

FLOCK IN DISTRESS AFTER PASTOR GOES

CHRISTIANITY IS GROWTH SAYS KNICKERBOCKER

"Inside the Magic Circle" Is Theme of Impressive Sermon by Noted Preacher.

Rev. Dr. H. D. Knickerbocker of Dallas, who is preaching a series of sermons at the Eastland tabernacle, preached last night on the subject, "Inside the Magic Circle." This was the third sermon of the series. Dr. Knickerbocker had intended to use a different subject, but because another speaker was to follow, wished to shorten his time.

"Everything we possess of value is made possible by God, for outside the magic circle of Christendom, there are no values," Dr. Knickerbocker said. "The Christian religion fertilizes the brain and increases the producing power of man, which power today is 250 times greater than it was 100 years ago," he said. The speaker drew a contrast between the countries outside of Christendom and those of the Christian world.

"The Christian churches no longer only try to fit you for the world to come, but they are endeavoring to prepare you for this world," Dr. Knickerbocker declared. "All of the good qualities found in men come from the influences of the Christian religion," he said.

"Inside the Magic Circle of Christendom we worship a God in whose image man is made, but outside this circle gods made in man's image are worshipped," Dr. Knickerbocker said. "If there is one above another who should be consecrated to the cause of Christ, it is a woman, for only in Christendom has she ever had a place of honor, and if she is not exultantly consecrated she is an ingrate," the speaker said.

Dr. Knickerbocker made a strong appeal to Methodists and their leaders not to fail in the purpose they now have to raise the money necessary to insure the building of a suitable house of worship in Eastland. He again pointed out the fact that church buildings in Eastland were inferior in quality to the dwelling houses and business structures.

Services were announced for tonight at 8 o'clock. No services are to be held Saturday night.

Jamie Heron Talks In Eastland About "Better Building"

Jamie Heron, poet and lecturer of Chicago and now on a tour of Rotary club in Texas, addressed the audience at the Methodist tabernacle last night immediately after Dr. Knickerbocker, who is holding a series of meetings there, had finished his sermon, which was cut short for the reason that Heron was to speak. The Eastland band furnished music for the occasion.

Heron's subject was "Building Business by Building Better Men," which he handled in a masterly manner. He read an original poem, "I Want to Live in Texas," and called the attention of his hearers to the wonderful undeveloped resources of the Lone Star state. He said that Texas is taking on new life and inspiration and rapidly awakening to the great opportunities within its confines.

He pointed out that the commercial clubs, together with the civic organizations, which are building a stronger moral force in individuals, are a great power for the upbuilding of Christian influence and progressive communities.

The speaker read a three-character playlet to illustrate how Rotary teaches service above self, and is applying the Golden Rule to business.

WHY COST OF FLIVING IS HIGHER THAN IT SHOULD BE

WHEELER DOES NOT WANT ANY MERE 'REPORT'

Sharply Rebukes Witness Who Brings Speaker Gillett's Name into Inquiry.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Speaker Gillett got a trunkful of liquor seized by the department of justice in 1920, Capt. H. L. Scarse, former department of justice agent, testified today before the senate Dastigier investigating committee.

This charge by Scarse brought a sharp rebuke from Senator Wheeler, Montana, when the witness said his testimony was based on a "report" and an alleged newspaper statement by Gillett acknowledging having received the liquor for a constituent. "Who gave you the information?" asked Wheeler.

"Gaston B. Means, for one," was the reply.

3,900-Foot Sand Is Famous Ranger Pay, Oil Scout Believes

In the opinion of a Ranger oil scout, the 3,900-foot pay sand in the Curry pool in Stephens county, which has received much publicity this week because of the bringing in of the Magnolia Petroleum company's well Brown No. 4, at this approximate depth is the famous Ranger pay.

"I believe it is nothing more than the Ranger pay," the oil scout said. "The sand takes a dip and you'll find it closer to the surface at one point than at other points. Take the black line we know about—a point south of this county, you'll find it on the surface. You can walk on it." He said these sand formations slope gently.

The sand known as the Ranger pay was found during the hectic days of 1918 and 1919 between 3,400 and 3,500 feet in Eastland county.

The Magnolia's well was reported making 500 barrels Thursday.

CYCLONE AND HAIL SWEEPS NEW ORLEANS DOING MUCH DAMAGE

NEW ORLEANS, April 18.—A cyclone, with hail and rain, last night swept over a section of this city near Lake Pontchartrain, destroying approximately 25 small homes, injuring about 50 persons and doing damage that may run to a half million dollars.

The police early today had not been able to check up the full damage done by the brief storm. None of the injured is believed very badly hurt, a woman with a broken leg being the most seriously injured. Hail stones as large as goose eggs were reported by weather bureau observers, and although the hailstorm lasted only a very short time many windows and skylights were smashed.

EXPLOSION OF GAS KILLS FAMILY IN JOHNSTOWN

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., April 18.—The entire family of Anthony T. Precko is dead or dying following an explosion of gas in their home today.

Someone struck a match in the kitchen and a terrific blast followed, and flames swept the bedroom where the family slept. Mrs. Precko, the mother, was so badly burned that she died in Mercy hospital. Leo Precko was killed outright, and baby Roas, 18 months, died shortly after his mother. Precko, the father and four other children, all under 14, are reported dying.

LA FOLLETTE RECEIVES MOCK NOMINATION

Political Trickery Is Charged Following Meeting of University Students.

CHICAGO, April 18.—Charges of political trickery were made today in connection with the presidential nomination of Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin by a mock republican national convention at the University of Chicago last night.

"The entire LaFollette program was framed by a group of radicals in the political science department," O. D. McBride, a senior and president of the Coolidge club, said. "It was carefully planned by LaFollette workers, who wanted it said the University of Chicago favored the nomination of the Wisconsin man."

McBride refused to place the name of Coolidge in nomination because he charged that the convention was dominated by radicals and reds. He declared he would refuse to nominate any real American on a platform which called for the recognition of Russia, total disarmament, a continuation of the "gentleman's agreement" with Japan, the independence of the Philippines and other radical measures. McBride bolted the convention and was followed by several of the leading college men.

Only one ballot was taken and votes were cast for the several candidates nominated as follows: LaFollette 199, Coolidge 96, Hiram Johnson 21, William E. Borah of Idaho 19, Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, 11, and former Governor Lowden of Illinois, 3.

A demonstration lasting 10 minutes was accorded the nomination of LaFollette.

DEEPENING TEN WELLS TO NEW OIL PAY SAND

Work has started this week on deepening 10 wells in the Curry pool to the new sand discovered with the bringing in of the Brown No. 3 of the Magnolia Petroleum company at 3,970 feet.

This sand which is 750 feet below the sand that has been producing the big pay in the Curry pool will also be tried out in new locations.

This new development means, if the present anticipations are met, hundreds of thousands of dollars of additional revenue to property owners, lease holders and operators and the employment of scores of more oil men.

The first well was drilled in the Curry pool in March, 1920, the well being drilled by Hale and Knight. It has always been an enormously profitable pool.

COMMERCIAL CLUB IS READY TO COOPERATE WITH RANGER CHURCHES

The Commercial club, an organization of business men of Ranger, "is ready to co-operate with the churches in any way that is advisable," A. Joseph, president of the club, said today in discussing the proposal of several business men to close their stores between the hours of 10 and 11 o'clock each day next week in the interest of the city-wide church revival now going on.

JURY CONSIDERING CASE IN WHICH DAMAGES ARE SOUGHT

At noon today the jury was still out in the case of Horner vs. Turner which was tried yesterday in the Ninety-first district court. This is a case in which W. E. Horner and wife are suing Clyde Turner for damages in connection with the death of their little girl who was run over and killed by an automobile last fall. Turner, it is alleged, was driving the car.

NEGRO WANTS TO WEAR WHITE GLOVES INTO BEULAH LAND

HUNTSVILLE, Texas, April 18.—Tommy Curry, a "jelly-bean" negro was punctuated about his habits, even to his last breath. Before dying in the electric chair today for the murder of his mother, Curry requested that he be buried in white socks and white gloves. As it was his last request, it was granted.

Train Girls Right, They Keep Boys Straight

HOUSTON, April 18.—April 18. "The story of Adam and Eve is correct. Most every boy who gets into trouble has been led astray by some girl."

This was the statement of Mrs. Eva Belcher, Houston policewoman, who handles all the juvenile cases here.

"Once that pair of brown eyes get fixed on his, and the acquisitive instinct all women possess starts to manifest itself, the poor fellow might just as well sign away the liberty of his own action. He is no longer to be held responsible to anybody, not even himself."

"The rule works the other way around," continued the policewoman. "When a boy is good, do not give him any credit. There is a girl at the bottom of it all. She deserves the credit."

"Keep the girls right, and the boys will be perfect gentlemen," she concluded.

MEDICAL RECORD FINDS ANOTHER UNUSUAL CASE

Freak of Nature Preventing Birth. Mother Carries Unborn Babe Many Years.

TOLEDO, Ohio, April 18.—One of the most astounding discoveries in medical history was made in St. Vincent's hospital today when an operation for a "tumor" revealed that an aged Toledo woman had carried for 51 years the perfectly formed body of an "unborn baby girl."

The woman, 74, died shortly after the operation. Her death was caused by a combination of diseases due to old age, doctors said. The baby's body when taken from the woman was in a shell or capsule of flesh weighing six pounds.

Blood vessels leading from the mother kept the flesh of the child from decaying, but the heart and lungs and other organs ceased to function soon after the scheduled time of birth.

Toledo physicians said this is one of the most unusual cases of its kind in medical history. Mothers have been known to carry the body of an unborn child for a year, perhaps two years, but never before for a half of a century.

The unborn child caused the mother little discomfort, according to Dr. J. E. McCormick, who attended the woman.

She married when very young and had two sons before she was 20 years old. Both sons live in Toledo.

PROMISING OIL WELL BROUGHT IN ON LEASE NORTH OF RANGER

The W. P. Bradford No. 1 well, 12 miles north of Ranger, made four flows within an hour at one-half this morning. It was given a 30-quart shot of nitroglycerin Thursday evening and the oil shot over the derrick.

It was described as a "nice" well by several men who visited the lease. The well has been drilled 1,955 feet and was 26 feet in the sand this morning. Adamson, Suderth, Fouts et al. are the owners.

CHICAGO, April 18.—Fire swept the five-story hog building of Morris & Company in the stock yard district today. Scores of fire engines were summoned and desperate efforts are being made to keep the fire from spreading to the acres of adjoining buildings.

BREAKING GLASS IN STREET IS PUNISHED BY FINE

Two young men of Ranger were arrested Thursday on a charge of breaking glass on a street pavement of the city. One pleaded guilty and was fined \$11.70, according to the police court records. The other man was released after an investigation. Special Deputy Sheriff Joe Calder made the arrests.

LEONARD WOOD REFUSES OFFER WITNESS SAYS

Declines Nomination, Claimed, When Late Boies Penrose Ties String to It.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Col. William Cooper Proctor, millionaire soap manufacturer, denied today before the senate oil investigating committee, that any oil deal offer had been made to Gen. Leonard Wood at the 1920 republican national convention. Previous witnesses have said that Wood turned down an offer by the late Jake Hamon of votes and money in return for the promise of appointment to the office of secretary of the interior if Wood was elected.

"I do not know anything about any such story," said Proctor, who was campaign manager for Leonard Wood.

The senate oil committee today heard a round-about story of alleged overtures said to have been made to General Leonard Wood by the late Senator Boies Penrose of Pennsylvania at the 1920 republican national convention.

According to the account, Penrose called Wood headquarters by telephone the night before the late President Harding was nominated and asked to know if Wood, if elected, would give Penrose the right to name three cabinet members. Although assured by one of his advisers that his consent would mean his election, General Wood refused to make any promises.

The story was told the committee by Pierre A. Harmon, a tax expert of Indianapolis, who said he obtained the account of the telephone conversation from James L. Nimrod of Moose Heart, Ill., who was a confidential worker in Wood's headquarters, and who claimed to have taken the message from Penrose at Wood's request.

Country Club Calls On Its Members To Turn Out For Work

There is some manual labor to be done at the new clubhouse of the Ranger Country club that can be done by club members, and so a "picnic," the second one of its kind, is planned. It was to be next Tuesday, but it will not come now until the following week because of the church revival services going on in Ranger.

The members will be put to work on the west wing to the main building and also on the south and north verandas. Contractor T. O. Bray and his men are now working on the roof construction and will probably get to the floor work next week.

CONDEMNED OUTLAW GOES TO ELECTRIC CHAIR IN CARELESSLY GAY MOOD

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 18.—"Diamond Joe" Sullivan, last of the southwest's notorious outlaws, went to his death in the electric chair today—Good Friday—without an outward sign of the "yellow streak" attributed to him by underworld associates. He walked to the chair with an air of gay carelessness and ease that astounded the spectators. He maintained his calm and unconcerned attitude as the adjustments were made and until the switch was turned on. At 5:36 a bolt of electricity 2,350 volts strong was sent through his body and he paid the penalty for a career of crime and banditry extending over the last decade.

PREMIERS OF FRANCE AND BELGIUM SOON TO CONFER

PARIS, April 18.—Premier Poincaré has planned to confer with Premier Theunis of Belgium on the reparations question, it was reported today, following approval of the experts' report by the reparations commission. The premiers will discuss the question of relinquishing Franco-Belgian economic control of the Ruhr and control of the railroad in the Ruhr.

SAFE BLOWER KILLED IN BATTLE WITH POLICEMAN

WICHITA, Kan., April 18.—An unidentified safe blower was killed and F. L. Jenkins, a policeman at Augusta, Kan., was seriously wounded in a battle early this morning when the officer caught the bandit in the act of robbing a filling station.

Widow and Three Children Die When Fire Destroys Home

COPEVILLE, Texas, April 18.—Mrs. William McStadden, widow, and three children were burned to death today in a fire which destroyed their small frame cottage. Auburn McStadden, 14, a son of the widow, was the only member of the family to escape the flames. He called neighbors, who made vain efforts to rescue the woman and her children. The bodies of the victims were removed from the ruins later by volunteer fire fighters of this little Collin county town.

The dead, beside Mrs. McStadden, are: Eliene, aged 16; Lockett, 15, and Hussie, 10.

JACK KEARNS GETS TOO GAY GOES TO JAIL

Dempsey's Manager Defies Police in Los Angeles and Loses the Fight.

LOS ANGELES, April 18.—Jack Kearns, internationally known boxing promoter and manager of the heavyweight champion, Jack Dempsey, was lodged in the city jail here today on a charge of being drunk and disorderly.

Kearns was arrested shortly before 7 a. m. at Sixth and Flower streets. He was sitting in an automobile with five other men. The officer, in reporting the arrest, said that when they accosted the party they were answered with oaths and threats. The patrolmen attempted to arrest the sextette, whereupon Kearns, emulating his protege, is alleged to have set upon them, using some of Dempsey's choice upercuts and passes, and it took two policemen to subdue him, they said.

In the machine a quart bottle partially filled with whiskey was found, police said. Kearns was brought to the city jail and will not be admitted to bail until the customary five hours have passed, it was declared.

Automobile Dealers Determine To Give Less Liberal Terms

FORT WORTH, April 18.—The sale of automobiles to people unable to afford them was scored in an address to the Texas automobile dealers convention here today by J. N. Mitchell of Waco. "Some dealers are spoiling the automobile industry by extending long-time terms to buyers," he declared.

Following Mitchell's speech, the convention adopted resolutions condemning the giving of terms to purchasers of automobiles more liberal than one-third of the purchase price down and the balance in 12 monthly payments.

PROPOSAL FOR U. S. TO ENTER WORLD COURT TO HAVE CONSIDERATION

WASHINGTON, April 18.—The senate foreign relations committee today appointed a special sub-committee to hold hearings on the proposal of the late President Harding that the United States should participate in the World court.

This was the first action taken by the committee since the proposal was submitted to congress by Mr. Harding long before he died.

AUSTIN, April 18.—The railroad commission, by unanimous consent, voted to positively refuse any suggestion to the interstate commerce commission in the matter of the proposed Gulf Coast-I-G. N. railroad merger, thereby overruling the motion of San Antonio interests opposing the consolidation of the two lines.

BEAUMONT.—The Eastern Texas Electric company has just honored 29 trainmen employed on city and interurban cars for perfect records during 1923. R. W. Stanford, who led the list, has operated as motor-man between Beaumont and Port Arthur during the year to a total of 146,000 miles without an accident.

DALLAS, April 18.—The Rev. John Quincy Adams' little flock of worshippers waited faithfully today for the joint return of their pastor and Jesus Christ, as promised by the former.

The Holy Roller pastor left this city last Monday in a flivver after collecting enough money from his devoted congregation to finance his return in company with the Lord on Easter Day. He is not expected until Sunday and his congregation is declared to have faith in him and confidently expects his return with the Redeemer of the world.

The grand jury of Dallas county is reported to be looking for the Rev. John Quincy Adams following a complaint of welfare workers that members of his colony are in deep poverty and suffering great distress. One of the leaders, Mrs. Conkle, said today she was confident the Holy Roller would return on schedule. Mrs. Conkle is a widow with six children. She said to have sold all her worldly possessions and given the money to the Rev. John Quincy Adams to finance the return of Jesus Christ.

Welfare workers said that most of the little flock of worshippers had sold all they had, some having little to dispose of and others having much larger holdings, and that all were penniless and suffering. The Pentecostal leader, they said, had "rolled" his parishioners for at least \$5,000. They are looking for him to come back and feel sure he will be able to explain everything to the grand jury.

NEED FOR REVIVALS.

"Revive us again" sang the sweet singer of Israel, and history tells us that while he was a mighty king and a loyal, devoted worshiper of God, he was prone to depart frequently from the straight and narrow path and needed constant reviving.

Ezra gave thanks for the mercy "to give us a reviving to set up the House of God. Isaiah preached revivals. "Your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions," said Joel. The apostles exhorted to revivals. Revivals have been needed, revivals have taken place since man first peopled the earth, and revivals will continue.

Revivals stand for progress. Without revivals the world would retrograde. They keep up strength, they support courage, they back up the nerve to dare, which is where the conquerer begins. They might be likened to the "daily dozen" generally continued no longer than the usual practice of these body building exercises. Because forgotten for a season after brief periods of practice, they are more necessary, for when revivals are continued day after day the seeker after righteousness becomes a true disciple of God, just as body building exercises continued daily, without ceasing, give strength to the muscles and keep the body strong. It is the intervals when God is forgotten or at least not kept in mind, that makes revivals imperative, just as any suspension of the "daily dozen," always because of laziness or illness, makes the muscles flabby so that the body begins to suffer and a revival of health building exercises is demanded.

When life flows along an even keel, without any serious worries and free from troublesome perplexities it is easy to forget God. Sometimes when the clouds are dark, those who are lacking in the patience and faith of Job may think they have been forgotten by God. Both are needing revival, for the former are forgetting their duty to God and the latter are forgetting to trust in Him.

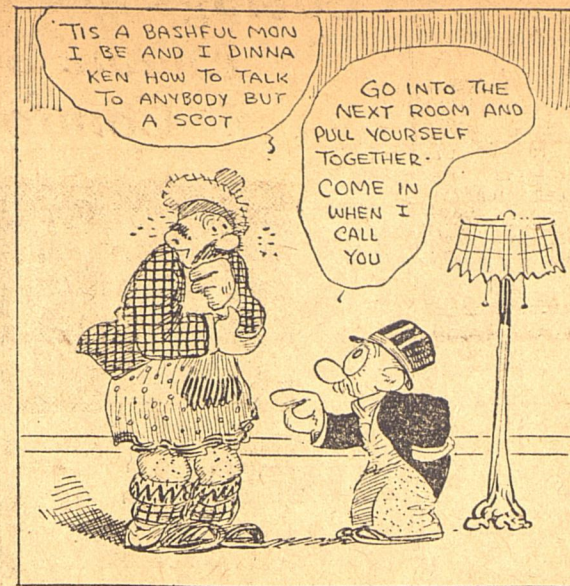
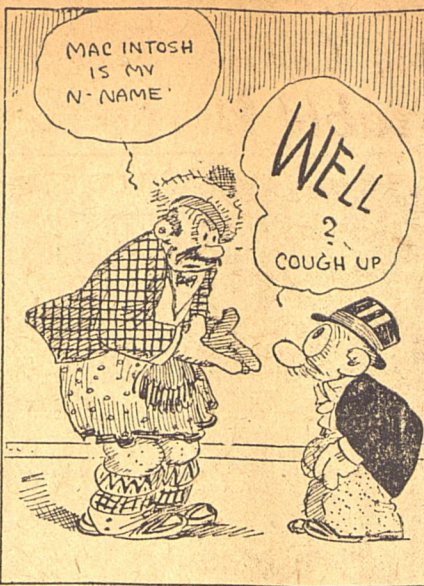
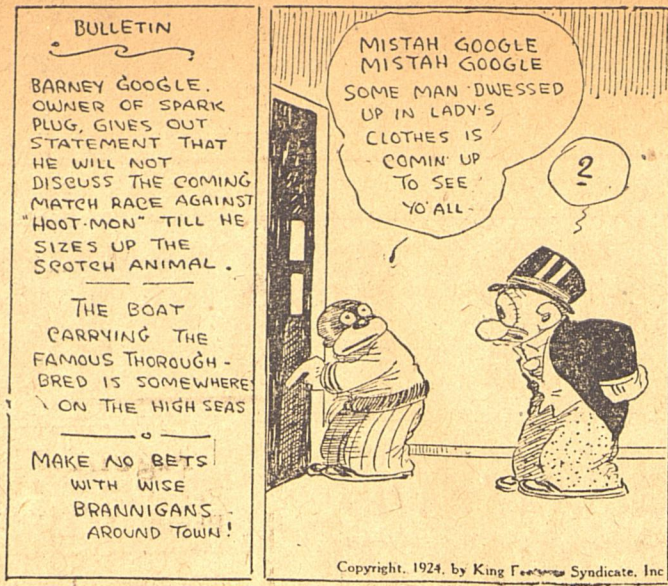
So far as history shows, the Jews first worshipped God and the earliest Jewish records, even before the writing of the Mosaic law, show the Jews practiced tithing. It may at times have been confused with taxes, but true tithing, which is voluntary giving, was preached by and prescribed for the Jews. Perhaps there was a good reason for this, for those pioneers in the worship were pretty wise sort of folks and did not urge tithing just to be in fashion.

Tithing does this: it keeps the mind on God. The tithing is given as a duty to God, or in token of loyalty, perhaps because of just a little fear, or, better than all, because of love for the Christ who redeemed the world. Whatever induces tithing does not affect its value as a constant reminder of God, or Christ, of the pledge taken to serve and of the necessity to keep the pledge. It induces prayer, for who better than God can help to raise the tithing; it encourages continued service, it provides a reason to walk with God and a topic to discuss with God.

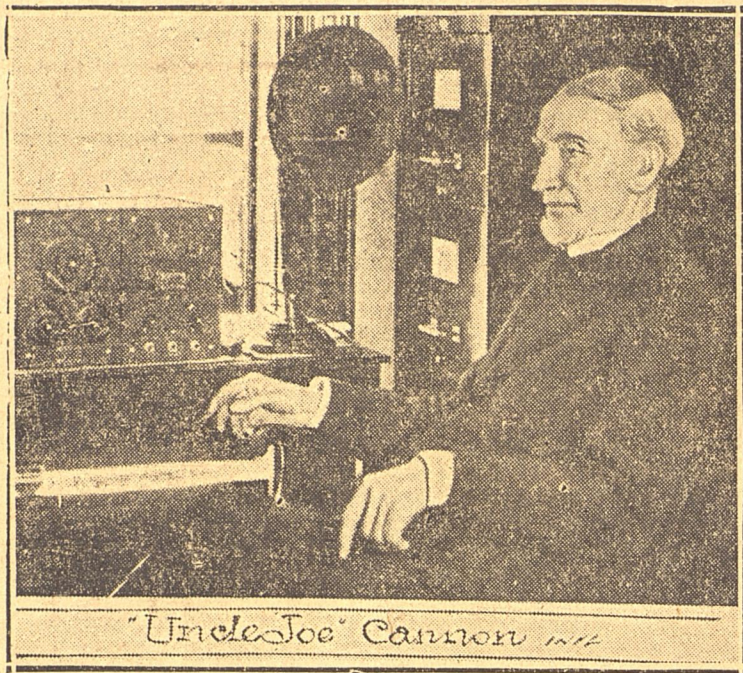
Revivals lead or should lead to tithing; tithing is in part like a continued revival. The one leads the heart to God, the other fastens the mind to God. Revivals enable the spirit to climb, tithing fixes the spirit in the higher levels. When they go together the progress is certain and continued, but the one without the other lacks the stamina to continue constant or the faith to run the race.

Bryan or some other leader said the whole world, since the last war, needed a revival more than anything else. But first of all, there must be revivals in the communities, for it is there all progress must begin. "Revive us again" and "teach us to pray, and doubt not," then give to God an adequate share of the increase and prosperity and contentment are certain.

Plenty Of Bleachers Promised At Republican National Convention

CLEVELAND, April. —The local convention, has planned to care for 50,000 others in a novel way. A series of bleachers, which will accommodate 50,000 persons, will be erected around the great auditorium, and the speeches before the convention will be carried outside the building through hundreds of "loud speaker" reproducers. Delicate recording instruments will be placed around the speakers' platform in the hall, so that whatever is said may be clearly reproduced for the thousands surrounding in the auditorium. For the first time in history the speeches before the convention also will be broadcast. A powerful radio station will be in constant operation during the convention. It is not believed that the practically certain nomination of Calvin Coolidge will detract either from the interest or the attendance. A vast

number of Republicans, local party leaders say, have had their fighting blood aroused by the oil scandals, and will attend to show their party loyalty, if nothing else. Then, too, a number will be attracted by the hope of fireworks between the regulars and the progressives over the platform.

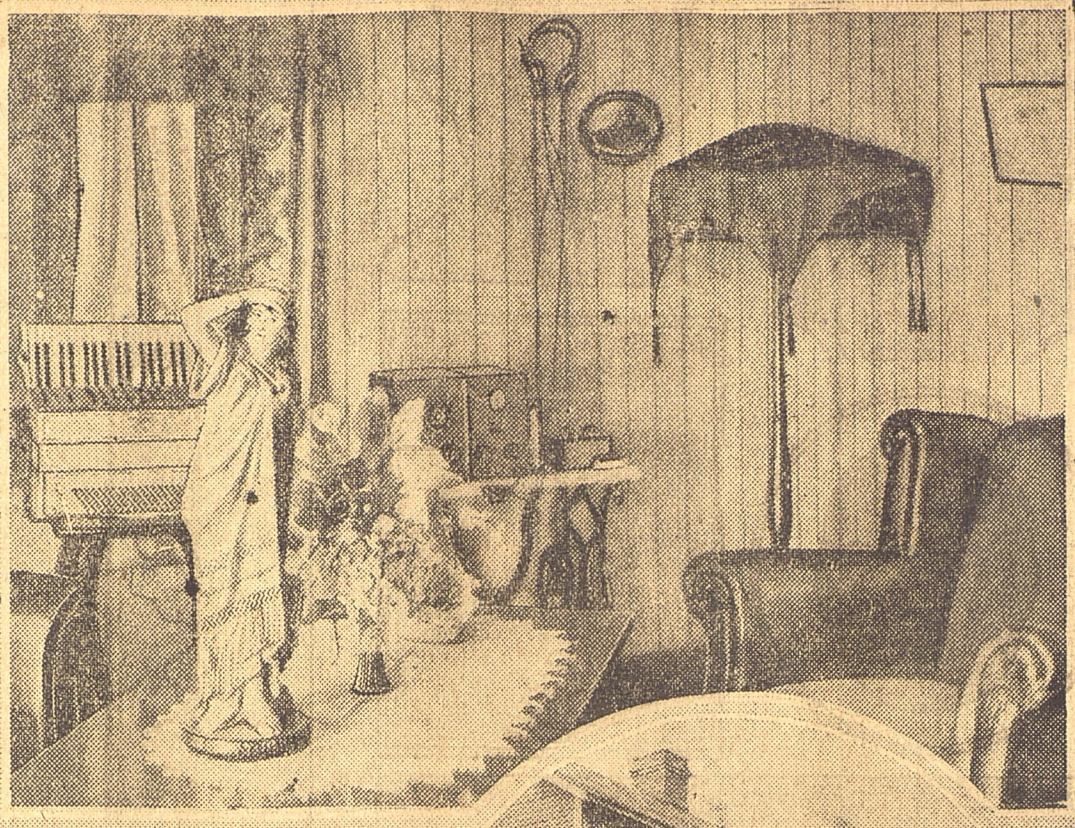

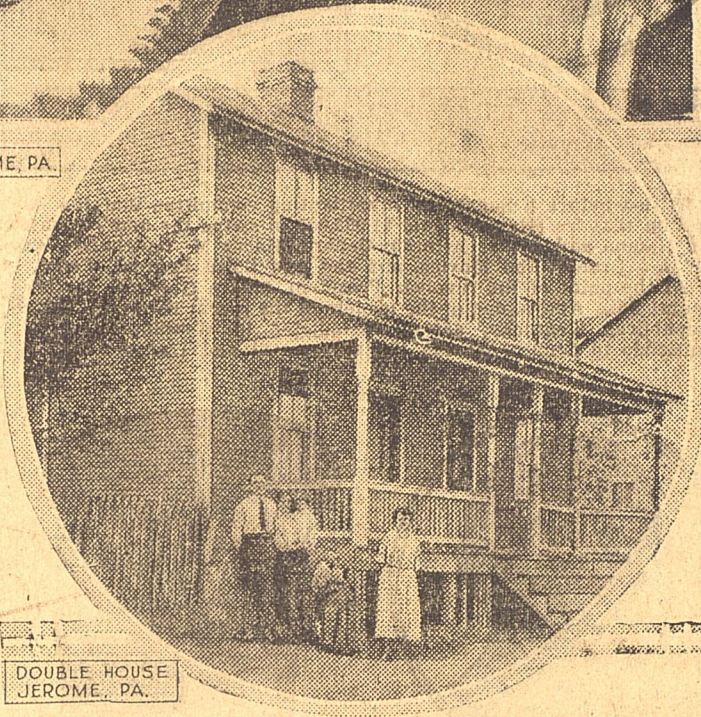

Savings in Rent and Other Necessities Enable Soft Coal Miners To Afford Comfortable Homes and Motor Cars

The above pictures show a typical home of a soft coal miner. They answer the often asked question "What kind of houses do miners live in?"

Jerome, Pa., with a population of 1,200, where the views shown here were taken, is, according to Bituminous Operators' Special Committee investigators, "a company town of uniform houses, painted a warm blue gray. The houses are of good construction and set on a hillside not too precipitous for comfort."

Bituminous coal operators long ago saw the wisdom of fostering pride in the upkeep of their homes among their employes. Radio sets, musical instruments, well chosen books and magazines are the rule rather than the exception in soft coal miners' homes—and miners' wives are encouraged to maintain scrupulous order and cleanliness within the house and out.

It is to the advantage of all concerned, the operators point out, for the miners to have as well appointed and even luxurious home surroundings as possible. Soft coal miners are more fortunate than most other trades, in that they have to pay only a nominal amount for such necessities of life as rent, doctor's care, light and heat.

Comfortable four-room houses at Jerome, for example, rent for \$8.00 a month. The operators make a small charge for electricity and coal supplied to miners' homes often at less than the cost of production. Doctor and hospital charges vary from \$.75 a month for a single man to \$1.50 a month for a married man—and this includes all expenses in-

cident to illness, however protracted it may be.

Miners, their wives and children have to pay only ten cents to see movies which show in cities for dollar prices and more, another saving in a matter which has come to be regarded nowadays as a necessity rather than a luxury. Nearly every mining camp boasts at least one moving picture theatre.

These savings enable miners in the soft coal fields of the country—and coal is mined in thirty States—to buy expensive automobiles, house furnishings and the like while still maintaining a comfortable balance at the savings bank.

The soft coal miners of one Colorado company collectively own automobiles valued at a little less than

\$1,000,000. In an adjacent community, investigators report that 2,257 families living at the mines own no less than 1,123 machines—just a shade less than one automobile for each miner's family. Sunday motor trips to nearby larger towns have come to be regarded as a regular occurrence.

Education of miners' children is amply provided for by the operators. Modern high-grade schools and well paid thoroughly trained teachers are to be found in the present mining community.

Sewing circles for the women, club-houses for the men, illustrated lectures and Saturday night dances shared by both sexes, make for healthful community spirit and the upkeep of happy, comfortable homes.

MEMORY LATE JOHN C. TOWNES TO BE HONORED

AUSTIN, April 18.—Plans are being made by the faculty of the law school of the University of Texas and by others to honor the memory of the late Judge John C. Townes with a memorial program on April 20, and eventually by the establishment of a \$100,000 library for legal research to be known as the Townes Memorial library. The following men compose the committee in charge of the program: R. H. Baker and Roland Barlow of the Baptist church and Dean H. Y. Benedict, Dean G. C. Butte, Judge C. S. Potts and Dean Spurgeon Bell of the university faculty.

The Rev. A. L. Aulick, pastor of the Baptist church will preside, and the following addresses will be made: "Judge Townes as a Lawyer," Frank Andrews, Houston; "Judge Townes as Dean and Teacher," Judge Joseph C. Hutcheson, Jr. of Houston; "Judge Townes as a Citizen," Attorney General Keeling, of Austin; "Judge Townes as a Christian," Judge O. S. Lattimore, of Austin.

Al Jennings, reformed train robber, testified before a Senatorial investigating committee that the late Jake Hamon, Oklahoma oil magnate, told him that he (Hamon) paid \$1,000,000 to swing the nomination of the late President Harding. The city beautiful committee expects to put on a paint-up campaign in the near future and already some of the merchants have offered to make reduced prices on paints to be used for that purpose.

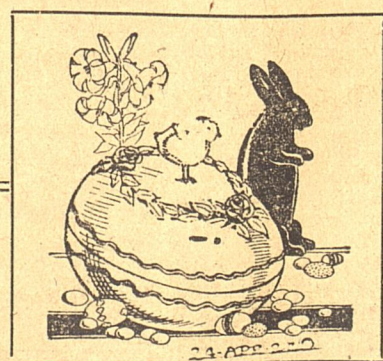
The various committees of the Chamber of Commerce are busily engaged in working out plans for the betterment of Eastland and are meeting with much encouragement from the people.

HARDY EXPLORERS PENETRATING UNKNOWN SECTIONS OF ALASKA TO DETERMINE ITS RESOURCES

The department of the interior was advised early in March by Dr. Philip S. Smith, head of the geological survey party that is exploring naval petroleum reserve No. 4 in northern Alaska that he and his party of a dozen or more men and 149 Eskimo dogs, had made their "hop-off" from the last outpost of civilization and would for the next five months be entirely on their own resources and beyond communication.

Naval petroleum reserve No. 4 includes a great area of some 35,000 square miles in the extreme northwestern part of North America, in one of the most inaccessible parts of Alaska. Last year the geological survey explored its coastal part and found enough evidence of the presence of oil to justify its further survey. The inland part of the reserve can be reached only by a winter journey, and this expedition is therefore now on its way.

Dr. Smith is a geologist and an experienced Alaskan explorer. The party includes another geologist, Dr. J. B. Bertie, and two engineers, R. K. Lynt and Gerald Fitzgerald. All three of these men were selected because of their proved ability to endure hardships met in traversing an unknown region and to combat the rigors of an Arctic winter.

The region to be explored lies north of the Arctic mountain system, a series of high ranges that stretch athwart northern Alaska. South of these ranges lie the drainage basins of the great Yukon and Kuskowim rivers, where vegetation is abundant and there are tillable and pasture lands, so that the country is an area of settlement by white men. The winters are cold but not so severe as to forbid habitation, and the growing season of 70 to 100 days permits many food crops to ripen.

Real Polar Section.
The country north of the Arctic mountains is the only truly polar part of the United States, comprising less than 20 per cent of the total area of Alaska. In polar Alaska there are less than 40 days in the year without killing frost; all timber is absent, and such vegetation as can grow is stunted. In sheltered places back from the coast the traveler will find low willows, but in much of the region not even these are available for fuel. Unless the explorers find coal or residue from petroleum seepages, their cooking must be done with kerosene, which must form a part of their heavy equipment, just as it does for explorers who cross the Arctic ice caps.

ploration from the well-known photographs of Arctic expeditions crossing the ice pack, with its irregular hummocky surface, but most of the land in the Arctic region is relatively smooth. Dr. Smith starts with five tons of supplies and four canoes to be transported some 400 miles from Nenana, on the Alaska railroad, across the Arctic mountains into the upper waters of the Colville, a mighty river that flows northward to the Polar sea. This journey, it is expected, will be made in less than two months, and the party will probably reach Coiville river in April. They will then have about two months of good sledding to explore the south end of the petroleum reserve. On reaching the field of work the party will be subdivided into two,

in order to cover as much ground as possible in the time available.

This long journey to the field of operations is the most difficult part of the explorers' work. Their freight will be dragged by 90 dogs. As each dog eats two pounds of dried salmon a day, the supplying of dog food is not the least of their tasks. In addition to the dogs of the freight team, 50 more will be used for the technical party.

To Trace Unknown Rivers.
Before the June thaw comes the dogs and sleds will take the back trail to their starting point, and with them will go all the men but the eight or 10 who form the two exploration parties. When the rivers thaw these parties will launch their canoes and

trace the course of two of the largest rivers to the Polar sea.

This journey is not made for adventure, but for geological and topographic surveys to obtain definite information about the presence or absence of great oil fields in this distant region. All the details of equipment and personnel have been planned with great care by members of the geological survey who have had long years of experience in Alaska. The provisions have been carefully chosen, but experience has shown that the most suitable food is that used by Alaskans themselves in their arduous journeys. Practically all of the provisions and much of the equipment have been obtained in Alaska. Only the canoes were carried into the country. They are of

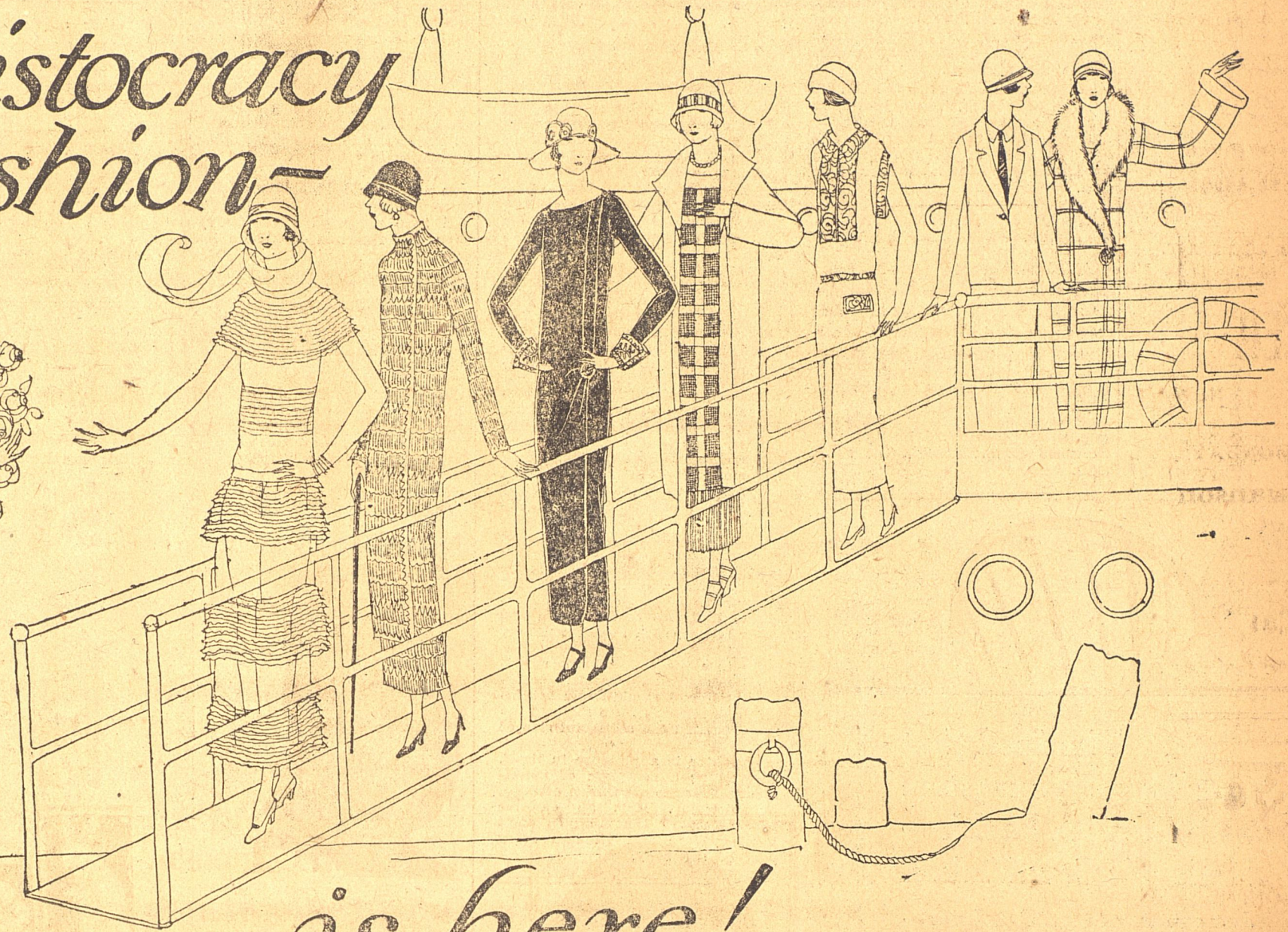
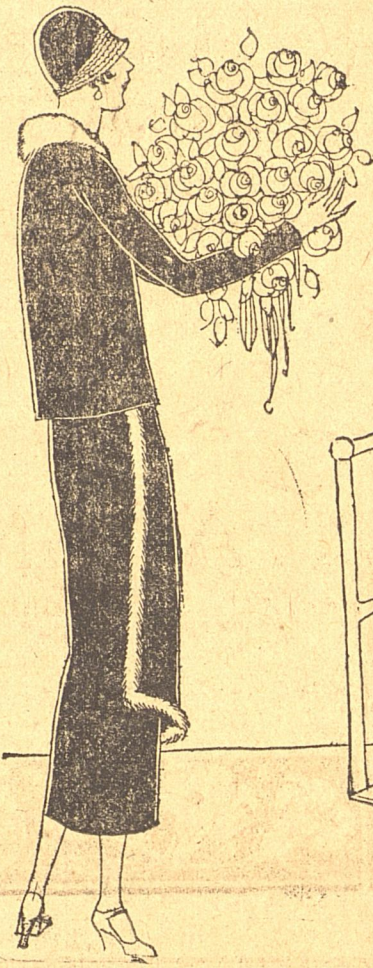
the Petersboro type and were built in Canada according to specifications long ago adopted by the geological survey.
In this northern region there is much coal and probably at least some petroleum. Of other resources, the extensive reindeer pastures are perhaps the most valuable. The wild reindeer or caribou are also sources of food, but the members of an exploration party can not afford to depend on game for food, although they will gladly take such as comes their way. To rely on hunting is likely to retard progress and prevent the party from carrying out systematic plans for surveys. The explorer who has a definite task to perform can leave nothing to chance; if he does his main purpose may be frustrated and he will have to return with only a picturesque account of wild adventure.

Dr. Smith and his colleagues will not only be able to determine much of the possible oil resources of this northwest end of America, but will explore the largest unknown area in Alaska.

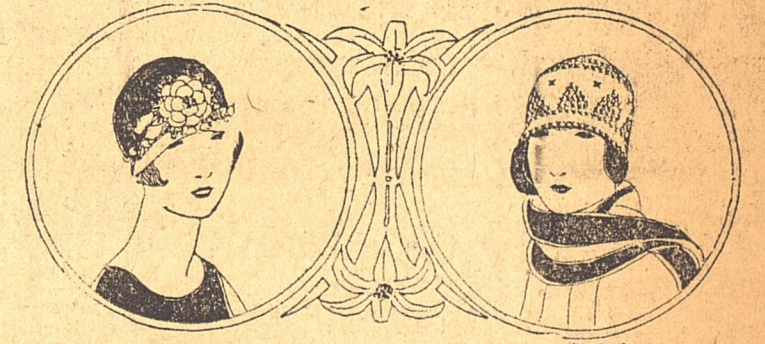

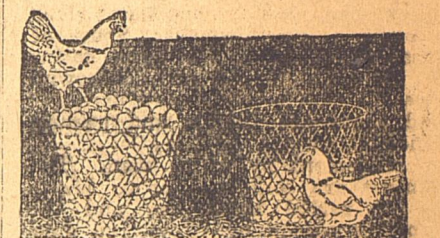

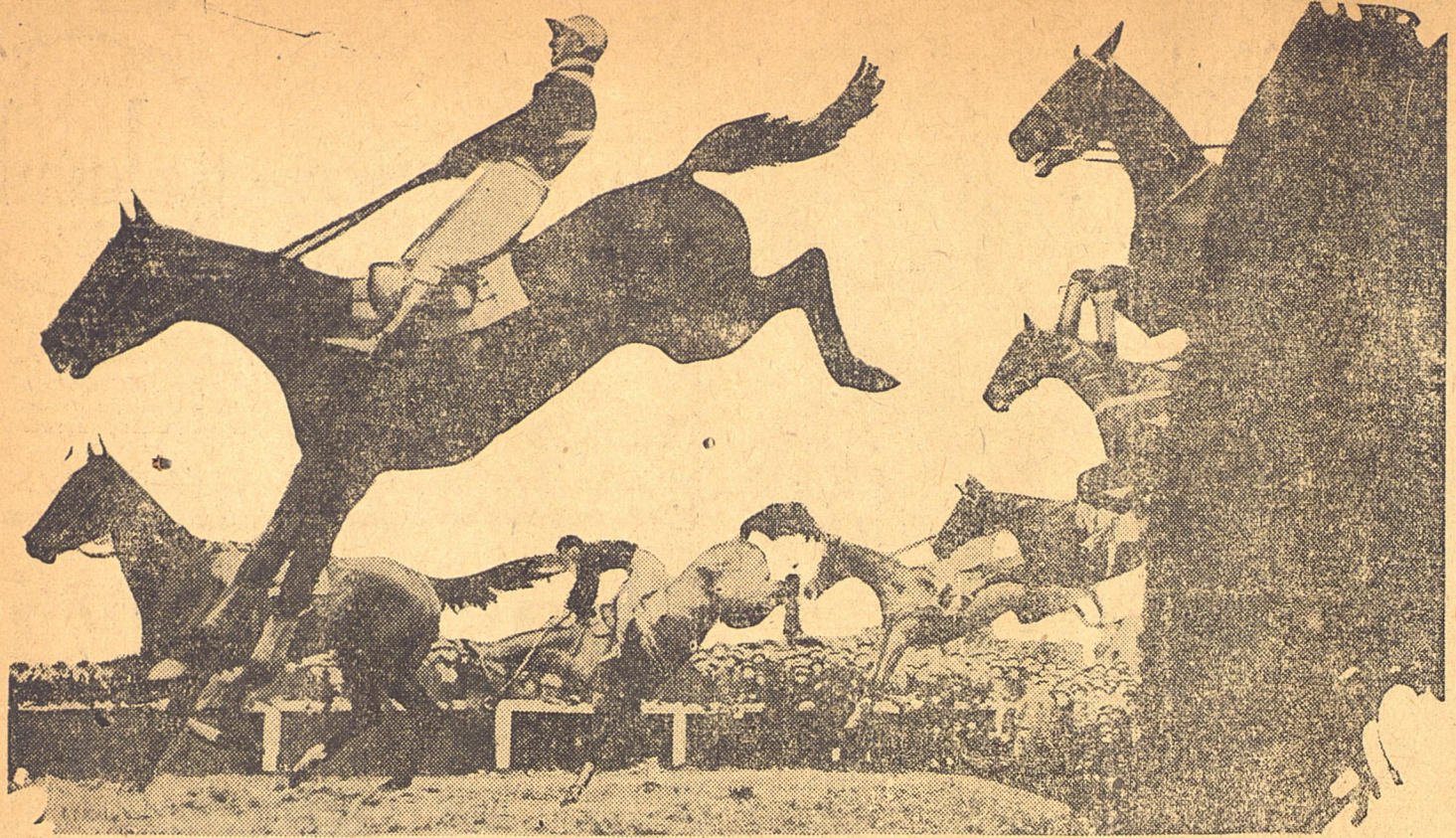

Robertson has had plenty of experience, both as an Olympic athlete and as a teacher of athletics and a trainer at the University of Pennsylvania. He knew from that experience that his most important job was to curb the athletes who knew their jobs and teach the ones who had something to learn. Some writers in recent weeks, who lean to the belief that all is lost for the American team that goes to Paris next summer, have been lamenting about the failure of veteran track and field men to follow sensational

form in the big indoor meets of the past season.

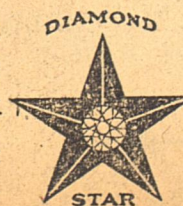


