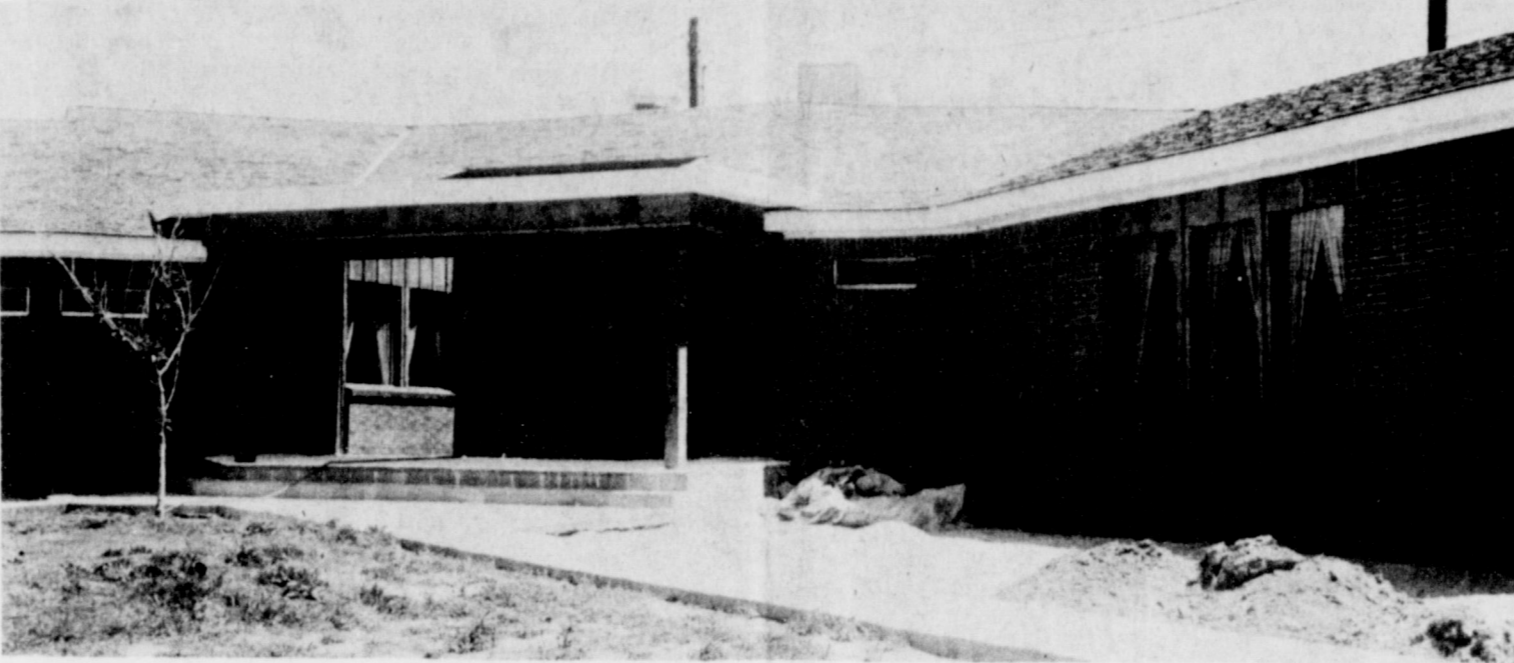
Judge Cihak In Explanation Of Judgement

"Evidence developed during the hearing showed that one of the youths had four previous misdemeanor convictions and that the other youth had five previous misdemeanor convictions."

Fourteen Area Tech Students Receive Degree

Among the more than 2,500 students who have applied for degrees at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, are fourteen area students who have been attending college in that city.

Originally, commencement exercises were slated to be held on Saturday, May 16, but the commencement was cancelled due to the devastating tornado which hit Lubbock last Monday night.

Included are Joe Bryan Jennings, Lazbuddie; Donald Bruce Little, Muleshoe and James Henry Pitts, Muleshoe, all College of Agricultural Sciences; Inez Edwards Bovell, Muleshoe, Lawrence Edwin Green, Muleshoe, Bettie Foster Sulser, Earth and Jerry Don Sanders, Springlake, College of Arts and Sciences; Dennis Ray Burrows and Roger Gene McGuire, both of Muleshoe, College of Business.

Quiet, Awed Voices Tell of Destruction

"I just can't describe it" ... "it reminds me of what an atomic bomb might have done" ... "newspapers and television cannot adequately show the horrors of it all" ... and "we were lucky that at least 10,000 people weren't killed" ... were just a few of the awed comments from persons who either were in the Lubbock tornado last Monday or went to Lubbock to help with search and rescue immediately following the disaster.

Monday night was perhaps an average night in the city of some 170,000 people. Scattered showers and some heavy hail stones had already hit scattered sections of the city which now resembles a scarred battlefield. Many Muleshoe residents, former residents and college students from this city were in the Hub center for various activities. No one particularly noticed the brewing storm as they went about their business.

Then shortly after 9:30 p.m., the wind hit and lights were extinguished. As the tornado dipped down just northeast of Texas Tech University campus, the long path of destruction began. University apartments with Muleshoe students inside were hit, as were homes of former Muleshoe residents, and the relatives of local people.

By the time the storm lifted back into the menacing clouds and moved out of the area, 21 persons were left dead or dying, hundreds injured and millions of dollars in damage to property and personal belongings littered the city.

Lubbock residents, with the aid of doctors, ambulances, nurses, police and civil defense workers from a wide area, began a massive cleanup.

Some of the local people who were in the path of the storm and their experiences are re-

lated below:
Edwin Cox, son of the Jim Coxes, lived in an apartment on Eighth Street in the heavily damaged area East of University Avenue. The U-shaped apartment complex was unroofed at the middle of the U. Edwin's good luck angel was on duty—his apartment was at the end of the U and Edwin was in Ruidoso on vacation. Dennis and Jane Burrows, who also live in Lubbock, accompanied him to Ruidoso. Except for minor damage, all three suffered no loss.

Hal Anderson, a Tech Student, felt he should notify his mother, Mrs. David Anderson, of his safety. Mrs. Anderson was in Houston with her daughter and family. Hal finally got a call through to her but he had to go to Shallowater to do it.

Johnny and Margie West lived at Villa Del Norte Apartments, 1913 Baylor Avenue. Johnny had just returned from playing baseball and was wearing baseball suit and tennis shoes. Margie had just returned from a meeting and neither had heard any weather reports. Their apartment, upstairs in a four-apartment complex, began to fall apart and they took shelter in an entrance hall which was about all that was left of their apartment when it was over.

By Tuesday morning the hot sun had warped their newly purchased furniture. Their clothes were a sodden mess. Their cars were, of course, badly damaged.

Mrs. John W. West, Johnny's mother, said it was about three Tuesday morning before they were able to get a call through to them and "it was kinda of a long night".

Mobile X-Ray Unit Here Wednesday

The Christmas Seal Mobile x-ray unit will be in Muleshoe on Wednesday, May 20. The x-ray unit will be located at Muleshoe High School from 7:30 a.m.-11 a.m. and on Main Street from 12-6 p.m.

The x-ray unit will be sponsored in Muleshoe by the Lions, Rotary and Jaycees and members from the organizations will be on hand assisting throughout the day.

The West Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association has begun a concentrated campaign to have as many citizens as possible x-rayed by the Christmas Seal Mobile Unit of the association during the month of May.

The chest x-ray program dis-

covers many abnormalities other than tuberculosis. In the past year, it has located emphysema cases, lung cysts, and cardio-vascular abnormalities.

The association bears the cost of having the film read and reported to each person in the survey. There is a fee of \$1.50 for the film and developing. A post card is mailed to those having a normal chest film. The one who have an abnormal reading are notified by a first-class letter which urges them to contact their private physician, or the local health officer for further examination.

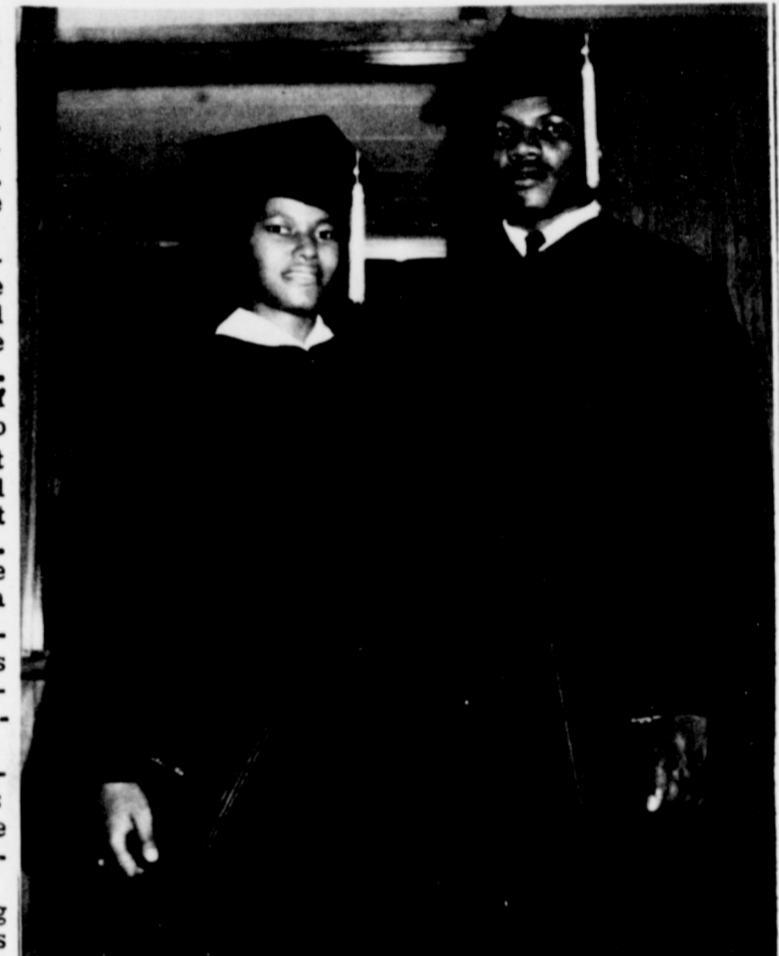

band, Mr. and Mrs. Steven Malory, live on 40th Street and suffered only minor damage.

The David Wyers live in Lubbock and their home was undamaged. They felt very fortunate because sometimes David works at night in the automobile technology shop at Estacado where he is the instructor. His shop and his office are adjacent at Estacado High School to Dan Bray, also a former Muleshoe resident (brother of Keith Bray and son of Mrs. J.W. Crim). Dan called him early Tuesday to tell him both their shops were demolished.

Gary Edwards was with his fiancée, Miss Terri Lynn Cowan, on Slide Road and York Avenue and they sat out the storm together. Gary's apartment was on Broadway in the fringe of the worst area and his apartment was hit by fallen poles, trees and other debris. Broken windows and a wet interior necessitated spending several nights with his uncle, Bill Pierson, but he felt lucky.

Larry Meyers and his roommate listened to the increasing tempo of the wind Monday in their Marlboro Apartment on 9th Street and finally when they saw trees whirling around jumped into Larry's car to outrun the storm. Very soon flying objects had flattened all four tires but they drove on. He considers his car a total ruin but realized fully that he is fortunate to be 'among those present'.

Larry said it was a strange feeling to line up for food from the Salvation Army but they were hungry and glad to get it.

Former Muleshoe mayor, Ray Keeling, who now lives in Littlefield, was among area persons caught in the Lubbock storm. He was driving into town on business and had just crossed the railroad tracks south of the mobile homes sales on University Avenue when a side glass suddenly exploded.

Keeling said, "as heavy as I am," he wasn't heavy enough, at the time, because the rear end of the new auto he was driving was lifted up and fish-tailed around. Then a large piece of tin hit the back of the

car, sailed over the top and hit the hood as the back edge of the tornado ripped through the Hub City.

Keeling said he looked across at all the unruffled buildings "And that's when I turned tail and came home," he said.

Herb Griffiths, with the Civil Air Patrol, went to Lubbock early Tuesday morning with a search and rescue group. He said it was hard to describe what he saw in the city, as he never saw anything like it before.

"It looks something like I have always thought an atomic bomb might do to a city. I couldn't believe the destruction I saw throughout the town. All the television photographs and all the newspaper words and pictures could never describe what I saw that day.

"From one end of the city to the other, it was incredible what damage had been done."

Joe Young, with the Texas Highway Patrol, stationed in Muleshoe, returned to his post in Muleshoe Thursday night after being stationed temporarily in Lubbock to assist officers there.

He felt the damage was underestimated and understated. As with most persons who viewed the massive path of the tornado, could not quite understand how why such extensive damage could be done with such a slight loss of life.

The THP officer spoke of the numbed people, who although they had been hit, and hit hard, were working as quickly as possible to rebuild the town.

Many other local residents or their families were caught in Texas' major tornado, but The Journal has no immediate information on their experiences.

People are honest when trust is placed in them by someone they admire.

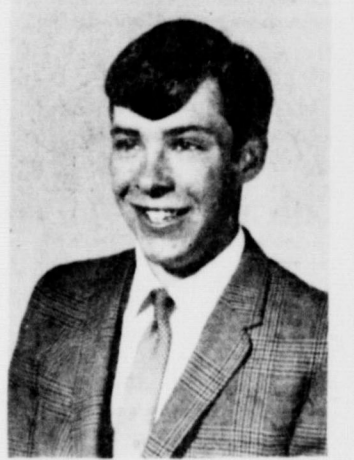
