FOUR WEST TEXAS CITIES ARE BECKONING

RUNNING MATE FOR COOLIDGE YET IN DOUBT

To Him Expected to Fall Bulk of Campaigning; Daugherty May Be Inimicable.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—President Coolidge's running mate will have to conduct most of the republican presidential campaign this year it is predicted by the political observers in Washington. To him, it is believed, will fall the task of touring the country and making the big speeches to gatherings of voters in different parts of the country.

Republican newspapers have reported that Mr. Coolidge is to leave the white house for only a few political journeys during the campaign. It is planned also, according to these reports, that he will use the radio in addressing the electorate. It is for these reasons that the selection of a vice presidential candidate is likely to give the republican leaders a good deal of worry.

It is admitted among official and unofficial republicans that President Coolidge's personality is not a political asset. He has been pictured in the "movies" in nearly every city and hamlet without stirring spectators to enthusiasm. It is felt that his personal appearance on the hustings would bring hardly more response.

Must Do Campaigning.
The vice presidential candidate will have to supply these defects in Mr. Coolidge, it is commented. To do that he will have to be a man of more than average physical and intellectual attractiveness, and a good orator. These at least are the qualifications that seem indispensable in the circumstances likely to exist.

There is much speculation in Washington as to the purpose for which former Attorney General Daugherty's friends and followers are making so great a show of solidarity. This demonstration of force on their part seems to be in keeping with some definite plan not understood outside of the circle it concerns.

One guess is that Daugherty and his cohorts are to remain in cohesion and co-operation throughout the campaign and afterwards to share the credit and control that will come from republican victory, but particularly to recover their hold on the party should President Coolidge be defeated and relegated. A republican president is regarded by the practical politicians of his party as a mere incident. With them the organization is the thing that matters. The president can not create an organization that they liking, but an organization can make a president to their taste.

Daugherty Is Working.
What prompts this guesswork about Daugherty's intentions is the recent movement among his former associates to glorify him. High officials of the department of justice have been conspicuous in this undertaking. One of them has been making speeches extolling his virtues. He still has powerful friends in the republican national committee. These include Chairman Adams and Secretary Lockwood, who have been exploiting as well as defending him in their semi-official organ, the National Republican.

An outstanding instance of this campaign for the rehabilitation of Daugherty and the retention of his place in the inner circles of the republican organization was the circulation of the speech he delivered at the big banquet given in his honor at Columbus, Ohio. It is reported that this has been broadcast to the rural press in the form of "boiler plate." The National Republican used liberal extracts from the speech and it was "released" to the daily newspapers.

It is not deemed probable that Daugherty will fight Mr. Coolidge in Ohio or elsewhere next November, but there is reason to believe that the president's reputation would not grieve the former attorney general or his adherents. In fact, that result would be explained by them as a consequence of his attempt to humiliate Daugherty.

KENT COUNTY VISITED BY HAIL AND WIND STORM

CLAIREMONT, Texas, May 14.—A second hail and windstorm within 24 hours visited this section last night, causing much damage to the buildings and crops. Wires are down and communication with the devastated country is almost impossible. At Jayton, lightning struck the schoolhouse, which caught fire and burned to the ground. Other buildings were also damaged by the hail. Loss to buildings alone is estimated at \$100,000.

Proved Shallow Oil Area To South of Ranger Is Extended

PAY SAND IS ENCOUNTERED AT 1172 FEET

Well on Fox Tract Having 450-Barrel Daily Flow Starts More Active Leasing.

The Williamson Bros. No. 1, located on the Fox tract, seven miles south of Ranger and one mile east of the Panhandle field, and the Texas High-tower, came in late Tuesday with an estimated 450 barrels. Pay sand was struck at a depth of 1172 and the well started flowing by heads at 1174.

This well is being watched with considerable interest by the oil men of Ranger as approximately a mile and a half of new territory between producing territory is opened up. There are a number of prominent oil men from Fort Worth and other towns who are showing considerable interest in the well, and the surrounding territory. Considerable activity has been going on in leasing and a number of new wells will be started immediately.

Several of Ranger's leading oil men, including John M. Gholson, Mills Davenport and G. D. Chastain, and a number of Eastland men, including W. F. Barton and Dr. W. J. Simmons, have interests in this new shallow area and have been watching the progress of the well with much interest. The pool is about seven miles south of Ranger and about nine miles east of Eastland.

KARL E. JONES RESIGNS HIS OFFICE HERE

Gives Up Secretaryship Retail Merchants Association to Enter Other Business.

The board of directors of the Ranger Retail Merchants' association, meeting this morning, accepted the resignation of Secretary Karl E. Jones, effective May 15, and arranged for Mrs. G. B. True to continue in charge of the office for the present. Mr. Jones has made new business connections which will take him away from Ranger, and he expects to get away in a few days.

Board members took turns in expressing appreciation of the work Mr. Jones has done for the organization since he took charge of it about two years ago. Each had something to say in praise of the retiring secretary and all expressed regret that he was leaving.

Mr. Jones came to Ranger in 1919 in connection with the sale of oil supplies, later taking up auditing and then becoming connected with the Retail Merchants' association. He and Mrs. Jones have been leaders in social circles and Mr. Jones has been an ardent civic worker. He is a Rotarian. He has been instrumental in many of the progressive movements in this city and will be missed by his friends and associates. Under his direction, the Retail Merchants' association has flourished. In a matter of Texas collections alone, the Ranger association has a record of beating all other points in the state this year. The credit reporting records have been maintained at a high level.

RECEIVERS OF T. & P. RAILWAY ARE DISCHARGED

Order of Federal Court Effective May 15; Future Looks Very Promising.

DALLAS, May 14.—President Lancaster of the Texas & Pacific announces that an order has been entered by the United States district court for the western district of Louisiana, discharging the receivers of the Texas & Pacific railway company, effective May 15, when the administration of the property again becomes invested in the board of directors and officers of the company.

The executive officers of the company are: William H. Williams, of New York, chairman of the board; J. L. Lancaster, Dallas, president; Finley J. Shepard, New York, vice president; Kingdon Gould, New York, vice president; O. B. Huntsman, New York, vice president; J. B. Payne, Dallas, vice president; J. A. Somerville, Dallas, vice president; C. W. Veitch, New York, secretary and treasurer; A. L. Ewing, Dallas, assistant treasurer; M. D. Cloyd, Dallas, assistant secretary; T. J. Freeman, New Orleans, general solicitor.

Mr. Payne, formerly traffic manager, will be in charge of traffic; Mr. Somerville, formerly general manager, will have charge of the operating department.

President Lancaster will maintain offices in both New Orleans and Dallas, and O. B. Webb and M. D. Cloyd have been appointed assistants to the president. Mr. Webb to reside in New Orleans, Mr. Cloyd in Dallas.

JACK KEARNS FACES SERIOUS CHARGES BY WOMAN IN CALIFORNIA

LOS ANGELES, May 14.—Jack Kearns, manager for Jack Dempsey, today was facing charges by Mrs. Frances Marie Emerson filed with district attorney Asa Keyes. Numerous witnesses were examined by Keyes today to determine whether warrants would be issued for either of the two men.

Mrs. Emerson said that Kearns caressed her and that she became unconscious after drinking mineral water, and that when she regained her senses, her clothing was disarrayed. Kearns was not in the room when she regained consciousness, she said.

BAPTISTS OF SOUTH MEETING IN ATLANTA

Annual Southern Baptist Convention Attended by About 7,500 Delegates.

ATLANTA, Ga., May 14.—The Rev. Dr. George W. McDaniel of Richmond, Va., today was elected president of the Southern Baptist convention.

Delegates here are said to favor the United States entering the League of Nations, while they are opposed to a change in the national prohibition laws.

ATLANTA, Ga., May 14.—Approximately 7,500 delegates representing 17 southern states and the District of Columbia, today began the first session of the annual Southern Baptist convention.

The convention, which is expected to last through next Saturday, bids fair to be one of the most important in the history of the Southern Baptist church.

Aside from the election of a president, made necessary by the resignation of Dr. E. Y. Mullins, of Louisville, Ky., now completing his third year in that capacity, many matters of importance will come up. Among them are:

1. Completion during 1924 of the \$75,000,000 campaign for missions. The campaign, which was started with the idea of gaining the goal in five years, has only until Dec. 31 to run. A balance of \$26,500,000 is needed.

2. Authorization of a new forward program to be started as soon as the present fund is raised.

3. Closer correlation of agencies of the convention by reorganization of some of the boards.

4. Proposal to again take over the George Washington university in Washington for operation as a Baptist institution.

5. Proposal to take over the Southwestern Baptist Theological seminary at Fort Worth, Texas, as property of the convention.

The opening sermon of the convention was preached by Dr. Finley F. Gibson of Louisville, Keynoting the aims of the convention.

MANY TEXANS ATTENDING SOUTHERN BAPTIST MEETING

FORT WORTH, May 14.—Many members of the Southern Baptist church in Texas were expected in Atlanta, Ga., today for the opening session of that body at the annual convention. Particular attention is being paid to this year's assembly by all churches of the south because of the extensive program before the meeting.

Among the most important matters to be brought up for consideration will be the completion of the \$75,000,000 campaign, the proposed reorganization of several boards, the reclaiming of George Washington University at Washington, and the taking over of the Southwestern Baptist Theological seminary at Fort Worth.

SHRINERS DETERMINED LIQUOR SHALL NOT MAR COMING CONVENTION

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 14.—One hundred federal prohibition agents were concentrated in Kansas City in preparation for the suppression of liquor traffic during the Shrine convention early in June. Fred O. Wood, chairman of the Shrine executive committee, asked the federal officials to send the additional agents into this territory to open the campaign against the liquor traffic. Large quantities of liquor reported to have been brought in for the convention will be destroyed.

RACE OF SEVEN CANDIDATES IS NECK AND NECK

Aspirants to Texas Governor's Office All Running Well as Near Home Stretch.

DALLAS, May 14.—While the democratic convention may be somewhat over-shadowing the Texas gubernatorial race, the candidates for governor have by no means let up in their stumping. With a weather eye on Waco, they have all been giving the eastern portion of the state daily planks from their platforms.

A hitherto stable horse was shot into the race Saturday at Kerens, when Jim Ferguson thundered out in his well known style. Mr. Ferguson came to Dallas just a few weeks prior to his campaign after chicken feed and stated that he was waiting for his hens to lay before he could open. With his entrance, only two candidates are remaining idle, T. D. Barton and H. L. Darwin.

Lynch Davidson, the Houston candidate, repeatedly pointing out himself as the leading candidate and, offering as proof, the fact that all other candidates in the race have attacked him without mentioning each other, has been in the heart of East Texas. For the past week he has somewhat turned aside from his denunciation of blocs and cliques, and what he terms socialism in the farm labor platform, to his plans for reforestation.

W. E. Pope has been hot after him and has challenged him for a debate, the loser to drop out of the race. Lynch replied in an interview to the effect that he considered the challenge only political trickery toward a feared man.

V. W. Davidson has been joining T. A. Collins in loudly denouncing the bloc and Felix Robertson as its exponent. Collins has been stating that he is connected with no clique or bloc, while Whit Davidson has been turning his fire on Lynch in protection of his farm labor platform trusts.

Joe Burkett has been "lone wolfing" it, and pointing out Whit as being run by the labor unions, Lynch, a "business" man, and Robertson, a Ku Klux Klan candidate.

"Can't and Can" candidates have developed in one instance. Lynch Davidson says he can save the state \$10,000,000 biennially, and Collins says taxes cannot be reduced.

Senator Wheeler Is Cleared Of Charges By His Colleagues

WASHINGTON, May 14.—"Not guilty" is the verdict that will be returned by a committee of his colleagues investigating the charges against Senator Wheeler of Montana of misusing his office, it was learned today.

The report exonerating Wheeler is ready today to be submitted to the senate. Action on the report by the senate is understood to be unnecessary in the event the charges against Wheeler are found to lack grounds for impeachment.

"None Shall Pass" Says Blanton About Treasury Raiders

Thomas L. Blanton, member of congress from Texas, the district that includes Eastland county, has been watchful of the national treasury and has brought tons of abuse (if abuse might be weighed on a scale) upon his head. Recently he had a slight bout with Congressman Hammer of North Carolina in a house committee room. Honors in the ring were reported even, but evidently the Washington newspapers were not entirely fair to the Texas congressman, who today wired this newspaper as follows:

Washington, D. C., May 14, 1924.—Washington dispatch eighth concerning Hammer's attack very unjust. Local newspapers attempted to force through committee without proper hearing, an outrageous unwarranted appropriation of \$44,000,000 to dam Potomac river for greedy Washingtonians who have already obtained \$215,000,000 from federal treasury for civic purposes wholly. I stood in their way.

Hammer is six feet, three inches tall, and weighs 275 pounds. If physical fighting becomes absolutely necessary to stop these continual raids, then my services are volunteered. None shall pass without vigorous protest. Thus far I have been able to hold my own in a parliamentary way, physically and otherwise. Signed: THOMAS L. BLANTON.

LOVE REPORTED TO HAVE TRADED TO HELP McADOO

Will He Support Klan Candidate for Governor? Seeks to Control Convention.

DALLAS, May 14.—Thomas B. Love was silent today regarding reports that he would seek to put the Texas state democratic machine behind the candidacy of Felix D. Robertson, klan candidate for governor, in return for klan support for William G. McAdoo, who seeks the instructed vote of Texas' 40 delegates to the democratic national convention.

According to the report Love agreed to support Robertson before the precinct primaries in return for McAdoo support. Together with Cato Sells of Fort Worth, Marshall Hicks of San Antonio and Tom Ball of Houston, Love will probably control the state democratic convention. It is confidently believed that all of his associates in the leadership are neither klansmen, nor friendly to it—possibly none of them is, but apparently he is regarded as the directly responsible for the program to be carried out.

It is claimed that Love will insist upon the election as delegates at large of: Cato Sells and W. A. Hanger of Fort Worth, Frank Wozniak and W. D. Thornton of Dallas, Tom Ball of Houston, Marshall Hicks of San Antonio and R. E. Thomason of El Paso.

Officers Of Ranger Country Club To Be Chosen Tomorrow

There will be a meeting of all members of the Ranger Country club at 7:30 tomorrow night in the green room of the Gholson hotel to elect officers for the coming year and to consider plans for the completion of the clubhouse. It is urged that every member be present as matters of the greatest importance will be taken up and decided at this time.

The main room of the clubhouse is now finished except for the placing of the windows and doors and the laying of the floor. Contract has been let on this work and it will be completed in the near future.

The building committee has, to date, carried on the work practically unaided but in order to insure the successful completion of the undertaking all members must co-operate, at least to the extent of being present at tomorrow night's meeting.

UNDERWOOD TO DEMAND SHOWDOWN ON KLAN ISSUE

WASHINGTON, May 14.—Senator Oscar Underwood will demand a showdown at the democratic national convention on the party's stand towards the Ku Klux Klan, it was announced by his manager, C. C. Carlin. Underwood forces, according to Carlin, will demand that the convention insert in the democratic platform the plank adopted by the 1850 convention opposing the know-nothing party.

C. C. WALSH OF SAN ANGELO TO BE PRESIDENT

He Is Elected by West Texas Chamber of Commerce Delegates in Convention.

BROWNWOOD, May 14.—Col. C. C. Walsh of San Angelo today was elected president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for the ensuing year.

BROWNWOOD, May 14.—Election of president and secretary and the selection of the 1925 convention city are among the chief matters of interest to the thousands of delegates here in attendance on the annual session of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. These matters do not interfere with the work of the convention, but they are pertinent issues that have aroused the campaigning spirit and delegates are looking forward to a lively session when they will come up for consideration and disposition.

El Paso, far west, wants the convention; so does Amarillo in the northwest, and Vernon in the southeastern edge and Mineral Wells, near the eastern center of the district. Mineral Wells and Amarillo are making the most demonstrative fight, but delegates from El Paso and Vernon are not inactive.

Voting Regulations.
President Spencer has submitted the following regulations with regard to voting:

1. Each town affiliated with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and in good standing on Jan. 1, 1924, shall be permitted to cast the total vote of that town as appears on the books of the organization up to May 10. But each city contesting for the next convention shall have the right to have its vote tabulated and voted as it exists upon arrival in Brownwood. Such a vote shall be one vote for each paid membership.

2. The vote of each town shall be cast by a representative of that town who shall be selected by a caucus of the representatives of the town provided that the vote shall be cast by a representative on the floor of the convention.

3. A town may split its vote any way it may decide. For instance, a town having 40 votes may give 10 votes to each of the four contesting cities, and may do likewise in election of officers.

4. There shall be no voting by proxy.
5. A majority vote is necessary for a decision, but on ordinary matters voting shall be viva voce, with the right to a roll call.
6. In voting for the next convention city a blackboard shall be erected on the platform and as each town votes the same shall be chalked up on the board.

7. In case of any contest the official records of the organization shall be binding.

Interest in Proceedings
Much interest has been shown in the proceedings of the convention. The addresser have had close listeners and have made some splendid forecasts of West Texas progress based on the developed, developing and undeveloped resources.

The enterprising features of the convention have been most enjoyable. People are here from every part of West Texas and from many other parts of Texas. A number of visitors from outside states are also enjoying and profiting from the occasion.

The ball tonight, when the king and queen will be introduced, and will be attended by a great array of West Texas duchesses and maids of honor, is expected to be one of the big features of the whole convention.

Delegations rolled in here today in larger numbers than ever, although a rainstorm last night kept some away, muddy roads being feared.

Three Men Nominated
Nominees for president are: R. Q. Lee, of Cisco, railroad man, banker and oil producer; Col. C. C. Walsh of San Angelo, banker and capitalist; W. W. Rix, of Big Spring, head of a chain of furniture stores in West Texas.

The name of Colonel Walsh of San Angelo as candidate for president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce was submitted in a brief nomination speech by Alex. Collins, also of San Angelo. The name of Mr. Rix of Big Spring was submitted in nomination speech by B. Reagan of San Marcos, formerly postmaster at Big Spring. A. J. Anderson, secretary of the Snyder Chamber of Commerce, made the nomination speech in which the name of R. Q. Lee of Cisco was submitted.

A. M. Boardland of Vernon, stockman, banker and county commissioner of Wilbarger county, was nominated for vice president by R. H. Nichols, president of the Vernon Chamber of Commerce. (Continued on Page Two.)

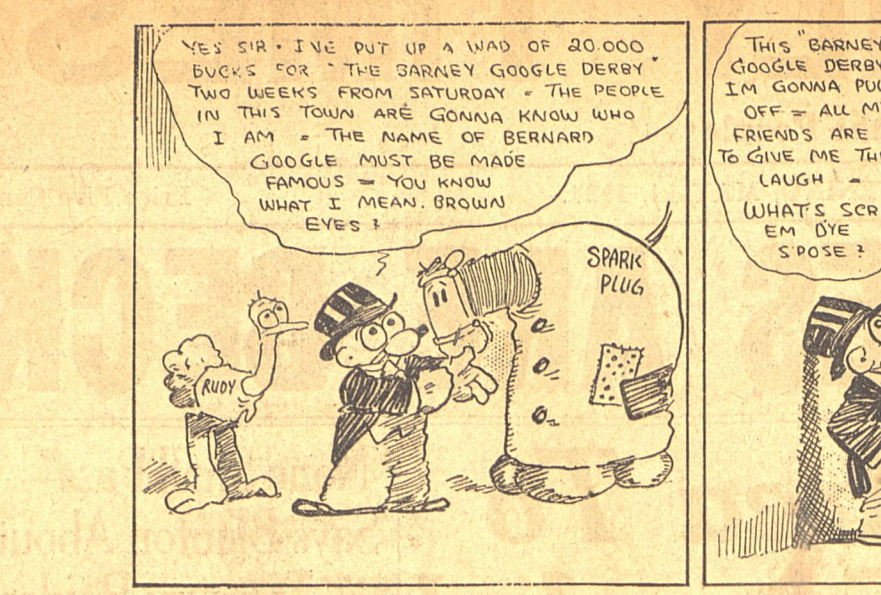

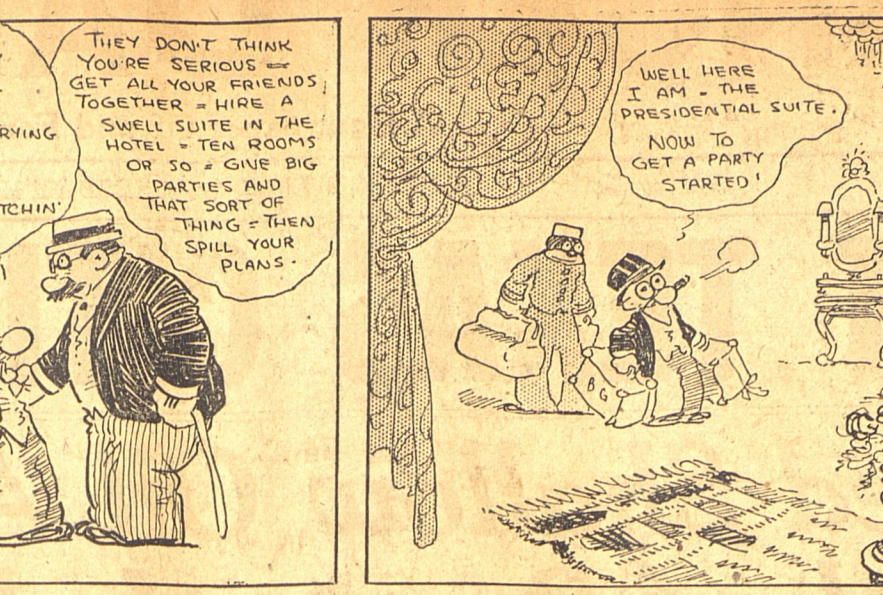

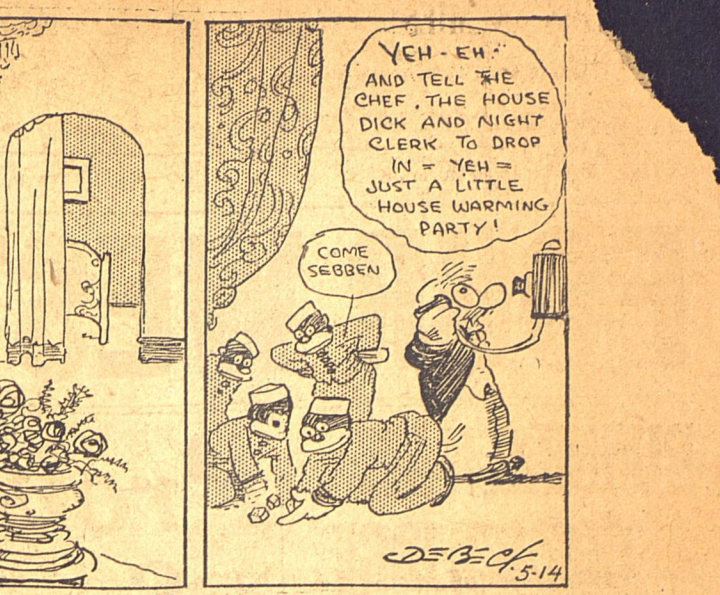

GERMANY'S WARSHIPS, SUNK FIVE YEARS AGO BENEATH THE WAVES, TO BE RECOVERED FOR JUNK

LONDON, May 14.—The biggest ship-salvaging job ever known is being attempted in the northeast Scotland—by raising of the interned German fleet, scuttled at Scapa Flow by Admiral Von Reuter in June, 1919.

The hulks of 68 war craft—once prides of the German fleet—have been rusting for more than four years, a tangle of junk, at the bottom of Scapa Flow. They were sunk simultaneously by their caretakers. They went down, dramatically, in a bunch, and they are jumbled together in 20 fathoms of water—and an English marine engineering concern has tackled the herculean job of getting them up.

Unprecedented engineering devices will be used in this job—a scheme of plugged up all holes in the biggest sunken battleships, pumping out the water, blowing them full of air, like a balloon, causing them to float. Eight or nine years will be required to clear Scapa Flow completely of the self-sunk German fleet. Within a year, however, the pivotal part of the job will probably be finished—that is the "raising by inflation" of the two largest ships. These, when brought to the surface, will be used as floating docks, upon which to place huge derricks to haul up the smaller ships.

And then the junk that was von Reuter's fleet—a fleet that committed suicide after surrender—will be sold for scrap and melted up and made into machinery and possibly some of the metal may find its way into ploughshares—and possibly into the fittings of newer British fighting craft.

The biggest ships of the fleet are the Hindenburg and the Seidlitz, 27,000-ton battle cruisers, famous during the war. There were 74 vessels interned at Scapa Flow, including 13 cruisers and 60 destroyers. Of this fleet, 68 were scuttled by the Germans, most sinking in 20 fathoms of water.

The salvaging firm has built a huge floating dock about 400 feet long for use in the first stage of the operations. This will be moored above the scuttled fleet, and divers, using it as a base, will concentrate on the first job of locating every one of the many holes the Germans bored in the ships in order to sink them. DALLAS, May 14.—John Richardson, negro, was jailed here today for safe keeping. He was brought here from Denton by deputies following his admitted assault of a white girl at Lewisville, Monday. Three other negroes held in connection with the case were released after Richardson made his confession.

RAIN SOUTH OF CARBON STOPS RUSH TO BROWNWOOD

A number of people who started from here to Brownwood this morning in automobiles were forced to abandon the trip and return to Eastland after reaching a point south of Carbon because of the heavy rains that fell in that section last night.

SWOLLEN RIVERS IN PENNSYLVANIA RECEDING

PITTSBURG, May 14.—The swollen waters of the Allegheny and Mononahela rivers today were slowly receding, leaving in their wake property damage estimated in the millions.

FIVE ESCAPED PRISONERS ARE STILL AT LARGE

M'ALESTER, Okla., May 14.—Five prisoners who broke away from the state penitentiary brickyard here yesterday were still at liberty early today, according to Warden W. S. Key. Nine men made the break, according to Key. Four prisoners, including Bill Tate and Arthur Henderson, life timers for murder, and two others, serving burglary sentences, were back in their cells to lay after a few hours of liberty.

GIRLS' TRAINING SCHOOL HAS FEWER ERRANT GIRLS

AUSTIN, May 14.—The number of errant girls in Texas is decreasing, according to a report by Dr. Carrie Weaver Smith, superintendent of the state girls' training school at Gainesville. There are only 52 girls in the school now as compared with 75 several months ago, Dr. Smith reported to the state board of control.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—President Coolidge is preparing a message to congress on the bonus bill it was said at the white house today. CHICAGO, May 14.—Anna "B" does not propose to let political success keep her from what she claims is the natural career of women—matrimony. She is 21, blonde and pretty and has the distinction of being a delegate at large from Tennessee to the republican national convention. She is the daughter of Ben W. Loper, chairman of the United States railroad labor board, and former governor of Tennessee. To her father, whose secretary she is, she is Anna "B."

IMPRISONED MINERS RESCUED UNHARMED BY HORRIBLE EXPERIENCE

GILMAN, Colo., May 14.—Seventy-eight hours of imprisonment on a 1900-foot level of the Empire Zinc company black iron mine here, came to an end for five miners last night when Elmer Anderson struck a grimace-covered, unshaven face through the opening blown by the final blast, cringed at an almost exhausted member of the rescue party and said, "Hello, Dad, here we are."

None of the five was injured and all reported that beyond some discomfort from the cold, they had suffered in the mine from imprisonment. Food and air were supplied by a pipe driven through to the prison room after a cave-in.

CITIZENS' FEDERAL RESEARCH BUREAU BEING ORGANIZED BY VANDERLIP AS FRAUD CHECK

 staff, hears reports and gives orders. He has a large staff, many of whom are working in various states. He is in constant personal touch with all of them. Lawyers are busily engaged in briefing cases that have been prepared and fully documented. Gradually he is perfecting an organization totally unlike any other ever organized in this country, and that will develop results which it is believed will assist materially in restoring conditions of normal honesty in government.

He recently augmented his staff by engaging a general counsel for the bureau, J. Weston Allen, former attorney general of Massachusetts and one of the most noted prosecutors in the United States. Mr. Allen selected as assistants Edwin H. Abbott, Jr., and Albert Hurwitz, both of Boston, who were his assistants in the prosecution of Ponzi, Thomas W. Lawson, the Middlesex and Suffolk county blackmail rings and other noted cases.

He has been frequently asked why he undertook the formation of the bureau and burdened himself with the work which will necessarily fall to his share. In an interview with the writer, Mr. Vanderlip summed the situation up with the following words:

"I believe there is room for a great service by an extra-governmental organization. My conception of the function of such a bureau is that it should confine its studies to departments and bureaus in the executive branches of the federal government, that its research should inquire into, first, the purpose, and second, the method of the department that is being investigated. The purpose of some of our government bureaus is either not clearly defined or wisely conceived. The method in many of them would be benefited by independent scrutiny. There may be, and frequently is, incompetence, which costs the people vastly more in taxes spent than would be the direct loss from any probable-corruption."

"Under normal conditions, I should think that 95 per cent of the work of such a bureau as this would be directed toward the study of, first, the purpose, and second, the competence or incompetence of management of the different bureaus."

"You cannot expect the executive side of the government to investigate itself. There can be no investigation by illy-equipped congressional committees that will be thorough-going unless these committees have some aid. The committees are never whole-hearted and they always lack means for thoroughness. Politics creep in, and the personal bias of the individuals engaged must be taken account of. I am convinced from long familiarity with the situation here in Washington, that an extra-governmental organization of the character of the citizens' federal research bureau can be of vast service."

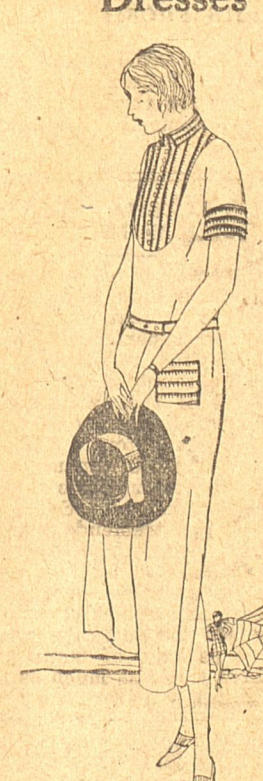
