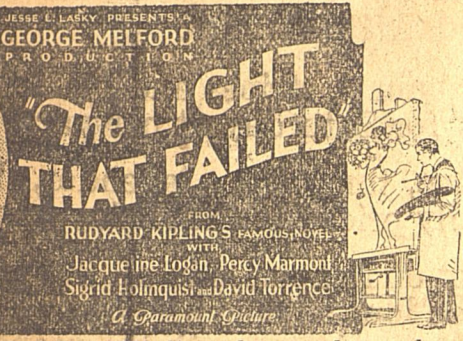

In a special communication from the department today, it was said that Wells was ordered to offer the "friendly assistance of the United States government in finding a solution to bring about the establishment of peace in the Honduran republic."

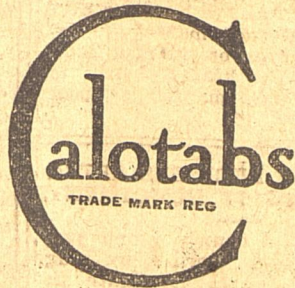

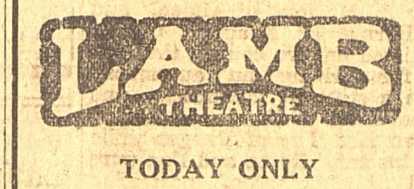
