



GOOD TOOLS

Industry Gets Material Aid When Proper Implements Arc Available.

BY SETH W. SHOEMAKER Directer School of Agricultur International Coorrespondence

Amateur gardeners of a confiding disposition often feel that gardening is a pleasurable pastime, involving only two operations, the planting of seed and the harvesting the crop.

Unfortunately, however, there is the important item of work that comes in between those two operations. Anyone can plant a seed, but only the industrious can pick from his vines several weeks later the large luscious tomatoes or the beautiful green peas of the sort pictured in the best seed catalogues. Time is an important factor in

the development of a garden, and the man with the best looking garden is the man who usually puts the most time on it.

Most seeds require from one to two weeks or more for germinating. During that time some cultivation will be well worth while. This accomplishes the dual purpose of stop-ping the growthof weeds and of putting the soil in fine mechanical condition for the young plants that will soon brighten the garden with their green foliage.

Advantages of Loose Soil The watering that has already been given just after the seed was planted will leave the soil in a hard-ened condition. If the weather happens to be dry, and no time is at hand to give further waterings, it may be that the soil will become drier than is best for the germinating seed. Any packed soil will dry much quicker than that which has been stirred or cultivated. The capillary attraction which brings the soil moisture to the sufface is undisturbed and it will be lost by representation into the pair if comething evaporation into the air if something is not done to prevent it. Cultiva-tion is the best method of accomlishing this.

The rows will be clearly indicated by the marks made when the soil was firmed over the newly planted seed and also by the stakes which should have been set just after planting. With a wheel hop in gardens of some size or with an ordinary noe in smaller patches cultivate carefully between each row. This should be hardly more than a light stirring of the soil, sufficient only to loosen the first half inch of the surface and far enough from the rows to keep from disturbing any seeds that

might be slightly out of line.
Look Over Your Implements This is also a good time to take an inventory of implements, to get them into shape for the present season and to add to the assortment any that may later be needed. The list should include a good garden rake, a spade hoe, line, sprayer and spraying material. In larger gar-dens the purchase of a wheel hoe is certainly well worth while, for it combines such implements as a hoe, cultivator and furrow marker, and will do the work of these tools much more easily and quickly than the hand implements. To hoe a long row the most enthusiastic optimist; to cultivate it with a wheel hoe is pleas-

The gardener's attention may well be centered on the weeds during these warm days. A weed killed now will be worth more than a hundred killed later in the season, for it is at this time that they are more susceptible to attack and will yield to nethods that would fail when they are more firmly established in the





MEMORIAL DAY.

Memorial day was not set aside exclusively for a bank holiday, nor even for a double-header at the baseball park. It is a day which in its majestic significance ranks close to Easter

In the year 1868 Major General John A. Logan, then commander-inchief of the grand army of the republic introduced a memorial without form or substance, based upon sentiment alone and dedicated it to every soul that ever "suffered, sacrificed or served" in defense of home, our native land, the enforcement of law and order and the preservation of the unity of the United States of America. The conception of this order was sublime and appealed to the highest sense of the nation at large, then staggering under the appalling losses of the war of the rebellion.

The majestic chords of memory, stretching from the thousands of battlefields and the millions of patriotic graves distributed all over our great nation, to every home and hearth within its boundaries, compelled instant approval of the memorial thus inaugurated. All home-loving, abiding and patriotic citizens, enthusiastically and universally endorsed it; many of the states legalized it, and at this time it is nationally accepted and observed as the silent, yet eloquent, memorial of every soul that ever "sacrificed, suffered or served" in behalf of our native land and its institutions."

If you who stayed at home, or you who went and returned could wake those who sleep and ask of them why they gave their lives, what would be the splendid chorus of these haloed dead. Go to God's Acre yourself. Stand before the tomb of him who died at Saratoga, or at Gettysburg, or on the scarlet hills of Champagne, and in all faith and humility ask him to answer.

No need to write his answer. It will be written in your heart. God grant you heed that answer, and on this memorial day guide your conduct as to make him glad he died for America and you.

Ten Good Seeds More Valuable Than a Thouand

With good seed it is possible to

make a good garden with many other conditions unfavorable but with poor seed it is practically impossible to

run. The cost of seed is such a small item compared with the cost of the working, fertilizers, etc., that there is never any economy in using poor seed, as this may overcome all of the other favorable factors.

Naturally, you ask how can we tell a good seed from a poor one? You cannot. Seeds have to be bought on faith. The reputation of the firm offering them is practically the only guarantee you have of their quality.

All seedsmen make rosy statements about the quality of their seed. But only some of these are true. And the wise gardener who has some r gard for his efforts and hopes to g a good return from his labor will n a good return from his labor will not buy the first package of seeds that is offered to him but will inquire carefully into the reputation of the firm or person offering the seeds for sale.

Benjamin Franklin once said that "He who follows the plow puts his trust in the Lord." He who plants seed puts his trust in the seedsman.

Good seeds are seeds that are Good seeds are seeds that are grown on the plants on the proper soil under proper climatic conditions and handled conscientiously in and handred conscientiously in the most approved manner. It is not possible to practice psycho-analysis of the seeds. You must know what has transpired during the production of the seed or you must take somebod else's word for it. 

'The curing of hay with electri service has great possibilities. Thi has been demonstrated by an experi ment carried on in England, where hay was cut and immediately stacked on a wooden box tunnel about 30 long closed at one end with hole drilled at the top and sides and ar electric fan properly designed at the other end of the tunnel. By forcing air through this wooden tunnel for 30 hours green hay was cured in the stack, an especially fine quality of hay resulting. There is no reason why this method of drying hay could not be extended to the drying of grain which contains an excess of water. These are only a few of the many possibilities to which electric service may be applied with profit to the farmer."


