#### GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP IN CANADA.

Government ownership in Canada is growing apace. It would be difficult to illustrate it, however, much more graphically than was done the other day in James Simpson, secretary of the Labor Temple, Toronto, Oon., during an address in which he said:

"The delegates to the annual convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada in Vancouver last year drew money from the Ontario Provincial bank to purchase tickets in the office of the governmentowned Canadian national railways, proceeded to the station in the cars of the Toronto transportation system, boarded a government-owned train, were carried on government-owned tracks on a government-owned right of way, were delivered at a government-owned park, and stopped at a government-owned hotel. Thence they were conveyed in a governmentowned train to a government-owned dock, where they boarded a government-owned steamer for another government-owned dock."

#### LIVING EXPENSES.


Rich or poor, we all require the same amounts of food, fuel, and elothing. It is what we demand outside of the aforesaid, according to our desires for distraction and the demands of society in which we move (high rents in particular) which makes it hard for the one with a moderate income to make both ends

A New York accountant has kept track of living expenses for 27 years and presents the actual costs for two persons for the year 1914, and the same items for 1923.

The retail prices actually paid for food during 1914 amounted to \$243; the same items in 1923 cost him \$257. Soap, gas, coal and clothing ran the total up to about \$500 for each year. The rent item, however, amounted to more than the cost of food and clothing, making the total about \$1,000 for two people. 



LONDON, April 28.—One of the largest castles in England is for rent—for only \$40,000 per year—provided a "suitable tenant" can be found. London real estate men are specu-

lating just which American million-aire will qualify as the "suitable ten-ant"—their instinctive assumption seems to be that an American millionaire will certainly be the tenant. The specifications for suitability haven't been prescribed, but patently they are that the applicant must have no wolves hovering around his door, and must have the social graces that ought to go with the second biggest eastle in England.

This is Arundel Castle, property of the Duke of Norfolk, on an estate covering 1,245 acres, located fifty-five niles from London.

The Norfolk family is one of the richest in England. The present duke is only 16 years old. His mother, the Duchess of Norfolk, in charge or the family afairs, travels a great deal. She has a large and splendid town house in the herat of fashionable ondon, as well as various estates lsewhere. So Arundel Castle, sec-nd in size only to Windsor Castle, really isn't needed much by the Nor-folk family, and a "suitable tenant" may have it for a period of years. Although one of the largest Eng-

lish castles, Arundel is fairly new as things go over here. Parts of it are only a hundred or so years old, and here are some sections that have there are some sections that have actually been built or, at least, reconstructed in recent years. That's another reason, some say, why an American is apt to get the place—some touches of the new will make it more appealing to him, acording to the London real estate agent's theory.

## Independence Of Philippine Islands Moves Notch Ahead

WASHINGTON, April 26.—A bill ooking to the independence of the Philippine Islands was presented to the house insular affairs committee today by a sub-committee, which re-vised the original Cooper bill. The measure provides that the governor of the islands shall call a constitutional convention within 60 days after the bill becomes a law to enact onstitutional provisions to safeguard the Philippine bonds, prevent the new republic from placing any burden or igious or educational property, ex-pt as already provided, and ex-essly barring treaties with foreign parties which would impair its in ependence.

Also that after the constitutional pefore independence has been estab-ablished, the United States must conclude treaties with Great Britain, France, Italy, Germany, Japan Holland, the Netherlands, Spain, Portugal and China guaranteeing Philip ine independence and wart. trality. The United States would also eserve the right to establish a nava base in the islands.
