

money. With this method of banking it is possible for credits to be indefinitely expended. Speculators Raid People.

"In the early summer of 1920 the money speculators and big business interests saw an opportunity to make a raid upon the American public in a financial way. The federal reserve banks immediately called their loans from the local banks and refused to make more. The bottom fell out of prices of livestock and farm products and labor was reduced accordingly. The federal reserve system refused to take care of the situation; in fact, the directors of the federal reserve bank board assisted in immediate deflation instead of going about it in a gradual manner.

"This resulted in the practical bankruptcy of all of the farmers and stockmen and a severe handicap was placed upon the laborer and small business. Liberty bonds which had been bought by the general public at one hundred cents on the dollar were forced on the market and the speculators bought them as low as 85 cents.

Within six months after liberty bonds had been forced to such low levels they had practically all been bought from the small holders and cornered by the bond speculators. They then rose at from 86 cents to \$1.03 and have since been maintained around that figure.

"Thus more than five hundred million dollars were wrung from the purses of the stockman, farmer and laboring classes and small business men, because it was they who purchased so liberally of liberty bonds a great many times borrowing the money at 10 per cent interest in order that they might do their part in winning the war. # REPUBLICAN LEADERS BEGIN

Blame Congress to Bolster Coolidge, Uphold Lodge to Embarrass Hughes.

Special WASHINGTON, May 22 .- In addition to the propaganda recetly under-taken to make President Coolidge appear better than his party, there is also an active campaign to give him prestige by destroying the repute on the republican congress. These lat-est tactics in the president's behalf are explained as due to the consciousness of his political managers that it is necessary not only to sunder him from former official associates who from former official associates who have been stained by recent scandals but to acquit him also of responsi-bility for the failure of congress to enact the program which big special

enact the program which big special interests have been furthering. This plan of blaming congress for the delay and defeat of certain legis-lation which these special interests want, as well as for the passage of other measures to which they object-ed has been encouraged if not inspir-ed by the spectrement of these neuron ed by the spokesmen of these power-ful groups. At a recent meeting of bankers in New York one of them coupled bolshevism and congress as twin menaces. Elbert H. Gray, chair-man of the board of the U. S. Steel corporation, previously had declar-ed that the worst thing in the coun-try is "the American congress." The Literary Digest, one of the most persistent and partisan of the propa-gandists for the "Mellon plan" is now conducting an assault on congress, presumably in pursuance of the new

presumably in pursuance of the new purpose to salvage the president at the expense of his republican co-partners in the legislative branch. Voice of the Interests. The Literary Digest sought the views of many persons regarding the "breakdown" of congress, taking care that the bankers and mouth-pieces of the special interests should care that the bankers and mouth-pieces of the special interests should be heard first. It is inferred from the opinions of many of these critics of the republican congress that the rejection of the "Mellon plan" and the investigation of the scandals in the very household of the adminis-tration worm the abief acues of their tration were the chief causes of their grievance, and that if Secretary Mel-lon's scheme of taxation had been adopted and there had been no ex posures of cabinet officers there would now be praise instead of cen-

It is this sort of strategy by which the candidacy of President Coolidge is being promoted. Even republican

eaders are being sacrificed to make the election safe for Mr. Coolidge. The republican campaign is thus takng the form of a crusade for the personal advancement of the prtsi-lent, without reference to the conse-uences to individual republican canidates. It is for that reason, Washngton observers believe, that the present officials of the republican ational committee are being retired n favor of Mr. Coolidge's own riends and managers. Support for Lodge.

Members of the coterie that has een bossing the republican national committee will be glad, democrats committee will be glad, democrats believe, that Senator Lodge has pro-posed a substitute for the world court. They will rejoice, it is felt, not only because Senator Lodge's scheme is likely to prevent action on the pending proposal but also be-cause it embarrasses Secretary Hughes by its implication of improv-ing on his plan of American partici-pation. These bosses of the national com

These bosses of the national comnittee have an old grudge against Secretary Hughes. They remember

with chagrin and indignation that he forced them to recall a statement they issued a year ago concerning the foreign debt, and that he won President Harding and subsequently President Coolidge to advocacy of he world court in the face of their
