"The delegates to the annual convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada in Vancouver last year drew money from the Ontario Provincial bank to purchase tickets in the office of the government-owned Canadian national railways, proceeded to the station in the cars of the Toronto transportation system, boarded a government-owned train, were carried on government-owned tracks on a government-owned right of way, were delivered at a government-owned park, and stopped at a government-owned hotel. Thence they were conveyed in a government-owned train to a government-owned dock, where they boarded a government-owned steamer for another government-owned dock."

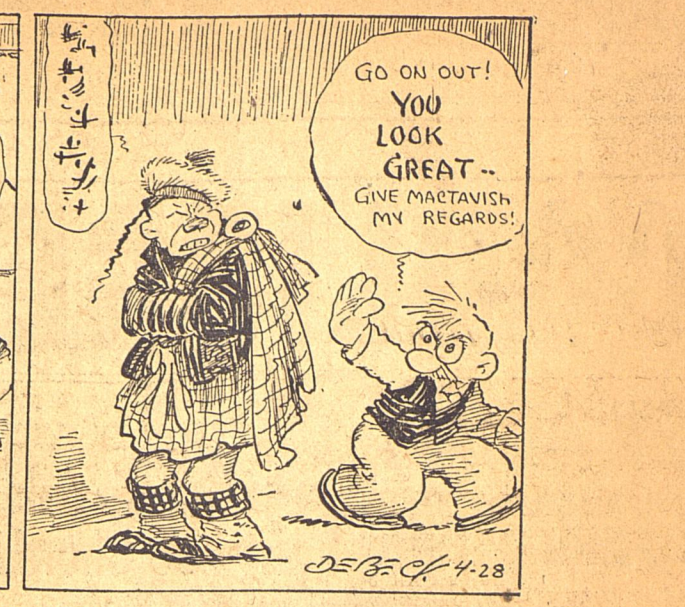
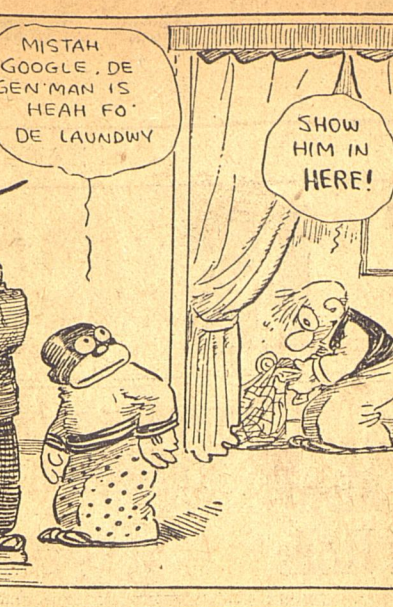
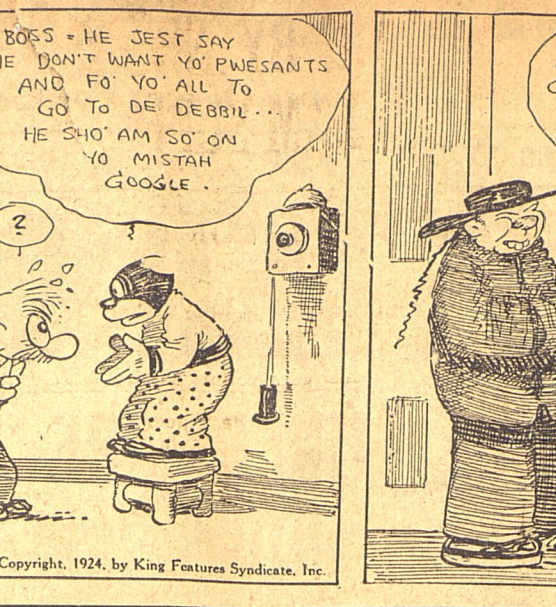
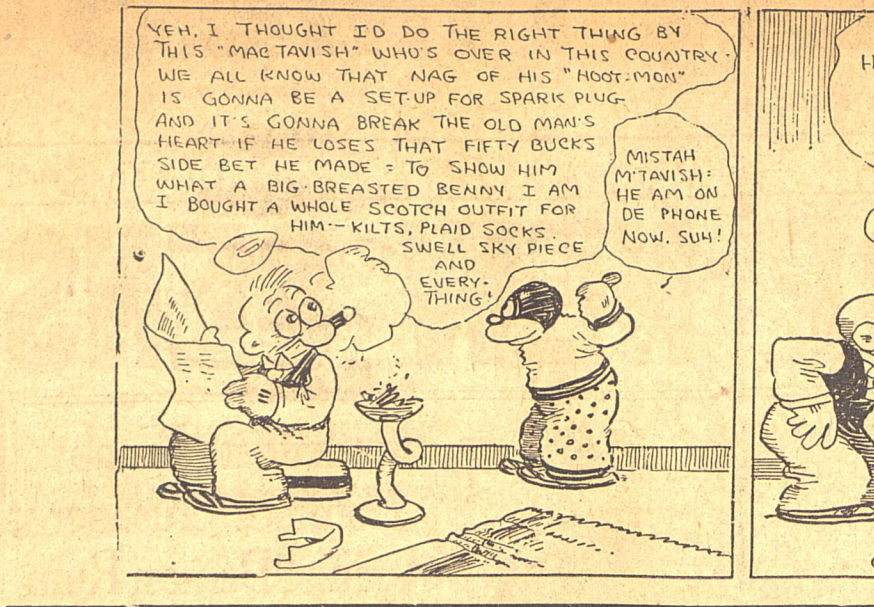

1,000-Barrel Gusher North of Caddo Is Arousing Interest

Critten & Lacy's No. 1 Cunningham, coming in as a 1,000-barrel gusher Thursday morning, was the occasion of a revival of interest in oil circles at Breckenridge, according to the Breckenridge Semi-Weekly News, which says also:

The oil pay was struck when the bit penetrated the line about 20 feet, blowing itself in as the sensational producer of the month in the entire Stephens county field.

North of Caddo. The Critten & Lacy No. 1 Cunningham is in the Tullos pool, and located five miles north of Caddo, which is said to be an extension of the Tullos proven territory.

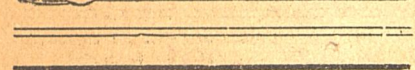

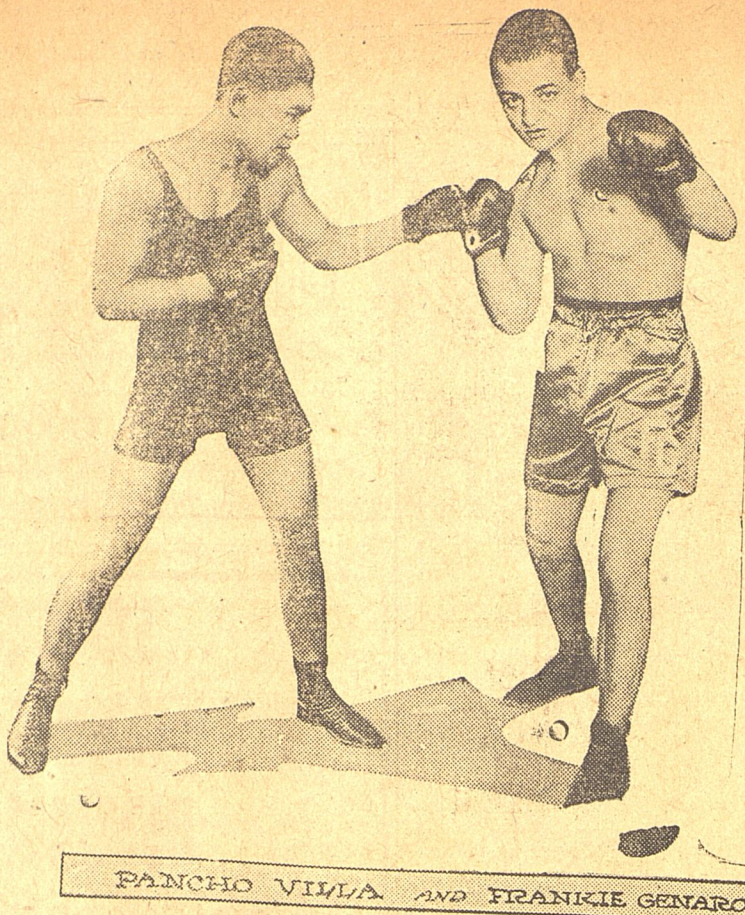

RULING THAT TENNIS STARS CAN'T WRITE FOR NEWSPAPERS HURTS HOPE OF AMERICAN OLYMPIC TEAM

NEW YORK, April 25.—America would run away with the Olympic tennis championship with a team composed of Bill Tilden, Winnie Richards, Dick Williams, Watson Washburn, Frank Hunter and the Kinsey brothers.

Hunter is a newspaper editor, and Tilden, Richards and the Kinseys are contributors to newspapers. Dick Williams, although it had not been announced officially, may resign from the team for the reason that he can't get away from business.

Unless the Olympic committee relents or unless the athletes who have been earning money with their typewriters give in, Uncle Sam will have a very weak tennis team at the games instead of a combination that would be invincible against anything in the world.

"Business reasons" may be a big handicap to the organization of the big Olympic team. Dick Landon, figured for a point or two in the high jump, has announced that he will not be a candidate for the team, and Joe Pearson, one of the best walkers in the country, will not seek a place on the team because he can't get away from his business.

Some day in the near future it is practically certain that the idea of the Swedes that athletes are entitled to be compensated for the time they lose from their business will not be frowned on now as such a terrible effort at the spirit of pure amateurism.

Effect of the ruling of the tennis association that players could not retain their amateur standing if they continue to write for compensation after Jan. 1, 1925, was eagerly awaited by the association from foreign countries. Australia was the first to register an impression and it was a very wise one.

OLD TEXAS LAW KEEPS MONEY OUT OF CIRCULATION

HOUSTON, April 28.—More than \$20,000 in currency and coin is lying in the vaults of one of the local banks, out of circulation and enmeshed in the legal wrappings of real estate, drawing no interest and benefiting no one.

The money, property of heirs whose cases have not been settled, cannot draw interest or be put to any useful purpose because a law passed in 1876 requires the district clerk to hold the "actual and identical money" entrusted with him until it is awarded to the inheritor at his coming majority.
