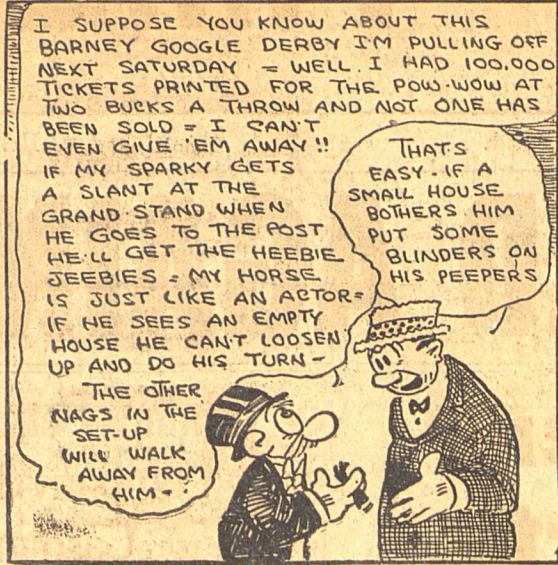

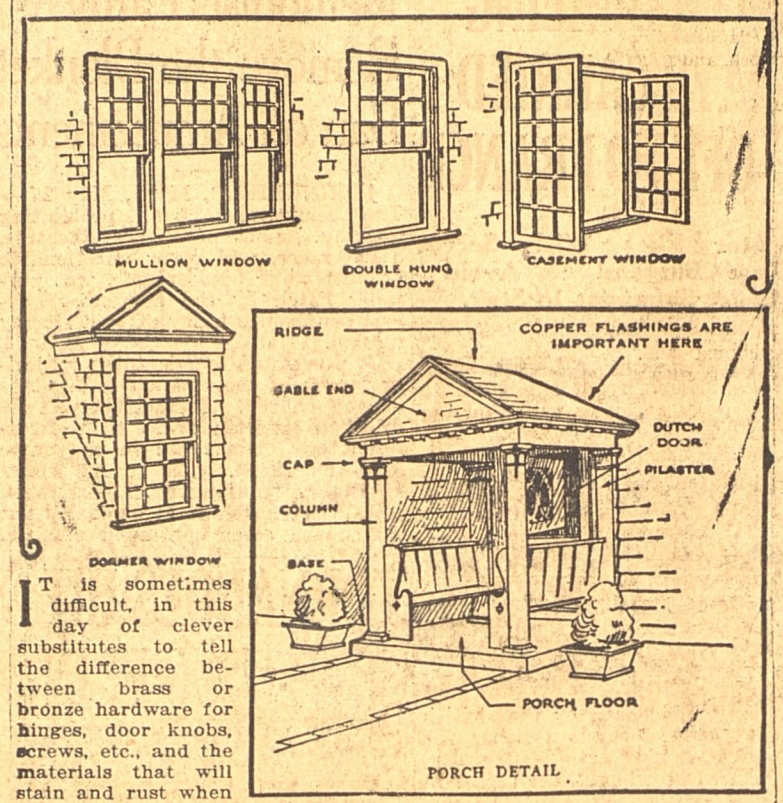

CLAIMS OF COLUMBUS AS DISCOVERER OF AMERICA ARE TO BE CONTESTED

GOTHENBURG, Sweden (By mail to United Press).—Somebody beat Columbus 20 years in the discovery of America. This is one of the statements that will be advanced, defended and, doubtless, attacked, at the world congress of Americanists which is to be held here Aug. 20-25, and for which preparations are now being made.

An "Americanist" is an explorer, ahaeologist, or other specialist who is expert on the history, anthropology, civilization, etc., of North or South America. At least 1,500 of them have been given special invitations to attend the Gothenburg congress. A couple of hundred have already accepted, and more acceptances are coming in daily.

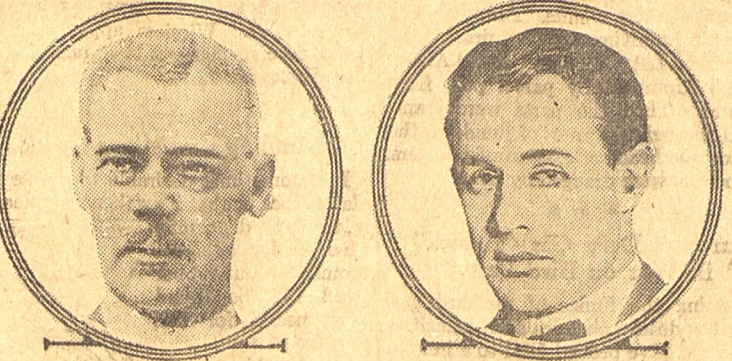
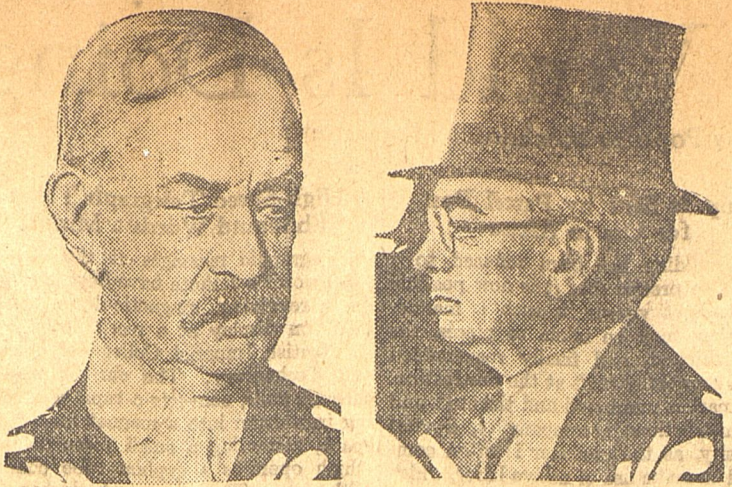
In order to keep the meeting from becoming a babel of voices, the authorities have decided that the official languages are to be English, French, German, Italian, Spanish and Portuguese. The newspaper reporters maintain that that is plenty. Besides the invitations to individuals a great number of countries have been invited to send official representatives, and a score have already agreed to do so.

The paper on the discovery of America is entitled: "The Discovery of the North American Mainland 20 Years Before Columbus." It is to be presented by Sofus Larsen of Copenhagen, who has spent years of research on the subject.

Another event on the program which will attract the attention of the scientific world is the first and exclusive report of the Arctic expedition which Rasmussen is now conducting. This will be presented in two lectures by the explorer. Other expert reports which are to be presented at the Americanist congress include investigations of a primitive race in Bolivia, the study of a lost civilization of ancient Mexico new discoveries concerning the religious beliefs of North American Indians, the history of tobacco and its use, etc.

The last previous international congress of the Americanists was held in Rio de Janeiro in 1922.

Cyrus E. Woods, American Ambassador to Japan, has resigned. He was opposed to the Japanese exclusion act passed by Congress. John Hays Hammond, Jr., son of the noted engineer, has exhibited in Rome a secret radio device, which sends several messages at one time and which can be picked up only by stations knowing their combination of wave lengths. James A. Flaherty, Supreme Knight of the Knights of Columbus, will receive from the Pope the first medal struck off in commemoration of the outstanding achievement of the year 1923 in the Pontiff's reign. For the first time in history this medal is dedicated to an American lay organization, the Knights, for their charity work in Rome. George Harvey, former American Ambassador to London, has been appointed editor of Edward B. McLean's Washington Post.

NOMINATION OF ABE LINCOLN IS RECALLED

Seward Nearly Wins on First Ballot, but "Favorite Sons" Defeat Him.

With two national political conventions approaching, McClure's for June recalls what was in many respects the most important convention in history—the republican convention in 1860. The story of that convention, which selected Abraham Lincoln as the party standard bearer, is told by a delegate who cast his vote for the rail splitter—Addison G. Procter, of Kansas.

To the 466 delegates who met in Chicago, Procter says, Lincoln was one of several "native son" candidates and was conceded but slight chance of the nomination.

William H. Seward, senator from New York and a former governor of that state was the outstanding candidate. He had pledged to him within 80 votes of a majority.

Vermont asked the nomination of Senator Jacob Collmer, New Jersey presented Senator William L. Dayton, Pennsylvania offered Senator Simon Cameron, Ohio had Salmon P. Chase, Missouri, Judge Edward Bates, and Illinois had a united delegation for Abraham Lincoln.

"There were 466 votes and 234 were required for nomination," Procter relates. "The first ballot showed Lincoln receiving about 80 votes, and Seward 183, within 50 of nomination. On the second ballot the votes of the favorite sons drifted toward Lincoln, giving him a hundred more."

"At the third ballot the favorite son voters drifted still more toward Lincoln. As we kept tally we discovered Lincoln was within three and a half votes of nomination. As the chairman was about to announce the result, Judge Carter of Cleveland, a pock-marked fellow with a voice like a bull, rose and shouted, 'Ohio will change three or four four votes from Chase to Lincoln.' That nominated Lincoln."

Horace Greeley had been opposed to Lincoln. One of the Kansas delegates asked the editor his opinion of Lincoln and this was his reply, according to Procter:

"Lincoln is a very adroit politician. He has an interesting history that would make good campaign literature. But the trouble with Lincoln is this: he has had no experience in national affairs, and facing a crisis as we are now, I doubt if such a nomination would be acceptable. It is too risky an undertaking."

MURDERER PAYS WIDOW.

PARIS.—The price of a life has been charged by the French courts to the widow of a murderer who died in prison. In this case it amounts to half a million francs. Jean Bares, millionaire of Nice, shot and killed Felix de Clinchamps. His wife has now been ordered to pay 100,000 francs each to his victim's wife, mother and three children.

U. S. JAZZ IN BERLIN.

BERLIN.—American jazz music records, "made in Germany," are quite the vogue here. Eric Borchart, saxophone artist from the Bronx, Berlin's most popular jazz orchestra leader, is swelling a handsome income by producing the latest American toe ticklers for a Berlin "plate" house.
