PLOT TO STEAL DOMINATES CONVENTION

FORTUITOUS CIRCUMSTANCE AIDS COOLIDGE

Personal Popularity Lacking; Republican Party Faces Problem in Georgia.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Senator Johnson's failure as a candidate against President Coolidge is not taken even by Republican leaders as a proof of the latter's strength. It is regarded simply as an evidence that the Republican voters who have expressed themselves in primaries thus far saw little choice between Johnson, with his bad record on the tariff and Newberry, and President Coolidge, the defender of Denby and Daugherty.

At Odds With Party.

President Coolidge's dismissal of Harry Daugherty from the bosom of his official family was a slap at the Republican national committee, which had been for weeks defending the former attorney general and denouncing all his critics and investigators. It is thought that President Coolidge's elimination of Daugherty must have chagrined and angered Chairman John T. Adams, of the Republican organization, and the group of which he is the spokesman.

Color Splits Georgia.

As part of the price of winning Georgia's delegates for Coolidge, the Republican federal machine has had to accept both a negro republican committeeman and a negro republican legislator. From the point of view of the party, the very outcome that the white women of the Republican organization have feared and sought to avert. Now that the Coolidge managers have a negro "associate" committeewoman they are confronted with the problem of what to do with her.

GOVERNOR ANNOUNCES NEW TEXT-BOOK COMMISSION

AUSTIN, April 15.—A new text-book commission to serve during the balance of Governor Neff's term was announced here by the executive. Members of the new commission are: Miss Mamie Bastian, Houston; Doner, Longview; Miss Helvie Anderson, Brownwood; A. S. Bush, Cuero; Miss Anna Garretson, Austin, and Miss Elma A. Neal, San Antonio.

Jack Campbell, On Habeas Corpus Writ, Seeks His Freedom

Jack Campbell, through his attorney, made an application for a writ of habeas corpus this morning and a hearing of the writ was being held this afternoon in district court. Campbell, arrested by Texas Ranger McCoy, near Pawhuska, last Friday on the suspicion that he is the Campbell who formerly operated the "stone house," east of Eastland and who was believed to have been killed in August, 1920, by an unknown man, has been in the Eastland county jail since Sunday for identification purposes.

NEFF INVEIGHS AGAINST M'ADOO AND UNDERWOOD

Declares Both Are Unavailable as Candidates; Wants Uninstructed Delegation.

CLEBURNE, April 15.—Opening his campaign for an uninstructed delegation to the democratic convention in June, Governor Neff turned a heavy broadside against the candidacies of both William G. McAdoo and Oscar W. Underwood for the democratic nomination here last night.

He was more vigorous in his talk against McAdoo than Underwood. Regarding Underwood as presidential timber, the governor said: "Underwood is a statesman and a man of great ability, but he is not in favor of prohibition laws. He is a wet." The governor opined that in view of Underwood's opposition to making the country bone dry, "certainly Texas will not instruct her delegation to vote first, last and always for Underwood."

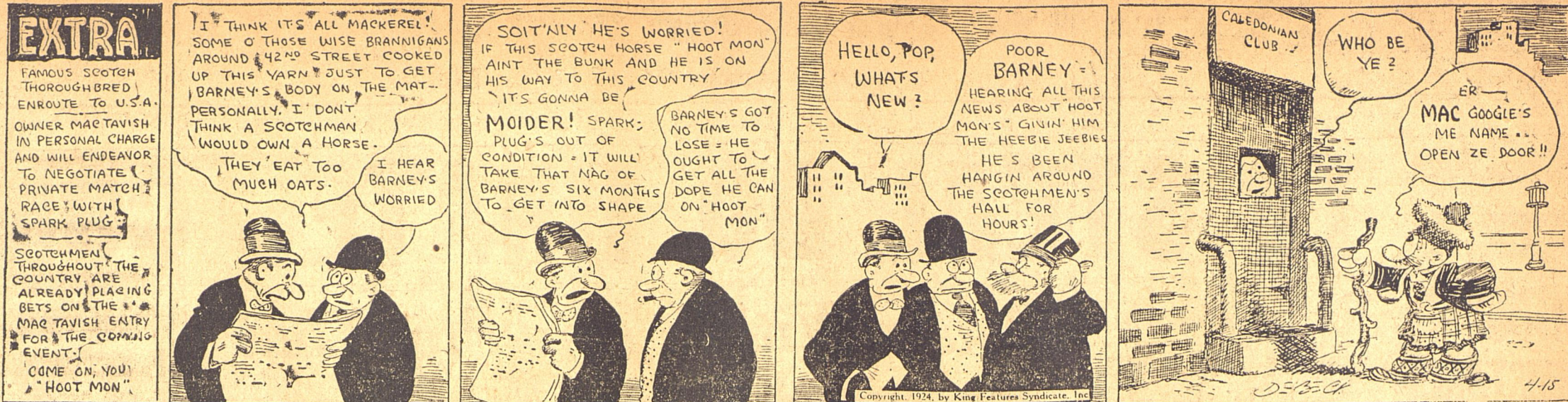

MARKET OPINION ISSUED TO JESS TAYLOR & COMPANY

NEW ORLEANS, April 15.—H. & B. Beer wired Jess Taylor & Co. of Cisco as follows: "Reactionary sentiment, lower cables than due and small domestic March consumption influenced values to a lower level. The weather inland was not altogether satisfactory, remaining rather unsettled, with scattered showers over the week-end and indicated for the immediate future.

There was less desire to buy, however, owing probably to the weakness of the stock market. On the contrary, the disposition was to liquidate. Even at the present rate of domestic consumption, if stocks on this side of the Atlantic were to lose as much per month as they decreased last month, supplies would be virtually exhausted by September.

This feature of the situation does not seem to be appreciated because of new crop talk, or are improving economic conditions abroad taken seriously.

As to the new crop, reliable advices are that preparations are backward, but in Texas better progress since April 1 is reported owing to more favorable weather in that state.

The best of weather is necessary to permit satisfactory progress of the new crop, but instead, unsettled, showery weather is indicated for nearly all districts of the cotton region.

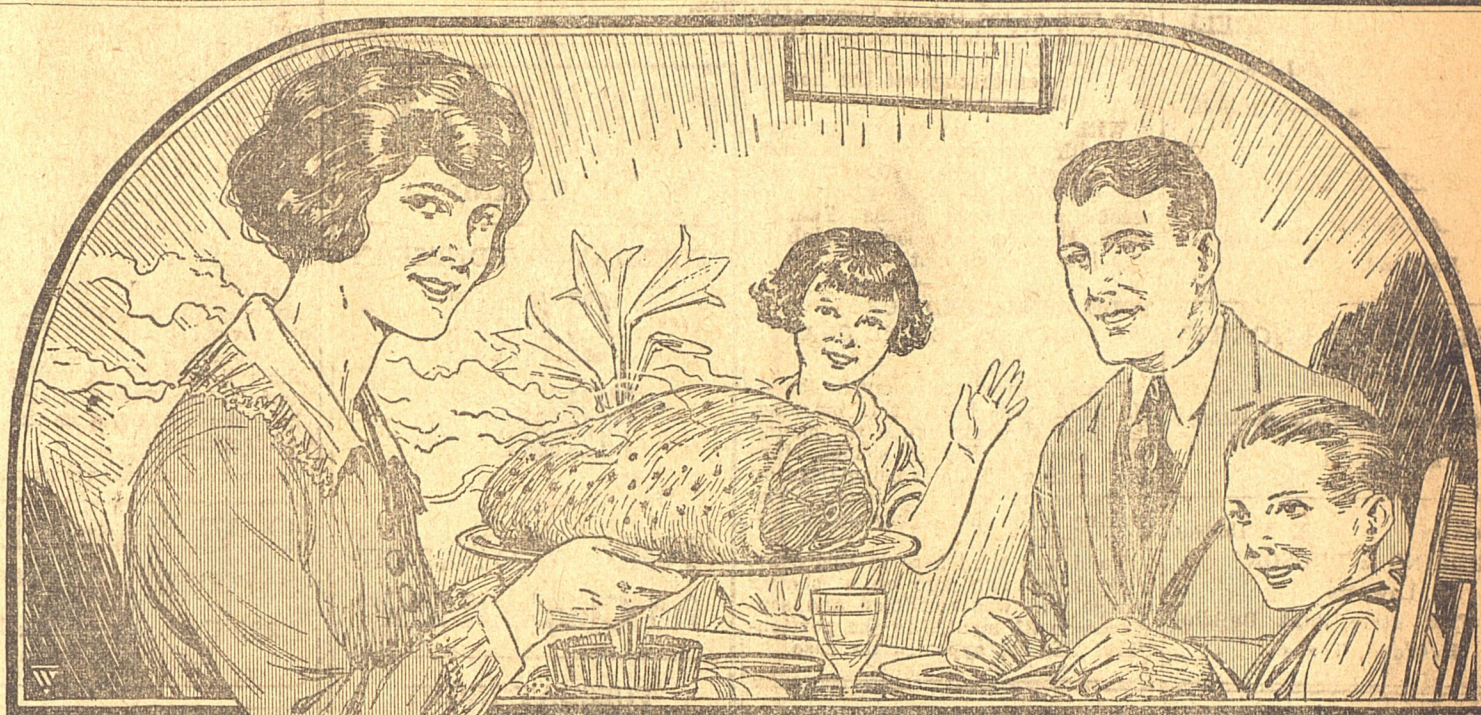

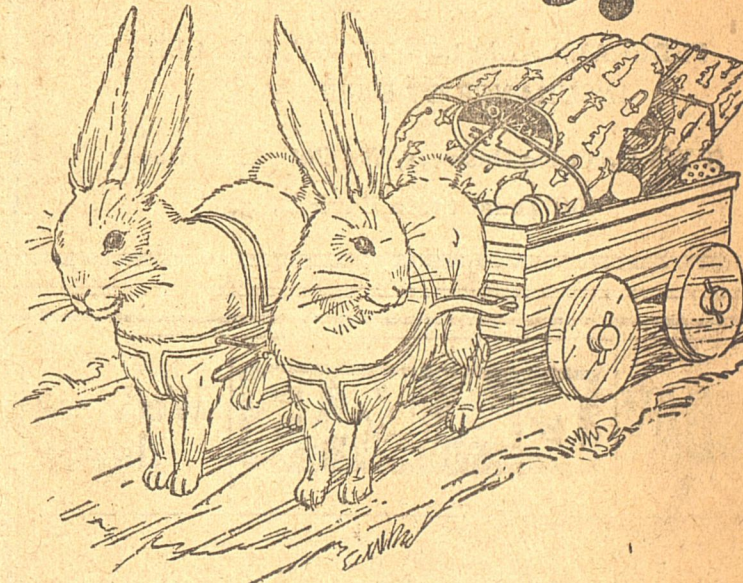

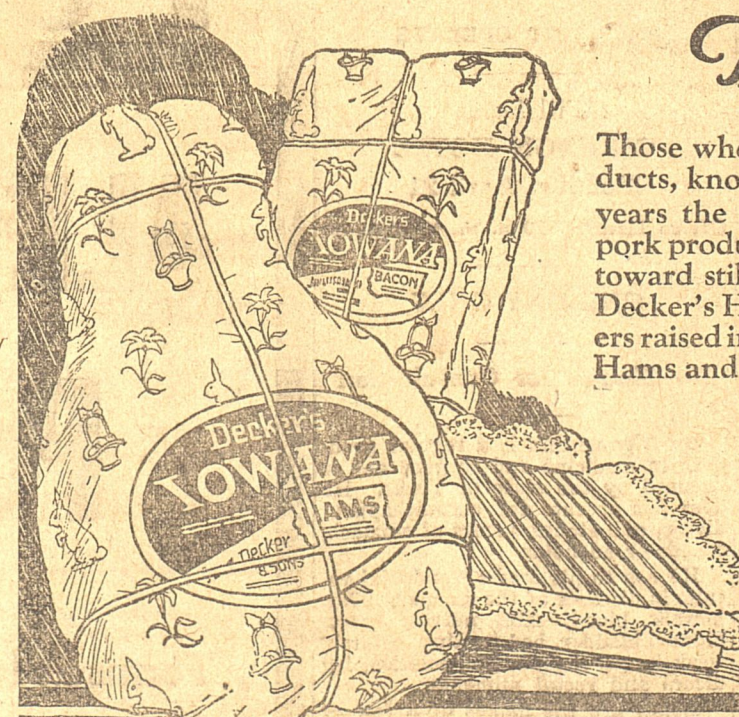
